

InternationalFilm Festival Slated for Austin

AUSTIN - The Fourth Annual Austin Gay and Lesbian International Film Festival will be held November 1-10 at Dobie Theaters in Austin. This is the only gay and lesbian film festival in Texas, and the largest in the Southwest. This year's schedule of over 15 films and shorts includes Monika Treut's My Father is Coming, which opened the San Francisco, New York and Los Angeles gay and lesbian film festivals this year. My Father is Coming will be the premiere for the opening night gala on October 30. Proceeds will go to benefit AIDS Services of Austin and the Austin Immune Clinic, with a reception at Chances following the screening.

Among other films showing during the festival are Peter Adair's Absolutely Positive, the uplifting story of how eleven men and women are living with HIV; The Changer: A Record of the Times, a documentary celebration of 15 years of women's music and Olivia Records, the first national women's recording company; and Bruce LaBruce's funny and erotic No Skin Off My Ass, about an atypical romance between a hairdresser and a skinhead.

The November 7 showing of *The Changer: A Record of The Times* will be followed by a reception for Cris Williamson and Cruise Party at the

Quadrangle Room at the UT Texas Union at 9pm. Chris Williamson will also be in concert at the Cactus Club on Friday, November 8 at 9pm.

Annise Parker, Houston City Council Candidate

Lesbian Activist Seeks City Council Seat

HOUSTON - Houston's gay and lesbian community has an excellent chance of electing the city's first openly lesbian City Council member this November.

Long-time activist Annise Parker, 35, kicked off her campaign in early July, soon after District C Council member Vince Ryan changed his mind about supporting a Montrose-based, non-incumbent district in the city redistricting plan.

"I'm running for the District C seat, not against Vince Ryan," Parker said. "It's time for Houston's gay men and lesbians to take their seat at the City Council table."

If elected, Parker would become Texas' second openly gay or lesbian official. Glen Maxey of Austin was elected state representative in a spring 1991 special election.

As the opposing camp has acknowledged, Parker is a serious candidate. She expects to raise up to \$75,000 in her effort to unseat 2-term incumbent Ryan. Parker's political involvement began at Rice University where she helped found the gay and lesbian support group. In the mid-1980s, Parker served two terms as the president of the Houston Gay and Lesbian Political Caucus. She also served on numerous community and state boards, as well as in Democratic Party positions. She has also served as the chair of the Houston Police Advisory Committee and on a United Way committee

Parker's platform focuses on crime, city services and a clean environment. But like other campaigns in Houston this summer, a crime wave quickly made crime the one and only issue.

"Lesbian" A Swear Word According to Hallmark

LOS ANGELES - Two members of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD) recently discovered that Hallmark Cards considers "lesbian" to be a "bad word." GLAAD member

Richard Best and Outreach co-chair Charlotte Innes separately visited two Hallmark stores in Southern California. They both tried to use Hallmark's new "Personalize It" program, whereby customers can use an in-store computer to print their own message on a Hallmark card. When Richard Best tried to send a note of thanks to group of participants in the San Diego Gay & Lesbian Pride Weekend, the computer refused to accept the message. He was told by a store employee that Hallmark had a list of "Swear words" and that the word "lesbian was probably" on that list. Charlotte Innes had a similar experience when a computer rejected her message to GLAAD/LA. After trying to send it three or four times, with the help of two store employees, one of the employees noted that Hallmark had a list of "bad words."

Her co-worker then called Hallmark's Kansas City office, and confirmed that "lesbian" was on the list. (The computer accepted the word "gay" because it may also be used in the sense of "joyful.")

GLAAD has written a letter to Hallmark asking for the removal of the word "lesbian" from its list of banned words and is asking lesbians everywhere to write and complain. The address is: Don Freberg, Director of Consumer Affairs, Hallmark Cards, Inc., P.O. Box 419580-216, Kansas City, MO 64141.



DEAR AGNES

Answers to your questions about love, relationships & personal problems

Dear Agnes,

I don't have a degree and I am wondering if my big mouth has gotten me in over my head.

There are not enough hours in the day to handle everything I have to do at the office. I have very little time or energy left over to take care of things at home, and absolutely no time for romance. My lover has been very patient so far, but I know there is a limit (and I think I'm about to reach it).

I am working very long hours and my department is still in a mess. Now I'm wondering if I am making my home life a mess too.

