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

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We are interested in what is happening in your community.

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November 8, 1988 is a turning point for our country and community. Apathy is the best word to describe the feelings of most voters concerning this election, but the long range problems facing our community and this country will slam head-on into the next President as soon as he takes office.

I was told recently by a close friend of mine, "I have never voted with the gay vote. It doesn't matter that much as long as it doesn't affect my job or my life."

Honey, I'm here to tell you, it matters. The next President will select at least two Supreme Court Justices and the long range effect of their decisions will affect our community and civil rights far into the next century. Anyone who believes things will just go on just like they always have is dead wrong.

Although I won't deny that there are other issues to consider, it is my belief that this election has the potential to affect our lives as women and lesbians right where it counts, in the job market.

Below are listed some of the stands each party has made in regard to lesbians and gays right, as published by the Human Rights Campaign Fund headquatered in Washington, D.C.

Republican

No mention of lesbian and gay civil rights. Rejected endorsement of Presidential AIDS Commission. Calls for research, compassion and expedited FDA drug review. Also calls for "protect(ing) those who do not have the disease," AIDS education that emphasizes "abstinence from drug abuse and sexual activity outside of marriage" and confidential testing and contact tracing. Advocates that people "remain on the job or in school as long as they are functional and capable."

Democratic

Calls for lesbian and gay civil rights and the "rebuilding" of the civil rights enforcement machinery. AIDS planks call for "increased support for expedited research on treatments and vaccines, comprehensive education and prevention, compassionate patient care, adoption of public health community consensus on voluntary and confidential testing and counseling, and protection of the civil rights of those suffering from AIDS, AIDS Related Complex or testing positive for the HIV antibody."

Just one more note: the most frightening thing I see happening concerns paid political commercials. People believe everything those damn commercials say. Don't believe all the paid commercials you see on TV. Look beyond the tube for your information on these candidates. One of the best sources for research is a paper published by The League Of Women Voters. It covers the candidates and their stand on the issues. I strongly urge you to pick up a copy and read it. Their number is in the White Pages of most city phone directories. In larger cities, your Gay Alliance or similar organization may also publish a report on the candidates. Check with them, if they don't publish such information, they should be able to direct you on where to find it. - Roxanne Hunter

5th Annual Texas Gay Rodeo

AUSTIN - The Fifth Annual Texas Gay Rodeo will kick-off in Austin on November 18 through 20 at the Texas Heritage Center on Highway 290 in Austin. Top cowgirls and cowboys from across the state will be competing for TGRA titles.

The competition for Mr., Ms. & Miss TGRA will begin Thursday the 17th at Nexus at 8 p.m. and conclude in closed competition Friday the 18th at the Texas Heritage Center. Winners will be announced Friday night at 10 p.m. at Petticoat Junction.

Rodeo contestants will register Friday the 18th from 6 p.m. - 10 p.m. at the Sheraton Crest Hotel at 1st and Congress.

Grand Entry will be at 12 noon on both Saturday and Sunday. The Rodeo Awards Show will be held Sunday Evening at 8pm at the Lonestar Saloon and Dancehall.

Advance tickets are available from TGRA members and at most sponsor bars. The box office will open at 10 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday. Tickets are \$10 per day at the door. Advance Packages are \$21 and include both Rodeo Days and Friday and Saturday dances (\$7 value) at the Lonestar Saloon and Dancehall.

Texas Human Rights Foundation Elects New Officers

AUSTIN - The Texas Human Rights Foundation (THRF) is pleased to announce the election of new officers of its Board of Trustees at it's quarterly meeting of October 16. Newly elected are Frank Stenger of Austin, Pres., and B.J.(Barbara) Anderson of Dallas, Vice President for Resource Development and Gene Harrington of Houston was named Vice Pres. for Education and Litigation. Re-elected was John Kellett of Houston, Secretary and Dick Peeples of Dallas, Treasurer.

Stenger who has served on the THRF board for over three years, is Assistant Attorney General in the Finance Division of the Texas Attorney General's office, where he also serves as chairperson of the Attorney General's AIDS task force. Formerly with the Dallas law firm of Mauzy and Stenger. Stenger is program chairperson for the Austin Lesbian/Gay Political Caucus. B.J. Anderson has served on the board for three years and, prior to that, acted as state fundraising coordinator for the 21.06 Supreme Court challenge. Active in the community for the past three years, she is co-founder of Among Friends, a lesbian organization in Dallas. With Anderson's election comes a renewed commitment on the part of THRF's board and staff to the concerns of the lesbian community.

