MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA BOARD OF REGENTS DECEMBER 5, 2013

A Regular Meeting of the Board of Regents governing The University of Oklahoma, Cameron University, and Rogers State University was called to order at The University of Oklahoma in Norman, Oklahoma, at 3:55 p.m. on December 5, 2013.

The following Regents were present: Richard R. Dunning, Chairman of the Board, presiding; Regents A. Max Weitzenhoffer, Kirk Humphreys and Leslie J. Rainbolt-Forbes, M.D.

Others attending all or a part of the meeting included Mr. David L. Boren, President of The University of Oklahoma; Vice President Nicholas Hathaway; Chief Legal Counsel Anil Gollahalli; and Executive Secretary of the Board of Regents, Dr. Chris A. Purcell.

Due to hazardous weather conditions, no one was in attendance from Cameron University or Rogers State University, and attendance at the meeting overall was limited.

Notice of the time, date and place of this meeting was submitted to the Secretary of State, and the agenda was posted in the Office of the Board of Regents on or before 8:30 a.m. on December 4, 2013, both as required by 25 O.S. 1981, Section 301-314.

MINUTES

Regent Humphreys moved approval of the minutes of the regular meeting held October 23, 2013 as printed and distributed prior to the meeting. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents Weitzenhoffer, Humphreys and Rainbolt-Forbes. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

President Boren was very pleased to announce that Will Webster and his family have led off a campaign to establish the Paul Massad Chair in Strategic Communication in the Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication. Paul has been at OU for 53 years and the establishment of this chair is a very nice thing. The President also noted that the Regents are being asked to approve the appointment of Dr. Emily Neff as the director of the Museum of Art. She is outstanding and well qualified as to experience and education. With approval of this item, she will begin in January.

ROGERS STATE UNIVERSITY

REVISION OF ACADEMIC POLICIES AND PROCEDURES MANUAL – RSU ACADEMIC PERSONNEL ACTION(S) – RSU

REVISION OF ACADEMIC POLICIES AND PROCEDURES MANUAL – RSU

A comprehensive review and revision of the entire RSU Academic Policies and Procedures Manual was completed through the efforts of the Academic Policy Review Committee, the Academic Council, and the Office of Academic Affairs at Rogers State University, as well as the Office of Legal Counsel at the University of Oklahoma. After Board approval at the December 2012 meeting, the revised Academic Policies and Procedures Manual became effective January 1, 2013.

Since that time, two corrections were approved by the Faculty Senate in August 2013, and by the Academic Council in September 2013.

Summary of Proposed Non-Substantive Changes:

1. The revised University Curriculum Committee description reflects the current composition and historical practice of that committee. The following description is recommended:

2.3.1.3 School University Curriculum Committee

Function: Review and make recommendations regarding proposed curriculum and/or program changes.

Membership: One member per department as identified by the department head. <u>A</u> representative from each department. Faculty should be senior (at least five years at RSU) whenever possible.

2. The University Honors Program Committee description was inadvertently omitted from the revised Academic Policies and Procedures Manual. The following description is recommended:

2.3.1.14 University Honors Program Committee Function: Make recommendations involving all aspects of the Honors Program, particularly including Honors curriculum development, modification, and implementation.

Membership: The Director of the Honors Program, six additional faculty chosen by the Faculty Senate, and one member each from the Foundation, Student Activities, and the Office of Admissions. The Director of the Honors Program will chair the Committee.

The RSU Police Department revised and updated the RSU Emergency Operation Plan, the Campus Emergency Plan and the Building Warden's list in September 2013.

The Jeanne Clery Report was completed, filed with the Department of Education, and posted on the RSU website in August 2013.

In keeping with the Clery compliance, Rogers State University conducted an area wide emergency tornado drill on October 23, 2013 with the Rogers County Emergency Management, the RSU Police Department, the Claremore Police Department, the Claremore Fire Department, and all local hospital. The drill location was at the RSU Student Housing Complex.

RSU conducted fire drills on campus in October 2013 while testing all fire alarms. In addition, the RSU Student Apartments completed two weather related drills and two fire drills this year.

During the year, The University of Oklahoma Police Department and The University of Oklahoma Attorney provided some basic Active Shooter training to RSU Faculty and Staff. In addition, the RSU Police Department conducted fourteen Armed Subject training sessions.

SUBSTANTIVE PROGRAM CHANGES – CU ACADEMIC AND ADMINISTRATIVE PERSONNEL ACTIONS –CU

SUBSTANTIVE PROGRAM CHANGES – CU

The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education require that all substantive changes in degree programs be presented to the institution's governing board for approval before being forwarded to the State Regents for consideration. The changes in the academic programs presented below have been approved by the President, upon recommendations of the appropriate faculty, academic unit and dean, the Curriculum Committee or Graduate Council, and the Vice President for Academic Affairs. The changes are being submitted to the Board of Regents for approval prior to submission to the State Regents.

1. PROGRAM: A.A.S. in Respiratory Care

PROPOSED CHANGE: Program Requirement Changes

COMMENTS: One course will be removed and three courses will be added to the General Education requirements for the program. Total hours required for General Education will increase from 18 to 22 hours. Two courses will be replaced in the support and related courses category. Total hours required for the support and related courses category will decrease from 13 to 12 hours. The requested changes will better prepare students for certification in the discipline and better align the program curriculum with accrediting agency requirements. The requested change will not require additional funds. Total hours required for the degree will increase from 63 to 66 hours.

2. PROGRAM: B.S. in Physical Education

PROPOSED CHANGE: Program Deletion

COMMENTS: Program has not met the minimum degree productivity standards originally proposed. Low demand with no foreseeable future increase warrants deletion of this program. The requested change will provide funds for reallocation since five courses will be deleted after teach out. Funds from the deleted program will be reallocated to the B.S. in Sport Fitness Management. Forty-three students remaining in the program will graduate no later than May 2017.

