

§21.06 UPDATE

Dear Editor,

We all know about 21.06: It is, of course, the "sodomy law" or the "anti-sodomy law," and it criminalizes private, consensual sexual relations between individuals of the same gender.

The Texas Human Rights Foundation is sponsoring a law suit which contends that this law is unconstitutional. The Lesbian/ Gay Rights Lobby of Texas, under the leadership of former Executive Director Laurie Eiserloh, mounted a formidable challenge to this statute in the legislature this past session. (The Texas Human Rights Foundation was not involved in the legislative challenge, just as the Lobby is not involved in the law suit challenging §21.06.) Although the Senate voted to take §21.06 out of the revised penal code, ultimately the statute was kept in. Now, our hopes of defeating §21.06 lie with the law suit, through the courts.

The Texas Supreme Court heard oral arguments on January 5, 1993, and we all have been anxiously awaiting their decision. Well, we get a little break.

The court recessed for the summer on June 30, and will not reconvene to hand down decisions until September.

Frustrating isn't it? Well, at least we can relax for awhile . . .

The Texas Human Rights Foundation would like to thank everyone for their continued support of the law suit. We'll keep you posted.

Don't Ask, Don't Tell, Don't Pursue

AUSTIN -Laurie Eiserloh, Executive Director of the Lesbian/Gay Rights Lobby of Texas expressed disappointment over President Clinton's policy on lesbian and gay people in the military, yet called it an improvement over the old policy.

"The new policy which prohibits lesbian and gay soldiers from stating their sexual orientation and prohibits so-called "homosexual behavior" on or off base invades the privacy of lesbian and gay

people."

"It is understandable why the military, like any other employer, would seek to prohibit sexual behavior — whether homosexual or heterosexual — while soldiers are busy at their jobs. By the same standard, it is ludicrous for the military to allow heterosexual soldiers to engage in sexual behavior while off-duty and prohibit the same off-duty behavior for lesbian and gay people. This has no effect on how we perform as soldiers."

Eiserloh also had some criticism for the "don't ask, don't tell" policy. "This policy is ridiculous. In job situations, people talk about their private lives — the movie they went to over the weekend, the color they painted their house, that sort of thing. Sometimes in these conversations, people talk about significant others in their lives. Why should lesbian and gay people be prohibited by law from engaging in this sort of friendly workplace talk, which plays an important role in building workplace camaraderie, while heterosexuals can say whatever they want?"

However, Eiserlohdid find some good points in the policy. "I am pleased that the military now must have actual proof of so-called "homosexual acts" in order to separate someone from military service, this should curb at least some of the witch hunts which have gone on in the military."

"I'm also pleased that recruits are not asked about their sexual orientation upon entering the service. This is an improvement, although of limited significance, because so-called "homosexual acts" are still disallowed in the military."

"Probably the biggest improvement in this policy is that attending a gay pride march or visiting a gay bar is not in itself a reason for separation from the service. Considering the restrictiveness in the rest of the policy, this is once again a limited victory."

As for President Clinton and his role in making this policy, Eiserloh had this to say, "No other American President has done so much for lesbian and gay rights. The public discussion that this policy has initiated is almost more important than the policy itself. Nevertheless, Clinton did not follow through on his campaign promise and the so-called compromise he has left us with has done very little for our community. Frankly, I'm pretty disappointed."

"I expect that this policy will be challenged in court on the grounds that it violates the right to privacy, the First Amendment, and the equal protection clause of the United States Constitution. This battle isn't over yet."

NEVADA SODOMY LAW REPEALED

CARSON CITY, NV - Nevada Governor Bob Miller has signed into law a bill to repeal Nevada's sodomy statute. This marks the first legislative repeal of a sodomy law since 1986, when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in Bowers vs. Hardwick that homosexual sodomy is not constitutionally protected.

First-year Nevada state senator Lori Lipman Brown introduced the bill to repeal the sodomy law in the state senate. The 82 year old law was previously amended in 1977 to apply to sexual activity between members of the same sex only. The repeal measure faced heated opposition during judiciary committee hearings including testimony from out-of-state "expert witness," Paul Cameron, a disbarred psychologist.

Judy Corbisiero of Nevadans for Constitutional Equality said, "This effort [to repeal the sodomy law] proved that when the gay community in northern and southern Nevada pull together we can make things happen."

After a grueling lobbying effort led by Corbisiero and Kevin Kelly of the Nevada Association of Criminal Justice, the repeal measure passed both chambers by more than a two to one ratio. Lee Plotkin, a member of the Las Vegas Lesbian and Gay Pride Committee who also lobbied for the repeal, said, "We developed a formula to make this effort work." He added, "If it can work in Nevada, it can work anywhere."

