MOMENTUM BUILDS FOR MARCH ON WASHINGTON

Washington, D.C. - Activists in over 200 cities are organizing to bring thousands of lesbians, gays, People with AIDS, and civil rights supporters to Washington D.C. on October 11th for the second National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights.

According to Pam David, on of full-time national staff twelve members, support is growing around the country. "The march has already been endorsed by over 450 student groups, labor officials. women's solidarity organizations, groups, AIDS service organizations, lesbian and gay groups and elected officials," David said.

Early reports indicate a massive turnout for the March. According to Arthur Scott, "New York City is sending 500 busses, thousands of people are flying in from California, and planes have been chartered from both Columbus, Ohio and Minneapolis, Minnesota."

THE EARLIEST VISIONS OF GAY UNITY

San Francisco, CA - The concept of gay political and social organization existed as early as 1865 - far sooner than scholars had previously believed according to a newly discovered document.

The document, titled "Bylaws for the Urning Union", was written in German by Karl Heinrich Ulrichs. Writing under the pseudonym Numa Numantis, Ulrichs proposed a union that would "bring Urnings out of their previous isolation and unite them into a compact mass bound together in solidarity." (The word "homosexual" had not yet been coined in 1865: "Urning" was the term generally used

by Ulrich and his contemporaries.)

The proposed bylaws went on to propose that the union should "champion the inborn human rights of Urnings...before the law" and defined the future goal, "to found Urning literature."

The bylaws were recently discovered by gay scholar Manfred Herzer in the Hungarian National Library; they were amongst a collection of papers that had belonged to Karl Maria Kertbeny, a contemporary of Ulrichs. The two men had corresponded extensively, but apparently Kertbeny, before his death, tried to destroy all documents that could have suggested he was a homosexual. Herzer hypothesizes that the bylaws escaped purge only because they had slipped between two very unrelated papers.

The document was translated into English by Hubert Kennedy, Ulrich's biographer. Kennedy's work on the early gay activist will be published in December by Alyson Publications.

There is no evidence that the Union was ever actually formed. However, two years after writing these bylaws in 1867 - Ulrichs went on to become the first self-proclaimed homosexual to speak out publicly for the rights of homosexuals. According to Kennedy, "Ulrichs was a colorful and strong personality, Not only is his theory of homosexuality historically important, but his courageous and moving defense of gay people is a lasting inspiration for anyone interested in the gay movement."

CENSUS WON'T ASK IF YOU ARE GAY

WASHINGTON - The United States census Bureau has decided not to ask

about sexual orientation in the 1990 census. According to the Bureau's Marshall Turner, a question about sexuality had been considered, but was dropped because it would be too upsetting to the public, *Au Courant* reports.

"Given the sensitivity of the questionaire, even though it might be a legitimate concern for research, we felt that we could not jeopardize the public response to such a question," Turner said.

The question would have been especially trick because federal law requires that all questions on a federal census be answered.

Jeff Levi, Executive Director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, didn't mind that the question had been dropped.

"The problem with (a sexual orientation question) is one of confidentiality," said Levi. "How do you assure that information won't be turned over to the wrong authorities?" "If the party involved were not a party of oppression to gay people's experience, then they might be trusted with this type question." According to Another Voice, Long Island, NY.

HEARING IMPAIRED AND HANDICAPPED SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED AT MARCH ON WASHINGTON

Washington, D.C. - The National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights announced plans to organize a special contingent for Persons with Disabilities within the October 11th March and to make every consideration possible to

accommodate the needs of the disabled community.

Hotels are being booked and housing accommodations are being made in facilities that are wheelchair accessible. Many of these hotels are within a few block of the wheelchair accessible D.C. Metro System. For hotel information call (202) 783-1828.

Sign language interpreters for the deaf and hearing impaired are being lined up for both the morning rally at the Ellipse and the afternoon rally at the Capital on October 11th.

ALTERNATIVES FOR LESBIANS CONSIDERING PARENTHOOD

Austin, Texas - On October 17th, Women of Waterloo, a project of Waterloo Counseling Center will sponsor a seminar on alternatives for lesbians interested in becoming parents. The seminar will be held at Metropolitan Community Church at 1100 Springdale from 10 a.m. to 6p.m.

