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Moved by Perry, seconded ky Hatchet, that we adopt the faculty as read and that this be made a part of the report concerning the School of Medicine. Carried.

Moved by Linebaugh, seconded by Hatchet, that a comittee consisting of Lydick. Nelson $\mathrm{N}_{\Lambda}$ and the Lan of the School of Law, be appointed and giveon authority to bring suit in the court, if they see necessary, to settle the matter as to the amount of money to which we are entitled under the bill appropriating funds for the University, and the question as to whether we will waive our right to any of it if it is not dram before June 30 th , and any similar questions, and that the committee be instructed to act at once. Further, that the Board request $D$ an $k$ monnet to report to this committee as to the legal questions involved. Carried.

Nr Rowsey presented the resignation of Prof. Gardner as Professor of Psychology and Philosophy. Moved by Hatchet, seconded ky Perry, that the resignation bo accepted to take effect September 1. 1910. Carried.

Mr. Lydick, Chairman of the Committee on Salaries, presented the report for the Committee. (See Exhibit "A".) On motion it was decided to take up the report of the comittee section by section, it being agreed that in all cases where there was no change made, those now holding position should be retained at same salaries.

Whe report of the committee with regard to the chemistry departaent was accepted with the exception of the increase in salary for Dr. Debarr.

The report of the comrittee with regard to the history department was accepted with the exception of the increase in salary for Professor buchanan. On motion Professor Gittinger was given the title of Professor.

The section of the report dealing with the Classical Department was adopted.

Upon presentation of the sepdion of the report with regard to the Botany Department it was moved by Hatchett, eeconded by Linebaugh, that the report of the comittee be approved and that the board request President Evans to confer with Dr Van Vleet as to the organization of a department of Fowestry. Carried.

Adjourned Ior lunch.

Afternoon session.
The Board was called together at 2:10 p. m. in President Evans' office with same persons presest as in morning session.

Moved by Linebaugh, seconded by Hatehett,
that Mr Royal J Allen of the State Board of Public Affairs be given opportunity to speak to the Board. Carried. lir. Allen spoke regarding bills for printing advertisements for bids for thenew University Hall, which advertisements were published in papers outside the state of Oklahoma, the total amounting to something over 600.00 . Nov d by Linebaugh, seconded by felon, that the claims for advertising for bids for the University building be allowed and warrants ordered dram for payment of same. Carried.

The report of the Salaries Committee was again taken up.

The recommendations of the comiltce as to the Mathematics Department were acoeptod.

Upon presentation of the section of the report dealing with the College of Engineering it was moved by Rowsey, seconded by Perry, that the matier of the department of engineering be left as it now is with Professor Bozell's salary raised to 1500.00 per annum, and with instructions from the President of this University to the head of that department setting forth the fact that we expect him to increase his department materially during this coming year. Carried.

The recommendations of the committee with regard to the music department were accepted. On motion the President was empowered to employ in addition a third piano teacher on a percentage baseis for next year, and was directed to bring in nowinations for the positions left vacant by Miss Brewer, Miss Goodrich and Miss Smith.

President Evans recomuended that this position of Violin Instructor be filled by the reappointment of Miss luerle Newby at a salary of $\$ 750$, guar- . anteed and $85 \%$ of all fees earned. Moved by Lydick seconded by Rowsoy, that this recomendation be adopted. Carried.

The recom endations of the committee with regard to the Germon Departnent, that the salaries be 22000 , 1350 , and $„ 1250$ respectively for Professors Neier, Voss and holt, were accepted.

Upon presentation of the section of the report with regard to the English Department the recomendation that one professor in this department should be dropped was anended by Hatchett, seconded by Perry, so as to continue the services of the professor and the assiciate professor at present salaries and fixing the salaries of the two instructors for the ensueing year at 1000.00 each.

In the Department of Zoology no change in salary was recomzended and the report was approved.

In the Department of Political Science no chance in salary was recommended and the section was approved.

