- Upload your work to <u>SHAREOK</u> to ensure that it will be indexed, shared, and maintained – all while helping you get more citations.

- Hustle at conferences to make connections that can lead to later jobs and to gain insight into some of the less obvious aspects of how things work in your discipline.
- Use Slideshare for conference talks to help tell important stores about your research and to share them with those who aren't able to see your talk in person.
- Understand open licenses so that you can retain your copyright while inviting certain other uses of your work, which could help spread it farther than you could do on your own.

## **SPARC Savings**

OU Libraries is proud to have contributed \$2 million in cumulative course material savings to the \$1 billion milestone announced by the Scholarly Publishing and Academic Resources Coalition (SPARC) earlier this month. SPARC is made up of over 200 member libraries around the globe that work to make Open the default for research and education. OU Libraries helps instructors reduce what their students spend on course materials by promoting and enabling the use of open educational resources through the Alternative Textbook Grant. #### We're OPEN

The University Libraries supports the open movement in a variety of ways. For example:

- Pursuing membership agreements with the publishers such as MDPI. Authors from
  the OU-Norman campus receive a 10% discount on article processing charges when
  they publish in any of MDPI's open access journals. MDPI journals have been "prevetted" for OU Libraries Open Access Fund. See the <u>full list of MDPI journals</u>, and
  see how to apply for up to \$1,500 from OU Libraries <u>Open Access Fund</u>.
- Supporting open resources such as the <u>Stanford Encyclopedia of Philosophy</u> and <u>PhilPapers</u>.
- Giving instructors more control of their pedagogy by supporting them in the adoption, modification or creation of open educational resources through <u>Alternative</u> <u>Textbook Grants</u>.



Do you use streaming video in your classes? The University Libraries moved to mediated access for Kanopy streaming video content on October 1. Any streaming videos which have already been licensed for use will continue to be accessible through the one-year license agreement. Any streaming videos which have not been licensed for use will require the user to request access. We will acquire access for video content which is being used in fall semester courses as long as our budget will allow. ## **Carpentry Workshops**

The Carpentries teach foundational coding and data science skills to researchers worldwide. Hands-on workshops cover basic concepts and tools, including program design, version control, data management, task automation, and fundamental data skills. Participants are encouraged to help one another and to apply what they have learned to their own research problems and workflows. Currently there are two curricula, Software Carpentry and Data Carpentry, which together cover R, Python, Git/Github, OpenRefine, tidy data, SQL, and bash. The next workshop is November 19-20, 2018.
