Lesbian Mother Wins Custody of Son in Jury Trial

AUSTIN - A Travis County, Texas jury trial has ended with a lesbian mother being awarded custody of her two and one-half year old son, who, she says, will continue to live with her and her domestic partner, an Austin policewoman.

The jury of nine women and three men voted the mother custody of the child in a 10-2 vote, with two of the women jurors casting the dissenting votes.

The lawsuit, which sought custody through a jury trial, was filed by a man once believed to be the child's biological father. According to testimony of the child's mother, the man brought suit and insisted on a jury trial hoping that lesbian issues would inflame the jury enough to award him custody even though he was not the child's biological father.

However, the mother's attorney, Linda Farin of Austin, explained that homophobic bias among jurors was essentially eliminated by her co-counsel, Austin attorney Diane Henson. Doing a nontraditional voir dire (the questions asked when picking a jury) of prospective jurors, Henson elicited the juror's responses through the use of an informal public opinion poll about current issues. Approximately one-third of the jurors were eliminated due to responses that indicated "homophobic" tendencies before they even knew what the

case was about.

While the mother was awarded custody of her child and the man is not required to pay child support, the jury did grant the man visitation rights because of his longstanding relationship with the child. In addition, the lesbian mother was awarded her attorney's fees paid by the man.

Republicans Speak Out on Gay Issues

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) Policy Institute has released a compilation of Republican statements on gay and lesbian issues. The following statements were made by various Republicans over the course of the last six months.

FEBRUARY '92 - Patrick Buchanan ran sensationalistic attack ads featuring clips of "Tongues Untied," a film partially funded by the National Endowment for the Arts about black gay male culture. He accused the Bush administration of funding art that "glorified homosexuality."

• When Bush/Quayle campaign chairman, Robert Mosbacher met with officials of the NGLTF and the AIDS Action Council, conservatives decried the meeting and criticized the President. Conservative congressmen fired off a letter to Bush that said: "The invitation and meeting was a slap in the face to every voter who affirms the traditional

family. The NGLTF agenda is not the Republican agenda and should not become a part of your re-election bid." APRIL '92 - Bush invited evangelical Christian activists to an April meeting at the White House where he told them that he opposes "special laws" to protect the rights of gay people.

MAY '92 - Beverly LaHaye, president of Concerned Women of America and a regular participant in White House meetings with conservatives, sent a fundraising letter out in May that said the "homosexual movement poses the most serious threat" of all to American children.

 The Republican National Committee rejected the requests of three gay rights organizations — the NGLTF, Human Rights Campaign Fund, and the Log Cabin Republicans — that asked to testify at the RNC platform hearings.

JUNE '92 - In an interview with Barbara Walters, President Bush reaffirms his support for the military's ban on gay and lesbian service members.

Vice President Dan Quayle, speaking to the Southern Baptist Convention about the "cultural elite," said, "They seem to think the family is an arbitrary arrangement of people who decide to live under the same roof, that fathers are dispensable and that parents need not be married or even of the opposite sexes. They are wrong."

• When asked by the New York Times whether he thinks it is "wrong for people of the same sex or unmarried people to be parents," President Bush said, "... I can't accept as normal life style [sic] people of the same sex being parents... I don't accept that as normal. And I believe in traditional family values."

JULY 1992 - Commenting on Democratic party support for gay rights issues, Tony Mitchell, deputy press secretary for the Bush/Quayle campaign, told a reporter, "I don't expect that the President is going to 'use' any of these issues against . . . Clinton." Mitchell noted that Bush "is a supporter of two-parent traditional families" and backs a continued ban on military service by gays and lesbians.

• Tyler Franz, an openly gay man who worked for the Bush/Quayle re-election campaign, filed a discrimination complaint under D.C. Human Rights Ordinance after he was demoted. He claims the personnel chief attributed the reassignment to "ideological differences with the religious right." The Bush/Quayle campaign denies the claim that he was demoted due to his sexual orientation.

As I type this, the Republican Convention, being held in Houston, is in it's thirdday. The anti-gay, "traditional family values" rhetoric has been flying hard and fast. Expect more updates on discriminatory Republican party statements in this space.


K-Mart & Mickey Mouse Include Gays



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A SHORT GUIDE TO HERBS AND THEIR USES

You probably know that Aloe Vera is a great pain reliever for burns, and you may have heard that Garlic can help lower blood pressure and has mild antibiotic properties. But, did you know that Ginger is helpful in breaking up the congestion that comes with a cold or bronchitis, or that Peppermint tea can help soothe an upset stomach?