Upon presentation of the section of the report with regard to the Departments of Psychology and Education, it was moved by Lydick, seconded by Linebaugh, that $r_{\Lambda}$ Brovivay be employed as instruct- . or in Psychology. Carried. Hoved by Lydick, seconded by Linebaugh, pepphded that an additional professorship of the Science of Teaching be created. Notion

Upon prosentation of the section of the rem port with rogord tothe Department of Phyaics the report was accopted uthorizing the increase in the salary of Professor Hesenan from 1500.00 to 11600,00 per year.

Upon presentation of the section of the report dealing with the Denartront of rhysical Cultur for fonen, upn motion of Hatchett, seconded by Ronsey, it was docided to unite the directorship of physical culture for wozon with the departzent of elocution or exprosation it a salary of $\$ 800$ Ius $55 \%$ of all feos in the departmont of 6x, ress then : rerisent ve netructod to nominato a nuitable person sor the joint po stion and report such nomination to next meeting of the board. Lotion carried.

[^1]Improper conduct on the part of Professor Holuberg, Dean of the School of Fine Arts. Moved by Rowsey, seconded by Perry, that lir. Holmberg be retained. Berried.

The report of the committee as to the Medital Department was read. Moved by Linebaugh, seconded by Lydick, that Dr. Bobo's salary as Lean of the entire oho: be fixed at $\$ 1500.00$ pr annam. On motion the commendation of the committee that Dr. Capshaw's salary be raised from $\$ 1500,00$ to $\$ 1600.00$ per annum was lost.

Upon presentation of the section of the report with regard to the $S_{\text {school }}$ of $L_{a w}$, the recommendation of the committee that the Dean of the School together with the President of the University be authorized to nominate a professor for an additional chair in this school at a salary of $\$ 2,000.00$ per annum was approved.

The recommendation of the committee with regard to the Department of Physical Culture was approved, granting Professor Darling leave of absence without salary for one year, and the President of the University mas in tructed to nominate a person to fill 'his position for the year of his absence, at a salary not toexceed \$1250.00.

Upon motion it was decided that the salary of the Secretary to the President who is also secretary to the general faculty of the University be fixed for the ensuing year at $\$ 1600.00$.

Moved by Betty, seconded by Perry, that the
the per diem and expenses of the members of the Board of Regents who attended this session be allowed and warrants ordered drawn. Carried. On motion, adjourned, to meet again on Friday, the 29 th of Aril.

REPORT OF DHE SALARY COMIITTEE.

THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE STATE UNIVERSTY:--
Pursuant to your instructions, the committee on salaries has inv stigated the work being done by the various professors and instructors of the University, and report as follows:

CHEMISTRY DEPARTME: T
Dr. DeBarr is instructing classes in worl, for Which credit of 28 hours is being given. Notother professor or instructor in the Univorsity does more than 18 hours pr meek. In addition to this, his is Vice-President of the University. Dr. DeBerr has been with the University for eighteen years, and in our opinion he is one of the best chemists in the West. He is a tower of strength to the University. His precent salary is, 2560.00 per year. We rcoommend that his salory be increased 100.00

Frof. Williams and :r. Calvert appear to be busy and devoting their ertire time to the rork. We recommend that their salaries remain as they are now fixed.

## HIETORY DEPARTIENT

Prof. Buchanan, in addition to his position as Head of the Department of llistory, is dean of the college of Arts and Scierces. This requires a great anount of his time, and calls for learning. skill, tact and business management. Prof. Euchanan is doing twelve hours a week in teaching. in addition to his other duties. He hes boen with the University for fifteen years, and in our opinion is one of the most valuable men the University has. We reconmend that his salary be increased from $\$ 2250.00$ to $\$ 2350.00$ per year.

