

Dallas Activist Bill Nelson Elected as New THRF President

AUSTIN - At its October quarterly board meeting held last week in Houston, the board of trustees of the Texas Human Rights Foundation (THRF) elected a new slate of officers and added two additional trustees.

Elected as THRF's new president was Bill Nelson of Dallas, former president of the Dallas Gay Alliance and long-time THRF board member. Owner of Crossroads Market in Dallas, Mr. Nelson was instrumental in founding the AIDS Resource Center in Dallas and was a former candidate for city council in Dallas. Mr. Nelson succeeds Frank Stenger of Austin, an assistant attorney general for the State of Texas, who has served as THRF's president since October of 1988. Stenger remains on THRF's board as chair of its litigation committee.

Elected as THRF's vice-president was Donald Skipwith, a Houston attorney who also serves as vice-chair of the board of directors of the AIDS Foundation Houston. Skipwith succeeds Gene Harrington of Houston as vice-president; after six years of dedicated service as a trustee, Harrington submitted his resignation, which was accepted by the board.

Alan Levi, a certified public accountant in Dallas, was elected as the new treasurer of the organization.

Nell Hahn and Steve Davis, both attorneys from Austin, were elected as new trustees to the board.

THRF's legal director, David Bryan, characterized the new slate of officers for THRF as a balanced blend of old and new talent and experience for the organization. "I believe Bill Nelson's history of activism will set a new tone for THRF as it carries out the important work in which it is involved, while at the same time THRF will benefit from his experience of having been a trustee for many years," Bryan said. "I am also excited by the addition of new trustees from Austin, where THRF has been under-represented in the past."

At the meeting last week, Sue Lovell of Houston, a THRF board member and a former president of the Houston Gay & Lesbian Political Caucus, was named as the chair of THRF's nominating committee charged with identifying new trustees to be considered for the board of trustees at the January meeting. THRF's board presently consists of 13 trustees living in Austin, San Antonio,

Houston and Dallas. The board meets quarterly in various cities around the state, and its meetings in 1990 are tentatively set for Austin, El Paso, Corpus Christi and Lubbock., as part of the statewide organizations effort to involve gay men, lesbians and persons with AIDS from outside the larger metropolitan areas of the state.

THRF is the sponsor of the litigation pending in an Austin court known as Morales vs. The State of Texas, challenging the constitutionality of Section 21.06 of the Texas Penal Code, which criminalizes private, consensual sexual relations between two men or two women. Linda Morales of Houston is THRF's lead plaintiff in the case, which also includes four more plaintiffs from Austin and Dallas. The State is attempting to have the case dismissed and a hearing will be scheduled late this year in the matter.

Austin Lambda to Cease Operations

AUSTIN - September 1989 marked Austin Lamda's tenth anniversary. One month later the organization has ceased to exist except in name only.

Claiming a lack of community support, Austin Lambda will close it's office and cease publication of it's newsletter effective immediately.

Austin Lambda has been instrumental in making major contributions to the gay community both in Austin and throughout the state of Texas. A partial list of their accomplishments includes: First Legal Day in Texas; First Gay Pride March; Referral Services; A women's softball team; speaker's bureau; and various concerts, dances and other functions. Austin Lambda also spun off several groups including: The Alliance; Gay Fathers; Lesbian Mothers; and ALSO (Austin Lesbians Speak Out).

Austin Lambda as a legal corporation will continue to exist in name only. If you have any suggestions for future uses of this organization as a community enterprise, please write them at: P.O. Box 5455, Austin, TX 78763.

but a company spokesperson says the book will not go to press until a goo cross-section of the community's multi-racial and multi-cultural wedding ceremonies has been assembled. The company invites couples to submit photographs of their ceremonies, in either black and white or color, along with a 500 to 1000 word description of their love story and decision to commit their vows. Subject to negotiation, contributors will receive a fee or percentage of book sales. Dear Readers

In late November, we received the following letter in the Dimensions office. Although it was marked "Letter to the Editor", we thought it would be more appropriate and more widely read in this column.

Dear gay and lesbian community and supporters:

Syndicated advice columnist Ann Landers has asked what her readers think about "legal sanctions for same-sex couples." To communicate your support for the rights of gay and lesbian couples, write to Ann Landers, c/o The Chicago Tribune, 435 N. Michigan Avenue, Chicago, IL 60611.

Here's what we told Ms. Landers:

We think lesbians and gay men should be able to legally marry. In our view, it's a matter of civil rights. Not to mention simple fairness and good sense.

Too often, gay and lesbian relationships have been attacked as antithetical to "Family values." Nothing could be further from the truth. Gay and lesbian couples — and their children — are genuine families. They share with all families the traditional value of love, caring and mutual support.

