

Judge Hampton to Face Formal Public Hearing

Dallas - Judge Jack Hampton will face formal public hearing set to begin on October 16th in Dallas, based on disciplinary proceedings started on December 16th of last year when the Texas Human Rights Foundation (THRF) filed a sworn complaint against Hampton with the Texas State Commission on Judicial Conduct. THRF initiated the disciplinary action after The Dallas Times Herald published an interview in which Hampton expressed publicly his views on his allegedly lenient sentencing of a Mesquite youth for the brutal execution-style murder of two gay men. Among other statements, Hampton was reported to have said, "These homosexuals by running around on weekends picking up teenage boys, they're asking for trouble, they really are," and "I put prostitutes and gays at about the same level. If these boys had picked up two prostitutes and taken them to the woods and killed them I'd consider that a similar case. And I'd be hard put to give somebody life for killing a prostitute." The formal hearing will be presided over by the Honorable Robert R. Murray, a retired court of appeals judge in San Antonio, who was appointed on May 10th of this year by the Texas Supreme Court as the master or judge to hear the case. THRF's legal director, attorney David Bryan, expressed satisfaction with the setting of the hearing date.

"THRF received a call from Judge Murray this morning telling us of the hearing date," said Bryan. "THRF is anxious for the process to go forward. It has been nearly nine months now since THRF filed the original complaint against Hampton, and over the summer months I have had several personal communications with Commission's staff and with the master directly, urging that a trial date be set soon, so that the disciplinary proceedings would become public." State law provides that all documents filed with the Commission and all proceedings remain confidential until the formal hearing is convened by the master. "THRF has been monitoring this action very closely," said Bryan, "sending a lawyer to the pre-hearing conference held by the master in May and responding to a request for help from the Commission in developing evidence. I have conveyed THRF's concerns in the past several to the master and to the Commission's staff over the fact that Hampton continues to hold court without a resolution of these very serious charges against him," Bryan stated.

Hampton could be removed from office if the evidence produced at the hearing shows his actions violated the Code of Judicial Conduct. THRF has alleged that Hampton's statements violated the Code by, among other things, displaying a belief that punishment for homocide may be conditioned on the identity of the victim rather than the nature criminal conduct; by rendering

the impression that heterosexual murderers of gay men or lesbians would be treated sympathetically in his court; and by showing his inability to preside impartially over cases in which gay or lesbian individuals are involved.

Federal Appeals Court Rejects Army Lesbian

Chicago - In the latest development in lesbian Miriam Ben-Shalom's 13-year battle to re-enlist in the U.S. Army Reserves, the U.S. Federal Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit ruled on August 7th that the Army is not required to re-enlist Ben-Shalom. Justifying its decision in part on the U.S. Supreme Court's ruling in Bowers v. Hardwick, in which the court held that states could regulate the rights of gay people to engage in private, adult, consensual sexual behavior, the court in Ben-Shalom upheld the Army's regulation discharging persons who "engage in homosexual conduct, or who by their statements demonstrate a propensity to engage in homosexual conduct."

The new decision by a three-judge panel in Chicago reverses a lower district court ruling which had declared the Army regulation unconstitutional and had ordered the Army to re-enlist Ben-Shalom. Ben-Shalom will appeal to a full (en banc) panel of the Seventh Circuit Court of Appeals.

Sue Hyde, Director of the Privacy Project of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), and organizer of the Gay & Lesbian Military Freedom Project Coalition, condemned the court's decision. "The damage Hardwick did to the lives of gay men and lesbians continues to become clear with each new case. In

Ben-Shalom, the 7th Circuit extends the dangerous logic of Hardwick to say it's o.k. to be gay, o.k. to say you're gay and you favor gay rights, but that it's not o.k. to act on one's sexual orientation, not o.k. to live our lives fully, without experiencing discrimination."

Ben-Shalom began her legal battle in 1976, when she was discharged from the Army Reserves because she acknowledged her lesbianism to about writing reporters appointment as one of the first two women drill sergeants in the Army Reserves. In earlier victories, lower courts held that Ben-Shalom's First Amendment rights were violated by her discharge, and that the Army regulation denied to gay people equal protection under the law because it penalized persons for their status as homosexuals. Hyde noted that the Gay & Lesbian Military Freedom Project Coalition, which NGLTF spearheads, will continue to pursue a Congressional strategy to overturn the anti-gay/ lesbian military policy. Hyde also noted NGLTF's plans to hold a Military Freedom demonstration at the White House on November 10. The Gay and Lesbian Military Freedom Project is a joint project of NGLTF, the National Organization for Women, Women's Equity Action League, National Lawyers Guild Military Law Task Force, ACLU Gay and Lesbian Rights Project, Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, and Citizen Soldier.