3. PROGRAM: B.S. in Sport Fitness Management

PROPOSED CHANGE: Change of Program Name and Program Requirement Changes

COMMENTS: Program name will be changed from Sport Fitness Management to Sports and Exercise Science to more accurately reflect the focus of the degree program. The requested change will not require additional funds. Pending OSRHE approval, the requested name change would take effect in Fall 2014.

One course will be replaced in the health and wellness category. Ten courses will be added to the list of choices for the major core category. Total hours required for the major core category will increase from 60 to 65 hours. Eight courses will be added to the list of choices for the additional requirements category. Total hours required for the additional requirements category will decrease from 20 to 15 hours. The requested changes more accurately reflect the focus of the degree program and they will not require additional funds nor will the total number of hours required change.

EMERGENCY OPERATIONS PLAN ANNUAL REPORT – CU

Pursuant to the authority contained in the Oklahoma Emergency Management Act of 2003, O.S. 63, Section 681 through 683.24, the head of each designated department and agency shall take necessary actions to implement the Emergency Operations Plan by developing written

internal procedures that detail support required by the plan and shall be prepared to put the plan into action. Section 681 also requires institutions of higher learning to make an annual report to its Board of Regents "detailing the status of emergency preparedness and identified safety needs."

Emergency planning and response is an evolutionary process adapting to the nature of the specific emergency. The Cameron University Emergency Operations Plan defines basic procedures and guidelines to minimize the impact of emergencies and maximize the effectiveness of response personnel. Response to and recovery from major emergencies and catastrophic occurrences will be conducted within the framework of the plan assuring continuity of campus operations. The plan provides effective coordination of university and community resources to protect life, preserve property, and provide stability, and lays the foundation for responses to extreme weather conditions, fires, hazardous materials incidents, large scale events, and protest actions. Although there were no significant changes to the plan this year, contact information sheets have been reviewed and updated, statistical data in section 1.2 have been updated, section 9.0, Communications has been updated to include the University's new, outdoor public address system, and Annex F – Response Equipment has been reviewed and updated. A current copy is on file in the Board office. Additionally, Cameron University's Emergency Operations Plan has been filed with the Comanche County's Emergency Management Director.

Cameron University's safety needs take into consideration the demographic profile of Cameron's students as well as the physical environment of Cameron's campus. The Cameron campus is located adjacent to economically challenged neighborhoods and the Jim Taliaferro Community Mental Health Center. Accordingly, Cameron's Office of Public Safety:

- maintains a close relationship with local emergency management agencies
- assists Student Services and Human Relations in updating annual orientation materials for new students and faculty members
- conducts joint training exercises involving active shooter situations, bomb threats, etc., with local emergency management agencies
- ensures that each Public Safety officer receives annual continuing education in excess of the state mandated twenty-five hours, and
- notifies all students, faculty and staff of Cameron's severe weather procedures and designated shelter areas.

In addition, throughout the year, the Directors of Physical Facilities and Public Safety conduct visual inspections, including nightly inspections of buildings, parking lots, campus lighting and grounds to ensure compliance with safety standards.

THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA

SCHOOL OF COMMUNITY MEDICINE FACILITIES – TULSA

At the October 2013 meeting, the Board of Regents approved the expansion of the School of Community Medicine M.D. Program Track at the College of Medicine, Tulsa in cooperation with the University of Tulsa. Utilizing the services of an on-call architectural consulting firm, a planning effort has been undertaken to study optional concepts to support the expansion of the College of Medicine education programs in Tulsa, including clinical and hospital simulation centers and student study modules. At this time, an architectural consultant is needed to work with the College to finalize space programming and develop a comprehensive plan for new and renovated space for the School, and to provide professional services for project design, construction documents and construction administration. As design and a budget are further developed, the Board will be requested to approve the construction project and its addition to the Campus Master Plan of Capital Improvement Projects for the Tulsa Campus.

A request for qualifications was sent to the architectural firms that are currently registered with the State of Oklahoma's Construction and Properties Department. A committee was formed to evaluate the responses received from 21 firms. The committee was composed of the following:

EMERGENCY RESPONSE PLAN ANNUAL REPORT – ALL

Pursuant to the authority contained in the Oklahoma Emergency Management Act of 2003, O.S. 63, Section 681 through 683.24, the head of each designated department and agency shall take necessary actions to implement the Emergency Operations Plan by developing written internal procedures that detail support required by the plan and shall be prepared to put the plan into action. Section 681 also requires institutions of higher learning to make an annual report to its Board of Regents "detailing the status of emergency preparedness and identified safety needs."

Emergency planning and response is an evolutionary process adapting to the nature of the emergency at hand. The intent of The University of Oklahoma Emergency Response Plan is to set out a foundation from which the University's emergency response may evolve and an organization that may direct its evolution. The University will use National Incident Management System (NIMS) and Incident Command System (ICS) standards and principles for managing all emergencies on campus.

Response to and recovery from emergencies will be conducted within the framework of The University of Oklahoma Emergency Response Plan. The plan is designed to provide effective coordination of University and community resources to protect life and property during and after emergencies. The plan lays the foundation for the University's response to emergencies. These emergencies may include prolonged power outages, extreme weather, fires, hazardous materials incidents, large-scale events, and protest actions.

Through coordination and preparedness, the University hopes to minimize the impacts of emergencies and to maximize the effectiveness of the campus community in responding to and recovering from major emergencies and catastrophic occurrences. Importantly, the plan provides an organizational structure for the continuity of campus operations in pursuit of the University's academic mission. The Emergency Response Plan is updated every six months.

DATA CABLE INSTALLATION SERVICE PROVIDER – ALL

Board of Regents' policies and procedures require that acquisition contracts that merely establish unit pricing, availability and other terms and conditions but which are indefinite as to quantity and delivery must be reported to the Board of Regents if the cumulative orders against them are expected to exceed \$250,000 annually.

