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



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From the Editor

In June of 1986 I was in Dallas and North Central Texas talking to anyone who would listen about this great idea for a lesbian magazine. There were alot of encouraging words from the people I met and talked with, almost all of whom were strangers. I had my mind made up before the trip – that I was going to try the waters with a publication directed

to the women's community.

The encouragement stopped once I came home except for a handful of friends (all of whom I can count on one hand). I got comments like—"You can never make a publication directed at women work. They don't have the income to keep one up and they won't support it!" Others flat did not like the format because I had chosen to stay away from politics and direct it toward entertainment. Several "friends" told me that I was nuts. Well, friend's advice can be great, but I have never believed you should hinge your life

on what people think or say. Otherwise, nothing would ever get done.

I am proud to say that Dimensions is two years old this month! And without you – the advertisers, the subscribers, the distributors, and the readers we would not be here trying

for our third year of publication.

At the risk of sounding like the Academy Awards, my thanks would not be complete without adding to the list, my staff, made up of mostly volunteers, who also believe in Dimensions and have contributed long hours and weekends to meet deadlines. We would not be here without you. A special thanks to Tasha Sumner who gave me the courage to build a business from a long supressed dream and the determination and foresight to work with me.

This by no means implies we are perfect, or that the job is easy, or has been easy. I would tell anybody who is considering starting a business of any kind that the horror stories are true: there are long hours and I don't mean eight to ten hours a day. I mean sixteen to eighteen. Don't think you are "going to fly" for the first year because odds are you aren't. It is real easy to over estimate what you think you can do. And if you expect support, especially from close friends – think again. To this very day, only one of my friends has a subscription to Dimensions. They think it is fine, but I "dedicate too much time to it". But for all the negative aspects there is the reward of knowing you are doing something you enjoy and making it work, in spite of set backs.

Our first year was by far the hardest both emotionally and financially. Emotionally we got practically no feedback and had very little advertising, it was frustrating, and at times, I began to wonder if my friends weren't right – "I was nuts." The second year was somewhat easier and that can mostly be attributed to the added support from our subscribers, readers and advertisers. For all the plusses, it is still hard financially, but

together we are making it happen!

AIDS Education **Grants Available**

Washington D.C. - The United States Conference of Mayors released a Request for Proposals (RFP) for funding of community based AIDS risk reduction education programs targeting racial and ethnic minorities. Approximately 15 grants will be awarded for projects up to 12 months in amounts ranging from \$20,000 to \$42,000.

Between January 1981 and June 1988, over 62,000 persons have been diagnosed with AIDS; a disproportionate number of these persons are in black and Hispanic communities. The primary goal of this RFP is to provide education on AIDS and HIV infection to racial and ethnic minorities through funding community based, community service organizations with an emphasis on those organizations with established ties to racial and ethnic populations.

Funding for these grants was made available to the Conference of Mayors by the federal Centers for Disease Control. Over \$1 million in grants has been given to fund over 50 projects in the five previous rounds of funding.

Lesbian & Gay Couples Needed for **National Survey**

Seattle, WA - A national survey of lesbian and gay couples is being undertaken by Partners. The research will help determine the nature and needs of this often invisible segment of the gay community. The last major survey of gay and lesbian couples was conducted almost ten years ago.

All lesbians and gay men in a relationship are asked to participate in the survey. The short, anonymous questionnaire requests general information on subjects such as discrimination, finances, children, relationship problems, and sources of relationship support.

To request survey forms, write Partners, Box 9685, Seattle, WA 98109. and include a self-addressed, stamped business envelope. Groups or organizations are encouraged to request and distribute multiple copies. The Partners' mailing list is confidential; never sold or loaned.

According to publisher Demian, "This information promises to be of immense interest, and it will arm social service providers and civil rights organizations with information they need."

Partners is an eight-page monthly containing interviews, news, and features of interest to lesbian and gay couples. press release

\$20,000 Grant Awarded To AIDS Legal Resource Project

Austin - In an important development for the AIDS Legal Resource Project, the Texas Equal Access to Justice Foundation announced on June 8 its award of \$20,000 to the program.

The grant money will be used to provide legal services to low-income clients of the AIDS Legal Resource Project, a comprehensive, statewide legal assistance and education program of the Texas Human Rights Foundation.

