

An open letter to the gay community:

The day after the election, almost all of the gays and lesbian in Texas are moping around wondering what happened. Governor Ann Richards in now former Governor Ann Richards. A lady who had a 60% approval rating was defeated by George Bush, Jr. The soon to be governor Bush brings a lot of fear to the lesbian/gay community for now they know that the "good life" under Ms. Richards is over. The next four years are already being considered years of oppression and defeat.

Unlike most of my brothers and sisters, I am saddened about the defeat of Ms. Richards, but I also have a sparkle of hope for the gay and lesbian community. Maybe now, you will all get up off your butts and fight for what is rightfully ours. Under Ms. Richards, we did enjoy a bit more freedom, but what little amounts we enjoyed were just that, little! GAY/LESBIAN GROUP THREATENS STEPHEN F. AUSTIN UNIVERSITY

The Gay and Lesbian Student Association (GLSA) of Stephen F. Austin State University (SFASU) has selected the Texas Human Rights Foundation (THRF) to coordinate litigation against the university and its Student Government Association.

GLSA President Keith Roberts announced that the organization has selected the Texas Human Rights Foundation to represent it in court against the University if the administration adopts the discriminatory practices recommended by a few radical right students.

The university administration has not announced whether it will follow the recommendation of those students advocating discrimination, and THRF's Board of Trustees hopes they will overrule the recommendation to revoke GLSA's charter and cut off it's funding. Garbarino mentioned that student members of the radical right have organized on college campuses around the state, just as their parents have for local elections. "We're their rallying cry. Queer baiting sells. The pattern of campus incidents is no accident. It's clear the Radical Right is even reaching into our schools to arm its war of hate and misinformation. They wish to corrupt the long and excellent tradition of free expression on college campuses, and their tactics are reprehensible." Although the Student Government Association cited section 21.06 of (the sodomy law) of the Texas Penal Code as justification for its actions, this statute was declared unconstitutional by the Third Court of Appeals in the case England vs. City of Dallas. The Texas supreme Court had the opportunity to reverse that ruling in the case of Texas v. Morales, but instead dismissed the case on a technicality and left the England ruling intact.

In discussing whether SFASU's administration should reverse the SGA's actions, THRF Vice President Eugene Sepulveda stated, "It's ridiculous to think that a state institution would squander taxpayer money and unnecessarily incur court costs. The legislature doesn't tolerate this type of frivolous spending any longer. It's not as if there hasn't already been a court case against a state university on this very issue. The administrators in Nacogdoches know this."

THRF has retained the services of Austin civil rights attorney Patrick Wiseman to represent GLSA. THRF Board President Donald Skipwith, in announcing the hiring of Wiseman, stated that "Patrick is one of the preeminent civil rights attorneys practicing today. With Patrick as counsel, THRF defeated Texas A&M University's attempt to discriminate against gays and lesbians in College Station, and we'll do the same in Nacogdoches." THRF sponsored Gay Student Services v. Texas A&M University, in which the university administration was compelled to grant

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a charter for a gay student group.

THRF Executive Director, Michael Garbarino noted, "THRF's mission is to challenge discrimination based on sexual orientation" and that the organization "has successfully litigated this type of case before," referring to the Texas A&M decision. "If SFASU's administration follows the recommendations of the Young Conservatives, acting through the Student Government Association, we will see them in court."

The Texas Human Rights Foundation, founded in 1978, is a statewide nonprofit organization working to end discrimination based on sexual orientation or HIV status through highimpact litigation and legal services programs.

RECORD NUMBER OF OPENLY GAY OFFICIALS WIN IN ELECTION

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Twelve of the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund's 17 openly gay candidates won their races on November 8, constituting a seventyfive percent success rate. According to Victory Fund deputy Director, the 12 winners are:

Debold notes that this 75 percent success rate for openly gay candidates is especially significant in light of the campaign of gaybaiting that were waged against them by opponents and because of the overall conservative swing of the electorate nationwide. "Each of our candidates won *two* races on November 8th," she says, "One against their opponents; the other against the Radical Right's distorted image of gay men and lesbians."

In addition to these successes, a number of openly gay elected officials won reelection. These include: U.S. congressman Gerry Studds, Wisconsin State Assembly member Tammy Baldwin, Oregon State Representative Gail Shibley and Texas State Representative Glen Maxey.