COME OUT TO CLINTON

DENVER, CO - The formation of a new, Colorado based, multi-purpose national organization has been announced. The "Come Out To Clinton Campaign," is a national effort, committed to supporting President Clinton to end the military ban against gay & lesbians (see story above) and encouraging the passage of a federal civil rights bill for everyone.

The goals of the right wing extremists are becoming more and more apparent. With passage of Amendment 2 in Colorado that legalizes discrimination based on sexual orientation and with many similar measures being voted on across the country, it's apparent that something must be done on a national level regarding the basic human rights of lesbians, gays and bisexuals.

The goals of the "Come Out to Clinton Campaign" are twofold: Primarily, the goal is to make it simpler than ever to have everyone's voice heard in the nation's capital, more specifically: to generate and send letters of encouragement to President Clinton reminding him that we're here and that without our vote, he wouldn't be President! Secondly, the money raised through the efforts will be donated to various gay and lesbian organizations nationally and locally.

Letters to President Clinton are generated and sent when you call 1-900-285-5462. The cost of the call is \$2.90 per minute (average call is 2 minutes) and will appear on your phone bill. You will be asked to leave your name and phone number (which will be held in strictest confidence), and your letter to the President will go out the next day.

HAWAIIAN SAME-SEX MARRIAGE RULING STANDS

HONOLULU, HI - Reaffirming its commitment to equal rights, the Hawaii Supreme Court recently turned down the State Attorney General's request to reconsider its May 5 ruling that said that the State's refusal to issue marriage licenses to same-sex couples is unconstitutional. In answering the State's request for reconsideration, Hawaii's highest court made clear that the State must prove a "compelling interest" or lift the ban on samesex marriages. The court's most recent edict, which was supported by the majority of the court, means that other states will be able to use the May 5 ruling in efforts to legalize same-sex marriage elsewhere.

Hawaii supporters of equal rights hailed the May 5 ruling as a victory for all people wishing to end gender-based discrimination. "We're overjoyed and we couldn't be more pleased, and we now expect to prevail ultimately on the issue of gay marriages," said Dan Foley, attorney for the three gay couples who filed the original lawsuit against

the state as part of the Hawaii Equal Rights Marriage Project (HERMP).

A final decision is expected to be made by the Hawaii Supreme court within the next two years. The legal bill for this fight is already \$25,000 and growing. 

DEAR AGNES

Answers to your questions about love, relationships & personal problems

Dear Agnes,

I have a big problem and I'm totally at a loss as to what to do about it. My girlfriend and I have been together since 1987. We've been very happy. We've lived together since 1988 and recently purchased a house together.

The problem is that she is having an affair with a co-worker. This has been going on for about eight months (since right after we moved into our new house).

Around that time she started staying much later at work and "going to the office" on weekends. I didn't really think anything about it until a friend of mine reported that she had seen "Jane" at a romantic restaurant with another woman. The next time Jane said she had to work on a Saturday, I followed her. She didn't go to her office but to a house about a mile from our home where she was greeted at the door by a woman. She was there for almost three hours.

I haven't said anything to her about this. I've been hoping she would quit seeing this other woman of her own accord. I am afraid if I say something our whole relationship will blow apart — and that's something I don't want to happen. However, I've taken it for about as long as I can stand it. It's not going away and I'm afraid I can't take it much longer.

Do you have any advice about how to approach her? I really want us to stay together, and I'm afraid if I go about this in the wrong way, I'll lose her. Please help.

Dear Silent,

Apparently communication is not one of the strong points in this relationship. Before

you decide that your lover is definitely having an affair, let's look at the evidence: First—a romantic restaurant can double for a business lunch or dinner. Second—unless your lover specifically told you she was going to her office, don't assume because she was at someone's house that they were in the throes of passion for three hours. They could have actually been working.

Unless you two are alot better off financially than most people (which you may very well be), her timing of added work is understandable. Generally, the first year after you buy a house is financially difficult. With an open mind, and in a nonconfrontational way, ask your lover what is behind all this extra work and about the romantic restaurant (leave the "romantic" part out). DON'T accuse her of having an affair — give her a chance to give you an explanation before you jump to conclusions. My money says she is working. Talk it out and if, in fact, she is working, be cautious of friends who carry tales.

Dear Agnes,

About six months ago, I started going to Alcoholics Anonymous. I have a serious drinking problem that I have under control at the moment.