A variety of alternatives including artificial insemination, adoption, and co-parenting will be discussed by local concerned practitioners. Information and advice on the legal implications of lesbian parenting alternatives will also be discussed. Finally, a number of lesbian parents from the Austin Community will discuss their personal experiences.

Suggested registration fees for the

seminar are \$10 per individual and \$15 per couple. No one will be turned away based on inability to pay. Any participant requiring child care should contact Waterloo Counseling Center. For more info. call, Kathryn Baker at 512-322-9654.

NATIONAL AIDS MEMORIAL "QUILT" TO COVER D.C. MALL

Washington, D.C. - The NAMES project, a national memorial to the tens of thousands of Americans who have died of AIDS, will be inaugurated with the unfurling of a giant quilt on Sunday, October 11th in Washington D.C.

The quilt — roughly the size of two football fields — will be composed of thousands of individual 3'x 6' fabric panels, each bearing the name of a single person lost to AIDS.

The panels are being designed and constructed in homes across America by the families and friends of those who have died.

Inspired by the American folk art traditions of quilting and sewing bees, the NAMES project is a positive

expression of personal loss as well as a dramatic illustration of the impact of AIDS on American society.

Plans are being made to tour major American cities with the quilt next spring.

Answers your questions about love, relationships & personal problems

Dear Agnes,

I am a twenty-three years old and heart broken. I fell in love with a woman who is twenty years older than I. I met her in Austin where I was working for her.

She moved to Lubbock where her exlover was living. She then called me and asked if my ex-lover and I would move down there.

We moved and were living with her. Then my ex-lover found out about us and we broke up. She went into the Air Force and I stayed with my ex.

I am still in love with her, but I don't think things will work out. I left her because she wouldn't talk to me and her ex-lover came over all the time. I couldn't handle it anymore. She was seeing a doctor. She tells me that she loves me, but she still loves her ex.

What am I suppose to do? I hurt so bad, and I don't know what to do.

I moved to Houston were my family is. I transferred so I am still working. I got an apartment, but I feel like there is no reason to do all of this. When I moved down here, I was very hurt and depressed. I tried to kill myself, but I didn't do a good job. I'm still here. I'm glad that it didn't work. I moved about a month ago and I don't like it. I guess I don't like being by myself. I am not sure.

I went to a bar the other night and felt -14-

so alone. I didn't like it. So I came home. We use to go out on Wednesdays and dance. I enjoyed that. I think about her all the time. I write to her often and I don't get any reply. What should I do now? I need a friend. Heartbroken,

Dear Heartbroken:

I am a little confused about whose ex is whose and who you are still in-love with, but I'll try to help.

Anytime you break off a relationship there is some depression, but your's sounds more serious than most. You mentioned in your letter that your exlover was seeing a counselor at one time. You might consider that same option. If money is a consideration you should be aware that there are many clinics available to persons of limited means who will adjust their fee according to your income.

A first step towards breaking away from this destructive relationship is to write a letter to your ex and describe your anger. Express your anger at her for not replying to your previous letters and don't allow yourself to be self-pitying. Then, sit back and wait, you may be surprised how expressing your anger can help build up your own self-confidence.

Another very important step is to

make friends. Make an effort to talk to people and don't wait for then to approach you. This may seem very difficult at first, but it will get easier. You need to give yourself time to adjust to your new situation and surroundings before making a decision to move again. Everyone has feelings of loneliness when they have just moved or ended a relationship. There is nothing wrong with these feelings. It is how you deal with them that counts. A counselor could help you work through many of these feeling in a more positive way.

Soon the waitress reappears, and uncorks the bottle she has just held out for your inspection and hands the cork to you. You look at it like a spaceship just landed in your hand and give it back. She shrugs and pours a quarter- inch of the wine into your glass. You look at her like you are offended, after all, you paid for the damned bottle, the least she could do is fill your glass up. You decide not to leave a tip. The waitress leaves,

you take a sip of your wine and spit it all over your perfect date, "tastes like ____," you say.