The truth is, gay and lesbian couples are already marrying one another in both religious and secular ceremonies. According to preliminary results of our national survey of gay and lesbian couples, 16 percent of female couples

and 10 percent of male couples had "ritualized their relationship with a ceremony." More than one-third had executed legal agreements to protect their relationship. (Results based on 812 respondents.)

Unfortunately, these couples cannot choose to legally marry and depend on existing laws to support their family life. The legal contracts we make can replicate only some of the protections that are automatic with marriage. Just one example: A widowed lesbian partner cannot claim her departed spouse's Social Security benefits.

And this inequity is far-reaching. At least 10 million Americans are in samesex relationships, judging from a recent San Francisco Examiner poll that found 60 percent of gay men and lesbians in relationships.

Our society should support these gay and lesbian families for the same reasons we support traditional families. Functional families make better neighbors and more productive citizens. Sincerely

It could be he doesn't know what to do. And if he has never been employed in this line of work, he may think he is doing what he needs to do. By all means be tactful and don't attack his behavior.

Battering
The Reality of Violence
in Our Community

There are many in the lesbian community that believe lesbian battering could not exist—that women are not capable of physically and emotionally abusing other women. But, it does exist and it is much more widespread than most of us are aware. In Austin in 1985, the Austin Coalition Against Abuse in Lesbian Relationships (ACAALR) conducted a survey of 81 lesbians. They found that 65% of those surveyed said they had experienced abuse in one or more adult relationships. Of this 65%, 70%

reported physical abuse, 85% emotional abuse and 32% reported sexual abuse. 13% reported that they were the abusive one in the relationship. In line with national statistics on women in the general population, one third said that they were sexually abused as children and over 50% report emotional abuse as children.

Battered lesbians deny their abuse or refuse to seek help out of fear that they will not be believed or because they see no way out of the relationship. They may also be afraid to approach mainstream battered women's shelters for fear of a homophobic response and because there is little or no community support or services in this area. Many lesbians do not believe that there is any abuse occurring within their

community.

In addition, many battered women live in a constant state of denial. They believe that what they are experiencing is not really abusive, that they are responsible for the abuse because of some flaw within themselves, or that if they will just "work harder" or "be better" the abuse will stop.

Abuse can be brought about by many causes. Most common is alcohol or drug abuse, although childhood experiences and many other experiences do contribute to abuse.

Recognizing that you are battered or are an abuser is the first step to healing. Below, I've gone into some detail on recognizing the signs of the different kinds of abuse. All of these forms of abuse are attempts to exert power or control over another person.

At the end of this article, you will find a resource list on where to find help for yourself, your lover or a friend.

TYPES OF ABUSE

Emotional Abuse

Below are listed some of the signs of emotional abuse with a short explanation.

- Isolation Alienation from family and friends; refuses to provide money or transportation; may move you away to another city, state or even country; the abuser may also refuse to have a telephone; irrational jealousy.
- Threats threatens to kill or hurt you; have you committed; find you no matter where you go; or to commit suicide if you leave.
- Humiliation/Degradation Insulting jokes, name calling, ordering around.
- · Trivial Demands makes you

- adhere to an exact time schedule, wear a certain hairstyle, etc...
- Demonstration of Power Assigns chores, laws, curfew. Makes discrediting remarks, physical and sexual abuse.
- Dependency No access to bank account; won't let you have job or makes you work to support partner.
- Occasional Indulgences sudden changes of heart, brings you extravagant gifts or does something for you that you didn't expect.
- Crazymaking convinces you that what you said, you didn't; changes rules; she's not violent, you're paranoid; uses things you've told her about yourself against you; buys you gifts and then blames you for money problems; tells you things are happening when they aren't and vice versa.

Physical Abuse

Physical abuse almost alway goes hand in hand with emotional abuse, however; all emotional abusers are not physically abusive.

Physical abuse can range from pushing, shoving and outright fist fights to burning the skin, putting guns and knives in the vagina, and stabbing or shooting.

Sexual Abuse

Although much of the description of physical abuse can also be applied to sexual abuse, sexual abuse can take on many different forms. Forcing you to have sex, forcing you to participate in group sex or have sex with another partner, or doing anything sexual that is against your will is abusive.

Don't confuse S/M sex with abuse.

While S/M, like any form of sex, can be abusive, this isn't always the case. Most S/M sex is consentual and both partners agree beforehand on how3 far things will go and a code word to stop things if they get out of hand.

WHAT TO DO

If you are a battered lesbian or a batterer, you are not alone and you can end you nightmare. Seek help from your friends and family if possible and seek professional help (a resource list is provided at the end of this article).

