

HATE CRIME PROVISION INCLUDED IN CRIME BILL

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The recently passed federal crime bill in a final vote in the Senate, includes two important measures supported by the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) — the Hate Crimes Sentencing Enhancement Act and the Violence Against Women Act.

The Hate Crime Sentencing Enhancement Act will advance the federal response to crimes in which the perpetrator intentionally selects a victim because of his or her "actual or perceived race, color, religion, national origin, ethnicity, gender or sexual orientation." Specifically, the act increases penalties for federal crimes that are hatemotivated and enhances federal sentences not less than three offense levels.

"This act sends a dramatic signal to those who seek to victimize gay people, and others," said Tanya Domi, NGLTF Legislative Director. "The federal government declares that hate crimes will be taken seriously by the federal courts and will be punished."

Passage of the measure is especially timely, with several anti-gay incidents garnering media attention nationwide. Gay and lesbian activists in Salt Lake City staged a rally earlier this month after a district court judge reduced the sentence in a case involving the killing of a gay man. While the case proved the victim was targeted because he was gay, the perpetrator was charged merely with manslaughter and sentenced to only six years. In a separate incident, four teens were charged in August with the vicious murder of a gay man in

Houston. According to police, the teens hunted down the victim because they had heard that gay men often had a lot of money and were "easy targets."

"Many vicious crimes against gay, lesbian and bisexual people are not federal crimes, and will not be directly impacted by this legislation," Domi said, "However, it is imperative that the highest level of government send a message that hate crimes will not go unpunished in this society."

Along with the Hate Crime Sentencing Enhancement Act, the Violence Against Women Act was folded into the massive crime bill. That act doubles the federal penalty for repeat sex offenders and requires that federal laws treat acquaintance rape and stranger rape the same. The act also mandates restitution for the victims of sex crimes. The measure includes money for a wide variety of police training, counseling services, data collection systems, and educational programs.

LESBIAN MOTHER'S NATIONAL DEFENSE FUND EXPANDS

SEATTLE, WA — The Lesbian Mother's National Defense fund (LMNDF) celebrates its 20th anniversary this year with an expansion of its membership and program services, and a name change to become the Lavender Families Resource Network. In 1974 the twelve "founding mothers of LMNDF began fundraising for two lesbian mothers in Eatonville, Washington. One mother lost custody and her children were placed in foster care. Only after four years of expensive

litigation and intense personal struggle did she regain custody of her children — custody she lost solely because she was a lesbian.

Twenty years ago, it scarcely occurred to lesbian and gay parents to even try to maintain or fight for custody of their children. Since that time, more and more lesbians and gay men have refused to accept the social prejudice which assumes that we are not fit parents, and have taken their cases to court. Although the chances of winning such a legal battle are relatively good in a few areas, gay and lesbian parents in most parts of the United States still face the serious threat of losing their children if they end up in court.

LMNDF's ability to serve as a clearinghouse of information and a network of support has enhanced opportunities for every lesbian to exercise her right to parent. Although our custody and visitation information has focused on lesbian families, it has also helped gay fathers, lesbian grandmothers, bisexual mothers and transsexual parents when these people are discriminated against based on their sexual orientation. Heterosexual parents, too, lose their children when they are labeled as gay, lesbian, or bisexual. None of these groups has developed a resource designed to support their struggles against discrimination in parenting as LMNDF has done for lesbians. Changing the name and explicitly including this whole variety of families is a natural extension of their traditional services.

From its original purpose of assisting lesbian mothers in custody litigation, LMNDF branched out years ago to provide information about donor insemination, adoption and parenting rights.

Lavender Families Resource Network is looking for attorneys to participate in their attorney referral program and is currently searching for additional Directors for the board including individuals with specific expertise in legal issues and finances.

Celebrities Lend Their Names to Fight the Right

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Some 110 notable figures and groups from the political, entertainment, religions and other fields have lent their names and support in the coalition effort to fight the Radical Right's campaign against lesbians, gays and bisexuals.

The National Gay & Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) Equality Statement Endorsement Project has asked major political organizations, civil rights groups, unions, elected officials, government bodies and others to sign onto a statement supporting fundamental equal rights for gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender people. The statement condemns the Radical right-sponsored anti-gay ballot initiatives.

"We support equality for all Americans," reads the statement. "Every American's right to be free from discrimination in jobs, housing and public accommodations must be defended and protected. No person's fundamental civil rights should be denied by a ballot initiative or any other means."

The Endorsement Project has garnered the support of Hollywood and entertainment celebrities including Whoopi Goldberg and Armistead Maupin. Political leaders in the U.S. Congress, including Senators Paul Simon, John Chafee Representatives Patricia Schroeder. Barney Frank and Gerry Studds have signed on, as have the AFL-CIO. AFSCME, United Auto Workers and other unions. The American Library Association, National Lawyers Guild, PEN (international writer's association) and numerous other professional associations have joined the effort. In addition, the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, a host of other religious affiliations, dozens of advocacy groups, businesses and

governmental organizations have lent their support.