Eugene Harrington, an attorney from Houston, is a law professor at the Thurgood Marshall School of Law at Texas Southern University and has served on THRF's board for six years. He is a member of the Legislative Task Force on AIDS and past chairman of the Houston Gay and Lesbian Political Caucus.

THRF is a non-profit, tax-exempt organization dedicated to fighting discrimination against lesbians and gay men and against people affected by AIDS through high impact public interest litigation, education and lawyer referrals.



Everytime I am around her now I feel uncomfortable and angry. I don't want to be so childish, but I don't know how to clear the air. **TWO PARTY**


Dear Two,

One sure way to drive a stake through a friends heart is to discuss politics or religion. That is a truth!


You could try talking with her again about your feelings and anger, but try leaving your political views out of it. Fifteen years is a long time to toss out the window over a difference of opinion.

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A LITTLE LEATHER NUMBER: Comedian Lynn Lavner Talks To Nancy Ford

About two weeks ago I played this incredible private party in Washington D.C. for two men who have been together fro 28 years. One threw a surprise 60th birthday party for the other. It was black tie, and they rented a historical mansion which houses an art museum. This place had been decorated with blown up snap shots of this fellow's childhood — his teddy bears were all around the room. There was a slide show of "This is me in Europe' and 'This is me getting my doctorate'. There was a harpist in the entry way during cocktails, and a trio played during dinner. I was the show. After the champagne we adjourned to a gazebo on the front lawn where we watched 15 minutes of individually commissioned fireworks starting with this guy's profile in sparklers. The point of my telling you all this is so that you know that faggot culture is alive and well today.

Thus began my conversation with Lynn Lavner, gay U.S.A.'s foremost leather-clad lesbian singer/songwriter/ pianist/comedian/recording magnate. It seems that the aforementioned birth-day boy, when asked what he wanted



for his birthday replied "A little leather number." That's Lynn Lavner in a nutshell, you should pardon the expression.

Her audiences are as diverse as the participants in the National Women's Music Festival and International Mr. Leather. And, her appeal is wide enough to take her one-woman show, "An Evening With Lynn Lavner - Is Plenty!" on an extensive autumn tour. Dimensions Texas' readers will have the opportunity to see her in Lubbock at the Golden Torch on November 11th and in San Antonio at the Circle on November 13th. When she returns to her home in New York, she will resume her stint as musical director and women's segment editor of "Gay Morning America," a New York Cable variety show. And then there's Bent Records, her production/management company which has produced all three of her musical/comedy albums. Busy woman.

She was born in Brooklyn, the short, left-handed lesbian daughter of Jewish parentage. her parents, both lawyers, hoped she would follow in their footsteps, to no avail: she says she was "the

lavender sheep of the family."

Prior to her show in Baltimore, Maryland, Lynn took time to talk with me about comedy, politics, show biz, gay women and lesbians, leather and life in general:

NF: The first Lynn Lavner song I ever heard was "Shelly, You've Gone Nelly On Me." Is most of your material historical?

LL: Did you say historical or hysterical?

NF: We know it's hysterical, but is it based in fact?

LL: If it isn't based in fact or an autobiographical experience then it's certainly historical in the sense that it's connected to my life. The story of that song is, one night I came to work at Blue Skies (cabaret). I was wearing eye make-up—I think I wore it every night —but the bartender decided to notice it that night. Looking up from making martinis for the customers, she said, "Hiya Lynn! What's-a-matter — you gone nelly on us?" It was a song title dropped right at my doorstep.

NF: Now, you are Bent Records, is that right?

LL: Oh, yes. Nobody else would record me. I knew that in my heart the minute I started. When you have your own label, you're in charge. No one can (interfere) with your material, and we wanted complete artistic control.

And with good reason. Lynn has released three albums under Bent, including her most recent "You Are What You Where". Past titles have included "The 1st Dyke on Dynasty" and "The Role-Playing Tango", not exactly the kind of material RCA, Epic or Columbia records are looking for, admittedly. Not long ago, Lynn authored a musical — "Ladies Don't Spit And Holler" which enjoyed a respectable Off-Broadway run. The original score LP was originally produced through Bent, but is now considered a collector's item. It was also performed in various clubs and on college campuses throughout the U.S., and in the prison where Jean (diet doctor murder) Harris is incarcerated.