Do you have any suggestions on how to manage all this? I don't want to be one of those women who has her job and that's it.

Dear Overwhelmed,

Anytime you start running a department, business, etc ...it is frightening. Obviously you are cut out for the job or you wouldn't have been promoted. Your boss wouldn't have taken a risk on you if she/he didn't think you could do the job (it wouldn't be good for their career

if you failed).

For starters, if you aren't a list maker, become one. List all your jobs — both big and small — and assign them a number of priority. This doesn't mean your list will be gone everyday, but it will help you focus on what needs to be done. It will also help you to see what you have accomplished.

Second — don't work late everyday. Take offat least one — preferably two—days per week at 5pm. Do this whether or not you have everything done. Working extended days with no relief is the best way I can think of to burn out.

Third—be on the lookout for a "second lieutenant". There is someone in your department who wants more responsibility—find out who it is and delegate some of your work to them. This is probably one of the hardest things in the world to do if you are a supervisor, but it is essential if your are going to manage a whole department.

Fourth — (but very important) don't ignore romance. In fact, you should make time for it. Mark it on your calendar like any other appointment. This may seem to take all the spontaneity out of it, but romance is romance, no matter where or how you get to that point.

You will be able to manage. It may take awhile to adjust, but give yourself time. Good Luck!

Dear Agnes,

This is a really strange one, but the only way to start is just to blurt it out. A

straight woman has been following me around.

This woman is married and has three kids. We met at a political rally and now she won't leave me alone.

At first I thought she just needed a friend, but then she started asking me all kinds of questions about being gay. Now she is at my house every day and has even showed up at my work a couple of times.

I think she's in love with me. I really like this woman as a friend, but I am not attracted to her that way. Even if I was, I don't want to be responsible for breaking up her marriage, and I don't want to have to bring anyone "out" (I've done it once and that was enough).

I even lied to her and told her I had met a woman at the bar I was attracted to. She reacted to that news by starting to buy me gifts!

I don't know what to do. I don't want to hurt her feelings, but I don't want to sleep with her either. Any advice?

Can't Take It Much Longer Austin, TX

Dear Can't Take It,

You need to have a frank talk with this woman immediately. Tell her that you may be misinterpreting her feelings, but that you are not interested in a relationship. Emphasize that you would like to remain friends, but sex is not in the picture.

Try to get her to talk about her feelings. Depending on her response, you might suggest a support group for women who are coming out.




mer rates are lower). Pets are welcome with advance notice. Smoking is not encouraged.




"Make that two that you owe me." Bianda drained the rest of the bottle in one gulp, and threw it into the back seat.

Imagine the perfect Texas autumn day. Hot, clear skies and a light breeze. You are in the Hill Country on a beautiful spot beside a bend in the Guadalupe River. The trees haven't really started to turn yet, but you see a spot of color showing here and there.

Now add over four hundred women and over a hundred musicians and you have a general idea of what it was like at the Second Annual Lone Star Women's Music Festival. And, to tell the truth, it wasn't at all what I expected.

First, I'll tell you what it was not...it was not a glorified political rally as some women's music festivals are prone to be; it wasn't a cliquish gathering of lesbian separatists; and it wasn't a weekend long concert of women with acoustic guitars singing folk songs (don't get mad... I really like folk music, I just don't want an entire weekend of it). What it was was alot of fun.

I was impressed with the diversity of women that showed up for the event as well as the wide range of musical styles represented by the women performers. There were women of all ages, political persuasions and varying stages of undress. The musicians ran the gamut from the solo performer singing songs of lost love, to the new wave band singing of pantyhose and breast exams. All in all, there was something for every taste. Some of the best and most impressive were: Laura Love, Nancy Scott, The Therapy Sisters, Girls In The Nose, Robin E., Lara Linnette, Ms. Brown To You, Purly Gates, and Emily Kaitz. All the rest of the performers were very good and I heard few complaints about any of the music.

The campground itself was very adequate and in a beautiful spot. The River offered places to wade, swing out on a rope and drop into deep water and shoot

the rapids on a tube, all within the confines of the camp. Most of the women worked hard to keep their areas clean (I didn't even see any cigarette butts lying around). Bathroom facilities were adequate, although a few extra toilets and showers wouldn't hurt.