NGLTF is distributing the list of endorsers to state and local groups that will use it to build coalitions for fighting anti-gay ballot initiatives. This year started with ten states targeted for anti-gay measures. The Radical Right failed to place measures on the November ballot in all but two states — Idaho and Oregon.



I'm sick and tired of this, but I don't know what to do about it. Do you have any suggestions other than getting two apartments and only seeing each other around payday?

Money is the Root of All Evil Houston, TX

Dear Money,

Another apartment won't help anything. You'll only double your expenses and be twice as broke, so scratch that idea.

Start by making a budget. It doesn't have to be anything complicated, just start writing down what you spend on bills, and then figure up how much cash you have (on average) after the bills are paid.

Most people will not write down their expenses because they really don't want to know where their money is going (or, they think it's just plain hopeless). This has got to be your first step.

Once you've written down your expenses for a couple of months, you'll be able to see your "spending trend." From here you will be able to see the places you can cut back.

For instance, are you going to the grocery store and spending lots of money and then going out to eat while your food rots in the fridge? Are you paying for two movie channels and then renting videos so you've seen all the movies before they make it to cable? Can you cut back on clothing purchases? These are all places to look for overspending. Based on your individual circumstances, you will be able to find more areas where you can cut back.

After you have figured out where you can cut back, you might consider splitting your spending money in half. Stash half back for the week before payday.

Remember, it will take both of you, working together, to solve this problem.

My lover and I are having a huge fight. It sounds really silly, but it is very serious to me.

I have a six-year-old male cat. I had this cat for three years before I even met my current lover.

We live in the country and the cat comes and goes as he pleases. The problem is that he isn't "fixed." My lover insists that I should have him neutered, but I don't think so.


He's getting older and I think it would be cruel to have him fixed at this late date. Besides, there are millions of "unfixed" cats around here. all our neighbors keep cats in their barns to keep the rat and mice population down. I don't see what difference fixing this one cat is going to make. My lover says I'm just being stubborn, but I think she is being unreasonable. What do you say?

Neuter or Not East Texas

Dear Neuter,

In most cases, it really is a good idea to have a any cat fixed. Not only does it help control unwanted kittens, it can also help prevent many other health problems. A neutered male is also much less likely to wander off or to fight with other males. However, since your cat is six years old, I would suggest that you talk to your vet before making a decision.





PROTECTING YOURSELF

... and your car, and your home, and your belongings, and...







"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

"The best offense is a good defense." "There's no use closing the barn door after the horse is gone."

Cliches? Yes, but there is truth to back them up. Steps you take now to protect vourself, your home and your belongings can pay off in a time of crisis. There's more to personal protection than an alarm system and a can of mace - the following should give you some ideas on how to guard against harm to yourself or theft of your property.

YOUR HOME

Home security systems come in a variety of forms ranging from the do-it-yourself kind from the local hardware store to elaborate systems that are monitored on a 24 hour basis. Monitored systems are the most reliable. Talk to your local alarm company about what is best for your home and your lifestyle. Monitored

alarm systems are available in a wide range of prices to suit most budgets. Make sure that the stickers the alarm company places on doors and windows don't specify what type alarm is installed. Experienced thieves know how to get around many alarm systems, and advertising what type you have installed may increase your chances of being robbed rather than decreasing them. If you simply can't afford an actual alarm system, you can always place those "This property protected by a monitored alarm system" stickers on your doors and windows anyway. Studies have shown that homes with these stickers in place are burgled 40% less often than those without them.

Although home security systems abound these days, there are some simpler steps you can take to protect your home and belongings.

Install a "peep hole" in your front door and use it. Remember that you don't have to open the door. Ask to see identification for anyone who says they are with a utility, phone or cable company — even if you called them to come make repairs. If you don't know the person at the door, or if they claim to be a salesman, tell them (without opening the door) to call and set up an appointment.

Make sure that windows and doors have secure locks. A deadbolt is a must on all outside doors. Be sure that you use the type that locks with a key on the inside if the door has windows in it or is within reach of nearby windows. Without this feature, a thief could break out the window, reach in and unlock the deadbolt. Security experts recommend deadbolt locks made in the U.S. or Germany as superior to those made in Taiwan, China or Japan.

Tall shrubs that cover windows can provide a place for a burglar to hide while he is breaking into your home. Cut these back so that your windows and doors are visible to neighbors and police. Also be sure that your home has adequate outside lighting. Motion detector lights are a good option to scare off potential thieves. And, last but not least, don't leave a ladder laying around outside your home. This can be just what a robber needs to boost him into a second story or attic window.

YOUR BELONGINGS

Next to chaining them to the foundation of your house, the best way to protect your valuables is to leave your mark on them. Police departments in most cities will either mark your property for you or loan you an engraving tool free of charge as part of Operation Identification. The identification number you use (usually your driver's license number) is placed on file with

the police and makes it easier to identify your property if it is stolen and retrieved by police. Some of the items most likely to be stolen include your TV set, CD player and stereo, cameras, computers and jewelry.

