

What about my job security? What about that time when my lover of 20 years passes away and her family, who hasn't spoken to her in those 20 years, comes in to take "our" car or "our" house? Where is a platform for a voice that cries out "This isn't a fair price to pay for loving someone?"

Please, if you saw the show, write to her. An avenue of communication has been opened to us. If we take advantage of this opportunity, we may, at long last, be heard. If you saw the show and thought it to be a fair representation of your personal beliefs as a lesbian-WRITE!

I am busy collecting letters from Lesbians in San Antonio. I plan to collect as many as possible, throw them all in a box and Federal Express them to the studio in which her show is produced. I am hopeful

that letters will pour in. It's time we took a stand and let the world know that we are tired of having to misrepresent ourselves to families and co-workers on a daily basis. We need legal rights and protection. Unless we make society as a whole aware of our needs, we won't have our needs fulfilled. Speak our and let your voice be heard.

Publisher to Donate March Income to AIDS

Boston - AIDS organizations will receive one-third of all direct-mail income received by Alyson Publications during the month of March.

Sasha Alyson, the company president.

explained that "we've been looking for more ways to help in the fight against AIDS, and this seemed like a good one. For every dollar that comes to us in the mail during March, from individuals buying books, one third of it will be divided equally between the American Foundation for AIDS Research and the PWA Coalition." Alyson also noted that Ray Faulkner, a C.P.A. based in Boston, will certify the process.

"In addition to getting money to two important AIDS groups, we hope to set a precedent for AIDS fundraising." Alyson continued. University officials and established Greek organizations seem pleased with the decision.



She's drunk every night by eight o'clock She hasn't gone but two days without getting smashed. She always feels guilty the next morning, but insists she doesn't have a problem.

When she is drunk, she is verbally abusive but never remembers a thing she said or did the next day. I can't get her to go to A.A. again. I don't know what to do. I can not stand watching the woman I love destroy herself. I also hate living with the verbal abuse. How can I help her to quit drinking again?

not help themselves!

I strongly urge you to find an ALANON group and begin attending immediately. ALANON is a group for the friends and relatives of alcoholic's. It will help you better understand, and cope. Let me know how you are doing and good luck.

I've been dating Jill for about 5 months. We are beginning to talk about a commitment to each other. If this happens, we won't live together right away, but I imagine eventually we will. She is a nice, intelligent, caring woman. We get along great.

The problem is I am a very neat person. My house is always spotless, as well as, my car. Jill is the complete opposite. She throws her clothes on the floor and picks them up when she does laundry. She never washes a dish until everything in the house is dirty. I have never seen her bed when it is made up. Her car looks like a dumpster on wheels — old bottles, candy wrappers, fast food trash.. I could go on and on, but I'm sure you get the picture.

If we live together, I don't know what we would do. I haven't ever said anything about her "house keeping" because I don't want to hurt her feelings. Besides, we don't live together yet. It might never work out, but I feel like we have a really good relationship that can last. I don't want to make her angry or defensive. Should I go ahead and take a chance by bringing it up with her?

Introduction to **Rocking the Cradle** by Debra Chasnoff & Kim Klausner

In 1982, when we were beginning our research for *Choosing Children*, a documentary film about lesbians who become parents after coming out, we set out to track down everything we could find about lesbian and gay parenting experiences and options. We were surprised at how little there was to read — a few out-of-print pamphlets about donor insemination, some legal information about custody battles, a short story here and there in anthologies of lesbian fiction.

Rocking the Cradle had just been published and it stood out as one of the only places gay and straight readers could turn for real life stories that addressed the complexities of

lesbian parenting.

Publications about the reality of any minority group's lives play important role in diminishing their internalized oppression. Over and over we have heard people say, "I thought I was the only one (only black lesbian, only lesbian wanting children, only woman sexually abused by her father, etc.) until I read. . . " Finding words or images with which one can identify can enhance a person's pride and selfrespect and, consequently, sense of personal power. This is especially true for lesbian parents and their children, who have been particularly invisible in the mainstream media.

When we started work on Choosing -15-



Children, we knew only a handful of lesbians in the Boston area who'd had children since coming out. There were perhaps a couple of hundred on the west coast and others scattered across the country. These women were true pioneers. They had a vision and fulfilled it against all odds - social mores, legal impediments and other obstacles. They were determined and creative. They had to be, because society certainly didn't support them and for the most part the lesbian community barely knew they existed. For most lesbians and gay men, being homosexual still was synonymous with not being able to have children. Since then, lesbian communities have become much more aware of the mothers in our midst. In the seventies and early eighties male children were excluded from women's community events, childcare was frequently unavailable and many younger activists just had no appreciation for

the responsibilities of motherhood. Gradually these attitudes have begun to change: more women have decided to parent; networks of lesbian mothers have solidified in some areas; a political base in the community is beginning to form. A small but significant percentage of the baby boom generation now having babies is lesbian. The sheer numbers of lesbians who are now parents (or

planning to be or whose close friends are) have pushed parenting issues to the forefront of the lesbian and gay political agenda.

Hundreds of thousands of us have marched in Lesbian and Gay Pride demonstrations for over fifteen years, fought repressive legislation, and become visible in other political movements. Along with strengthening a rich culture of our own, we've made some small inroads in mainstream culture as well. The public is more aware of us as people and some of the most vicious stereotypes have been weakened in the minds of many.