The problem is my friends. They go out to the bar almost every night and are always bugging me to go with them. They all think that my drinking is not all that serious a problem and keep encouraging me to "just drink one" or "just drink a beer" or something else stupid like that. They don't know how very tempting that is.

I don't want to give up my friends, but it seems as if they don't really care about what I want for myself. I haven't talked to my AA sponsor about this because she doesn't know I'm gay, and I don't want her to find out. Do you have any suggestions on how to handle this? The longer it goes on, the more and more tempted I am to give in. Giving up alcohol was hard enough to do once, I don't want to have to do it again.

TRYING TO STAY SOBER Denton, TX

Dear Sober,

Social pressure to drink is heavily engrained in our society — and in the lesbian/gay community. Drinking dates back to the beginning of civilization and our ancestors — particularly those of European descent — were heavy drinkers. Gay social life focuses on many activities that revolve around alcohol.

Often, when people quit drinking or make any other serious lifestyle change, some friendships will change. Much of your friendship with these people may be based on drinking, and when you take that away, you have permanently altered the terms of the relationship. The most important thing you can do now is contact the AA group for lesbians and gay men in the Denton/Sherman area. You can reach Lambda AA of Texhoma by calling 903-893-6941.



WHY Are We Gay?

Theories on the Cause of Homosexuality
Through the Ages

Recently, there have been a number of studies released that claim to have found biological and genetic causes of homosexuality. Dr. Simon LeVay's study showing that the hypothalamus in gay males was slightly smaller than in straight males was the first widely publicized study linking homosexuality to biology. Then came two "twin studies" from Northwestern University that showed that a disproportionate number of identical twins (both male and female) were both gay and that more fraternal twins were both gay than regular siblings. Now, researchers at the National Institutes of Health claim to have found a genetic marker in the X chromosome of male homosexuals (a study of lesbians is under way). In light of this "hard" scientific evidence, I though it might be interesting to look back at some past theories on the "causes" of homosexuality.

You'll notice that most of the theories relate to gay men. Although some cultures acknowledged the presence of lesbianism, male-dominated cultures tended to overlook the fact that females could ever be attracted to anything other than men. England, during Queen Victoria's reign, instituted laws against "buggery" (male homosexuality), but there were no laws against female homosexuality, since the Queen didn't believe that women could do such a thing.

THE CAUSES

The Lepchas tribe of the Himalayas believed homosexuality was caused by eating the flesh of an uncastrated pig. Babylonian astrologers thought that the planets governed homosexuality. Scorpio and Mercury were strongly implicated.

Plato thought that the gods had created three sexes — male, female and hermaphrodite. The hermaphrodites were too strong and Zeus wanted to weaken them so he split them into two beings. These "half" beings are always looking for their other half and, as a result, are attracted to others of the same sex.

During the Dark Ages, people who had sex with others of the same sex were believed to have been possessed by the Devil. The condition was contagious and the cure was exorcism or burning at the stake.

Arabs believed male homosexuality was caused by "excessive itchiness in the buttocks region," and that it could be cured by applying a salve to the area.

In the Middles Ages, "The famous surgeon William of Bologna ... attributed lesbianism to a growth emanating from the mouth of the womb and appearing outside the vagina as a pseudopenis," according to sociologist David E. Greenberg's book "The Construction of Homosexuality."

Reincarnation plays a role in theories from India. If you change gender from one life to the next, your physical body may be changed, but your "spirit" may be slower to change. Thus, if you were a man in your last life and a woman in this one, you may be carrying over an attraction to women left over from your days as a man.

In the 19th century, Scottish physician, Robert Macnish claimed to have found the cause of homosexuality by studying the shape of people's skulls.

In the late 1800s, it was believed that masturbating too much could cause homosexuality. It was also blamed on insanity and was associated with criminals.

A contemporary Islamic surgeon believes that homosexuality is caused by eating pork. He believes that pigs are the only "gay" animals and the genes for homosexuality are absorbed through the mouth when you eat pork. He believes that this explains why there are more homosexuals in pork eating nations (of course, this would mean that there are no homosexuals in Islamic (or Jewish) countries — yeah, right.)

After World War II, scientists thought homosexuality might be caused by hormonal imbalances. A study was conducted on military inductees which showed that "some subjects showed a high degree of estrogen (female hormones) ..." However, the test was inconclusive and it was too expensive to test every person entering the military.

