Meeting of the Regents of the University of Oklahoma in the President's Office at Norman, Oklahoma, April Ind and 3rd, 1909.

Friday Afternoon Session.
Present, Nelson, Perry, Lydick, Gordon, Rowsey, and Betty. In the absence of President Truce, who was detrained at home on account of sickness, on motion, $J$ blat Gordon was elected president pro term.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

Attorneys ${ }^{H a r r i s}$ and Dudley appeared before the Board and presented at length the claims of the instructors who failed of reelection, and presented their brief.

Moved by Rowey, seconded by Betty, that the following persons, who were employed in the University of Oklahoms prior to July, 1908, and who failed of reelection at the Board meeting held in Oklahoma City in June, 1908, be allowed salary for two months each, in full of all claims that each may have against the University for services rendered: HD Guelich, V L Parrington, LW Cole, C i Jansky, EM Williams, G D Davidson, Miss Clara killer, Dr R P Stoops, W R Humphries, $:$ Maynard, 0 Hall, and James Duff barnett. Carried.

Moved by Lydick, seconded by Betty, that the claim of David R Boyd dated February 9, 1903, and being in the sum of $\$ 1222.20$, be disallowed. Carried.

Moved by Rowsey, seconded by Lydick, that the claim of I N Prickets in the sum of $\$ 140$ be disallowed. Carried.

Moved by Rowsey, seconded by Nelson, that the claim of J L Reader, who acted as librarian during the months of July and August, and rendered services, be allowed and warrants ordered dram. Carried.

Moved by Lydick, seconded by Betty, that the claim of The Daily Leader for $\$ 50$ for advertising be disallowed. Carried.

Moved by lydick, seconded by Nelson, that the resolution adopted by the Board of Regents on June 9, 4904, be repealed and declared to have no further effect, and to be in no way binding upon the Board of Regents. Carried.

President Evans made a detailed report of the visit he and Mr Rowsey made to Chicago to confer with the architects concerning the new building for the $\mathrm{Uni}_{\mathrm{n}}$ versity. He reported that the architects practically accepted the revised plan he had outlined at the suggestion of the Regents, and that work on the plans was being pushed as rapidly as possible, but that they could not be ready for bids for a few weeks yet.

Mr Rowsey offered the foll wing resolution:
In case anyRegents is absent from any three consecutive regular meetings of the Board without good and sufficient cause it is the sense of this Board that the Governor take such action on the part of said Regent so absenting himself to be a resignation. Approved, and a copy ordered sent to the Governor.

Session, Saturday corning, April 3rd, 1909.

Meeting called to order in President Evans' of fice at the University at 9:00 a. m. by president pro fem Dr Gordon.

Carried.

Moved by Rowsey, seconded by Perry, that the degree of LL. D. be conferred upon David B Boyd, and that the proper officers of the Faculty and the Board of Regents be directed to carry out the wishes of the Board in having the said degree conferred upon him at the Commencement exercises in June of this year. Carried. Lydick and Betty not voting.

The following resolution was offered and its adop tion moved by Linebaugh, seconded by betty:

Whereas, the University of Oklahoma belongs to all the people of the State and should be conducted in such a way that the humblest citizen cannot justly criticise it or any member of the faculty, and

Whereas, a goodly number of our citizens very seriously object to members of the faculty engaging in the public and indiscriminate dance andcard parties; Therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Regents, in regular session in the city of Norman, April 2nd and 3rd, 1909, that we request the members of the facult $y$ of this University to refrain from these anusements during their conneotion with this University.

Further, that the President of the University be requested to furnish each member of the faculty with a copy of this resolution.

The resolution as above stated carried.
President Evans presented his report as to the organization of the University as follows:

BY-LAWS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF OKIAHOIA.
ORGANIZATION.
which instruction is given subject to the administration of the Regents and faculty and all who give instruction in any department, with the exception of undergraduate instructors, shall constitute the general faculty of the University.
2. The University shall include:
A. A COllege of Arts and Sciences with a Dean as its head executive officer and connected with this College shall be schools of hedicine. Pharmacy, and pine Arts.
B. A College of Engineering with a Dean as its head executive officer containing schools of civil, Mechanical, and Electrical Engineering.
C. A Preparatory School under a Principal Who shall be recogniz as Professor of Pedagogy in the University faculty.

