Awards ranging from \$250 to \$2,500 support instructors who seek to adopt, modify, or create open educational resources (OER) that are free to students, and some awards receive matching funds from the applicant's college.

The fellowship aims to foster collaboration across subject

disciplines and build a learning community in digital scholarship research.

Citation Management with Zotero