LAST ACT: Needless to say, you never see your goddess again except once in the bar, she spit her drink on you. The next goddess you find, you take to McDonald's, no wine list there! Your love life is on a steady decline. Fade to black.

All silliness aside, none of us wants to play that part! So, I am here to tell you something about wine...and if you learn nothing more than what to do with a cork, you will at least have learned something. So, the lesson for the day is WINE, how to choose it and what to do once you've got it. Onward, ho!

LESSON ONE:

Okay, so you're having a big juicy steak, now let's see, your supposed to -17- have red wine, right? WRONG!!! As

you used to say when you were a child, "It's a free country." The rule, white wine with white meat and fish, and red wine with red meat, no longer holds up. It's your choice, if you simply detest red wine, go ahead and order the white. No one will look at you funny.

Now a word about labels, if you don't understand anything on them, don't despair, very few people do. However, it is really very simple.

French and German wines are labeled by region. In the case of a really long name, it goes something like this: Region, Subregion, Town, Vineyard. Now you may think this is meaningless information but if you find a wine that you like, check out the region in which it was grown, next time you have to order, you will probably be safe with another wine from that region. If you can remember all of the above information you should make your memory banks available to the FBI.

Italian wines are so confusing that instead of a region or subregion, you should look for a reputable shipping company like Antinon, Frescobaldi, etc. Find one you like and stick with it.

American wines are labeled by the kind of grapes from which they are made. So the rule still goes, find one you like and go from there. However, American ingenuity has brought about wine with screw tops and in aluminum cans, they have fun names like "Hearty Burgundy" "Mountain Chablis". Obviously, there is no such variety of grapes named "Hearty" or "Mountain" so it is advised to keep your distance.

Now, if you have no earthly idea how to pronounce these fun names, here's

a trick to get you off the hook. Look the waitress in the eye and say, "I was thinking of something fairly light and semi-sweet, would you suggest this one? And point to your choice.

LESSON TWO: SWEET, SEMI-SWEET, DRY

A quick lesson in how to figure what constitutes dry wine, sweet wine and semi-sweet wine.

Sweet wines taste something like grape Kool-Aid.

Dry wines leave a faint feeling of dryness in your mouth. Something like the feeling that comes when you get part of the inner shell of a pecan in your mouth.

Semi-Sweet wines are somewhere inbetween.

LESSON THREE: WINE ETIQUETTE

Okay, you've ordered your wine, the waitress brings it to the table and here is what is <u>supposed</u> to happen.

The waitress will hold up the bottle with the label turned towards you. This is simply to acknowledge that she picked up the right bottle as she tripped down the cellar stairs. You nod, yes, that is what you ordered. She uncorks the bottle and hands you the cork. You take it and feel to make sure it is damp (this tells you that the wine has been stored correctly), then you sniff it -

delicately, don't act like you are trying to get over a bad cold. And what should the cork smell like? Wine, of course. If it smells like vinegar, rotten eggs or old tennis shoes, it is definitely not good.

Now she will pour a few drops in

your glass. This is simply to make sure that it hasn't turned to vinegar. Don't turn it down just because you didn't think it would be so sweet...vinegar is the only thing acceptable to turn down.

LESSON FOUR: A FEW MISCELLANEOUS POINTERS

The House wine is the wine on the menu labeled Red, White and Rose. It is served by the glass and by the carafe, not by the bottle. It is sometimes good, sometimes lousy and always cheaper than bottles.

Rose is pronounced "rowsay". To ask for some of that there rose (as in flower) wine is totally uncouth.

Carafe is pronounced like giraffe with a "c".

1974 was a lousy year for wines from Europe.

Mexican food goes better with beer or margaritas.

LAST BUT NOT LEAST

The best way to find out what wines you like is to sample all different kinds. You might start out with the house wines at different restaurants. Be sure to ask what kind they are. The other way is to take a trip to your nearest liquor store and start buying. Now this method may get a little expensive but how can you place a monetary value on your social standing! (Just Kidding.)

So, go out, have fun, don't forget to put your napkin in your lap and use the right fork. After all, once you've got the wine list figured out, the rest should be easy!