LESBIAN AVENGERS PUSH BACK CHRISTIAN RIGHT IN NORTHERN IDAHO

MOSCOW, ID - The Lesbian Avengers Civil Rights Organizing Project (LACROP), along with lesbian and gay residents of Idaho helped defeat Proposition 1 in the November elections. The Proposition was voted down by a mere 4,000 votes.

Proposition 1, sponsored by the Idaho

Citizens Alliance (ICA), would have made it illegal to spend state money in a manner that would show acceptance or approval of homosexuality. It also would have made it illegal for public school teachers to discuss homosexuality as a positive behavior and force libraries to create an "adults only" section for materials that address homosexuality.

ICA founder Kelly Walton has already said he will try again in 1996 to pass the initiative. He has also indicated there may be an effort in the Idaho Legislature to pass the initiative.


LACROP targeted three counties in Northern Idaho for a visible, grassroots campaign to defeat Proposition 1. Two of the counties are historically very conservative. Neo-Nazis wearing swastikas regularly showed up at Human Rights Task Force meetings. LACROP and local activists organized visibility actions in both counties, as well as door to door canvassing efforts and literature drops using brochures that talked openly about lesbian and gay lives. Both counties finished the election with 54% voting "no". This was higher than the capital city of Boise and the statewide average which defeated the measure with only 51% of the vote. By comparison, the county considered to be the second most liberal in northern Idaho (where LACROP did not do campaign work) voted to pass the measure by 54%.

LACROP is a working group of the New York Lesbian Avengers and was established to assist lesbian activists in communities under attack from the Christian Right. The group was invited to northern Idaho by the Palouse Lesbian Avengers in early August and sent eight full-time lesbian organizers to work in Idaho from August through November.


Whatever the case — when you find one, you can offer to buy her a drink,

It didn't matter that I had to watch on an old black and white television, the picture almost as snowy as the venue. I was there every Saturday in hopes of seeing those guys zoom off that hill.

I want to get the Christmas lights down (I think it's really tack when you leave them out too long after New Year's Eve) but the weather has been so vile I've had to put it off again. I get surly.

It's not exactly depressing, but it sure can be irritating. But that's how winter is. Inevitable. So relax and enjoy it the way we do. By planning a summer vacation.

Having something bright and sunny to look forward to makes the alarm going off at five-thirty in the morning five days a week a little more palatable. And reservations are important. They make the vacation real. And due to where we vacation, reservations make our vacation possible. The place books so far in advance we will have had our reservations for over a year when we finally get there this spring.

And by we, I don't mean to mislead anyone. It's not just the wife and myself. We vacation with friends whenever possible. I enjoy seeing my friends as charmed by a sunset as I am. And I like knowing we all shared that Marty Stoufferish moment when we stood in silent amazement and watched the mountain lion mother lead her two cubs across the Rio Grande and back into Mexico.

For the most part, we've vacationed over the past ten years with the same couple, Bob and Terry. It works great for us because even in the most perfect of relationships (and of course, ours are) there's always going to be one of you who's more frisky than the other. In our set of circumstances, my wife and Terry are the ones always breaking out in a rash to be doing something. 

And, I think the hats might help us be a little more comfortable in approaching each other in an out of context setting.

So look for us if you're out that way in early spring. We'll be using those reservations I mentioned earlier when we claim our cabin up in the Basin. We always make a one day event of Lajitas for lunch followed by a photo ramble of the Terlingua cemetery and that neat old hotel, so maybe we'll bump into each other somewhere. Besides having a camera and a pair of binoculars draped around my neck like every other tourist, I'll be wearing my hat. And I'll be looking for yours.

As a direct result of being influenced by the media, I respond by buying a new couch, and purchasing my own video copy of *Personal Best*. **APRIL** • April Fool's Day month. Chose to spend month hiding again. Instead, opened for the fabulous Flirtations, renowned a Capella 4-man singing group, in a benefit performance for Houston's Assistance Fund. Discussed the feasibility of becoming an honorary "Flirt." Later decide the required hormone treatments would be cost-prohibitive and hinder my progress in getting in touch with my female side.

MAY • Spent month sleeping in preparation for summer.