"She knitted all through it. She was the only single woman at the performance. Everyone else was pretty much coupled up."

NF: How did you first know that wearing leather on stage is what you wanted to do?

LL: I think that in looking for a distinctive stage costume — something that nobody else was wearing. Also, it was very politically incorrect at the time I started to do it. Women at festivals and at clubs were not welcomed in leather. And all of it just reeked to me of what homophobic straight people have to say about gays in general. I just felt that I had been told all my life how to walk, what to think, how to dress, who to love. I wasn't about to be told it by a bunch of queers.

But, since those early days the tide has turned. Just five years later, Lynn admits to needing to employ security personnel in her dressing rooms to deter her more ardent admirers. "I don't know. Maybe I'll have to get back into taffeta."

Though she describes her act as being the most "politically incorrect in lesbian show business", that description is as satirical as some of her song lyrics. Lynn has combined the power of music and comedy and uses that power to convey to her audience that idea, political or otherwise, which impassioned her to write the song in the first place. LL: I've been told by politicians that they envy me. David Scoundras (an openly gay city councilman from Boston, Mass) gets up and people expect a speech. I get up an they don't. There's a term that I don't like to over-use manipulation - (but) that's what we

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do That's our stock and trade. Particularly in the cabaret. It's very spiritual, it's very emotional - it takes the audience through a series of rollercoaster rides of joy and laughter and surprise. And, there are people who won't be affected at all; or they have a good time, or they have a good cry - it just all depends on which feeling they want to follow.

Throughout our conversation I found that we were referring interchangeably to ourselves as "gay women one minute, then as "lesbians" the next. I asked her if she had a preference.

LL: I think it's typical that there has to be a conflict over this. There's probably ten million lesbians in the United States, sitting in a circle, fighting. For myself, I call myself a gay woman only because of that feeling of sympatico with gay men-not feeling excluded by the term "gay people". For me, "gay people" means women, as well. For other women who have had different experiences with men or who have not had experience with men or - worse yet — have had experiences only with straight men - I can see how there would be a desire to (engage) this particular female identity. But I'll be a lesbian till the day I die. She went on.

LL: This is a time when (we) women can't be separatists. Our enemies would love to see us divided, not only by gender, but by political feeling, by status, by color, by what we like to do in bed, and - God forbid - what we like to wear onstage and off. But the truth is, what we saw in Washington last October and again this October is the lesson 'Let's be visible. Let's stay together.' And then we talked about AIDS.

LL: Being a New York woman (where the AIDS death toll leads the US), I felt the effects of the epidemic in 1982. I used to do AIDS benefits where it would be me and six drag queens.

NF: That sounds familiar


LL: At that time, there were lesbians who would say to me "If AIDS were a lesbian disease, do you think they (gay men) would come to our defense?" There's nothing funny about that, is there?



CRUSH by Jane Futcher

The Finer Grain by Denise Ohio

Coming into the busy holiday season, it is often hard to find time for yourself. This month, I've got two books that are wonderful for when you can finally get away and relax.

The first is <u>Crush</u> by Jane Futcher (Alyson Publications, \$6.95). <u>Crush</u> was first published in 1981 to rave reviews.

The story revolves around Jinx, a student at an exclusive girl's boarding school in the early sixties. Jinx had had a hard time fitting in ever since she arrived there, but in her senior year, she finally feels she belongs. The beautiful and popular Lexie has chosen her for a friend. Jinx develops a crush on Lexie and is trying her best to get over it, but Lexie has plans of her own. And...Lexie always gets what she wants.

Carol Seajay of the Feminist Bookstore News says of Crush, "A wonderful high school lesbian romance, rich with developing sexuality and attraction with the ins and outs, true pain and joys of adolescent love. I wish I had read it in high school."

I am in total agreement with Ms. Seajay. This book gives the young lesbian affirmation of her feelings but also a taste of the reality of this lifestyle.

Jinx faces prejudice, discrimination and more than her share of hostility during the course of her relationship with Lexie. All the things that most of us have had to face.

Amory decides to try her hand at college where she ends up in a Women's Studies class. While in the class, she makes friends with a group of women notorious on campus for being lesbians.

While Amory is grappling with the issues of lesbianism and feminism, she must also deal with her feelings about Jessie, her nightmares, and the riddle of her past.