GAY AMERICAN HISTORY

Different Daughters

by Louise Rafkin

AHHH, Autumn is arriving with it's inspiring weather. Though it saddens me to say "Goodbye" to summer's fun, the first cool winds of the fall season bring a special joy to my heart. It is a time for me to evaluate my life and set goals for the winter. It is also a time for reflective reading. History, Philosophy and other works of non-fiction are the types of books that seem most appropriate and I have chosen two such books, one old and one new, for this month's column.

Gay American History (by Jonathan \$13.95, Colophon Books/Harper & Row, Publishers) is a fascinating documentation of the lesbians and gay men who have always formed a large but invisible part of our nation.

First published in 1976, this classic in gay studies is a collection of excerpts from letters, court records, newspaper articles, etc., with brief comments and observations by Mr. Katz. The dates of these documents range in time from 1528 to 1976 and come from every part of the United States

There is the heart rending Tennessee court case which vividly tells of two young women in love in the year 1892. When their plans to elope were discovered by their families, they were forcibly separated and one was driven to insanity and murder. Equally as enthralling are the newspaper accounts of Murray Hall, a prominent New York politician during the late 1800's. A heavy drinker, expert poker player and constant womanizer, Murray was married twice. It was not until 1901 when Murray died that the truth became public. Murray Hall's real name was Mary Anderson! She had lived in disguise as a man for over thirty years.

Gay American History is a thick book with small print and is written in the dry style of a college thesis. It is a scholarly work which can be boring at times, but hard to put down at others. greatest contribution is delightful sense of concealed history it

gives us. It proves beyond a doubt that lesbians and gay men have a rightful and historic place in America. second book this month, Different Daughters, (edited by Louise Rafkin, \$8.95, Cleis Press) is a collection of emotions. Twenty-five women, each one the mother of a lesbian, allow us to listen as they explain their relationship with their daughters. Some are accepting, some are resentful. Most were shocked and upset when their daughters came out to them. They all attempt to describe their inner conflicts and the reasons behind them

This is not a self-help book for coming out to your parents. It is simply a forum for the expression of emotions and the pictures it paints are not always rosy. I found myself becoming upset as I read the contributions of some of the less accepting women. But each woman does search her soul to try to identify her feelings, and we are privileged to share these private thoughts.

From a technical standpoint, Different Daughters is uneven. The writing ability of these women bounces back and forth between poor and good, but never reaches that magic point of excellence. They do manage to communicate their emotions however. and that is where this book succeeds. For the mother who is confused by her daughter's lesbianism, it is often a great relief to discover that she is not and that the guilt and alone conflicting emotions that she is feeling are natural and they will pass. for the daughter, this book might provide some insight into her mother's actions and attitudes. Perhaps by sharing this book, mother daughter can begin communicate more openly and more fully share each other's lives.

I am a true skeptic-always have been. I don't believe in ghosts, or the boogie man, or all the supersitions associated with black cats or mirrors. All this superstitious-mumbo jumbo has a place I'm sure but I really don't dwell on such matters. Of course I have known people who swear they have seen ghosts, but I personally haven't. I do enjoy listening to their stories. In fact, Stephen King is one of my favorite authors, he spins a good tale and can sometimes scare the hell out of you, but it is all in the mind. So when I am laying there at three o'clock in the morning waiting for a tap on my window, I remind myself that it is all in the mind.

With this attitude it was difficult to convience me to go to Alpine, Texas. "But there are ghost lights... The Marfa lights. And you will enjoy the countryside."

Great I couldn't wait. "Even the science magizines have sent people out to study the Marfa lights and they can't explain 'em. " There was nothing in that part of Texas I wanted to see. Or so I thought. I looked Alpine up on the map---Right there, on the map, it said, "The Old Ghost Lights."

Three years later I loaded up the car and headed to Alpine, Texas. Alpine is a small college town one hundred and ten miles north of Big Bend in the Davis Mountains. And, yes, it is beautiful and the people are friendly. And no the motels are not American owned.

Of course, I took along three other wittnesses to look at these so called "ghost lights."

I arrived on Friday night and the first place I wanted to go was out to look -27- at the lights. Heck, that's what I came for, right? I drove through Wild Rose Pass and didn't see the ghost that is supposed to be there, so I expected about the same reception from the ghost lights.