This item reports the anticipated activity for fiscal year 2014 for the following multiple-award contracts: Sequoyah Communications, Inc. of Oklahoma City, Telco Supply Company of Sulphur, Techsico Enterprise Solutions of Tulsa and Trans-Tel Central, Inc. of Norman, for data cable installation services for the continual upgrade of the University-wide network and fiber infrastructure. The Information Technology (IT) departments for Norman, Oklahoma City and Tulsa campuses identify the outsourcing of cable installation services as the most effective and economical approach for meeting current and future demands. These just-in-time contracts provide the necessary personnel for the timely completion of data cable installation needs for all campus locations. The IT department projects expenditures for FY 2014, estimated to be \$400,000 for the Norman campus, \$400,000 for the Oklahoma City campus, and \$150,000 for the Tulsa campus.

The previous annual expenditures for fiscal year 2013 for all campuses are as follows:

The multi-award contracts to Sequoyah Communications, Inc. of Oklahoma City, Telco Supply Company of Sulphur, Techsico Enterprise Solutions of Tulsa and Trans-Tel Central Inc. of Norman are based on a previous competitive solicitation and will be the third renewal of a five-year contract.

Funding has been identified, is available and budgeted within the Information Technology operating account.

Reason for request:

This modification will better prepare non-thesis option students for their exit exam by focusing on a specific subject with a pre-approved CS seminar course or with an Independent Study.

Computer Science, Bachelor of Science in Computer Science/Master of Science (in Computer Science), (RPC 233/132, MC A235 F235 Q146)

For non-thesis option, three credit hours of CS 5990 Independent Studies OR seminar course in Computer Science approved by the Graduate Liaison of the School of Computer Science. Total credit hours for the degree will not change.

Reason for request:

This modification will better prepare non-thesis option students for their exit exam by focusing on a specific subject with a pre-approved CS seminar course or with an Independent Study.

PRIME SUPPLIER FOR CISCO EQUIPMENT, SERVICES AND MAINTENANCE – NC

Board of Regents' policies and procedures require that acquisition contracts that merely establish unit pricing, availability and other terms and conditions but which are indefinite as to quantity and delivery must be reported to the Board of Regents if the cumulative orders against them are expected to exceed \$250,000 annually.

This item reports the anticipated activity of \$3,500,000 for fiscal year 2014 against a contract awarded to Presidio Networked Solutions, Inc. of Greenbelt, Maryland, for Cisco equipment, services, and maintenance. This prime supplier contract supports the University's network infrastructure by establishing pricing and availability of Cisco products at significant discounts. Cisco products are the campus standards for the Norman campus core network.

The previous annual expenditure for fiscal year 2013 was \$3,217,988.

This contract was awarded on a best-value basis from a previous competitive solicitation. This is the fourth renewal of a five-year contract.

Funding has been identified, and is available and budgeted within the Information Technology operating account.

This item was presented for information only. No action was required.

BULK FUEL – NC

Board of Regents' policies and procedures require that acquisition contracts that merely establish unit pricing, availability and other terms and conditions but which are indefinite as to quantity and delivery must be reported to the Board of Regents if the cumulative orders against them are expected to exceed \$250,000 annually.

This item reports the anticipated activity for bulk fuels for fiscal year 2014, with estimated annual expenditures of \$800,000. The unleaded, ethanol, diesel and bio-diesel fuels are necessary for the operation of approximately 552 university owned vehicles and service equipment.

The contract to Mansfield Oil Company, of Gainesville, Georgia, is available through the State of Oklahoma from a competitive bid according to state purchasing rules and complies with Board Policies and Procedures regarding competition relative to the acquisition of products and services.

Funding has been identified, and is available and budgeted within the Fleet Services operating account.

This item was presented for information only. No action was required.

ATHLETIC TICKET PRINTING SERVICES – NC

Board of Regents' policies and procedures require that acquisition contracts that merely establish unit pricing, availability and other terms and conditions but which are indefinite as to quantity and delivery must be reported to the Board of Regents if the cumulative orders against them are expected to exceed \$250,000 annually.

This item reports the anticipated activity for athletic ticket printing and mailing services for all home sporting events in support of Athletic Department ticket sales. The Athletic Department projects expenditures for FY2014, estimated to be \$300,000.

The contract is based on a previous competitive solicitation and will be the first renewal of a three-year contract.

The contract was awarded to Weldon, Williams & Lick Inc. of Fort Smith, Arkansas and represents best value to the University.

SUBSTANTIVE PROGRAM CHANGES – NC

The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education require that all substantive changes in degree programs be presented to the institution's governing board for approval before being forwarded to the State Regents for consideration. The changes in academic programs itemized in the attached list have been approved by the appropriate faculty, academic units and deans, the Academic Programs Council, and the Senior Vice President and Provost. They are being submitted to the Board of Regents for approval prior to submission to the State Regents.

Substantive Program Change Approved by Academic Programs Council, October 4, 2013

Addition of Program

COLLEGE OF ARCHITECTURE

Architecture, Master of Science in Architecture (RPC TBD, MC TBD)

Addition of program. Level I formal degree abbreviation Master of Science, Level II degree designation as on Diploma Master of Science in Architecture, Level II title of proposed degree program Architecture. A total of 30 credit hours will be required for the degree, 18 credit hours in the core required curriculum and 12 credit hours in guided electives. The academic standards for admission, retention, and graduation for this degree will be those already in use by the Division of Architecture, the Graduate College, the College of Architecture, and the University of Oklahoma: to be admitted to the graduate program, a student must earn a combined grade point average (GPA) of 3.0; to be retained in the program, a student must maintain at least a 3.0 in all coursework (undergraduate and graduate combined) attempted; to qualify for a graduate degree, students must achieve an overall grade point average of 3.0 or higher in the degree program coursework and in all resident graduate coursework attempted.