Gay Art Trashed by Government

Washington, D.C. - The Senate in late July vote din favor of Senator Jesse Helm's rider to a bill funding the National Endowment for the Arts that declares no Federal funds can go to

"promote, disseminate, or produce obscene or indecent materials, including but not limited to depictions of sadomasochism, homoeroticism, the exploitation of children . . ."

specifically defining By "homoeroticism" as obscene and indecent on the par with child abuse, Helms hopes to chill any treatment of gay/lesbian lives in forums ranging from public television down to local theater and dance projects (romantic glances between two men or two women would be prohibited). The move is part of a larger conservative push against gays in the media, including efforts by the Rev. Donald Wildmon's American Family Association and the Christian Leaders for Responsible TV to intimidate sponsors of television shows with gay characters.

Helms boasts he will "win every time" on cutting Federal money for arts projects with homosexual themes.

A joint Senate/House conference committee is expected to decide whether to keep Helm's amendment

after the August recess. Now's the time to call or write your Congressperson, your Senator, and write Sen. Robert Byrd, the manager of the bill, who has indicated he may support the Helms rider.







Answers to your questions about love, relationships & personal problems

Dear Agnes,

Let's hear it for Denmark! I was excited to read in last month's Dimensions they will legalize gay and lesbian marriages on October 1, 1989. Since straight marriages performed in one country are recognized in others, could this legal tactic work with gay and lesbian marriages performed in Denmark? If so, what are their marriage laws and procedures?

Already Packing!

Dear Packing,

I hope you just packed and didn't purchase non-refundable plane tickets yet. According to the National Lesbian/Gay Task Force, gay marriages are not legal here, and therefore will not be recognized!

Dear Agnes,

Mine is a big problem and I'm not sure what to do about it or even where to start. See, my lover and I have been together for ten years. About three years ago she was layed off her job and started drinking heavily. I really didn't think anything about it because I thought she would be fine as soon as she found work.

Well, she found work and it did get better, I thought. I discovered about a year later that she had stepped up to doing "speed" and was doing it fairly often. She said it was nothing and that I shouldn't worry, she could handle it. She couldn't. Her drug habits have gotten worse and worse. She can no longer hold a job for very long and has gone through our savings buying "crank", cocaine, and various other drugs.

I've tried to talk her into going into a treatment center but she refuses. I don't really want to leave, I still love her and would like to see her get better, but I'm not sure how much longer I can live like this.

Where do I turn now? Victim of the "Drug War" Austin, TX

Dear Drug War,

Call your local chapter of Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous or some other twelve step group, and find out what they have to offer for friends and relatives of the addicted person (Alanon is AA's version), and go! Many larger cities have lesbian/gay chapters, but if yours doesn't, don't be put off—go anyway. A support group is a must for your well being.

The mental anguish suffered by lovers, family, and friends of people on drugs leaves deep scars, guilt, and shattered self esteem. We always tend to blame ourselves. But it is important to remember you did not make your lover start drinking or abusing drugs, and you

cannot make her stop. The only way a person can get sober and stay sober is if they want to.

If you cannot bring yourself to go to a support group, I strongly urge you to get private counseling for yourself.

Good luck and my thoughts are with you.

Dear Agnes,

My lover and I have been together for five years. They have been five of the best for me. We both have good jobs and mostly we stay to ourselves.

However, there is a girl my lover is just totally in lust with. This all started about three months ago. We have been fighting alot lately and I am hinging between telling her to go get this thing out of her system... That's one side of me. The other side wants to tell her if she sleeps with this b- that's it. Hit the road.

What are the odds of us working out if I let her go?

MANAGING

Your Money

Money! One of the most talked about subjects. And generally in a negative way. "I'm broke!" "I don't have the money to go out this weekend."

Money, like power in our society, is often viewed in a negative light.

There is a very simple way to look at money! You can manage your money. Or—it will manage you, on a day to day basis. The next time you are hustling to pay the rent or find the extra hundred bucks that you need to buy a new washer, and out comes the old credit card... Stop and think; are you managing your money or is it managing you?

Well....unfortunately, your money is managing you! So what can you do to take control for yourself?

SAVINGS

Save! Now don't let that word turn you off — it does most people! But the only way to effectively manage your money is to save and invest. It is that simple. But, you say, "after I pay bills I'm broke, there's nothing left to save."

Well look at it like this, if you are out of a job tomorrow and don't have any money in savings, what are you going to live on? Unemployment? A relative's money? Friends?

The most effective way to save is by a direct deduction from your paycheck to a savings account, bank, or credit union. Be certain whatever institution you choose is FDIC insured. Five or ten dollars is an excellent start, and when you receive a raise or pay off a bill, increase the amount you pay to savings. Saving is like paying yourself instead of everybody else.

Consider two savings accounts, One account for emergency money – you should have enough money in this account to cover all essentials for three, to six months. Add to this account for things you want for the house and car, such as; stereos, tvs, etc.. Use this account for purchases that you would otherwise make with credit cards.

INVESTMENT

The other account will be investment money. To many people, the word investment means risk or that you can't get to your money for many years without a penalty. Now, this can be true in some instances, but there are many relatively safe places to put your money

for investment.

A saving account or money market fund is the safest investment you can make, but they do not offer the highest return on your money. Once again, be sure the bank has FDIC insurance. Banks can go out of business overnight – especially in Texas.