Prof. Gittinger has 13 hours per meek, and Prof. Floyd has 12 hours per week. We are of the opinion that each of these gentlenen could and ought to do a great deal more work than they are doing. We find that student assistents have been employed to teach Nodern History, Merican History and Ancient History. In our opinion this work ought to be done by the professors in this department. they ought to be, and doubtless are, capable of giving better instruction than the student assistants can do. In order, therefore, that the studnets may have better instruction in these branches, End that the University may be saved the exponse of employing student assistants, and for the reason that Professors Gittinger and Floyd, in the opinion of your comittee, heve not
sufficient work to do, we recommend that the student assistants in this Department be discontinued and the work given over to the professors, to be divided as the Head of the Department may advise.

We find thet Prof. Gittinger is an able instructor and has been with the University for eight years. We recomend thathis salary be increased from $\$ 1500.0$ to 1600.00 per year, andd that Prof. Ioyd's salary remsin at $\$ 1600.00$

## ODRE: ANE LATIN DEPABTMEMT.

Prof. Paxton, who is the professor of Greek, has been with the University for fourteen years, and receives a balary of 12000.00 per year.

Prof. Sturgis is professor of Latin; has been with the University for ten years, and receives a salary of ${ }^{3} 1750.00$.

We believo that Prof. Paxton is one of the most $\therefore \quad$ learned men in Greek whose services could be obtained. He is an able and popular instructor, and his scrvices aro very valuable to the University. "e find that he is teaching seven een hours per week, which is far above the giverage. However, on account of the unpopularity of ureek among the students here, as elsewhere, Prof. Pation has in his department only seventeen students. During the last senester, two of his classes had one etudent each; two of then had two stucents each; one class had four and one had seven. Excopt on account of the very limited number of students in this Department, the committee would recommiend an increase in salary of Prof. Paxton.

Prof. Sturgis teaches eighteen hours per week. His classes are sexil. During last semester he had 44 students in his classes. We find that student assistants have ben empleyed to te ch Caesar and First Latin. The Caesar class, although it had only 32 students, was divided in tro sections, each section aking five hours per weok. The same thing was true with. the First Latin. How ever, on account of the second year of the preparatory dopartment being abolished, irct Latin will not be taught during the next year. We thind it is unecessary to divide the Caesar class in two sections. We recomend that it be taught in one section, and that the additional five hours of latin be taught by Prof. Sturgis. According to the present schedule, this mould give him 23 houre. Some years ago. Prof. Eaxton was head of the Depart cent of latin and reel, and taught Latin as well as creek. In event tie work should be found too heavy for Prof. Sturgis, we recommend that Prof. Paxtonve given some clasces in Latin, so as to equalize the work between the two. We recomend that in the event the work of teaching Latin and Greek should becone too heavy, during the ensuing year, for Prof. Sturgis and Prof. Paxton to properly teach, that a rule be adopted by which no classes in Greek and Latin be taught where only one student desires the work.

EOTANY DEPARTMENT.
Dr. A. H. Van Vleet is the professor of Botany.

Your comittee is not at $\mathbf{d l l}$ satisfied with the extent of the work being done by Dr. van Vleet, in this, to-wit: during the last senester, Dr. Van Vleet taught Botany I, which recited two hours per week, and had four hours in the Laboratory, and Botany VII, which recited two hours and had eight hours in the Laboratory per week. It will thus be seen that during the entire weel of five days, Dr. Van Vleet had but four recitations and a total of twelve hours in the Labora tory. This semester, Dr. Van Vleet reports that he has the following classes, towit: Lotany II. This class recites two hours per day three days per week. doing its work in the laboratory; Botany XI, reciting two hours per ctay three days in the week, doing its reciting in the laboratory. Then Dr. Van Vleet has a preparatory class, which i divided into two sections, each section reciting four hours weekly. Your comnittee is of the opinion that this work being done by Dr. Van Vleet, When analyzed, is not wore than onemalf of the work which the professor of this department oug't to do. In addition to this. Dr. Van V1eet suggests that he have a student assistant. Dr. Yan Vleet has informed the comittee that he has a great deal of comittee tork to do, but we find that he is. a momber of the comittee on rules and the committoe on Stuient petitions, and it is our opinion that the smount of mork to be done upon these comittees is hardly sufficient to notice. Dr. Van Vleet is also the Dean of the raduate School, but upon investigution your comittee finds that there is not to exceed ten students doing post-graduate work, and that the amount of extra work to be done by the Dean of the Craduate Sohool is very little indeed. We rocomrend that the board refuse to allow the student assistant in this department, and that it be so arranged that Dr. Van Vleet will have more work to do, or that his salary of $\$ 2000.00$ per annum be diminished.