Reason for request:

This program is not a new program in that the original Master of Architecture program has traditionally offered three options M045, M046, and M047, one of which was a 30hour option (M045). Due to changes at the National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB) the use of the title "Master in Architecture" is to be reserved only for those programs fulfilling the educational requirements for Architectural licensing. We are modifying the other Master of Architecture (M046 and M047) to meet these accrediting requirements and submitting them concurrently with this Master of Science in Architecture program. Student demand for postprofessional degree programs in Architecture are growing at a rapid pace. Technology and research developments are spurring the need for professionals to refresh their skill sets to maintain a competitive advantage in today's markets. Furthermore, the need for continuing inquiry and translational research themes to apply the research in practice model has necessitated the development of a PhD program in Architecture for which the MS in Architecture is ideally suited to provide requisite study and preparation. The Division of Architecture has maintained the one-year Master of Architecture for many years specifically to fulfill the needs of the postprofessional and the teaching profession as the Master of Architecture is considered the terminal degree. However, with the increasingly cross-disciplinary nature of the profession and the need to incorporate additional areas of inquiry, we are seeing an increase in demand for specialty areas of research and seek to adjust our resources in the Graduate program to meet these needs. For example, energy security and water resource depletion has led to an upsurge in the need for sustainable design education. Buildings in the United States use 12% of all potable water resources and 70% of all electrical power generation. Maintaining currency in Sustainable Design Technology is necessary to meet conservation and resource efficiency goals. The

Architecture profession is seeing increases in specialty credentials such as the LEED AP (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design), Aging in Place, Adaptive Re-use, etc. These areas require intensive studies beyond continuing education offerings. Each of the specialty tracks aim to train professionals to be able to bridge the gap between current research and professional practice and thus fulfill employer and market demands for designers skilled in these areas of specialization.

Deletion of Program

JEANNINE RAINBOLT COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

School Counseling, Master of Education (RPC 258, MC M830)

Program deletion.

Reason for request:

The program was suspended in October 2010; no new students have been admitted to the program. In light of the recent reorganization within the counseling programs, this program cannot be offered in the immediate future.

Change of Program Name and Degree Designation

COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING

Industrial Engineering, Bachelor of Science (RPC 129, MC B525, A525 F525, B526, A526 F526, B527, A528 F140 Q340)

Program name change to Industrial and Systems Engineering, and degree designation change to Bachelor of Science in Industrial and Systems Engineering.

Reason for request:

The School changed its name in fall 2011 to Industrial and Systems Engineering. The change of the program name was delayed due to uncertainty in how the accrediting agency planned to accredit programs that included Systems Engineering in their title. The accrediting requirements have been published and will not impact our school.

Change of Degree Requirements

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

Political Science, Ph.D. (RPC 193, MC D790)

Degree program requirement change. Deletion of the distribution requirement, and addition of a field in Methods. Total credit hours for the degree will not change.

Reason for request:

First, the faculty determined that the distribution requirement was outdated and no longer in step with graduate training in Political Science at other institutions of the same caliber. In addition, graduate program alumni indicated that the distribution requirement provided no advantage in job placement. Finally, eliminating the distribution requirement will make it possible for students to get to their general exams faster and start dissertation research earlier. The addition of the Methods field is to provide a fundamental core of sound Methods training that can be tailored to students' specific scholarly needs.

Change of Course Requirements

COLLEGE OF ARCHITECTURE

Architecture, Master of Architecture (RPC 012, MC 046)

Course requirement change. The changes in the Master of Architecture program follow our changes made in our professional undergraduate degree. With an emphasis on project based learning centered in the architecture studio, the curriculum provides courses which are linked in content to the studio courses. The studio sequence of courses allows for the final year of instruction to parallel the final year of our professional five year Bachelor of Architecture program. Total credit hours for the degree will change from 49 to 53 hours. The increase in the total hours required corresponds to the leveling classes required for most students without undergraduate degrees in architecture. The increase also is needed to provide courses for expanded requirements for accreditation.

Reason for request:

The Division of Architecture is restructuring its graduate program offerings in order to foster a more interactive experience for our graduate students, eliminate unnecessary administrative steps in the admissions, application and tracking process, enhance the relevance of our educational offering to the graduates' subsequent work-force experiences, and make ourselves more competitive in the tightening international architectural graduate programs market.

Architecture, Master of Architecture (RPC 012, MC 047)

Course requirement change. The changes in the Master of Architecture program follow our changes made in our professional undergraduate degree. With an emphasis on project based learning centered in the architecture studio, the curriculum provides courses which arc linked in content to the studio courses. The first year and a half provides courses for students without undergraduate degrees in architecture to level with students with architectural undergraduate related degrees in year two. The studio sequence of courses allows for the final year of instruction to parallel the final year of our professional five year Bachelor of Architecture program. Total credit hours for the degree will change from 64 to 89 hours. The increase in the total hours required corresponds to the leveling classes required for most students without undergraduate degrees in architecture. The increase also is needed to provide courses for expanded requirements for accreditation.

Reason for request:

The Division of Architecture is restructuring its graduate program offerings in order to foster a more interactive experience for our graduate students, eliminate unnecessary administrative steps in the admissions, application and tracking process, enhance the relevance of our educational offering to the graduates' subsequent work-force experiences, and make ourselves more competitive in the tightening international architectural graduate programs market.

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

French, PhD. (RPC 086 MC D445)

Course requirement change. FR 5313 has been removed as a recommended course and MLLL 5073 is now required instead of being merely recommended. Total credit hours for the degree will not change.

The course has been strongly recommended in the past and is now offered on a regular basis.

German, Master of Arts (RPC 100, MC M490)

Course requirement change. MLLL 5073 is now the only required course, and students who write an MA thesis arc no longer required to sit for the general exams. Total credit hours for the degree will not change.

Reason for request:

The old requirements (either GERM 5003 History of the German Language or GERM 5113 The Middle Ages) reflect a somewhat outmoded view of the MA as a philologically based degree, and having them as requirements can have a negative impact on enrollment in other German graduate/advanced undergraduate courses offered in the same semester. In addition, exempting thesis students from their general exam gives them more of an incentive to write a thesis, which can serve as a foundation for a dissertation should they decide to pursue a PhD in German.

