Open Access Week

When you hear the word "open," what do you think of? Frequently, people think of open access journals or free access to journal articles. But open access includes all types of scholarly works – open educational resources such as textbooks and lesson plans, research protocols, datasets, software code, and other elements in the research lifecycle. Open access is the free and immediate online access to scholarly information, and it benefits authors, readers, funders, the public, and others. OU Libraries

Wiley, Elsevier Journal Subscriptions

In 2019, the University Libraries exited comprehensive journal agreements with the publishers Wiley and Elsevier and entered into new agreements for a <u>subset</u> of these publishers' journals. Our agreements are set to expire at the end of 2020, and the University Libraries is currently negotiating new multi-year agreements with Wiley and Elsevier.

In approaching this year's negotiations, the Libraries has been using a new analysis tool; the tool enables identification of the journal titles we must retain and those we need not retain because we can more cost-effectively provide needed access to them through the online journal archives we own, openly available content, and ILL. We will also provide funding to acquire articles upon request via an on-demand document delivery service. Although we will pay for this content, the amount we pay will be far less than maintaining current subscriptions.

Because our negotiations with Wiley and Elsevier are ongoing, we are unable to share the title lists we are negotiating. However, if you have questions about particular titles, please contact your <u>liaison librarian</u> for more information.