Herbal remedies have been used since ancient times to help heal both the body and the soul. Documented use of herbal

medicines date back to 5000 B.C. and are recorded in writings from China, Egypt, Babylon, India and ancient Greece. More than 25% of modern medicines are based on the same herbal remedies used thousands of years ago. For instance: birch bark has been used to treat headaches for thousands of years. Birch bark contains methyl salicylate, a chemical compound closely related to salicylic acid, the chemical used in aspirin.

Below, you will find some common herbs and their medicinal uses. All of these herbs are currently available at your local grocery or health food store. However, that may not be the case for long.

Two bills are currently in committee in both the U.S. House and Senate that would greatly limit your access to both herbs and vitamins. Health food retailers, holistic medicine practitioners and vitamin takers across the country are urging everyone to write your Congressman and Senators to voice opposition to HR.3642IS.2135.

If passed, these bills would make 50% of nutritional supplements (vitamins and herbs) unavailable to consumers within 12 to 18 months. High potency vitamins would be regulated as drugs ("high potency" is described as anything more potent than that found naturally in foods, i.e. a vitamin C tablet could contain no more of the vitamin than found in an orange), supplements such as selenium, PABA, chromium and other supplements would be eliminated, and herbs (and probably amino acids) would be regulated as drugs and be available by prescription only.

The herbs listed below are only a partial list of what is currently available. Many books are available on the subject that will give you a much more comprehensive listing of herbs and their uses.

ALDE VERA

Of all the healing plants, aloe is probably the best known. It's ability to soothe minor burns is almost legendary. Aloe is also useful to help pain and irritation caused by minor skin inflammations, insect bites, mild cases of poison ivy and poison oak, heat rash and sunburn. The best way to use aloe is straight off the plant. Just snip as much as you need, split it down the side and apply the wet side to the irritated area. The plant will heal itself, so don't worry about cutting on it. If you don't have a "green thumb", you can purchase pure aloe gel from any health food store and most grocery stores.

BASIL

Basil has a slight antiseptic quality and can help relieve pain and promote healing when applied as a paste to cuts and abrasions. A mild tea made from basil is also useful for soothing gas and relieving nausea and headaches.

GARLIC

One of the most prominent herbal remedies, garlic works well for a number of illnesses. It's antibiotic properties make it effective in treating infections ranging from tooth abscess to yeast infections. To use as an antibiotic, either take internally or apply garlic oil on a cotton ball (available in capsules) directly to the affected area. Garlic, taken internally, has also been used to treat high blood pressure and cold and flu symptoms. Soaking in a hot bath for 15 to 20 minutes after taking garlic will help remove the smell from your skin.

GINGER

Ginger is available both in powdered form in capsules and fresh from most large grocery stores. Taken internally in either capsule or tea form, ginger can help relieve menstrual cramps, nausea and help break up congestion in the chest or sinuses. Ginger can also be used externally as a compress (a compress is made by soaking a towel in a strong tea made from the herb and applying it to the skin) on the forehead to relieve sinus congestion, on the abdomen to relieve cramps, on the lower back to relieve pain or put the tea in a hot bath to help ease the pain of arthritis. A report in the New England Journal of Medicine in 1983 showed that taking powdered ginger in capsule form is very helpful in treating motion sickness and vertigo.

PEPPERMINT

Peppermint tea (available in grocery and health food stores) is a great remedy for gas and indigestion. The Chinese also drink hot peppermint tea to cool off in the summer. This is because the tea brings blood to the skin where evaporation helps cool the body. Because of this, peppermint tea is useful in breaking a fever. It is also useful to help relieve a sore throat, sinus congestion and other cold and flu symptoms. Peppermint has also been used to treat headaches, insomnia and to relieve tension.

PARSLEY

Parsley contains vitamins A and C, calcium, thiamin, riboflavin, and niacin as well as having a high amount of chlorophyll. Eaten raw, it is helpful in the diets of anemic people. As a tea it can help relieve menstrual cramps, asthma, and menopausal symptoms. The chlorophyll in parsley is a great breath freshener and helps relieve indigestion (so, yes, you should eat that parsley off your plate at the end of a meal).

THYME

The ancient Greeks used thyme to calm convulsions and other spasms. Modern herbalists still use a tea made of thyme to help the spasms associated with asthma, stomach cramps, menstrual cramps, coughs, migraine headaches, and circulation disorders.

Many of these herbal remedies have not been scientifically tested to determine their effectiveness. But, none are harmful when taken in small amounts and all have centuries of knowledge and acute observation behind them. If you have a serious problem, it is best to consult a doctor, but for a minor cold, headache or menstrual cramps it is certainly worth a try!