Spanish, Ph.D. (RPC 217, MC D850)

Course requirement change. MLLL 5073 is now a requirement for Spanish PhD students.

Reason for request:

The class has been recommended in the past and is now offered on a regular basis.

COLLEGE OF ATMOSPHERIC AND GEOGRAPHIC SCIENCES

Environmental Sustainability, B.A. in Environmental Sustainability (RPC 381, MC B408 P161, B408 P516, B408 P591)

Course requirement change. Addition of GEOG 4893, Research Methods, to the core curriculum for all options of the BA in Environmental Sustainability. Total credit hours for the degree will not change.

Reason for request:

This course is required of all Department of Geography and Environmental Sustainability majors as part of a two-semester capstone sequence, approved by department faculty September, 2012.

Environmental Sustainability, B.S. in Environmental Sustainability (RPC 382, MC B410 P161, B410 P516, B410 P591)

Course requirement change. Addition of GEOG 4893, Research Methods, to the core curriculum for all options of the BS in Environmental Sustainability. Total credit hours for the degree will not change.

This course is required of all Department of Geography and Environmental Sustainability majors as part of a two-semester capstone sequence, approved by department faculty September, 2012.

<u>Geographic Information Science, Bachelor of Arts in Geographic Information Sciences (RPC</u> <u>367, MC B450)</u>

Course requirement change. Addition of GEOG 4893, Research Methods, to the core curriculum for all options of the BA in Geographic Information Science. Total credit hours for the degree will not change.

Reason for request:

This course is required of all Department of Geography and Environmental Sustainability majors as part of a two-semester capstone sequence, approved by department faculty September 2012.

<u>Geographic Information Science, Bachelor of Science in Geographic Information Science (RPC 368, MC B452)</u>

Course requirement change. Addition of GEOG 4893, Research Methods, to the core curriculum for all options of the BS in Geographic Information Science. Total credit hours for the degree will not change.

Reason for request:

This course is required of all Department of Geography and Environmental Sustainability majors as part of a two-semester capstone sequence, approved by department faculty September, 2012.

Geography, Bachelor of Science in Geography (RPC 289, MC B465)

Course requirement change. Remove ENGL 3153, Technical Writing, from Major Support Requirements. Total credit hours for the degree will not change.

Reason for request:

Department of Geography and Environmental Sustainability faculty voted in March 2010 to drop the requirement in line with the College of Atmospheric & Geographic Sciences decision to drop the course as a college requirement.

Option Addition

MEWBOURNE COLLEGE OF EARTH & ENERGY

Petroleum Engineering, Master of Science (RPC 183, MC TBD)

Option Addition. New Master of Science Level IV option called MS Petroleum Engineering to be combined with Bachelor of Science in Petroleum Engineering in an accelerated degree program, and will be available only to those pursuing this accelerated program. A total of 30 credit hours required for thesis track.

The integrated programs in Petroleum Engineering are designed to attract BS students in Petroleum Engineering. The current core curriculum for the Master of Science program requires courses that are not necessary for students in the BS in Petroleum Engineering program. The proposed option allows greater flexibility and the opportunity for students to specialize in an area of interest to industry.

Change of Course Requirements

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

Information Studies, Bachelor of Arts in Information Studies (RPC 343, MC B560, B561)

Course requirement change. Replace LIS 3003 with 4223 in requirements. In each of the requirement categories, replace the language 'one course chosen from the following' with 'select one course from list of approved courses available from SLIS department and website', and remove specific course lists. Replace MATH 2123 with additional free elective. Total credit hours for the degree will not change.

Reason for request:

LIS 3003 is focused on learning the foundations of programming and is better suited to be an elective in our Information Technology Category. Based upon feedback from alumni and students, as well as through reviewing similar programs, we believe that our students need a strong background in managing information for organizations as well as project management experience. We address this need by adding the existing course LIS 4223. Our program is interdisciplinary by nature, and we are constantly evaluating new options for the major categories in which we require our students to complete a course. To facilitate this process, we would like to have a flexible list of courses that we will maintain within the department, instead of being required to change the program every few years. The department reviewed the requirements of 10 similar programs in the United States, and the removal of Calculus II reflects the curriculum of these other programs. This will allow our students the freedom to take an additional elective focused on their educational goals.

COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

Elementary Education, Bachelor of Science in Education (RPC 062, MC B355)

Course requirement change. Content and name changes in literacy methods courses to update them due to changes in the field as well as to prepare teacher candidates to implement the new English Language Arts standards in elementary classrooms. Total credit hours for the degree will not change.

Reason for request:

Change in content to update and to prepare teacher candidates to implement the new English Language Arts standards in elementary classrooms.

COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING

Computer Science, Master of Science (RPC 132, MC M235)

Course requirement change. For the non-thesis option, three credit hours of CS 5990 Independent Studies OR seminar course in Computer Science approved by the Graduate Liaison of the School of Computer Science. Total credit hours for the degree will not change.

This modification will better prepare non-thesis option students for their exit exam by focusing on a specific subject with a pre-approved CS seminar course or with an Independent Study.

GAYLORD COLLEGE OF JOURNALISM AND MASS COMMUNICATIONS

Journalism, Bachelor of Arts in Journalism (RPC 137, MC B610)

Course requirement change. Allow students to pursue another skills stream course to satisfy the nine hours of JMC electives. Students now may choose from any JMC +3000 electives to satisfy the nine hours required. Total credit hours for the degree will not change.

Reason for request:

Changes in Journalism are driven by technological advances, new formats for new and information disseminations, and new required clusters of skills for professional journalists. Also, the media economic models are changing and media are increasingly niche, targeted, specialized and consumer-orientated.

HONORARY DEGREES – NC

The University policy and the policy of the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education on awarding honorary degrees states that nominees and alternates must be approved by the OU Board of Regents and State Regents prior to awarding of the degrees.

*President Boren recommended the nominees listed in his recent letter to the Board of Regents be approved for honorary degrees.