The first investment to consider is your employer's stock plan. Employers generally offer to match part of your money. (You put in a \$1 and they put in 25¢ or 50¢.) Be sure your company is financially sound, has good management, and check your stock report every quarter for accurate bookkeeping. There is risk in any stock investment, but the potential for profit make stocks an attractive option.

EE (Government) Saving Bonds are an excellent savings option. They can be purchased through payroll deductions or from most banks. They earn interest on competitive rates and there are no state or local taxes. You do not have to pay federal taxes until you cash the bonds in. You purchase saving bonds at half their face value (a \$50 bond costs you \$25). You must hold the saving bonds 6 months before you can take them to the bank and cash them in. To get the face value of the bond (\$50), you must hold them 12 years. (If you purchase a \$25 bond each month in a year you will have \$300 [\$600 face value] OR in 10 years \$3000 [\$6000 face value]) Most employer plans will let you deduct any amount for saving bonds (even \$3 or \$4 a pay check). EE bonds are a safe investment, backed by the U.S. government.

Consider investing in a mutual fund. Here's how it works: you put your money in the fund and in turn, it is invested in a diversified list of stocks or bonds chosen by the fund managers. They move your money among various stocks and bonds to get you the best return. You are buying shares in the fund. Look for a no-load mutual fund. No load funds do not charge fees or commissions. There are many different funds, and there are risks involved. Don't let anyone sell you a fund over the phone. Money magazine is an excellent source of information for investing and there are toll free phone numbers for mutual funds, banks, stocks, etc... Call for a financial report and stick to the top performing funds. You will need \$500 to a \$1000 dollars to get you started in mutual funds.

Remember that an investment is something that goes up in value over time; it makes you money. CDs, money market funds, stocks, bonds, real estate, and collectibles are all investments. Some are riskier than others and some will bring a bigger return, so be careful and be sure you know and understand all the facts before you plunge in.

Cars, tvs, stereos, furniture, etc.. are not an investment. They cost you money that can never be recouped. Yes, you can resell them, but only at a fraction of what you paid, they do not go up in value.

CREDIT CARDS

Credit cards are great, but they cost you money unless you pay them off each month. The interest rates range from 13% on some cards to 18% on others. This is money you are paying to the bank to use their money. Shop around

for cards carefully and choose the lower interest rate, and annual fee. Close accounts that you are not using, but paying annual fees on. These cards are costing you money each time you pay the fee, and it only takes two or three to add up to a hundred dollars a year. Also, the tax deduction is being phased out for credit cards, so pay cash whenever possible.

We live in an instant gratification society - when we want something we want it now - today. For this instant purchase power, we end up paying the banks and credit card companies hundreds of dollars each year. Learn to save your money! Learn to manage your money! It takes time, but it is well worth the time and trouble. It feels good to pay cash and pocket that money that you had been giving to the bank - your hard earned dollars.


Private, funny little nicknames for each other mean absolutely nothing to the rest of the world, except as a substitute purgative, and should remain private for exactly that reason.

Two Novels first published in the late 50's at the beginning of the era referred to as the golden age of lesbian paperback originals.

This month we're going to look at two books first published in the late 1950's at the beginning of an era known as the "golden age of lesbian paperback originals".

Chris by Randy Salem is about a the beautiful Christopher Hamilton. Chris writes scientific articles on marine life and is very successful in her career. For the past four years, Chris has lived with "Dizz". Their sexual relationship has

never been good, and Chris seeks satisfaction on the weekends when Dizz is gone. On one drunken night, she picks up Carol Martin.

Carol admires Chris and her work, and soon finds herself falling in love. Carol is determined to get Chris out of her terrible life with Dizz and into her own. But Dizz knows her power over Chris and is determined not to let her go.

Even while she seeks to hold onto

Chris, Dizz is letting herself become more and more interested in George, a dapper young man who caters to her every whim.

This book was first published in 1959 by Beacon Books and has been reissued now by Naiad Press. The book gives a bird's eye view of life as a lesbian in the late 50's. Chris is a wellwritten, emotional love story even though I found it to be a bit naive. Everyone you meet as you read the book is more or less understanding about the gay life-style.

On the other hand, <u>Three Women</u> by March Hastings gives us a better idea of the scars that discrimination can leave. <u>Three Women</u> was also published in the late 50's by Universal Publishing and Distributing Company and re-appears now courtesy of Naiad Press.

Byrne and Greta are tied together by a terrible event in their childhood. Greta is mentally-ill, and Byrne feels it is her duty to care for Greta. Byrne longs to live a life free of her commitment, but knows she cannot. Then she meets Paula Temple.

Paula is her nephew's finance. Paula has agreed to marry Phil as a way to escape from her family and her alcoholic father. But, from the moment Paula meets Phil's Aunt Byrne, she feels she has found the key to true happiness. Even with all odds working against her, Paula is determined that Byrne will come to love her and leave the dark shadow— Greta behind.

Three Women is an excellent novel. Ms. Hastings has captured the essence of new love, as well as, the desperation of a woman trapped by her past. I would recommend it to everyone.