## MATMEMATICE DEPARTMMT.

We have personally interviewed Prof. Keaves and Prof. Duvall, and have been most favorably impressed with the ability, energy and geniality of these two professors. Wio find, however, that Prof. Reaves has fifteen hours, and Prof. Duvall sixteen hours per week. We think this is not enough work. The schedule shors that student assistants have been employed to teach First Geometry and First Algebra. Both of these gentlemen want an increase in salary. We recomrend that the positions of student assistants in this department be discontinued, and that Frofessors Reaves and Duvall be required to do this work, and thatthe salary of Prof. Duvall be increesed from 1500.00 to $\$ 160.00$ per year, any that Frof. Reaves' alary be increased from $1800 . j$ to 1900.00 per year. We make this recomendation of the raise in salaries, both on account of the increased work which will thus fall upon then, and erecially on accountof the marked ability which these professors, by their work and services, have shown themselves to po:sess.

## ENGINE: RING DEPARTMENT.

Your cormittee is puzaled and perplexed as to what it ought to report in this department. The showing made by this departinent is, to your comit tee, very unsatiafactory.

Prof. Felgar is head of this department. During the last semester, Prof. Felgar's students recived credit of eight hours per week. The schedule shows that he had eight hours in the laboratory, or field, and six hours in recitations, but that his work was of such a nature that the students received credit for ofily eight hours per meel,g and he had only 12 studnts in his departmet.

Prof. Bozell is the professor of Electrical Engineering. He had only seven students in his Dopartment, although for his worl, which seems to be very light, his ctudente received credit for fiffeen hours per ree. He gete a saiary of 1250.00 .

Prof. Dwight is the instructor in drawing. His stucents received credit of nine hours per week, and his classes ar larger. He gets a salary of 1500.00 ser year.

Prof. Chappoll is the associate professor of Civil Enfincering. He had twenty students in his clasees lest se ester. Thoy were giver credits for olewen hours per meel, and he draws a salary of $\$ 1500.00$ per year.

Mr. Aitkenhead is the shop man in this department, and receives 1000.00 per year selary.

It will thus be scen that there are five men in the Department of Civil Engineering, maling a total valary expense of $\$ 7050.00$. Aside from those taking drawing under Prof. Dwight, we find that the total number enrolled in this depertment, during the last :cmester, is 33. The toval enrollment of the classes of Professors Folgar, Eozell and Chappell, was 33, and no doubt in this enumeration a number of students have been counted twice or tiree times. It occurs to us that there is at leatt one too many men employed in this departnent, and that the State ought not to pay $\$ 7050.00$ per year in this Department, as there is but a very limited nuiber of students.

Wo dislike to offer a criticism without suggesting a remedy, and while me are thoroughly aatiPied that a remedy exists, by which the expense can be diminished without seriously crippling the Department, we are unable to make definjite suggestion as tohos to do it. We had Prof. Felgar before our comittee and questioned him at length. We stated to him our opinion, as above set cut and insisted upon sugestions from him as to how the work would be conducted with at least one of the professors taken out of the work, se steadfastly refused to even consider the rossibility of attempting to operate this ceprotment with any change whatever made, and insisted thet all of the en remain in the faculty, and, in addition to that the salary of Pros. Eozell be increased ${ }^{4} 250$ per year. Your committee recomends that the expenses of this Department be materially decreased; that the number of employees be diminshed by at least one, and that the head of this department be
directed to arrange the work accordingly, and if he is unaile to do so, that so: o one else be elected, who is beth able and willing to properly conduct the angineering departrient of this state, with fewer than five wen and with the selary expenses meterially less than. 7050.00 per annum.