CHARTER SCHOOL CONTRACT – JOHN W. REX ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

At the September meeting of the Board of Regents, the Board approved the Oklahoma City Public School District's ("District") application for the Board of Regents to sponsor the John W. Rex Charter Elementary School in downtown Oklahoma City ("School"). Regents' approval was contingent upon receipt of certain legal and logistical assurances from them together with an agreement, satisfactory to the University, delegating the planning, operation and governance of the School from the District to the School. The Board authorized the President or his designee to negotiate a charter contract with the School's board of directors to operate and govern the charter school, subject to review and approval of Legal Counsel and Board of Regents' final approval. Because of pendent interests of the District (e.g., certain termination rights and ownership of the School's facility), the charter contract has been negotiated between and among the School, District and the University.

Under the charter contract, the University will oversee the School primarily in two areas: finance and instruction. The University will have two non-voting members on the School's board of directors, Regent Humphreys and Professor Lawrence Baines, College of Education. In

addition, designated representatives of the parties will meet periodically to review administrative and operational issues and assess educational progress. In return for its administrative services, the University will receive from the state Department of Education up to five percent of the state aid allocation to the School.

University Legal Counsel has reviewed and approved the charter contract between and among the School, District and University, which is currently before the Board for approval. University Legal Counsel also has received the referenced legal and logistical assurances from counsel for the District and the School as well as an executed copy of the Governance and Operational Agreement between the District and School delegating the planning, operation and governance of the School, which agreement is satisfactory to the University.

The contingencies having been satisfied, the charter contract is being brought before the Board of Regents for final approval, as provided for at the September meeting of the Board.

*President Boren recommended the Board of Regents approve the charter school contract between and among the Board of Regents, the Oklahoma City Public School District and the John W. Rex Elementary School, Inc.

RUPEL J. JONES THEATRE RENOVATION AND CRAWFORD MUSIC PRACTICE WING IMPROVEMENTS AND ADDITION – NC

Renovation of the Fine Arts Center Rupel J. Jones Theatre has been approved as a part of the Campus Master Plan of Capital Improvements for the Norman Campus since 1995. A second project in connection with the Weitzenhoffer Family College of Fine Arts is proposed for the Reynolds Performing Arts Center Crawford Music Practice Wing, which is immediately adjacent to the Fine Arts Center. This project will upgrade flooring and finishes and construct a three-story music practice room addition on the north side of the Crawford Music Practice Wing. The estimated total cost is \$1,100,000. It is proposed that the project be approved by the Board and added to the Campus Master Plan of Capital Improvement Projects for the Norman Campus. Professional architectural and engineering consulting services will be provided by GSB, Inc. under the firm's on-call agreement with the University.

The Rupel J. Jones Theatre project includes important safety improvements to replace the stage lift; refurbish rigging; and upgrade electrical and lighting equipment. The estimated cost of \$5,000,000 is being funded from University resources. GSB, Inc. will provide architectural and engineering services for this project as well due to the following reason. At the September 2011 meeting, the Board of Regents ranked Kaighn Associates Architects, Inc. (Kaighn) first. Kaighn completed a project feasibility study. However, Kaighn subsequently reorganized and is now unable to provide the remaining consulting services. Since GSB, Inc. was ranked second by the Board in September 2011, the University has appropriately requested GSB, Inc. to provide design, construction documents and construction administration services for the project at a cost comparable to that originally proposed by Kaighn.

In order to reduce overhead costs; combine staging, storage and delivery areas; and expedite and coordinate the work, it was determined that the two projects can best be accomplished utilizing the construction management project delivery method. A request for qualifications was sent to the firms that are currently registered with the Construction and Properties Department, Office of Management and Enterprise Services of the State of Oklahoma's Division of Capital Assets Management as providers of at-risk construction management services. A committee was formed to evaluate the responses received from _______ firms. The committee was composed of the following:

- IV. Authorize the President or his designee to execute the Agreements for At-Risk Construction Management Services;
- V. Authorize the University administration to negotiate a guaranteed maximum price for construction for each project, to be presented to the Board for formal approval as required; and
- VI. Recognize and acknowledge that the University may incur certain costs relative to the above projects prior to receipt of bond proceeds and, to the extent the University utilizes currently available funds for said costs, it is intended that bond proceeds will be utilized to reimburse those outlays.

NETWORK INFRASTRUCTURE REFRESH FOR THE NATIONAL WEATHER CENTER $-\,\mathrm{NC}$

I. AWARD A CONTRACT:

The Information Technology Department (IT) provides the network infrastructure critical to the National Weather Center in support of its academic, operational, and research missions. This network infrastructure supports all or part of six National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Partner organizations, as well as eight University departments and research facilities. The existing network is in its eighth year of operation and at the end of its service life and in need of replacement to ensure network availability and reliability for all critical facility operations.

The proposed network refresh includes cabling and wireless network upgrades, security controls and installation of new equipment with greater capacity, redundancy, and utility for the current datacenters and offices in the Weather Center. The refresh adds 10 gigabit Ethernet to support both the University Partners Data Center and the NOAA Partners Data Center for current and future growth of bandwidth-intensive applications including real-time imaging of weather events and voice and video in the Hazardous Weather Testbed, greatly enhancing support of future requirements for the academic and research missions.

Chickasaw Telecom, Inc., of Oklahoma City was awarded the contract based on a competitive solicitation, performed by the State of Oklahoma, which is in keeping with the Board of Regents Policies and Procedures with regard to competition relative to the acquisition of products and services.

II. AND III. MASTER LEASE-PURCHASE PROGRAM

The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE) implemented the Master Lease-Purchase program to facilitate for Oklahoma colleges and universities acquisitions of long-lived assets using the lease-purchase method. OSRHE submits funding requirements periodically through the State of Oklahoma Council of Bond Oversight and the Oklahoma Development Finance Authority, the conduit financing agency. Institutions fund the resulting debt service using current operating funds. The consolidation of multiple funding requests into a single debt issuance by the OSRHE greatly reduces the time and effort that would otherwise be required for an institution to finance the acquisition of a major capital asset. A Reimbursement Resolution by the Board is required in the event-because of timing-University funds must be used for the original acquisition, and reimbursement is needed from the lease proceeds. This Resolution constitutes a declaration of official intent as is required by the reimbursement regulations set forth in Regulation Section 1.150-2 of the Internal Revenue Code.