If you have a friend or family member who is involved in an abusive relationship, remember that you cannot make their decisions for them - what you can do is offer your support and love. Supply them with reading material on abusive relationships. The more they read, the more likely they are to recognize themselves as a battered woman or abuser. Offer them a place to stay if and when they come to a decision to leave - many women are, or feel that they are, financially dependent on their abuser and will need your help in this area. And, last but not least, refer them to this resource list for professional help.



WINTER TRAVEL FOR WOMEN OF THE 90

It's that time again! Time for our annual "Winter Travel" article. In June of 1988, Dimensions sent out a survey to our readers. In that survey, we asked the questions: Have you ever spent time at a lesbian/gay resort? Would You? While only 9% of the respondents said that they had vacationed at a lesbian/ gay resort, a resounding 98% said they would like to go (or return) to vacation at one. Many of you added comments to the effect that you would love to vacation at a "family" resort, if you just knew where they were. Well, that's where we come in! These travel articles are to let you know that there are places out there that are "just for you" - and nobody else! So, let's go . . .

Since most of these resorts are Bed & Breakfasts, I'll start out with a definition of B&B provided by Mother Source Travels of St. Louis, Missouri: "B&B offers the traveler more than accommodations in a strange place: B&B offers an opportunity to experience the local culture and expand your social network through the graciousness of a Hostess or Host who knows the area, where to go, and what is going on locally without the time commitment that friends and relatives may

expect of you when you stay at their homes. Your Hostess or Host likes people and offers thier home to you as a member of the "community" without intruding on your privacy (or you on hers). She may offer you juice and coffee or a full breakfast – each home is unique."

Since Mother Source was so kind as to give us this definition, we'll start with a description of their service and then move on to specific accommodations.

If you would like to register your B&B with Mother Source, call or write for more information. You don't have to have a B&B to register, just extra space in your home and a desire to share your local culture with traveling women.

What A World, hat A World!

The Madwoman of Provincetown: Comic Kate Clinton

"I love it when something happens spontaneously—it kind of rips through me."

"It" is comedy, and Kate Clinton gets excited when she talks about it.

"It's almost like there's another person talking. It's really a gift I enjoy."

As much as she enjoys it, predominantly lesbian/feminist audiences have enjoyed it too, and then some. Since 1981 she has toured the country serving up her oft-time political, sometime graphic, always bulls-eye accurate wit to increasing numbers of fans.

"The joy of making people laugh" drove her to comedy. Growing up in a household with three brothers, Kate learned early on the power comedy holds. "I found that a really good one-liner could keep them away."

She formally began her career in March of 1981 on a dare while on break from teaching high schoolers, which she had done for eight years. The transition from the classroom to the stage was not that traumatic. Recalling her students, she says, "You learn to work the room. The frightening thing is, the same audience keeps coming back day after day." Like most comics, Kate has a stockpile of scripted material, but she relies on the audience to steer the course of the



show.

"I might prepare two 45-minute sets and actually get about thirty minutes of material done. The rest is improv. I'm doing a part in my show now where I just say, "Are there any questions?" They range from "Do you like to eat?" to "What's your phone number?"

Kate estimates that approximately 10% of her audience is male. "We've been doing such outreach" she teases, as I see an image of feminist comedy missionaries rapping on chic townhouse doors on Saturday a.m., rounding up potential male audience members a la Jehovah's Witnesses. "I wish more would come." she said, explaining that she considers her material's focus is on gay culture as opposed to lesbian humor exclusively. One of her most memorable audiences was largely comprised of a group of Catholic senior citizens on a scenic tour of New England in Provincetown, Mass. (where Kate makes her home.) "They were booked into my show, and they had been told I was a drag act. Now that was a challenge. It was absolutely wild - it was like talking to my mom." "Everybody had their purses clutched tightly to themselves, and wore little plastic mesh hats. The questions were absolutely hysterical. I felt like an

unwitting dupe on 'Heterosexual Bloops, Blunders and Practical Jokes.' "Kate Clinton thinks she is going to perform for a group of radical lesbians, but we've switched audiences on her." Finally, as if to add coincidence to calamity, it turned out the group was from Fall River, Mass., the district represented by the recently much-publicized Barney Frank. Yes indeed, comedy is sometimes divine. Sometimes even divinely serious,

"At sound check I generally say a Catholic prayer, right from memory. People always laugh, but I am blessing the hall and bringing the spirit of the women in the hall.

"I go toward it very positively. I approach it very politically, too. I think when people laugh, they open. They're open and vulnerable, and that's when I like to sneak in new ideas."

Be forewarned — plan on hearing lots of new ideas when Kate Clinton comes to town.







by Roz Perry


