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




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
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## With The Editor . . .

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

#### AMA HAS QUIET ANNUAL SESSION

American Medical Association Names Dr. Elmer L. Hess of Erie, Pennsylvania, as President-Elect. House of Delegates Again Condemns Fee-Splitting.

Cast in the international flavor of a San Francisco setting, the American Medical Association's 103rd Annual Meeting last June 21-25 proved to be one of the quietest sessions in recent years. Expected fireworks in the AMA House of Delegates, particularly in regard to osteopathic relationships, failed to materialize with the only heated discussions coming in regard to fee splitting and closed panel medical care plans.

For the most part the House of Delegates was content to quietly approve a long series of committee reports, reiterate established AMA policy, and elect a new slate of officers. Dr. Elmer L. Hess, urologist of Erie, Pennsylvania, the anticipated favorite, was elected President-Elect on the first ballot. He will serve in 1955-56, succeeding Dr. Walter B. Martin of Norfolk, Virginia, who was inaugurated in ceremonies broadcast nationwide by radio and television.

The actions of the House of Delegates

included the following.

Fee Splitting. Efforts of certain groups within the AMA to secure a relaxation of established ethics to permit the rendering of a single bill for services rendered by two or more physicians were defeated. Adopting a report of the Judicial Council, delegates again voiced a firm opposition to fee splitting, rebating or payment of commissions in any form, and to any "mechanism that encourages this practice." The House did vote to allow the filing of one joint comprehensive bill to

non-profit insurance companies (where such was the policy of the company) and to permit the presentation of a single itemized bill where insisted upon by the patient. The action followed a heated discussion sparked by Iowa's Dr. George Braunlich, who pleaded with delegates to approve a resolution permitting the single bill. In vitrolic rebuttal many delegates insisted the presentation of a joint bill was fee splitting.

Osteopathic Relationships. The House of Delegates again postponed action on the controversial question of medical-osteopathic relationships to the interim session of December, 1954, at Miami, Florida. In the meantime an on-campus survey of schools of osteopathy will be conducted by a special AMA committee. The inspections have already been authorized by the American Osteopathic Association. The action thus deferred a show-down vote on proposals advanced in New York last year to bring the AMA into a liaison program to improve standards of osteopathic education.

Closed Panel Plans. For the ticklish problem of what to do, membership wise, with physicians who work for medical care plans restricted to a closed panel of physicians, the AMA also postponed action for another year. In the meantime the AMA Judicial Council will make a thorough study of the relationships of such physicians to their employers with special reference to the Code of Ethics, which insists upon free choice of physi-

cians as a basic patient right. A report of the Council must be rendered no later than the 1955 Annual Session at Atlantic

City, New Jersey.

Veterans Medical Care. Adopting two strongly worded resolutions, the House of Delegates condemned the present practice of establishing service-connection for veterans' disability by legislative fiat. Warning that the practice could lead only to a complete program of non-service connected medical care for all veterans and their dependents, proponents of the resolutions struck sharply at the American Legion and other veterans organizations for policies "designed to saddle the nation with bankruptcy."

Among other minor business, the

House also:

Authorized a study of the licensure of foreign medical graduates by the various states.

Terminated the Seal of Acceptance program for voluntary health insurance plans.

Discontinued the registration of hos-

# RICHARD R. JOHNSON, M. D. 1880 - 1954

Dr. Richard Revel Johnson, 73, retired Sand Springs general practitioner died at his home on June 17, 1954, after an illness of several months. He was a Life Member of the Tulsa

County Medical Society.

Dr. Johnson was born in Wolfe County, Kentucky, in 1880. His medical degree was obtained from the University of Kentucky School of Medicine in 1907, and for thirteen years he practiced at Lexington, Kentucky. In 1920 he removed his practice to Sand Springs where he attained a wide reputation as a general practitioner and obstetrician. Dr. Johnson retired from active practice in 1953, and for the past several months had been in poor health.

Survivors include two sons, Dr. R. Chadwick Johnson, Sand Springs general practitioner, and Mr. Lawrence Johnson. Services were held June 21st

at Lexington, Kentucky.

pitals by the Council on Medical Education and requested the Joint Commission on the Accreditation of Hospitals to assume the registration program.

Voted to continue the holding of the annual mid-winter Clinical Meetings.

Approved the establishment of a program of medical military scholarships, with definite limitations on the number of students involved, as a source of future medical officers for the Armed Services.

The 1954 Distinguished Service Award went to Dr. William Wayne Babcock, Professor Emeritus of Clinical Surgery at Temple University School of Medicine.

An attendance of 12,000 doctors and approximately 20,000 other visitors, mostly exhibitors, wives and family members, taxed San Francisco's hotel quarters to capacity. An unfortunate mix-up in reservations at the Palace Hotel, headquarters for the session, left 35 top AMA officials and delegates without rooms. The incident had angry repercussions in the House of Delegates as critical delegates asserted San Francisco poorly suited for the sizeable meeting. Crowding of exhibits into a circus tent also received heavy criticism from exhibitors. In the end, however, delegates voted to return to the popular California city in 1958.