Funding has been identified, is available, and budgeted within the operating budgets of Information Technology Department and Real Estate Operations.

*President Boren recommended the Board of Regents:

- I. Authorize the President or his designee to issue a purchase order in the amount of \$1,882,746, to Chickasaw Telecom, Inc., of Oklahoma City, available through a state contract, for network refresh equipment for the National Weather Center;
- II. Authorize the President or his designee to submit the above acquisition for inclusion under the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education Master Lease-Purchase Program; and
- III. Recognize and acknowledge that the University may fund certain costs of the above project prior to delivery of purchase proceeds from its own funds and, to the extent the University utilizes its own funds for said purposes, it is intended that proceeds of the Master Lease-Purchase Program will be utilized to reimburse the University.

POST-SEASON CONTEST – NC

Arrangements necessary for the University's participation in a bowl game must be made prior to the next Regents' meeting; therefore, it is necessary to seek authorization for the President, the Athletic Director, or their designee to award purchase orders and sign contracts associated with the University's participation in a bowl game. Provisions outlined in Regents' policies regarding post-season athletic contests will be followed. Additionally, an agreement with the University of Oklahoma Foundation to advance bowl related expenses is required to facilitate the contracts, purchase orders and arrangements necessary for the University's participation in a post season bowl game.

*President Boren recommended the Board of Regents:

- I. Authorize the President, the Athletic Director, or their designee to award purchase orders and sign contracts associated with The University of Oklahoma's participation in a post-season bowl game; and
- II. Authorize the President, the Athletic Director, or their designee to negotiate an agreement with The University of Oklahoma Foundation to advance bowl related expenses as required.

DEFINED CONTRIBUTIONS FOR EMPLOYEES UNDER THE AGE OF 28 – ALL

It is requested that the University's Defined Contribution plan be amended to allow employees under the age of 28 years, and with less than three years of service to receive the 9% monthly contribution that all employees over the age of 28 currently receive. Furthermore, it is proposed that this amendment be made prospectively, beginning January 1, 2014, with no retrocontributions. The three year vesting period will remain unchanged.

Historically, contributions were not allowable in for this age group until they attained three years' service. Based on benchmarking data, it is clear that other institutions of higher education and industry have eliminated minimum age requirements. This provision has also become a recruiting issue in recent years as the workforce has become more transient.

The purchase price is supported by an independent third party appraisal, and the proposed acquisition complies with Regents' policy. Both the purchase contract and appraisal are on file in the Board of Regents Office.

Funding has been identified, is available and budgeted from Real Estate Operations resources.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Highlights from the Statements of Net Position as of September 30, 2013 and Statements of Changes in Net Position for the three months then ended are presented below for information only.

STATEMENTS OF NET ASSETS

- Total assets of \$101.4 million exceeded related liabilities of \$64.6 million by \$36.9 million.
- Education & General assets of \$13.2 million exceeded related liabilities of \$6.5 million by \$6.7 million.
- Sponsored Program assets of \$0.9 million exceeded related liabilities of \$0.2 million by \$0.7 million.
- Auxiliary Enterprise assets of \$10.4 million exceeded related liabilities of \$2.8 million by \$7.6 million.
- Other fund assets of \$77.0 million exceeded related liabilities of \$55.1 million by \$21.9 million. Other Funds consist of fixed assets, net of accumulated depreciation, and related bonds and master lease obligations, and other academic and administrative activities.

STATEMENTS OF CHANGES IN NET ASSETS

- Total revenues of \$12.4 million exceeded expenses of \$12.0 million by \$0.4 million.
- Education & General revenues of \$8.3 million were less than related expenses of \$8.4 million by \$0.1 million.
- Sponsored Program revenues of \$0.4 million were less than related expenses of \$0.5 million by \$0.1 million.
- Auxiliary Enterprise revenues of \$2.7 million were less than related expenses of \$2.9 million by \$0.2 million.
- Other fund revenues of \$0.9 million exceeded related expenses of \$0.1 million, resulting in a net increase of \$0.8 million. This increase in due primarily to the receipt of Section 13 allocations and state appropriations for capital lease debt service.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Highlights from the Statements of Net Position as of September 30, 2013 and Statements of Changes in Net Position for the three months then ended are presented below for information only.

STATEMENTS OF NET POSITION

- Total assets and deferred outflows of resources of \$97.2 million exceeded related liabilities of \$31.9 million by \$65.3 million.
- Education & General assets of \$14.3 million exceeded related liabilities of \$1.8 million by \$12.5 million.
- Sponsored Program assets of \$707 thousand exceeded related liabilities of \$69 thousand by \$638 thousand.
- Auxiliary Enterprise assets of \$4.1 million exceeded related liabilities of \$.3 million by \$3.8 million.
- Other Fund assets and deferred outflows of resources of \$78.1 million exceeded related liabilities of \$29.7 million by \$48.4 million. Other Funds consist of fixed assets, net of accumulated depreciation and related bonds and master lease obligations, and other academic and administrative activities.

STATEMENTS OF CHANGES IN NET POSITION

- Total revenues of \$30.7 million exceeded expenses of \$23.8 million by \$6.9 million.
- Education & General revenues of \$19.0 million exceeded expenses of \$11.9 million, resulting in a net increase of \$7.1 million.
- Sponsored Program revenues of \$384 thousand exceeded expenses of \$348 thousand, resulting in a net increase of \$36 thousand.
- Auxiliary Enterprise revenues of \$3.8 million exceeded expenses of \$2.4 million by \$1.4 million.
- Other Fund revenues of \$7.5 million trailed expenses of \$9.1 million, resulting in a net decrease of \$1.6 million. This decrease is due primarily to unfunded depreciation (\$1.1 million) and expenditures related to construction of the McMahon Field and Athletics Center.

