WHITE HOUSE TO MEET WITH LESBIAN/GAY ELECTED OFFICIALS.

WASHINGTON, D.C. - For the first time in history, the White House has scheduled a meeting with gay and lesbian elected officials. According to San Francisco Supervisor Susan Leal, the liaison between the Administration and lesbian and gay elected officials, the meeting will be held at the White House on Tuesday, June 13. "This much awaited meeting will give gay and lesbian officials the opportunity to provide input to the Administration and to discuss with Administration officials issues of common concern," says Leal. On the morning before the meeting, the gay elected officials will conduct a series of Congressional visits to meet with key legislators.

Elected by popular vote, openly gay and lesbian officials epitomize the strides that the lesbian/gay community has made towards dispelling anti-gay stereotypes and achieving political equality. "We have spent the past two years laying the groundwork for this unprecedented event," says Leal, "and now, to paraphrase Harvey Milk, we will give the American people the chance to judge us by our own leaders, and by our own legislators." Among the 32 Victory Fund winners invited to the meeting are Supervisor Leal, U.S. Congressmen Barney Frank and Gerry Studds, and Texas State Representative Glen Maxey.

The Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund is

assisting Supervisor Leal in convening this meeting, and established a scholarship fund for those openly gay elected officials who could not otherwise be a part of this groundbreaking event. The Victory Fund will also sponsor a reception and banquet on Saturday, June 10, to honor openly gay elected officials and members of the Administration.

The Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund is a national donor network of men and women committed to electing qualified, openly gay and lesbian candidates to public office.

"CRACKING THE CORPORATE CLOSET" RELEASED

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Workplace issues for gay, lesbian and bisexual employees has made headlines, and now it's made it to hardback. Harper Business has just released "*Cracking the Corporate Closet*," an exhaustive look into the internal policies of 200 corporations and their impact on gay, lesbian and bisexual employees and consumers. The book, subtitled "The 200 Best (and Worst) Companies to Work for, Buy from and Invest in If you're Gay or Lesbian — and Even If You Aren't," is written by Daniel Baker, Sean O'Brien Strub and Bill Henning in association with the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF).

In conjunction with an NGLTF workplace questionnaire, the authors of "*Cracking the Corporate Closet*"

collected a variety of data that indicate workplace climate for gay, lesbian and bisexual employees. Basic criteria for consideration were the existence of non-discrimination policies that include sexual orientation, domestic partner policies and benefits, diversity training and AIDS education programs, gay/lesbian/bisexual employee groups, and whether companies consider marketing to the gay community. The 240-page book includes several summarizing lists, but predominantly discusses survey findings in narrative form with corporations grouped by type, such as "Banks" and "Publishing."

"Workplace organizing is an exploding phenomenon, with new gay/lesbian/bisexual employee groups launched virtually on a daily basis," said Melinda Paras, NGLTF executive director. "Because the workplace is where many Americans spend a majority of their day, this is an important frontier for organizing in support of gay, lesbian and bisexual equality. NGLTF is proud to have worked with the authors of *Cracking the Corporate Closet*" to provide this information to inspire further activism in the workplace."

NGLTF will sponsor a workplace organizing intensive at their annual Creating Change conference, to be held in Detroit, November 10-13, 1995. NGLTF also coordinates a separate workplace organizing conference, with the next gathering scheduled for April 1996.

GAY PARENTS TO HOLD CONFERENCE IN LOS ANGELES

Los Angeles, CA - Families 101, the Gay and Lesbian Parents Coalition

International (GLPCI) 1995 Conference will be held Friday, June 30, through Monday, July 3, at UCLA in Los Angeles. Families 101 should prove to be a stimulating learning experience for the whole family. There will be three related subconferences: the Parent's Conference, COLAGE (Children of Lesbians and Gays Everywhere) Conference for youths 13 and up, and the Children's Program for 6-12 year olds. Parents and youths are both invited to attend "The Prom You Really Wanted" on Saturday night while the children have a pizza party.

The parents conference workshops will include adoption, artificial insemination, step-parenting, non-gay spouses, multi-racial parenting, couples communication, family law, being OUT in your child's life, dealing with the media, and parent-child communication. The youth conference workshops will cover topics such as how and what to tell friends, safer sex, gay and lesbian history, fighting homophobia and dealing with divorce. The children's conference will include a pool party, field trips, time to talk about their families, games and crafts.

stuffing a pizza slice in his mouth, Limbaugh chats about his knack for "always being right."

When he's not busy punching pizza, Limbaugh is busy bashing lesbians, gays, women and people of color. His radio and television broadcasts are filled with homophobic misinformation and downright ridicule. During one broadcast of his TV show, for example, Limbaugh derided a meeting of rural lesbians, which took place on a farm. These women, Limbaugh said, were "mating with pigs" in order to "perpetuate the species."

