

The Month of [the] March

AUSTIN - The 1991 March On Austin will be held on the weekend of March 15-17,1991.

The weekend will kick-off on Friday evening with a cocktail reception hosted by the Austin Names Project at the Radisson Hotel from 7pm-9pm, a "Welcome to Austin" reception sponsored by the Lesbian Gay Rights Lobby at the Zilker Park Clubhouse from 8pm-Midnight and a concert by the Washington Sisters at the Austin Opera House. The Coalition of Lesbian/Gay Student Groups along with Gay & Lesbian Young Adults will also host a Hospitality Reception from 6pm-Midnight at the Radisson Hotel.

A series of community workshops will be held at the Radisson Hotel on Saturday afternoon. The workshops will be followed by the March On Austin Banquet at the Crest Hotel. A dance, sponsored by ALLGO and the Texas Lesbian Conference will follow the banquet. Also on Saturday, the Beth El Binah, a Lesbian/Gay Jewish congregation, will sponsor a ceremony of candlelight ritual and melody to close the Jewish Sabbath from 6-7pm at the Radisson and a special combined performance of lesbian and gay chorales from across the state will be held at 9pm at the UT Bass Concert Hall.

The March itself will be held Sunday. Participants will meet at 11am at Disch Field and the March will step off at noon up Congress Avenue to the Capitol. Marchers will gather at the south

entrance of the Capitol to hear from prominent speakers. Keynote Speaker will be Urvashi Vaid, Executive Director of the National Lesbian/Gay Task Force. Also in attendance will be recently elected state officials, state legislators, and national political leaders. Following the March, enjoy live entertainment, arts and crafts and information booths at Waterloo Park. Food and Drinks will be available.

Monday, March 18th is LGRL Lobby day at the Capitol. You will have a chance to visit your State Senator and Representative to discuss our legislative agenda. Scheduling prior appointments with legislators will be helpful. Call LGRL at (512) 474-5475 for more information.

Homeowners Insurance Company Recognizes Domestic Partners

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Fireman's Insurance Company of Washington, D.C., one of American's oldest business firms, has become the first insurance company in the nation to file a Homeowners policy change that recog-

nizes domestic partners. By redefining who is insured, the new endorsement extends to domestic partners the automatic coverage rights enjoyed by spouses and relatives of Homeowners policyholders.

Fireman's offers Homeowners coverage to apartment renters and owners of dwellings and condos in D.C, and the states of Maryland and Virginia.

According to Carl Blundell, CPCU, a company underwriting manager who created the new endorsement, "this Homeowners policy change will extend automatic coverage to anyone with whom an insured has a close, committed personal relationship that involves sharing household responsibilities and owning property together. Automatic coverage applies after an insured has established such a relationship and lived with their domestic partner continuously for at least six months."

"The public will no longer confuse us with Fireman's Fund or any other insurance company." says Fireman's new president, Dick Andrews. "We will have the first Homeowners policy in the insurance industry that will serve the diverse and changing lifestyles of today's society without sacrificing the privacy needs of the individual."

Mr. Andrews advises that Fireman's, unlike other insurance companies, will no longer require that the name of an insured's domestic partner be disclosed and appear on the Homeowners policy in order for the partner to be included in the coverage. "Because our new endorsement eliminates the need for such notification, unmarried insureds and their domestic partners will have the privacy choices and coverage rights enjoyed by married couples."

Fireman's Insurance company plans to

begin attaching the new endorsement to all Homeowners policies it issues beginning in early 1991.

Dear Agnes,

I am a faithful reader of yours and have been a "fan" for almost four years. My problem seems insignificant compared to others in your column. I have been tempted to write to you several times but thought it was just to silly.

I know this will sound totally ridiculous, but my lover is a terrible cook. Now, before you throw this letter in the trash, let me tell you that I have been living with this woman for thirteen and a half years. Further more, she has been cooking all those years. I've tried to "take over" the kitchen numerous times over the years, but for some reason, "Joann" thinks she is the world's greatest cook. I assure you she is not!

She can't even boil water. I've spent hundreds of dollars on food thrown out the back door and ground down the garbage disposal. What can I do?

Having read your letter last month (Feb. '91) to BROKEN HEART, I just wanted



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A LOOK AT THE CAUSES, SYMPTOMS & TREATMENT OF ALCOHOLISM IN WOMEN.

Alcoholism does not discriminate. It is a problem for both sexes, people of every age and all social and economic classes. While it is a problem that can strike anyone, there are more women drinkers now than at any time in the past, and many of these women are problem drinkers.

Recent research has shown that women are more vulnerable to the effects of alcohol than men and are likely to develop problems more rapidly and with less alcohol consumption. The same number of drinks over the same period of time will produce a higher blood alcohol level in a woman than in a man. This happens because women's bodies

have a higher percentage of fatty tissue and a lower volume of body water than men's. Women also tend to metabolize alcohol more slowly causing a higher concentration to remain in the bloodstream for a longer period of time.

Another problem that women alcohol abusers face is the reluctance of some health professionals to label women as alcoholics. Women don't fit their stereotypic view of alcoholics, and the symptoms of alcoholism in women have been seriously under-studied. Friends and family of the woman alcoholic are more likely to deny or try to hide the fact that the woman has a drinking problem. Society attaches more of a

stigma to women alcoholics than to men. One good example of this bias is the recent mud-slinging against Ann Richards in her campaign for governor of Texas. A male candidate's alcoholism might have been brought up in a campaign, but his recovery would have been hailed as a sign of character, not as a sign of potential weakness as it was for (now) Governor Richards.

One additional problem in the lesbian/ gay community is that our social lives revolve so much around alcohol. This makes it especially hard for those who are potential alcohol abusers to avoid situations where alcohol is served.