REGENTS' FUND QUARTERLY FINANCIAL REPORT September 30, 2013

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Highlights from the Regents' Fund Quarterly Financial Report for the three months ended September 30, 2013 are presented below for information only.

ALL FUNDS

• As of September 30, 2013, the Regents' Fund consisted of 234 individual funds with a combined net market value of \$127.9 million, a \$3.7 million (3.0%) increase from June 30, 2013.

CONSOLIDATED INVESTMENT FUND (CIF)

- Cash and investments held by the CIF at September 30, 2013, had a market value of \$82.0 million, a \$3.3 million (4.1%) increase from June 30, 2013. Of the \$82.0 million, \$951,000 was held locally for working capital purposes, and \$81.1 million was managed by Adams Hall Asset Management LLC, Investment Management Fiduciary.
- During the three months ended September 30, 2013, the CIF realized a total return of 3.9%, which trailed the blended benchmark of 4.4% by 50 basis points.
- During the year ended September 30, 2013, the CIF realized a total return of 9.9%, which exceeded the blended benchmark of 9.2% by 70 basis points.

SHORT-TERM INVESTMENT FUND (STIF)

- Cash and investments held by the STIF at September 30, 2013, had a market value of \$43.2 million, a \$716,000 (1.6%) decrease from June 30, 2013.
- During the three months ended September 30, 2013, the STIF realized a total return of 0.6%, which exceeded the 91-day Treasury Bill rate of 0.0% by 60 basis points.
- During the year ended September 30, 2013, the STIF realized a total return of 1.5%, which exceeded the 91-day Treasury Bill rate of 0.1% by 140 basis points.

REGENTS' FUND QUARTERLY FINANCIAL REPORT September 30, 2013

As of September 30, 2013, the Regents' Fund consisted of 234 individual funds. The funds, under the governance of The Board of Regents of The University of Oklahoma, are preserved through investment and spending strategies that provide a balance between reasonable current income and long-term growth. Future growth is needed to offset the impact of inflation and to maintain purchasing power for future generations.

Performance Measurement and Objectives

The CIF is a long-term portfolio and should be judged with a long-term perspective. While short-term performance measures are meaningful with respect to due diligence and periodic monitoring of the fund, the performance of the CIF will be judged with the longest time horizon perspective in mind.

Absolute Return Objective - which shall be measured in real (i.e., net of inflation) rateof-return terms and shall have the longest time horizon for measurement;

The Absolute Return Objective of the CIF is to seek an average total annual return equal to CPI and other costs plus 5%.

Relative Return Objective - which shall be measured as time-weighted rates of return versus market index benchmarks; and,

Comparative Return Objective - which shall measure performance as compared to a universe of similar investment funds.

Rebalancing

It is the University's general policy to rebalance to its target asset allocation on a uniform and timely basis. The method of rebalancing will be based on the "tolerance" rebalancing formula, which generally states that the portfolio will be rebalanced if the target asset allocation goes beyond the stated tolerance for any particular asset class. Management is required to direct the investment manager to rebalance the portfolio within 30 days following the end of the month during which the fund was first determined to be out of balance.

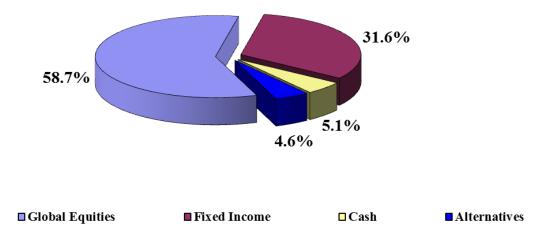

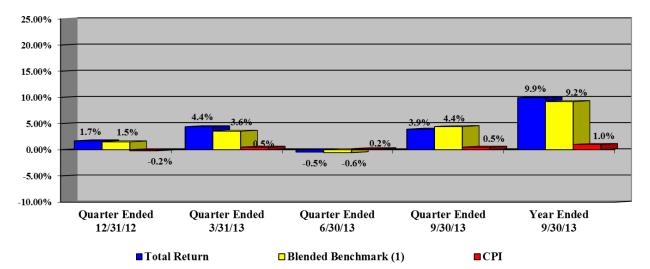
Asset Allocation

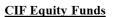

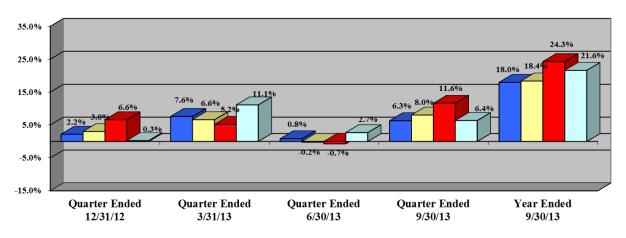

Total CIF

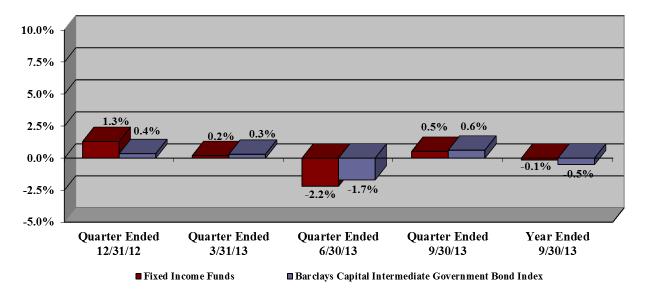

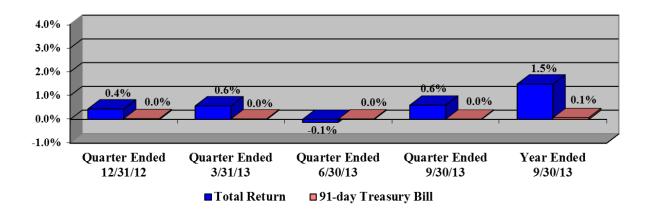