Fortunately, "operators are standing by" at Pizza Hut's corporate offices,

monitoring public response to the Limbaugh commercial. Reports are being filed on the basis of each call.

It's June — a time of celebration for lesbians and gay men the world over. Parades, picnics and rallies will be held in cities large and small during the last week of this month. In honor of this annual celebration of pride, this article will give you some basic information every lesbian and gay man should know. Included is a short history of the gay movement, and the meaning and origin of the symbols we use and the names we call ourselves.

HISTORICAL DATA

Although a serious gay-rights movement began in the late 1800s in Berlin, it died a very painful death with the beginning of the Nazi movement. The groundwork for the modern gay movement was laid in California in the mid-fifties. West Coast One, Inc., and The Mattachine Society were the first organizations for gay men. The Daughter's of Bilitis, an organization for lesbians quickly followed.

The 1960s saw a growing number of organizations and "out" gay activists. Then, on Friday, June 27, 1969, the gay rights movement erupted. The Stonewall Inn, a gay bar in Greenwich Village in New York City, was raided by police that night, and the patrons decided to fight back. The fight moved into the street where other gay people in the area joined in and turned a small protest into a full-fledged riot.

To celebrate the first anniversary of the Stonewall Riot, gays in San Francisco held the first "Gay Freedom Day" parade in June, 1970. In 1972, the American Psychiatric Association removed homosexuality from their list of mental disorders. California decriminalized homosexuality in 1975. Harvey Milk became the first openly gay person to hold elected office when he became a supervisor for the city of San Francisco in 1977. He was fatally shot by ex-supervisor Dan White in 1978.

In the early 1980s the first cases of AIDS were diagnosed in gay men and the gay community was forever changed. In addition to the death and devastation from the disease itself, fear of the disease led to an increase in anti-gay violence. The Supreme Court ruled that states had the right to make sodomy

a crime. Despite all this, the gay movement continued to gain momentum. The AIDS Quilt, National Coming Out Day, The Gay Games and the first big March on Washington are just a few of the "firsts" in the gay community in the 80s.

The nineties are halfway over and the gay community has seen some major victories and more than a few setbacks. Increased visibility and activism has brought a corresponding increase in hate crimes and right-wing resistance. The passage of Amendment 2 in Colorado angered and frightened us. The pending approval of same-sex marriage in Hawaii gives us hope.

GAY SYMBOLS

THE PINK TRIANGLE — The pink triangle was used in Nazi Germany to identify gay men. The triangle was a piece of pink cloth that had to be affixed to clothing and displayed to indicate that the wearer was homosexual. Gays and lesbians have adopted this symbol of oppression and death and turned it into a symbol of pride.

LAMBDA — The lambda is the Greek letter "L" for liberation. Originally it was the pictographic symbol for the scales of justice. In time, it began to represent the concept of balance. Spartan Soldiers painted the lambda on their battle shields as a symbol of their unity, and a representation of the delicate balance they believed must exist between the demands of the state and the freedom of the individual. Romans borrowed the lambda from the Greeks, using it as a symbol for "lampas," the Roman word for torch. In 1970, without knowing of the historical significance

of the letter, the Gay Activists Alliance of New York designated the orange lambda on a blue field as a symbol of gay liberation. In December, 1974, the lambda was adopted as the international symbol for gay and lesbian rights by the International Gay Rights Congress meeting in Edinburgh, Scotland.

LAVENDER (the color) — Purple has many links with same-sex love. Greek mythology, the poetry of Sappho, Native American lore and even a West African religion give purple a significant relationship with homosexuals.

GAY WORDS & THEIR ORIGINS

BULLDYKE — many think this term comes from Queen Boudica (boo-dike-a) who led a Celtic revolt against Roman invaders. Legend has that her army killed over seventy-thousand Roman soldiers before losing the battle. It may also come from Dike (justice), the name of a goddess in Greek mythology whose female companion was Aletheia (truth).

FAIRY - from the brown-skinned people of ancient Europe and the British Isles.

FAG or FAGGOT — from the sacred firestick of ancient gay wizards which was made from a branch of the *fagus* (beech) tree.

GAY - From the Gaia, the earth goddess.

LESBIAN - from the Isle of Lesbos in Greece, home of the poet Sappho.

FYJ

The gay and lesbian community is shrinking! The formerly accepted figure of gays constituting 10 percent of the population is being whittled away. In recent years, "scientific" studies have come up with figures of 5, 3 and even 1 percent. If the Far Right had its way, we would, both literally and figuratively, disappear — never to be seen or heard from again.