IUNE . Performed at the 1994 Gay & Lesbian Pride Rally in Houston. Wept as I watched fireworks explode over hundreds of gays and lesbians in Buffalo Bayou Park, united together in the spirit of a cause they have no choice but to stand for. Performed in conjunction with Stonewall 25 Cultural Festival in New York City. Wept as I watched fireworks exploding over thousands of gays and lesbians at Yankee Stadium at the closing ceremonies for Gay Games IV. Avoided street vendor hotdogs and plaquard-waving Fundamentalist tourists. Also spent time with Rose Troche and Guin Turner, the producer/ writers/star of Go Fish, the "ground breaking new film about life and love," as Goldwyn refers to it. Was encouraged that finally a lesbian film was available that didn't portray that two women be drunk, drugged or mentally ill before they could achieve any level of intimacy together.

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JULY • While preparing for an interview with her, kept Melissa Etheridge waiting on hold while I gathered enough composure to remember how a telephone works. Speak into one end of the receiver, Nancy, and you'll hear her voice coming through the other end. Modern technology.

AUGUST . During the month of August, my life was dominated by straight women. But oh, such straight women! One afternoon was spent talking to songstress Sara McLachlan about flying labias, trying to convince her that she really is a lesbian, regardless of what her boyfriend has to say. Don't laugh - it almost worked. August's other het-fem preoccupation was sharing the stage with former Saturday Night Live-er, Julia "It's Pat!" Sweeney at Houston's Plaza 9200 to raise funds for supplies distributed through AIDS Foundation - Houston's new Respect Yourself: Safer Sex for Lesbians workshops. Read on.



Body Guard by Claire McNab Painted Moon by Karin Kallmaker Cactus Love: Short Stories by Lee Lynch The Mysterious Naiad: Various Authors

This month we'll take a look at four new books from Naiad Press. Two are novels and two are collections of short stories that are perfect for reading during those short breaks between holiday shopping trips.

We'll start with the novels, The first is **Body Guard** by Claire McNab, the sixth in the Detective Inspector Carol Ashton Mystery series. Carol has recovered physically, from a gunshot wound. However, she is having a hard time dealing with the emotional aftershocks. Then she is given the unsavory assignment of safegaurding the notorious American feminist, Marla Strickland.

Marla has already had one of her staff killed by a letter bomb and is receiving threats from various right-wing groups in Australia. Although Marla doesn't particularly want a body guard and has already hired a private security firm, she finally comes to accept Carol. The danger grows when a group calling itself Wellspring states that it intends to see Marla dead before she leaves Australia. This is an exciting mystery with a big surprise ending. Claire McNab's novels are always good, and **Body Guard** is no exception.

Next, we'll look at **Painted Moon** by Karin Kallmaker. This romance revolves around architectural intern Jackie Frakes and artist Leah Beck. Leah is having a hard time dealing with the death of her lover when she finds Jackie trapped in a snowstorm near her mountain cabin. Jackie is in an unsatisfactory romance with a man and locked into a job she hates. When Jackie shows up in her life, she gives Leah new inspiration to paint after a two year hiatus.

The story gets more complicated from there. Jackie thinks she might be gay, even though she hasn't done anything but kiss Leah. Leah sleeps with her agent, moves back to the city and

prepares to exhibit a series of paintings that will reveal her to the world as a lesbian. Misunderstadning upon misunderstandning stand in the way of their ever being together.


This is a very enticing romance with a series of twists and turns that will keep you turning pages.

Now, on to the short stories. First, we'll look at Cactus Love, a collection of stories by Lee Lynch (author of Home in Your Hands and Morton River Valley). Lynch writes a good novel, but she writes excellent short stories. This particular collection brings back many of the characters from her past novels and short stories. The stories are good, well-developed and easy reading. The only problem I have is with Lynch's old-fashioned notions of butch and femme. Her characters tend to fit very snugly into the slick-haired dyke who works in a manly job and the wellcoiffed femme who cooks all the meals. Having said that, I will say that her charactizations don't interfere with her storytelling skills. My particular favorite is the first story in the book, "Truck Stop Woman." The truck-driving woman whose long-long-term lover has passed away finds a little solace with a truck-stop prostitute. (No, it isn't sex the story doesn't reach that point - it's the notion that you should take love where you can find it.)

Next is The Mysterious Naiad, a collection of mystery/romance stories by Naiad authors including Claire McNab, Penny Hayes, Lauren Wright Douglas and many others. The book is edited by Katherin V. Forrest and Barbara Grier. There are some great stories in this collection. My favorite was about a woman who recieves a

subscription renewal card from "Ferret" magazine, only to find out that she must subscribe or lose her lover. I found this collection to be much more intriguing and well done than either **The Romantic Naiad** or **The Erotic Naiad** collections,