Freud didn't really state a "cause" for homosexuality, but he did have some theories. He hypothesized that Male homosexuality might be caused by a fixation on the mother, by the male placing such a high value on the penis that he can't tolerate the object of his affection *not* having one or by jealousy of his father or an older brother. Helene Deustch, a disciple of Freud, thought there were two causes of lesbians: "arrested development" (the girl never

outgrows her friendships with other girls), and the fact that when the girl realizes she can't have her mother, she transfers her feelings not to her father, but to other women.

Psychoanalyst, Irving Bieber believed homosexuality was caused by a great fear of the opposite sex. He also promoted the thought that mothers "caused" homosexuality in their sons by being "overly occupied with manners and appearance ... She probably spends too much time in his company ... She holds her husband in contempt and usually dominates him."

New York psychoanalyst, Edmund

Berger thought that male homosexuality was a result of not getting enough milk from the mother as a child. This makes the child angry and he unconsciously seeks revenge against women by having sex with men.

WHAT A WORLD, WHAT A WORLD DESIGNER GENES

BY NANCY FORD

"It is claimed by those who have had experience, that in certain professions — a very large percentage practice abnormal sexual relations. Many of these individuals are thoroughly healthy, and not in any other way to be distinguished from normal human beings.

"As we in this country well know, many homosexuals among men are splendid musicians, capable writers, adept hairdressers, and designers, and perhaps best of all interior decorators. In fact, many of these individuals take a certain pride in their un-normality, claiming that their practice is far to preferred to the old-fashioned, and to them obsolete relations that exist between normal men and women."

This text has been plucked verbatim from the well-respected medical journal/sex manual Eugenics and Sex Harmony by Herman H. Rubin, M.D. The bad news is that this text was considered the Sexology Bible for some time, the theories of which were referred and adhered to almost exclusively by the major medical universities and colleges in the U.S.

The good news is it was published way back in 1933, and has since been used as an illustration as to how far the medical community has come regarding the cause of homosexuality and lesbianism. I read the news *today*. Oh boy.

As published in an Associated Press report in July, "researchers have identified a gene pattern linked to male homosexuality, adding powerful new evidence to the scientific theory that the tendency to be gay is inherited.

This validates the argument by many gays and lesbians that homosexuality is not a matter of choice, but rather, of biological design. Science has spoken, indicating that Nature does indeed triumph over Nurture, and the concept of homosexuality as sin takes a holiday. Or does it? Oh, that it were so simple. As for the prolific attitudes among many mothers that they are to blame for their offspring's deviance, they may be right. This study suggests that if there were a genetic basis for homosexuality, it would likely be on the X chromosome,

the sex-linked chromosome inherited by males from their mothers. So put down this magazine, guys, rush to the phone and thank your mom for the designer genes she gave you.

Double-edged sword: some fear that if a biological basis for homosexuality is found, there may be some people who view it as an opportunity to medically change sexual orientation in utero.

Scenario: Okay. It's the year 2010. You're relaxing at home with your spouse watching Holovision. Suddenly the image projected before you is a commercial for one of those home pregnancy tests. Except this is the souped-up version. Not only will this test indicate pregnancy, but also the fetus' gender. Blue eyes or brown. Race. Left or Right handedness. And sexual orientation.

Kind of gives the concept of a woman's right to abortion a whole new twist, doesn't it? What if a woman determines she does not want to give birth to a left-handed child. Or a blue-eyed child? Or a gay child? It's her body, her choice, you know.

So you see, all this genetics stuff can be good news or bad

news. Perhaps the sanest answer to the What causes it question is It doesn't matter. We just are. Just for the record, Eugenics also contained the following passage: "If it should develop that a boy at the age

of puberty still retains an abnormal fondness for doing fancy work, or if girls should exhibit a desire to dress in boys clothing, and to indulge in boyish games, it might be well to make a and endocrinological physical examination of these children. For, not infrequently, the entire trouble may be absolutely corrected by merely aiding the thymus gland to regress normally, and allow normal development of the sexual organs of the boy or the girl to be completed. In which event, all traces of abnormal yearnings for those of his or her sex will be removed, and true heterosexual function will be restored." Hmmm.



Isis Rising

by Jean Stewart

I have two new fantasy novels for reading on the beach this month.

The first is Shadows After Dark by Ouida Crozier. Kathryn is a mildmannered researcher at the University of Minnesota. When she meets a woman at one of the local bars, it only takes one dance and the whisper of a name to start her obsession. Kyril, the dark-haired, enigmatic dance partner isn't seen again for two years. When she finally does come back into Kathryn's world, it isn't at all what Kathryn expects.

Kyril has come from Körnagy, the world of the Oupir (oupirs are known to humans as vampires). A new disease has killed Kyril's lover, and she has come to Earth to try to find the cause of this new threat to the Oupirian world.