The story revolves around Paris Collins, an adult education teacher who changes jobs, cities and lovers every two years. Now she has come to Morton River Valley, the same New England town where Dusty has her diner.


Before long, Paris is involved in community issues — the loss of green park land to real estate developers and the budget cuts at the school. She also becomes involved in the problems of the Scala family: Sophia, the mother that


Paris is teaching to speak English; Guila, her oldest daughter whose beauty almost blinds Paris; and Maddie, the younger daughter who is kicking down closet walls as fast as she can.

In the midst of all this, Paris also meets Peg a cute butch who has sworn off love relationships for life just the thing to suit Paris and her two year plan.

This is a good book — Lee Lynch's usually are — very entertaining even though it tends to get preachy at times (Lee Lynch's usually do). Environmentalism, education cutbacks, small town budget problems, fear of heights, sexism, racism, homophobia, and corrupt government officials are all legitimate issues, but a bit much to cover thoughtfully in a novel of this length. However, the basic story is good and I liked all the characters so I would recommend it for some fun fall reading.




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A FEMINIST PERSPECTIVE

A New Monthly Column From The Lesbian/Gay Rights Lobby WRITTEN BY LAURIE EISERLOH, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The Lesbian/Gay Rights Lobby of Texas is offering marriage certificates for lesbian and gay people. Each certificate is individually numbered and State Representative Glen Maxey and I will personally sign each certificate. They are sealed with the House of Representatives state seal. These certificates are not actual legal documents, gay/lesbian marriage is not legal in the state of Texas, but rather a certificate that recognizes your commitment to one another. Each union is entered in the LGRL registry of marriage. Marriage certificates may be used by those who are already united and by those who intend to unite. If you would like a marriage certificate, please send your names as you would like them to appear on the certificate and \$30 to LGRL, P.O. Box 2579, Austin, TX 78768. Please include a return address. Delivery in one to four weeks.

One of the most powerful and affirmative lesbian statements ever made in the Austin community was the July, 1992 wedding announcement of Ms. Sara Dee Strandtman and Ms. Karen Marie Umminger in the Austin American-Statesman, Austin's daily paper. Next to the endless announcements by happy heterosexual couples appeared a photograph of two beautiful newlyweds, both of whom were women. For many of us in Austin, the Strandtman-Umminger announcement symbolized a new era for the lesbian/gay community.

Politically, I am very supportive of lesbian/gay marriage. During the last legislative session, I wrote, and State Representative Debra Danburg introduced, the first lesbian/gay marriage bill in the history of the state. Lesbian/gay marriage works well as a political tool because it helps us proclaim to society as a whole that our relationships are as important as straight relationships. Lesbian/gay marriage helps us to associate our relationships with many idealized social concepts such as love, stability, commitment, family and home. This is a great relief for many of us who are weary of seeing lesbians associated with other much less positive concepts.

However, despite the power of lesbian/gay marriage as a political concept, there is a certain amount of ambivalence in our community about marriage. Many lesbians and feminists believe that the concept of marriage is theoretically problematic. For many, the most glaring problem with lesbian/gay marriage is that it assimilates heterosexual culture. We want to be married in order to gain the same respect for our relationships that straight people have for theirs. But why do we want this? Shouldn't we be trying to create our own institutions that are better than those created by

straight people?

The second most glaring problem with marriage is that it is an institution created in order to oppress women. One theory is that marriage was created because surplus male wealth necessitated a need for male inheritance. While matriarchal lineage is always clear (i.e. the identity of a child's mother is not uncertain — the one who gave birth is the mother) patriarchal lineage is uncertain (in other words, one may not know the identity of the child's father). Marriage was created in order to establish a means for patriarchal inheritance whereby the father's property was passed to the father's children. Of course the most important part of this social contract was that women were not allowed to have sex outside the marriage or there would be confusion about the identity of the children's father. Males were exempt from this. Not only did this lead to the oppression of female sexuality, but it devalued any matriarchal means of inheritance. Opponents also point out that marriage is an institution in which women have been undervalued, brutalized, and oppressed. So why would we as lesbians and as feminists ever want to support lesbian/gay marriage? Perhaps

in recreating our own version of marriage, whether it be a lesbian wedding, an intimate union or a spiritual union, we have addressed all of the problems with traditional marriage. Perhaps we have not. But regardless of the theoretical implications of marriage, there is no denying the powerful political statement made by lesbian marriage.

Right now, I am looking at Ms. Strandtman and Ms. Umminger's wedding announcement from the Austin American-Statesman, and I still can't believe my eyes.



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
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
