



NATIONAL CONFERENCE WASHINGTON, D.C. - The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) will host its annual "Creating Change" skills building conference in Dallas November 11-13, with pre-conference workshops November 9 and 10.

More than 70 workshops will be showcased at this year's Creating Change conference. Prior to the main body of the conference, Creating Change features full-day pre-conference institutes: the People of Color Organizing Institute and the Transformation Institute on November 9: and the Race Class and Gender Institute on November 10. This year's conference will include three Fight the Right "intensives" (focusing on elections, education and religious organizing), as well as "intensives" on Fundraising, AIDS and Youth.

#### TEXAS GAY RODEO TO BE HELD IN AUSTIN

AUSTIN, TX - The Eleventh Annual TGRA Rodeo will be held in Austin, TX, November 11-13 at the Travis County Exposition Center located off State Highway 290 East and Decker Road. The rodeo is always the main focus of the weekend, but there will also be vendors and entertainment venues.

Friday, November 11th will be the Rodeo Kickoff Dance from 7-10 at the Doubletree Hotel Ballroom. Two rodeo performances will be held on Saturday and Sunday, November 12th and 13th. The first performance begins at 9am, followed by the Grand Entry at noon and a second performance at 1pm. Dances will also be held both Saturday and Sunday from 7pm-midnight at the Doubletree Ballroom.

Individual tickets are \$12.50 for each day's rodeo and \$5 for each night's dance. ## VICTORY FUND CANDIDATES ON BALLOT IN EIGHT STATES

GAY-BAITING A FACTOR

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The Victory Fund, a donor network of individuals who are committed to electing openly gay and lesbian public officials, has backed 16 candidates in eight states in this year's general election. The Victory Fund backs candidates at the city,

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county, state and federal levels and has helped many openly gay candidates since its inception in 1991. Candidates who are recommended must meet certain criteria and complete an exhaustive screening process.

The Victory Fund is a registered Political Action Committee (PAC) and supports candidates with in-kind contributions, referrals to campaign professionals and access to its donor network. Members Join the Victory Fund for \$100 or more and agree to give at least \$100 on two recommended candidates within a 12 month period. After candidates are qualified, members receive profiles of each race and choose which campaigns to support and when. Checks are made payable to the candidates campaign, but sent to the Victory Fund where they are combined with contributions from other members and sent to the campaign as a massive show of community support. Membership in the Victory Fund is more than 3,500 nationwide.

To demonstrate the Victory Fund's effectiveness, some 72 candidates contacted the Fund for financial aid during the 1993 election cycle. Of these candidates, only 12 were recommended to the network, of which six won. Of the remaining 60 candidates, only two won. The Victory Fund is also reporting several incidences of increased antigay campaigning — even from opponents who claim to be "gayfriendly."

One explanation for the increase is the rise in power of the Radical Right and its demonization of the gay and lesbian community as fundraising gimmick. "The Radical Right has stepped up its attacks on openly gay political figures as part of its overall strategy to undermine the strength of our community - and to raise money," says Victory Fund Deputy Director Kathleen DeBold. "They know that qualified gay and lesbian officials dispel anti-gay stereotypes and increase our community's visibility in an extremely positive way - something they don't want to see happen. Seventeen of the Victory Fund's this year are in states that were targeted by the right for antigay ballot initiatives.

The extremely reactionary Traditional Values Coalition (TVC) has beefed up its attacks on openly gay and lesbian candidates. In regards to California's openly gay Secretary of State candidate Tony Miller, TVC head Lou Sheldon announced, "I've yet to see an open homosexual not promote [gay] agenda ... If the Press puffs up Tony, we will crucify him." Sheldon has also targeted openly lesbian California Assembly candidate Sheila Kuehl and took a special trip to Wisconsin to campaign against openly lesbian State Assemblymember Tammy Baldwin, who is up for re-election this year. Many candidates have been accused of

being "single issue" candidates and that their only purpose in running for office is to promote the "gay rights agenda." "There are many ways to exploit homophobia in a campaign," says political activist David Mixner. "A straight candidate gay-baits when he calls himself *The Pro-Family Candidate* implying that his opponent is anti-

family." Another popular way for a straight candidate to introduce homophobia into a campaign is to make an announcement to the effect of, "I don't intend to use my opponent's homosexuality as a campaign issue," thereby making it a campaign issue. For Victory Fund candidates, the increase in gay-baiting has meant an escalation in the cost of campaigning. Openly gay candidates must be more qualified and better-prepared than their straight counterparts, they need to raise more money early in the race so they can define themselves before the other side does, and they need to raise surplus funds to refute anti-gay attacks. "We've made great strides in electing our own these past few years," says Victory fund Executive Director William Waybourn, "and this backlash against Victory Fund candidates only reinforces the importance of our mission."


Will you say something to help swing this argument? After three years, I am sick of arguing with her. I know it's too late for the upcoming election, but there will always be another one.

After years of the bar scene, when I finally met the wife, I was delighted to join America in its celebration of the suburbs. In lieu of recovering from



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
god! They were go-go dancers! Well, actually they were a little more than gogo dancers and a little less than strippers. Erotic dancers maybe?