Kyril and Kathryn's relationship is fine until Kyril discloses her true nature and the reason for her visit. Kathryn is horrified at Kyril's disclosure.

After the police in Minneapolis become concerned about a series of murders where the victims have been drained of blood, Kyril is forced to return to Körnagy — and decides to take Katherine with her.

Shadows After Dark is definitely one of the better lesbian vampire novels around. The premise is original and defies many vampire stereotypes. This is not a novel of wooden stakes through the heart and strings of garlic, but rather a fanciful explanation for the persistence of vampire legends throughout the world.

The writing is superb. There is a fluidity and grace evident in her style. Ms. Crozier's work isn't quite on par with Anne Rice, but she has the potential. My only complaint, as with so many other lesbian novels, is length (yes, I've said it before). Lesbian publishers tend to put out books that are all about the same length. I don't know if the authors cut their own work too short or if publishers do it for them. I only know that the slim volumes issued by lesbian publishers aren't enough.

Character and plot development are rushed and stories often seem to be cut off mid-stream. Maybe that explains the abundance of sequels in lesbian povels.

The same problem of length also plagues the second in the <u>Isis</u> series. <u>Isis Rising</u> by Jean Stewart is the long-awaited sequel to Return to Isis.

In this sequel, Kali, the refugee from Elysium and her lover, Whit are helping to rebuild the community of Isis after it's destruction by "Regs" from Elysium. Three women are appointed to help with the rebuilding and while it is under construction, Whit is appointed as Military Governor. Power struggles begin almost immediately as each woman has ambitions to be the elected leader of Isis.


Problems plague the rebuilding as the campaign for leadership progresses. Sabotage, arguments over design and internal power plays all work to divide the new community. Is all this trouble just the result of human nature and politics, or is it the consequence of an evil master plan by one of the women? Although I loved Return to Isis, Isis Rising leaves much to be desired. The characters are poorly developed and the

plot was very murky right up to the last chapter. "Magic" of the really powerful sort comes into play toward the end of the novel and the only lead-in is Kali's increasing ability to hear other people's thoughts. This is a fantasy novel, but the jump from ESP to full blown magical warfare is a little too fantastical.

The length problem mentioned earlier crops up in its full glory with this book. The end comes right when it starts to get good, leaving the reader and most of the characters at complete loose ends.

Various Views on The World Around Us

I am eighteen years old, I voted in the 1992 election, and numerous other city elections. I work two jobs, attend a conservative college preparatory, single-sex school full-time. I have been in a loving, committed relationship for almost one year. I am the arts editor for my school newspaper, and a staff writer; originally, I wrote this editorial for my newspaper.

Homosexuals should have the basic human right as American citizens to join the United States

military.

Research is now revealing that homosexuality is not a choice; gays and lesbians are born with a sexual preference and orientation in which they are attracted to those of the same gender. To think about the issue logically, why would anyone want to put themselves in a position to be ostracized and mentally and physically abused.

We, as gays and lesbians, are everyday people that pay taxes. Homosexuals are business men and women, teachers, students, politicians, construction workers, waiters, waitresses, sons, daughters,

and some even parents. The list could go on.

What many people fail to acknowledge is that gays and lesbians have been in the military for many years; in doing so they have had to denounce their own identity and closet their lives in fear of a discharge from the military. A continuation of the ban could be considered a form of ethnic cleansing.

For many years, the military has given a lighter sentence to those convicted of a crime if they would report the knowledge of any "queers." This practice is wrong. It is also wrong for a committed, hard-working service person to receive a dishonorable discharge simply because he or she is gay or lesbian. Military personnel dishonorably discharged will have difficulty finding a substantial civilian job anywhere.

Heterosexual men and women are concerned about being approached, or "picked-up" by a homosexual, but simply because a straight male or female is working closely with a gay or lesbian person does not by any means allow that the homosexual is even remotely attracted to the heterosexual. Many homosexuals will continue to "stay in the closet" for fear of brutal discrimi-

nation.

Approximately a year ago, some of the men in the navy were accused of raping many women in a hotel, but the issue, known as the Tailhook Scandal, did not remain in the public eye for long. for some of these men, punishment beyond a slap on the hand was not received. However, if an issue such as this were to have occurred with a homosexual, the public would have never heard the end, and that person or persons would have been immediately discharged.

Lifting the ban on gays in the military will be hell in the beginning, but will lead to a greater level of acceptance in the society for gays and lesbians. High ranking officers may lose respect and experience a freeze in their current position if they are "outed", but in time will regain their acquired and well-deserved respect.