The other thing than can help is to make a complete inventory of your home with original price, purchase date and serial numbers. Store one list in a "safe" place in your home and a copy in a safe deposit box. Not only will this help in case of theft by establishing ownership and worth, it will also be invaluable in case of fire, flood, tornado or other natural disaster. One easy way to take inventory of your home is by videotaping. Make a tape that shows all your belongings and narrate it with original purchase prices. Be sure to open all your closets and cabinets to get an accurate and complete picture of your belongings. Once again, keep a copy at home and another in a safe deposit box.

One last note — Don't go around bragging to people you don't know about the \$8,000 stereo system you just purchased or the 4 karat diamond your lover bought you. And, don't tell anyone (even a friend) that you have an alarm system, but you rarely turn it on. This kind of information gets around and can make you a perfect target.

YOUR CAR

This may sound obvious, but you should always take your keys out of the ignition when you leave the car. Statistics show that nearly half of all cars stolen in the U.S. had keys in the ignition. So, even though it is -30° outside, don't leave your car running with the keys in it while you run into a convenience store for a cup of coffee. After all, would you

rather have a warm car or no car at all? Some other tips to prevent car theft include:

- don't hide a spare key under the seat, above the visor or in one of those magnetic boxes. Thieves know all these places.
- Park in well-lighted areas at night, preferably close to a street corner.
- Don't leave the title in the car, it belongs in a safe deposit box.
- Car alarms seldom deter thieves, instead, invest in a \$25 cutoff switch. This device is easy to install and won't let the car start unless the switch is turned on. A thief won't take the time to look for the switch and will move on to greener pastures.

YOURSELF

Homes can be repaired, belongings and cars can be replaced. Protecting yourself

from injury, rape or even death, is the most important part of any discussion about crime. You can make a good start by following the tips listed below:

- When walking anywhere, choose a well-lighted route where there will be other people around. If possible, walk with a friend or a dog.
- Walk with purpose (like you know where you're going) and pay attention to your surroundings.
- Walk in the middle of the sidewalk instead of close to buildings or near the curb.
- Carry your purse close to your body with the clasp facing you.
- Carry your keys and money in your pocket, not in your purse.
- Don't carry large sums of money and never flash a roll of bills (even if you know they are all ones.

The first book we're going to look at this month is Second Guess by Rose Beecham. Second Guess is the second in the Amanda Valentine Mystery Series.

Detective Inspector Amanda Valentine of the Wellington, New Zealand Police Department has just returned from a year's leave of absence in New York. She is looking forward to the slower pace of life in New Zealand. Instead, she returns just in time for a highly public, very scandalous murder case. Sybil Knight was the director of the Wellington City Art Gallery and daughter of the former Ambassador to the U.S. Her body is found in the

private S&M dungeon at a lesbian sex club.

Sybil had lots of money, and lots of enemies. The man at work who thought she had stolen a job that was rightfully his; her homophobic brother who believed she had more than her share of a wealthy Aunt's estate; her lover, Kim, who suspected that Sybil was having an affair; and Casey, the owner of the sex club where she was found dead.

Amanda must deal with the press, as well as Sybil's influential family while trying to find the murderer.

Author Rose Beecham also writes under the name Jennifer Fulton. Her previous books include Passion Bay, Saving Grace and True Love. She is an engaging writer and has created some unusual (but entirely believable) characters. Detective Amanda Valentine can be compared very favorable to that other scion of lesbian detectivedom — Kate Delafield (the creation of Katherine V. Forrest). Second Guess is a good read and is definitely recommended.

Next, we'll look at **The Sure Thing** by Melissa Hartman.

Dr. Christine Kennedy is a researcher studying earthquake prediction. When she accurately forecasts a Southern California earthquake, the press is very interested.

Dory Moraga, an Emmy award-winning reporter for an LA TV station is sent to interview Chris. To thank her for the interview, Dory offers to take Chris to lunch — a lunch that turns into much more.


Chris' lover of seven years was killed in a car accident three years before and Chris is still having a hard time with her death. Dory grew up in the barrios of East LA and is driven to succeed in her chosen profession.

When Dory's work takes her into dangerous situation, Chris is terrified. The thought of Dory putting herself in harm's way — on purpose — is totally foreign to her and very nerve-wracking. When Dory has to go out and report on the riots in L.A. following the Rodney King verdict, Chris is beside herself with fear.

Will their relationship last? Who cares. Although Chris is a sympathetic character at the start, her whining about Dory's work gets old. Dory's love 'em and leave 'em, "my career comes first" attitude may be common among

lesbians, but that doesn't make it an endearing quality. Any woman who will leave and not speak to you for three months when you complain about her work isn't worth a second chance. Maybe The Sure Thing is just too close to real life for comfort. If I want to hear stories of women who get together and break-up, get together and break-up again and again, I'll go to the bar.



- Avoid walking near vacant lots and alleys.