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# PRESIDENT'S PAGE

A detailed program of civil defense has long been blueprinted for Tulsa County and under the direction of a few interested citizens is slowly being placed into practical effect. The task is not an easy one for despite its significance few Tulsans can visualize the terrible conditions under which such an organization would be so urgently needed. It is inconceivable to most persons that an atomic bomb could actually be detonated in Tulsa, or that enemy sabotage could produce a man-made halocaust. In an area where tornadoes strike with periodic regularity, Tulsans are singularly disinterested in planning to meet the results of nature's lethal devastation.

I am afraid that too many doctors share in this general apathy. This is particularly unfortunate for the doctor, more than anyone else, is the most vital element of personnel in the civil defense program. Your Board of Trustees also shares this view, and with the object of alerting physicians to their obligations has appointed a special Civil Defense Committee. This group will assist Dr. Gifford H. Henry, Medical Director of Civil Defense, in completing the medical organization necessary to meet civilian disasters. Virtually every member of the Tulsa County Medical Society will soon be called upon to accept a position of responsibility on the disaster teams; this will not be an idle measure to be taken lightly. Rather, you will be asked to fully acquaint yourself with the duties of the post to which you are assigned, to take part in training programs, and to participate in mock alerts. I cannot impress upon you too strongly the need for throwing aside our indifferent attitude towards civil defense. While I hope there is never an occasion to bring this organization into practical use, concrete planning for those emergencies must be completed as quickly as possible. Your help and interest is essential today; tomorrow may be too late.

#### BEFORE HOT FLUSHES APPEAR.

Patients presenting such classic menopausal symptoms as hot flushes cause little diagnostic difficulty. However, throughout the period of declining ovarian function which may begin long before hot flushes appear, many women complain of distressing symptoms which though less clearly defined are actually due to estrogen deficiency. For example, insomnia, headache, easy fatigability, and symptoms affecting the bones, joints, and the skin may not be readily identified as due to estrogen deficiency because they may occur years before, or even years after cessation of menstruation.

Investigators<sup>1,2</sup> have found that as the body attempts to adjust itself to declining estrogen production, a number of symptoms may appear which call for the prompt institution of estrogen replacement therapy. These symptoms may be nervous, circulatory, arthralgic, or dermatologic in character because the loss of ovarian hormone "withdraws one of the most important regulators of the organism" and affects many body functions. If such metabolic imbalance or deficiency is evidenced, the administration of estrogen is clearly indicated.

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

THE THYROID SUBJECT OF NEW TEXTBOOK
Dr. T. Levitt, author of the recent book, The Thyroid, is Hunterian Professor of the Royal College of Surgeons of England and Lecturer in Surgery to the Fellowship of Postgraduate Medicine at the New End Hospital, London.

His book is an original and revolutionary work based on the study of material obtained from 2,114 consecutive thyroidectomies and is concerned mainly with the difficult and perplexing problems of thyroid disease rather than those on which general

agreement has already been reached.

He approaches his subject from three angles: (1) the clinical aspects of thyroid disease, (2) the natural history of thyroid disease, and (3) the treatment. He offers what he believes to be the solution of this jig-saw puzzle, the six progressive phases of degeneration of the toxic thyroid gland: (1) epithelial hyperplasia, (2) lymphos epithelial hyperplasia, (3) focal lymphoid hyperplasia, (4) diffuse lymphoid hyperplasia, (5) fibro-lymphoid hyperplasia, and (6) fibrosis. Group Number Five is Hashimoto's type of disease, and Group Number Six is Riedel's.

Miss Irma A. Beehler, Librarian of the Tulsa County Medical Society, was elected Secretary of the Medical Society Group of the Medical Library Association at the organization's annual meeting in Washington, D. C., June 13-15, 1954. She also appeared on the program, presenting a paper entitled "Who Is The Lay Public?" Her presentation, part of a symposium, dealt with the admission of non-professional personnel to medical libraries and the advantages and disadvantages of such policies.

# HILLCREST PLANS TO BUILD DOCTORS OFFICE BUILDING

Hillcrest Medical Center last month formally confirmed earlier reports that it would build a six-story building for professional medical offices. The structure would face west on Utica Avenue at Twelfth Street, east of the Center's present main building.

Tentative plans as approved by the Hillcrest Board of Trustees call for a modernistic stainless steel and glass building with space for an estimated fifty doctors. Each floor would have 8,500 square feet. The structure is presently planned for 100 by 155 feet. In addition to a main office building, an adjacent three-story auto ramp 100 by 80 feet will be built.

The facility is estimated to cost \$750,000 with construction to begin by January 1, 1955. Mr. Bryce Twitty, Administrator, said the building would be constructed on borrowed money and would eventually be self-liquidating.

The ground floor of the proposed building will have various shops, including a pharmacy, florist, surgical supply, etc. The structure will connect with the Center by an underground tunnel. The building is designed in such a fashion that additional floors can be added later, and it is expected that the structure will eventually be eighteen stories high. The tentative date for occupancy by tenants is October 1, 1955. Tulsa doctors have already been invited by the Center to express their interest in renting professional space.