The division of the campground into chemical free, quiet and party areas seemed to suit everyone and I heard no complaints about noise levels or the close proximity of other campers. In fact, the closeness of the camps the women set up seemed to foster a community spirit where women met and talked with one another instead of confining themselves only to the group they came with.

The food served was great and even included a meal of genuine New Braunfels german sausage (as one performer said, she never thought she would see a women's music festival where weinies were served for supper — I thought it was rather appropriate).

Gate security was excellent although most of the women I talked to thought internal security could have been cut back a little and still have been adequate.

The only complaints I heard were that all the women would have liked to see


more vendors (this will fix itself as the festival grows); the hot weather, a result of an unusual, late season heat wave; and the Emcee (her jokes were stilted and repeated time and time again). I also heard complaints about the system of volunteer

work (everyone at the festival was required to put in four hours of work restocking the bathrooms, helping women through the parking lot, etc.). The complaints weren't about having to work, only about the fact that some women didn't show up for their shift, causing others to have to work eight hours or more.

The cost of tickets to the festival were very reasonable. Ticket prices ranged from \$45 to \$65 (with separate meal tickets available), as compared to \$200 and up for some of the other large women's music festivals around the country.

All in all, Bonnie (the festival organizer) and her staff put on a great weekend — and word of mouth should make it even bigger and better next year. The festival will be held the first weekend of October in 1992, so make plans to attend. It's definitely worth the effort!





THE FEMINIST PERSPECTIVE


I am certain that many of you have seen the media images of lesbian and gay protesters in California smashing windows with bicycle racks and burning the California state flag in protest of Governor Pete Wilson's veto of a lesbian and gay civil rights bill. These protests in the streets are reminiscent of protests in Houston that the lesbian/gay community organized in response to the killing of a gay man named Paul Broussard.

At the same time, we have all suffered through the Clarence Thomas and Anita Hill hearings and a mass murder in Killeen perpetrated by a man who, according to the Houston Post, admittedly committed the crime because he hated women. Every day we hear statistics about the number of women mutilated by rape and domestic violence. A woman is raped every 6 seconds. Every 18 seconds a woman is beaten. The number one cause of injury to women in this country is domestic violence. As lesbians and as feminists, why aren't we rioting in the streets? Why is the gay and lesbian rights movement able to organize in response to violence and oppression against the community while the feminist movement seems more apt at organizing pro-choice rallies featuring Cybil Shephard? Where is Susan B. Anthony? Where is Gloria Steinhem? Where is the women's rights movement when you need it?

The answer to this question is extremely complex: however, I think that part of the answer lies in the development of both political movements. The feminist movement has made alot of important social changes and still exists as a political movement. However, much of the energy and creativity of this movement can now be found in community discussion groups and college classrooms. Rather than a shirking of political responsibility, this retreat to the classroom is a necessary stage in the development of feminism. The primary issue that is being addressed within this new stage of the feminist movement is this: how do we recognize differences in the women's movement while maintaining a cohesive political movement? Feminism encompasses issues such as racial oppression, class oppression, abortion, environmentalism, new definitions of the family, violence against women, etc. With such a multiplicity of agendas, protests in the streets can be difficult to organize. However, exclusionary politics nearly destroyed the feminist movement in the past. A balance must be sought.

The lesbian/gay rights movement, on the other hand, has not moved as far along in the process of recognizing diversity within our community. Although things are changing, the lesbian/gay rights movement, to a large extent, is dominated by privileged(privileged primarily by race and class) gay men. These leaders have made very positive changes, particularly in the fight against AIDS, but there has been some refusal to recognize differences of sex, race, class, religion and ability within our community. This refusal is exemplified by arguments such as whether the Dallas Gay Alliance should be called the Dallas Gay/Lesbian Alliance. At the same time, the lesbian/gay movement focuses on a more narrow range of issues — primarily AIDS, domestic partnership, and violence issues. This focus enabled the Houston community to organize in response to the killing of Paul Broussard and work for the passage of the state hate-crimes bill. While I'm not advocating that feminists concentrate on a more narrow range of issues, some degree of focus may be politically expedient.

Activists in the lesbian/gay rights movement and activists in the feminist movement have alot to gain from working together and alot to learn from one another. As both women's rights advocates and lesbian rights advocates, it is our community that must translate the errors of both movements into the strengths of the coalition.