Created in 1984 by the Texas Supreme Court, the Texas Equal Access to Justice Foundation is a non-profit organization which funds legal service programs for the poor in civil matters. The grant is part of the IOLTA (Interest On Lawyers' Trust Accounts) program which pools funds from the trust accounts of lawyers who choose to participate.

This year, the foundation is giving a

total of \$120,000 in discretionary fund grants-the category of grants for which statewide organizations like THRF are eligible-to 5 organizations.

THRF Executive Director Dara Gray said about the grant: "We are very happy to have been selected as a recipient of these IOLTA funds. The grant will give us the means to go full steam ahead on the AIDS Legal Resource Project. Still, it provides only part of the funds necessary to address the tremendous needs in this area, so we are actively seeking other donations to meet the entire program budget."

The AIDS Legal Resource Project, with a total budget of \$75,000, will consist primarily of a toll-free legal information hotline and the Council of Cooperating Attorneys, a statewide network of attorneys recruited and trained by THRF to take on AIDS-related cases.

Hotline callers will receive assistance from the legal director or trained volunteers and, when necessary, will get referrals to members of the Council. In some instances, legal counsel will be provided on a pro bono (free of charge) basis. Additionally, a public education program will educate Texans on the protection of individual rights of people directly affected by AIDS.

The Texas Human Rights Foundation is a non-profit organization dedicated to fighting discrimination against lesbians and gay men and against people affected by AIDS through public interest litigation, education, and legal assistance.

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Dear Agnes,

My lover and I just came home from a "dream vacation" that we had saved for years to take. We had a wonderful time and spent the last two weeks in Paris. I am into art and spent several days in the museums and galleries while my lover did the sight seeing tours.

My lover met a beautiful French woman during one of these afternoon excursions and proceeded to talk me into a three-way. It was wonderful. We spent a week having blissful, erotic sex. But I would never do this kind of thing at home.

Dear \$30K Difference,

If your lover says she doesn't have a problem with your financial situation then I think you should quit worrying so much. If she has the money and wants you to come along on a trip you should stop feeling guilty.

If you threw a fit every time she wanted to go somewhere because you don't have the money to go, that is a different matter, but if she asks you to go, you should stop the negative feelings.

If you were living with her and not paying for anything or helping with the house I could see where you might feel bad or inadequate, but sounds to me like you are keeping up your end as much as possible. Unfortunately, we can't all make \$50,000 plus, but as long as you take care of your financial responsibilities, there is no need to feel inadequate.

If I came home and my woman was sleeping with my best friend, I would beat the hell out of my best friend and drag my woman home by the hair of the head. You can't stand for that kind of baloney in life. You should have told her to do something. No wonder she is depressed.

Dear The Boss,

To answer your first question-I never had any to start with!

If you reread the letter from "In the Dumps", you will notice that she did not ask for advice.

Women are not possessions or property as you imply. And just because you drag someone home doesn't mean you can make them love you or make them stay. Or does that count in your book? I think you could write an excellent advice column, but you may be a few years ahead of your time. Try writing a column for the Neanderthal cavemen, they sound more your style.

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In the futuristic short story, "The Test", by Katherine V. Forrest*, the author describes a world where being homosexual is preferred. In the story, the "normals" try desperately to prove that their children are homosexual. Dr. Newell, the researcher in the story makes the following statement:

"Imagine knowing beyond a shadow of a doubt that all those individuals in your species [humans] with exceptional intelligence or creativity possess a precise genetic configuration [homosexuality], either dominant or recessive and that you don't."

Now this may sound a bit far-fetched to us, but what if we were an "accepted minority" as opposed to being considered a "deviant lifestyle"? What changes could we expect? Below are some of the differences I see could be made in our everyday lives if this world were closer to perfection.

Families

As in the story described above, we would be able to expect acceptance from our families. Parents would not disown, disinherit, commit or otherwise shun their homosexual children. You would be able to bring your lover home for Thanksgiving without receiving a cold shoulder from your favorite aunt and strange questions from your grandmother. You would be given the double bed in the guest room and not the twin beds in your old room and no one would harass you about being an "old maid". Some of us are lucky

enough to have families like this already, many are not so fortunate.

Work

In this "perfect world" of the future, you could not be fired from your job for your sexual orientation. You would not be the butt of office jokes or the subject of harassment and juicy gossip. You would not be held back in climbing the corporate ladder for being "single", nor would it be taboo to bring your lover to the office Christmas party. You wouldn't be embarrassed to receive flowers from another woman on Valentine's day and no one would question your direct deposit donation to the Gay Alliance.