This is where you come in. Get out and march in the Pride Parade in your area. Come out to someone who doesn't know you are gay. Buy from gay owned business whenever possible. Give financially to the Gay Rights organization of your choice. Show that you are proud of who you are.

Haven't we got enough romantic competition from our own sisters in the

'hood without introducing a whole 'nother gender into the equation?

Then I thought, maybe this all makes perfect sense. Who better to ask what really pleases a woman than a lesbian? In its most pristine form, a collective *Cultura Lesbiana* is uncluttered with unnecessary testicular influence. Virgin canvas, so to speak, untouched by the...

On occasion, I have been led to believe that I know what gay women want, at least for a few days in Cancun at a time. But that wasn't the question. I considered going to a straight bar for Happy Hour one night, just to do a little research to discover what pleases straight women. If hit upon by a member of the opposite sex, I decided I would decline by saying, "I'm not straight, but some of my friends are. Not that there's anything wrong with heterosexuality — it's just not for me. I'm sure some of you are as normal as regular people. Thanks for the drink. Got a sister?"

With that in mind, I have consulted a number of dykely cohorts who offer these tips to our straight male friends to achieve more success in the relationship department. Consider it an outreach program to the het community.

Cabin Fever

There Will Be No Goodbyes

We'll start this month with **Cabin Fever** by Carol Schmidt. This is the third in the Laney Samms mystery series, and the most timely and frightening novel I've ever read.

I got this book on April 17th and read it the same day — two days before the Oklahoma City bombing. You'll understand the significance of this as I tell you a little about the book.

Laney Samms is a bar owner and the right-hand woman to music maven Kitt Meyers. She narrowly escapes with her life when a car bomb explodes in Kitt's sports car.

While the police are working on the

bombing case, Laney travels to Michigan's Upper Peninsula to help Tess, a new client, turn a former hunting camp into a lesbian music and arts center. Although most of the people in the nearby town are accepting of their new neighbors, it soon becomes apparent that someone is bent on driving them out. After a series of suspicious accidents, Laney finally meets the man who lives on the neighboring land. Although he is very nice to her, Laney is suspicious. What happens next is where Oklahoma City comes to mind. Although I'm not going to tell you the rest, suffice to say it involves white-supremacists, neo-

nazis, the Michigan Militia and a plan to bomb a major building. It also includes some interesting information (with documentation) about Henry Ford and how he figures into the background of the groups listed above.

Even without the coincidental link to current event, **Cabin Fever** is an excellent novel. Ms. Schmidt's writing and background research are impeccable. Her characters are riddled with personality quirks and fault which makes them totally believable. I did think the plot was scary and more than a touch unrealistic on the first reading, but events in the news a mere two days later showed just how real the plot could become.

Next we'll look at **There Will Be No Goodbyes** by Laura Dehart Young. Liz (Buddie) Callow is a radio news reporter in Washington, D.C.. When she goes to cover an AIDS funding protest, she interviews Kate McGowan and eventually becomes involved with her. In the meantime, Buddie is also staying with and caring for her best friend Chris. Chris is dying of a rare heart condition while trying to continue her career as an artist and get over her recent affair with a married man.

As Buddie copes with all this, she discovers that Kate is coping with serious problems of her own. Kate's father has committed an unpardonable sin against his daughter. Her brother died in a boating accident in which Kate was involved. And, women from her past keep popping up at the most inopportune times.

Although this book was an easy read, it is ultimately forgettable. The characters are well-drawn, but there is little or no plot — only a rambling narrative

following Buddie's life and the lives of those around her. Ms. Young has great promise, she just tries to cover too much territory in too short a space.

In my synopsis, I left out quite a bit. In addition to all the problems of Kate and Chris, Buddy must also deal with a huge barn fire, an unaccepting mother, a homophobic colleague, an assault on the street, etc., etc....

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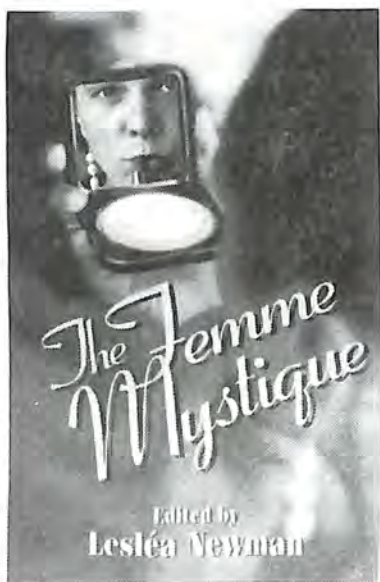