Well, I drove almost twenty miles down the highway headed to Marfa from Alpine and, no, there wasn't a big sign that said Marfa light this

was wrong! That damn gold light was moving around like a person walking with a lantern. Not only was it moving back and forth like a person walking, it was coming closer to the car. I was getting a little uneasy, I slid down off the hood of the car and walked to the edge of the road. Maybe it was my vision or the angle I was

way. And then I turned down a dirt road for three or four more miles; passed a ranch house about a mile down and then there was nothing. It was dark! And I mean mountain dark, you couldn't seen your hand in front of your face. There were lights all right. I could see them from the highway, but so what. Funny thing was when I turned off on the dirt road they were all gone except the ranch house light. Strange, but I would bet it was the terrian.

So I parked, turned off the lights, killed the igniton, got out of the car, cranked my first beer, and sat down on the hood to wait. Well let me tell you, I didn't have to wait long. A light began to glow along what appeared to be the south horizon. It was just a glow in the distance and it stayed there for a few minutes. But then it popped up, a full blown light. I looked at my beer. Yep, just the first one. I looked back at the light. It was still there. "Close you're eyes and when you look back it will be gone," King had written in the Shining. He looking at it from. Wrong it was closer and by now it was within a hundred yards, and hell, yes, I was starting to feel spooked. No I don't believe in ghost, or goblins, or the marsh monster, but how could I deny what was right there before my very eyes. The light lingered, but came no closer (I was glad). And then it disappeared. Disappeared before my very eyes. I waited, but it didn't come

I drove back to the highway and pulled into a parking place. It is just a little parking place off the highway that faces the southeast. Still no big sign, reading ghost lights this way. Two or three cars of locals were there drinking beer, partying and talking about Marfa lights. I waited. The locals left. It got quiet again, not much traffic. There was a constant, blinking red light; a distant light on the horizon seemed to be drawn into it from the left side. It exited on the right a big white-gold light. It moved up, above the red light and then it would almost touch the ground and then move back up further away from the red light. We all watched and talked and watched. How could this be happening and who would ever believe it?

We discussed it all the way back to the motel and quickly decided to go have a look at the place during the day.

It was flat land. Oh there were mountains in the distance, the far distance, but nothing that would account for the lights or the movement of the lights. There was still that one ranch house and some power lines close to the road but nothing past that. There just wasn't any way around going back the second night.

I was prepared tonight. I knew the layout of the land and had a good idea how everything set, the mountains and flat land. No problem, I could clear this matter up tonight. I drove out the dirt road about three or four miles, killed the car, unloaded the blankets, and perched myself on the hood.

I waited and after we all got settled and quiet, the red light blinked on the horizon just like the night before. It was a constant blink, reminded me of a radio tower light. There was no tower. But the familiar glow at the horizon started and was drawn into the red light from the left, and then a goldwhite light passed through the red one and started to move up and down the horizon. Here came a second one. looked like it was after the first one that passed through. The first one was getting brighter and closer. I wanted it to come closer, just not too close. A third one started to glow on the horizon. The first and second lights were coming toward the car and they

looked just like car headlights driving down a road. There is no road! I felt that same spooked feeling I was aware of the night before. The closer they came the worse it got. They began to fade. I was glad, otherwise, I might have made a fool out of myself by running down the road screaming. Hopefully someone would have screamed with me. Nobody told me what Marfa lights do to you if they get you.


We didn't stay on the dirt road much longer after that. We drove back to our safe little haven on the highway, listened to the locals pop beer tops, and talk about the Marfa lights. I couldn't help wondering if the locals knew something about that dirt road I didn't.

No, I still don't believe in ghosts, but I sure as hell believe in ghost lights. The way I figure it, if I can see it and have three wittnesses who say they see it then it is not all in the mind.

So, if you are ever traveling from Alpine to Marfa on Highway 67/90 after dark, just turn down the first big dirt road without a gate (it is probably marked on your map), park the car, look out to the southeast, and wait.....They'll be there. But, keep your keys handy, you may feel more secure back on the highway with the locals.