Military

Of course, in this hypothetical society, homosexuals would not only be "allowed" in the military, they would be judged on their merits as soldiers alone and not on the basis of who they loved. Who knows, they might even have base housing for same-sex couples!

The General Public

Wouldn't it be great if you could kiss your sweetheart goodbye when she is leaving on a long trip without stepping back into the house and pulling the door shut? Or, how about holding hands in the mall, calling each other "honey" in the grocery store and being able to say "my lover" and not "my roommate" when talking to anyone, including your

family and your neighbors. The problem of sidelong glances from bank officers when setting up a joint checking account or loan would be eliminated, as well as, store clerks who give you dirty looks when receiving one of those checks and nurses who don't understand why "the roommate" wants to stay all night at the hospital. In the year 2525, anything can happen.

Politics

Now this covers all kinds of possibilities - from gay elected officials (we already have some of those) to an absence of police harassment. If you wanted to run for political office, you wouldn't fear that your sexual preferences would cause harm to your campaign - it wouldn't even be an issue. There would be no worries about homophobic judges, juries or any other officials. We could go even further and speculate that, after all the human and civil rights are taken care of, our justice system could then focus more on critical issues such as the environment, the population explosion, starvation and disease. Of course, if this were a real Utopia, there would be no need for politics at all, much less a justice system, police, etc.

Now all this may sound like just so much daydreaming to you but, as my mother always says, "Anything is possible". As I have pointed out, much of what is written here is already happening in some families, cities and states across this country. In some European countries an article like this might even be considered ludicrous. It can happen.

It's happening now. All we have to do is keep pushing. Who knows, Katherine V. Forrest may be right. In closing the story "The Test"*, Dr. Newell turns to her assistant and says:

"From biblical times, from the very dawing of our species, racial foreknowledge told the normals that we represented humankind's next step on the ladder of evolution — that the homosexual is homo superior."

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A Discussion of Lesbian Literature Both New and Old

This month T. Sumner Reviews:

SUNDAY'S CHILD by Joyce Bright

OSTEN'S BAY by Zenobia N. Vole

Summer is here and the heat is on. One good way to cool off is to sit under the air conditioning vent and read a good book. I've got two great summertime books this month.

The first is <u>Sunday's Child</u> by Joyce Bright (Naiad Press, Inc., \$8.95). The story revolves around Kate Ashbourne and her best friend Angie. Kate is a runner. She came just steps away from the Olympic Trials in high school and now, 24 years later, she's ready to try again. Kate enlists Angie to coach her. This not only deepens their friendship but also serves to take Angie's mind off the rapist that is terrorizing their town. As the big race draws closer, neither woman realizes that they are on a collision course with the rapist.

This novel involves many aspects. There is mystery, romance and, of course, running. Ms. Bright captures all of it well, but especially the sport. She takes you through the endless stream of thoughts that run through your mind during any lengthy physical activity to the competition and comraderie among the contestants. It even made me want to take up running. (I wear my jogging shoes to run to the refrigerator).

There are also some intriguing insights into the mind of a rapist, as well as, the disturbed family life that produced him.

I would recommend this book to anyone interested in sports but also to mystery and romance lovers. This is one of those books where you get it all – right down to the shocking conclusion!

Next we have Osten's Bay by Zenobia N. Vole (Naiad Press, Inc., \$8.95).Gail Murray is a marine geologist working at a small Canadian university. When she is offered a job on an island off the coast of South America, she eagerly accepts. But, upon her arrival, she discovers that the job is not what it appeared to be. With funding from a mysterious, oil hungry corporation and several near-fatal accidents with her SCUBA divers, Gail is reluctant to hand over her valuable research.


In the meantime, Gail becomes involved with Marike Osten, owner of a resort on the island. As intrigue leads to violence, Gail goes to Marike for help and they fight the evil together.


Ms. Vole is a captivating author. Her descriptions of the island, as well as, it's underwater surroundings, are written in vivid detail. The only thing I found disconcerting is the lack of gray. By

that I mean that the bad characters are evil and the good ones are so good it hurts. A few in-between characters or at least some that you could wonder about would definitely have helped my involvement in the plot. Also, the lead character, Gail, lacked definition until very late in the book, almost all you knew about her was that she was a marine geologist and was one of the "good" ones.

This a great book for anyone interested in SCUBA diving or for lovers of melodrama.

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
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


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
