Saving Students Over \$1.6M in Textbook Costs

OU Libraries Alternative Textbook Grant, one of our Open Educational Resources (OER)initiatives, helps reduce students' costs by supporting faculty members in theadoption, modification, or creation of affordable course content. In theinitiative's first four years, students have saved over \$1.6 million intextbook costs.

The impact of the creation or adoption OER extends far beyond one semester or one classroom. Each newsemester introduces the OER, and the cost savings, to a new cohort of students, compounding the impact. OU Libraries and its supporting partners, the College of Arts and Sciences and the Price College of Business, provide aone-time grant, but the resource can be used semester after semester. Course Materials in Canvas

The OU Libraries' Course Materials Canvas tool is designed to help instructors incorporate library materials in their Canvas courses. Instructors can use the tool to build reading lists that include books

and articles owned by the library, videos, web resources, and more. Benefits:

- Instructors search Discover Local and link directly to resources; no need to deal with off-campus access or link maintenance
- Course materials can be saved and reused in other courses or future semesters
- Course materials lists are added to Canvas course navigation so that students have easy access

Measuring Scholarly Impact

Faculty are increasingly expected to demonstrate the impact of their research; at the same time, the scope of "impact" is expanding. One way the University Libraries is helping faculty find, apply and interpret a variety of metrics for measuring research impact is by creating detailed reports that provide researchers with quantitative metrics for their publications, and summaries of their overall impact and influence. We also work with faculty to build online profiles that update their metrics as their research continues to be used. The Learning Lab

TheLearning Lab is now open on Lower Level 1 of Bizzell Memorial Library. The areaextends the innovative atmosphere that draws users into the HelmerichCollaborative Learning Center and serves as the primary service point forstudents to receive help with research, writing or tutoring. It supports both collaborative and private study with flexible furniture and power tosupport student technology needs.





Virtual Reality

The Architecture Library now offers a customized Vive workstation which allows users to experience their architectural models in Virtual Reality. The VR workstation also has the capability to transform how users experience existing technologies such as Google Earth. Merge VR goggles which allow users to create a virtual experience powered by their smartphone are also available for checkout.

Library Instruction

Classroom instruction sessions are available on everything from basic information literacy

to the use of advanced research materials. Librarians may also assist with the development of effective library <u>research assignments</u>, or help create <u>research guides</u> for your courses to support student research throughout the semester. To schedule classroom instruction, please contact your <u>liaison librarian</u>, or <u>submit a request</u>. Requests must be made no later than 2 weeks before the class date.

Funding Opportunities


Open Access

Open Access refers to the movement within scholarly communication that seeks to make academic resources freely available. <u>OU Libraries supports open access</u> with a <u>fund</u> to help facilitate select open publishing. <u>Applications</u> are accepted online.

DATA Grants

OU Libraries' <u>DATA</u> (<u>Data Acquisition and Transmission Award</u>) <u>grants</u> are available to all OU-Norman affiliated faculty, staff and students. The grants are used to acquire data sets for use in research or instruction, up to \$5,000. Preference is given to applications which result in the permanent acquisition of unrestricted-use data sets. **The fall 2017 application deadline is October 1.**

Zarrow Family Faculty & Graduate Student Center

The Zarrow Family Faculty & Graduate Student Center will open this fall.
