Monday – Thursday 7:30 a.m. – 11:00 p.m.

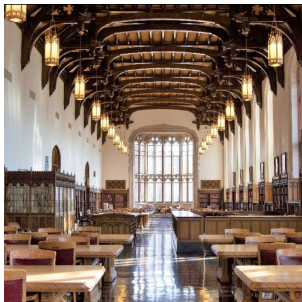
Friday 7:30 a.m. – 9:00 p.m.

OU Libraries Launches Tools for Social Distancing



University of Oklahoma Libraries offers two tools to help students find available study spaces and public computers. Digital signage throughout University Libraries shows how full each floor is and helps direct students to available study spaces. This information is also available on the Libraries' main website to help students gauge study capacity before they arrive at a location.

University Libraries also offers a tool that displays which computers are available in the public computer labs. Computers have been spread out throughout Bizzell Memorial Library to better assist with social distancing. The new tool will provide students with locations, maps, and free/busy information. University Libraries Partner on Western History Association Disciplinary Research Webinar



Liaison and curatorial faculty and staff from Bizzell Memorial Library and the Western History Collections participated in the development of a webinar highlighting digital resources for scholars of the American West. The webinar was sponsored by the Western History Association. "Research in the Era of COVID-19: Archives, Libraries, and the Study of the West" was presented on June 17, and drew more than 300 registrants from across the country. The webinar addressed the continuing need to access primary resources at a time when many collections are unable to offer access due to campus or institutional closures.