Mr. Twitty also indicated the Center would begin a drive next year for funds to construct a 200-bed addition to the Hospital. The ultimate goal is for a facility with a minimum of 1,100 beds.

DR. LEONARD L. KISHNER has been commissioned a Lieutenant (S.G.) in the United States Navy Medical Corps and reports on August 16th to the Navy Base at San Diego, California.

DR. ROYAL E. STUART will return to Tulsa on September 1st after two years military service with the United States Navy. He will occupy offices at Utica Square Medical Center.

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
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#### MENTAL HEALTH FACILITIES IN TULSA RATED AS POOR

Tulsa's mental health facilities were rated as "poor" in an article appearing in the July issue of Woman's Home Companion and written by Albert Q. Maisel, popular lay medical writer. In a national survey of metropolitan areas, the writer rated 96 other communities as poor, 42 as fair, and only 29 as good.

The article criticized Tulsa for a lack of mental health clinics, specialized hospital services, and professional personnel in relation to its metropolitan population

of more than 250,000 persons.

Tulsa psychiatrists, admitting many of the conclusions were correct, noted the City did have the Child Guidance Clinic, the Hillcrest Medical Center's Psychiatric Division, and a proposed psychiatric center at St. John's Hospital as evidence of local interest in mental health. They see a need for more private psychiatrists, including another child psychiatrist, and certain types of hospital and private institutional facilities for care of mental patients.

The improved blood replacement rates for June, 1954, are the result of increased attention to this problem by hospitals and physicians and shows what can be done. The benefactors are the patients who receive the blood.

A problem second only to recruitment of donors is the selection of patients to receive transfusions. In this regard we quote from CA, a Bulletin of Cancer Progress Published by the American Cancer Society, Inc., May, 1954, Vol. 4, No. 3:

"Q. A patient with chronic leukemia for the past three years feels perfectly well despite the fact that his hemoglobin level is about 9 grams. He has had transfusions on several occasions but within a week or two, the hemoglobin falls to the previous level. How vigorous should I be in trying to restore more normal hemoglobin and red cell levels?

"A. Many of these patients feel well and do well providing hemoglobin does not fall below 8 grams. It is almost always difficult if not impossible to bring hemoglobin levels to normal in these people. Several investigators report that drastic attempts to raise hemoglobin by transfusions are not only unsuccessful but result in hemolysis."

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## Editorial

A physician writing in the June issue of Medical Economics attributes a plethora of professional troubles to his membership in a couple of civic luncheon clubs. These contacts and activities, says the M.D., bred a familiarity which lost him his personal and professional respect in the community, emptied his office of patients, enriched his non-joining competitor, made him a lot of enemies (as

Not until he had withdrawn from the clubs, adopted a completely aloof attitude, burrowed into a professional hole, and chilled the public into addressing him formally as Doctor So-And-So did his practice succeed. His advice to fellow doctors: unless you're a confirmed backslapper, stay clear of any entangling alliances with civic clubs. It will ruin you!

The advice is pretty hard to take, and, we believe, the product of some fallacious thinking. Here in Tulsa, for instance, some of our finest doctors have been leaders and members of civic clubs for years. Their offices have not been emptied of patients as a result, nor have they lost one whit of respect because fellow club members learned to call them by their first name. By their participation in worthy civic endeavors they have earned a new respect as citizens who have things other than medical at heart. At the same time, most of these men cannot be described as "confirmed backslappers." They are representative, rather, of dignified and respectable strata of the medical profession.

The new doctor begins practice with a tremendous heritage of public respect for the medical profession, a respect born of centuries of service to the sick and aged. How well he individually justifies and maintains that respect, and to what extent he adds to it, is dependent upon multiplicity of factors. Not all of these are strictly professional by any means. Yet, to attribute a loss of that respect to the familiarity bred by civic luncheon clubs is an incomplete and inadequate explana-

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
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tion. The reasons are not that superficial

and go much deeper. At a time when the public relations of the medical profession have been seriously damaged by a variety of public criticism, there is a need of a greater participation in civic affairs by the doctor. Aside from a purely selfish measure of using the contacts as a means of helping carry Medicine's story to the public, the physician as a citizen has a responsibility to be a leader and participant in useful civic and community projects. The virtual exclusion of doctors from veterans organizations, for instance, has deprived Medicine of a voice in the popular policies which are leading to an ever encroaching upon private medicine by the United States Veterans Administration hospitals. The need is for more and more doctors who will leave the narrow troughs of professional life to represent Medicine at civic clubs, veterans organizations, fraternal groups, and community agencies.

We would not argue that public respect for a physician is a desirable if not essential attribute. That respect is something which is earned by a high standard of professional ability, a knowing application of the doctor-patient relationship, a humanitarian outlook on human problems, and a courageous willingness to assume a share in the responsibilities of community living. Except in isolated cases, perhaps, the aloof and coldly professional attitude will not in itself earn that respect. Assuredly, it may keep the great mass of the public from calling you

by a first name.