Sadly, the increased exposure and activism of lesbians and gays has paralleled a rightward shift in the mood and mores of the country (symbolized by the election and reelection of Ronald Reagan). So, while it's now possible to walk into a mainstream bookstore in any major city and find a "gay studies" section. the Supreme Court is ruling that it is permissible for states to outlaw gay sex. And the AIDS crisis and the government's slow response to it has escalated many people's fear and hatred of gay men. The Right is alarmed at changing family structures and the gains of the women's and gay liberation movements. In reaction, they have tried to narrow the range of what is considered acceptable sexuality and lifestyle. Unfortunately, these values have begun to permeate all levels of society. Even many of our straight friends are choosing to marry when ten years ago they questioned the concept of the nuclear family.

It is this renewed homophobia and social repression which accounts for

the lack of significant, long-standing change in the lives of lesbian mothers since *Rocking The Cradle* was first published. In spite of all the people who've come out to families, coworkers, and others, and the increased media coverage of gays, most people are still unfamiliar with or hostile to the concept of gay parenting.

Rocking The Cradle tells many stories about custody battles. When we first read this book, the strength of and gay liberation the lesbian movement was such that we thought that the time would come when a parent's sexual preference would be irrelevant in determining the best interests of a child in custody cases. Today, women continue to get married, have children, and then come out. And lesbian mothers still fight bitter custody battles with exhusbands, the state, or grandparents who feel a gay sexual orientation is damaging to children. We're still losing more of these fights than we're winning.

In the last few years, some of these legal battles reflect new issues facing woman in our community. A Chicago tried to challenge her gay exhusband's visitation rights with their daughters using the pretext that she was afraid of them catching AIDS from him (even though he was perfectly healthy and the virus can't be transmitted casually anyway). lesbian in Northern California didn't have a clear contract with the man she used as a sperm donor. Soon after her baby was born, the donor decided he wanted to be the social father as well and was awarded visitation rights by a judge. She now has to share parenting with a virtual stranger. And a lesbian mom in Denver suffered through the death of her lover and then the loss of her child to the parents of that woman — the biological mother.

There is great diversity within the lesbian and gay community in the way we are setting up childbearing. It seems that the largest number of new parents are starting off in couples, but many of us are raising children on our own, out of choice or because of a break-up of a relationship. Lesbians are sharing parenting with men on a continuum ranging from absolutely involvement no to sharing household and splitting parenting responsibilities 50/50. Increasingly, groups of friends are exploring ways to share parenting even though they don't share romantic attachments. Slowly, more gay men are able to become parents themselves in ways than marriage: they other occasionally able to adopt or become foster parents and sometimes they find a woman to bear a child for them.

In many areas, lesbian-headed families are part of a wider group of families don't mesh with the which sterotypical nuclear family model. Millions of women are raising children without a man in the home (because of divorce, separation, or never having married). The high incidence of divorce and remarriage has meant that millions of children are being parented by adults with whom they have no biological ties. Lesbians' children aren't the only ones growing up with a "non-biological mother" or parent.

It would be terrific if, ten years from now, Rocking The Cradle could be reissued again, but this time as a historical book, capturing the challenges lesbians used to face as parents. In a future such as that, everyone will be familiar with and

tolerant of lesbian mothers; a lesbian's right to parent will not be questioned; and lesbian parents will be able to concentrate their energy on improving the services and support that all parents and children need. Whiles we still have along way to go until this vision is realized, books like Rocking The Cradle help us take the small steps needed to get there.

The Other Side of Venus

by Shirley Verel

This is not usually the time of year you think about reading, after all, spring fever makes you want to do things like fly kites or play frisbee. But, I've got two books this month that are definitely worth taking time out for. Besides, it will give you something to do when the thunderstorms start pounding on the door!

Let's start with The Other Side of Venus by Shirley Verel (Naiad Press, \$8.95). This novel was written and set in the mid-1950's. In one sense, it is a classic story of love gone wrong, in another, it is the story of an era in lesbian history.

The story revolves around Judith Allart, a fairly wealthy woman who has recently ended her marriage, and Diana Quendon, a young novelist. 3oth women are struggling against their love for one another, after all,

lesbianism was not considered a viable alternative for young women in 1955.

There are many forces working against them including friends, relatives and co-workers. These people eventually manage to pull them apart but will they stay separated? You'll have to read the book to find out.

I especially enjoyed this book because there is no trace of the butch/femme role-playing which is so common in novels from this era. I did have a problem wading through the first few chapters, but, once I got into it, I liked it. So, if you are one of those people who won't read a book unless it grabs your attention in the first few pages, this one isn't for you. If you can wait a little bit for the story to unfold, I would definitely suggest The Other Side of Venus.

immediate excitement, <u>To The Lightning</u> by Catherine Ennis (Naiad Press, \$8.95) is the one to read. It's got adventure, mystery, and a good dose of sensuality.

The main characters, Chris and Merry start off on a weekend camping trip as friends. A ferocious thunderstorm catches them off guard and when Chris wakes up, she finds that they are in an unfamiliar valley with no sign of civilization to be found. This is where the adventure, and the love story, begin.

Where are they? How did they get there? How are they going to survive? Will they be rescued? I can't tell you any of that, but I can say that the answers are much more intriguing than the questions.


To The Lightning is an exciting

and intelligently written book. I read it in a single setting and passed it onto my roommate who did the same. I felt tense the entire time I was reading it wondering what would happen next. Ms. Ennis does, however, manage to relieve the tension from time to time with her sarcastic wit.