CAUSES

It is impossible to say exactly why some women have problems with alcohol and others don't, but research does show some shared traits among alcoholic women. Following is a list of some factors that can put you at greater risk for alcoholism.

- Family history of alcoholism. This
 includes parents, grandparents, aunts,
 uncles, etc. Although your risk is higher
 if alcoholism is present only on one side
 of your family, your risk increases even
 more when a history of alcohol abuse
 can be found on both sides.
- Family history of abstinence. This is true especially when drinking was shunned in your family for strong moral reasons.
- A family history of depression disorders in female members.
- Having an emotionally or physically absent father.
- Being of Scandinavian, French, Irish or Native American descent.

Keep in mind that just because you fit into one or more of these risk groups does not mean you will become an alcoholic, only that you are at increased risk and should be very careful about your alcohol intake.

DANGER SIGNS

Just drinking on a regular basis does not mean you are an alcoholic. There are signs that tell you when alcohol is becoming a problem in either yourself or a loved one. Some of the early signs are the ability to drink more without feeling drunk, no or fewer hangovers, preoccupation with drinking (worrying about whether drinks will be served), or a personality change after a few drinks (pleasant to mean, shy to out going, etc.).

Saying you are only gong to have two drinks and having ten, or drinking alone are signs that the addiction is getting worse. Remember that it is possible to drink "alone" even in a bar full of people. At this stage, the drinker may begin to lie about her alcohol consumption and deny that she has any problems with alcohol. Blackouts and memory lapses may also begin to occur in the middle stages. As the addiction takes hold, alcohol will become a source of stress instead of relieving it, leading only to further drinking.

Later stages of addiction are: emotional highs and lows, loss of control, loss of family, job, etc.

Having the "shakes", skipping meals, drinking in the morning or to relieve a hangover, rapid drinking and using alcohol to aid sleep are also danger signs.

TYPES

Part of the problem in identifying alcoholism is that there are so many different forms alcohol abuse can take. While most alcoholics do drink every day, not

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all do. Some problem drinkers have control over when they drink but not how much, others may drink all day without ever being "drunk", and some may "binge" by not drinking for days or weeks before going on a big drinking spree. Some "social" drinkers also have a problem when they are drinking to help them feel more relaxed or to "fit in". These drinkers plan their social activities based on if drinks will be served or not.

No matter what the drinking pattern, alcohol has become a problem when it interferes with any major area of your life. This includes personal relationships, health, work performance, and legal problems. Many times, these problems may be the first sign to the alcoholic and those around them that there is a problem.

WHERE TO GET HELP

The hardest part of recovering from alcoholism is realizing that there is a problem and seeking help. The decision to seek help is more important than the choice of a treatment program. There are twelve-step programs such as Alcoholics Anonymous, inpatient programs, outpatient treatment, halfway houses, and private counseling. Where one goes for treatment is an entirely personal decision.

There are a surprising number of cities with AA groups specifically for lesbians and gays. Although AA, as an organization, is very non-discriminatory, the lesbian or gay alcoholic may feel more comfortable dealing with this problem in a "friendly" environment. Women For Sobriety (WFS) is an alternative to AA for women. WFS stresses

self-help and disagrees with the AA assertion that the alcoholic is "power-less" to control their drinking without the help of a higher power.

To find out what options are available in your area, look in the Yellow Pages under Alcoholism Information and Treatment Centers. Your local AA office will be able to tell you if a lesbian/gay AA group meets in your area.


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
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
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WHAT A WORLD, WHAT A WORLD?

Madison, code named Scorpion, has been in retirement since her last deep cover assignment turned sour. She is lured out of retirement to penetrate the Providence Liberation Army to learn the location of their terrorist training camp.

The leader of this "Army" is bent on moving his recruits, and the violence they bring with them, onto American soil. Madison must move to stop them before they can implement their plans. After Madison gains entry into the exclusive top-ranks of Providence, she is constantly faced with the threat of being "found out". This assignment could cost Madison her life, as well as her lover, Terry.

Unbeknownst to the U.S. Government, the Madison McGuire novels may be the best recruitment campaign for lesbian spies ever created. Ms. Williams has given us a strong, but vulnerable, character with whom most of us would love to trade places. Madison is not the usual, two-dimensional heroine of lesbian thrillers. There is depth of feeling in this character that comes from between the lines.

Especially interesting is the timing of the release of this novel that examines the problems of the Middle East and focuses on the Palestinians. This book is, by turns, gritty, realistic, frightening, intriguing, romantic, and above all, entertaining.

Now, on to mystery — and murder — in I Left My Heart by Jaye Maiman.

Robin Miller is sitting at home when the news comes ... her ex-lover, Mary, is dead. The police report says the death was accidental (or possibly even suicide) from an allergic reaction. Robin doesn't believe it. Mary was a fastidious woman and was vocal, and careful, about her allergies. She took great pains to avoid any substance that provoked symptoms.

As Robin begins to look into the last days of Mary's life, she discovers all kinds of strange goings-on.


Mary, an investigative reporter, had been working on a story that implicated a rising local politician (and her lawyer) in some pretty sleazy deals. Then there is Mary's neighbor at her beach house who has been very vocal in complaining about "those" women that frequented her house on weekends. This is the same woman who found, and reported, Mary's body to the police. There is also an unknown impostor who acquired a lethal medication in Mary's name.

Ms. Maiman has created a character as memorable and likable as any I've seen. I hope to read more about Robin Miller in the future.

My biggest complaint about most mysteries is that, with a little common sense, you can usually figure out who the culprit is by the fourth or fifth chapter — not so in this book. The surprise ending is what puts this "Robin Miller Mystery" in the same category with Homicide Detective Kate Delafield and Detective Carol Ashton.