The schools in connection with the colleges of the University which contain students not required to matriculate in that college shall be under the executive direction of deans.

The schools in conncction with the colleges of the University containing onlyregularly matricu?ated students of that college shall be under the executive management of directors.

The general faculty of the University shall be divided into groups corresponding with the groups unler the elective system. The professors and instructors in each of these groups shall constitute a special comittee upon the departments of the work of the University with which they are conneoted, ant the chairmen of euch groups shall be appointed by the President of the Uni... versity.


Additional schools in the colleges of the University may be zecommended for organization by the Senate to the Regents at any time, and the Senate has power to rearrange at any time the group comittees into which the entire faculty is divided.
3. The members $8 f$ the General Faculty shall be classified as follows:
A. The President.
B. The Vice-President.
C. The Dean of the Graduate Sohool.
D. The Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.
E. The Dean of the College of Engineering.
F. Deans of schools.
G. Directors of schools.
H. Dean of Woaen.
J. The Chairmen of Group Committees.
K. Professors.
L. Associate Professors.

1. Assistant Professors.
N. Instruotors.
2. The President, the Vice-President, the deans of colleges and schools and the chairmen of the group committees, the principal of the Preparatory School and the Registrar shall constitute the Senate of the University.
3. The members of the General Faculty associated with each college or school shall constitute the faculty thereof.
4. The President shall be the executive head of the university and a member of each faculty thereof. It shall be his duty to secure efficiency in all departments and order $y$ and econonic admintstration in all of the affairs of the University. He has the authority needed to that end and is answerable to the Board of Regents alone for his acts.
5. The Vice-President shall exercise the functions of the President during his absence and in other ways shall support and aid him in the work of administering the affairs of the Univorsity.
6. The Degn shall be the executive afficer of each college or school, shall be responsible to the President for carrying out all University policies and for the execution of all established rules and special directions given by any superior authority, and shall be the official advisor of the students in such college or school. The dean shall make an annual report to the President on or before the first day of Narch of each year in which he shall fully treat of the work of his college or school. He may make reports or advance suggestions at any time and shall make special reports
whenever requestod to do so.
The directors of schools shall act as special advisors of the students in their respective schools subject to the authority of the Dean of the college.

Group Committees.
9. The chairman of each groupcommittee shall be responsible, togother with thet comittee, for the quality and efficient progress of the worl in the subfects included in that group. The group comittees shall be given charge of the general policy touching instruction in subjects included in their group and shall be required to pass upon and recormend all courses proposed to be included in the departments of their group to the President for him to approve and submit to the Senate. The chairmen of such committees shall represent the views of the group committees in the meetinge of the University Senate and it shall be their duty to lead the committees as far as possible in securing the greatest efficiency and most harmonious relationship in the instruction given in the different branches included in the group.
10. The faculties of the colleges shall be responsible for carrying out the general policies adopted for their respeotive colleges and for rranging for the proper offering of different oourses of study and the general administration of collego affairs.

The faculties of the schools shall similarly be responsible for the administration of the affairs of their respective schools and shall-pass upn all special professional or technical courses proposed to be offered by members of the faculty to students of that school alone, and where they approve, reoomend to the Senate the including of such courses in President for his approval and submission to the Senate, all such courses proposed to be included in the work offered by the University.

The University Senate.
11. The University Senate shall exercise genoral legislative functions touching the educational policy of the University or any particular matter incident thereto. All new courses or departments proposed to be introduced into the various colleges and schools of the University shall be submitted to the President for his approval and by him to the Senate for final approval before such courses are embodied in the curricula of the various departments of the University.

The General Faculty.
12. Watters of general policy or regulations affecting in common all departments of the University shall be detormined by the general University Faculty.

The Dean of Women.
13. The Dean of Vomen shall be charged with the general oversight of all women students of the University. It shall be her duty to aid and advise them in their University life. She shall render such assistance to the President of the University as that officer shall desire.

Mr Rowsey moved the adoption of the EDdie report. Seconded by Perry. Carried.