## MUSIC DEPARTMENT.

Pror'. Holmberg is the head of this Department anc is teaching eleven hours per week. In addition to this he gives four private lessone per week, and has quite a little cxtra work as head and director of this dopartmont.

Se inind that $r$. "allor is recoiving a salary of 8800.00 per yoar as inetructor in the theory of music. He teaches only nine hours per week. We thinl: this position, occupicd by lr. Waller, should be abolished. Pros. Nolnberg can easily take up a little of this extra worl. irrs. Cora Iritchett, of the music department, is qualified to teach a part of the work which bir. "aller now has, and has expressed acr villingness to do so. She is at the present tine drawing a salary of $\$ 800.00$ per year. pie think her to be very popular and efficient. We recomend that one-half of the work now done by Mr. Waller be done by Mrs. Pritchett, and that her salary be raised from $\$ 300.00$ to $\$ 1000.00$ per year, and that the remainer of ir. Waller's work be given to Prof. Holmberes, who now draws a calary of 1750.00 , which ve deem sufficient for the onsuing year.

As additional reason for recomending the small increase in salery of irs. Pritchott, we call the attention of the board to the fact that the tuition which is brought into the University for the work which she is now doing is sufficient to pay the salary which she now receives.

Prot. Lenox is instructor in voice. We have carefully examined the work which he is doing, and fil d that from nine o'clock untill trelve o'cloct. and from 1:30 o'clock ntil 6 o'clock, five days $^{\prime}$ In tho "ce, evory hour of the time of Mr. Lenoz is occupied in giving lessons in his department. In addition to this he has quite a lot of outside work. is present salery is 1600.00 . The President of the University, as well as Prof. Lenox, informs your committee that the tuition which was brought into the University on account of the work done by Prof. Lenox exceeds his salary to a considerable amount. The believe that this work, which is being so onergetically and ably done and which is so profitable to the University, hould be awarded by a small increase in salary, of say 100 per year, making the salary of Prof. Lenox $\$ 1600.00$ per year.

Hiss Brewer and Mies Goodrich of the music depertinent have offered their resignations, on account of threatened metrinonial ventures, and we presume their positions will be filled by persons of oqual ability, who will be entitled to approximately the same salaries which they now receive.

## GERMAR DEPARTMETT.

We recomend that the salarios in this deparement remain the ame for the ensuing year as they have been for the past year.

Prof. Meyer is doing 16 hours per week; Prof. Voss 17, and Prof. Holt twenty, and receive selaries of $\$ 2000.00, \$ 350.00$ and $\$ 1250.00$ respective1y. We consider the time given by these professors to their work as being sufficient, and we are of the opinion that those departments where the professors have ferrer hours are not properly arranged.

ENCLISH DEPARTMINT.
Proi'. lever draws a salary of $\$ 2000.00$, and does ten hours mork per week. Prof. lads 111 draws a sal ry of 1500.00 and does thirteen hours per week; Mss Loomis draws a salary of 1200.00 , and does ten hours per weok; Miss Erooke draws a salary of $\$ 1000.00$, and does six hours per week. In addition to this work, the department has so atranged its work that each professor has two hours, in addition to the above figures, each week as conference mork in the gradirig of papers and consultation with students. Your comittee is fully advised that in teaching English, a great deal of work is required in the examination and grading of theses and other papers. However, after making allomance for all this extra work, your committee is of the opinion that we have now employed in this department more instructors than is necessary, and we therefore recomend that one of the instructors in Enclish be abolished; that the nork now: bei:yg done by her be divided among Professors oremer and liadsell and the other instructor, or their successors, and that the salary of Prof. Hadsell be, on aild account, raised from $\$ 1500.00$ to 1500.00 per year, and that the salary of Miss Loomis be raised from 1200,00 to $\$ 1300.00$ per year.

## ZOOLOGY DEPAFTMEIT.

Your com ittee had a personal interview with Prof. Lane, who is the Frofessor of Zoology. We found that during the last semester he had only elght hours, drawing a salary of 1750.01 per year; that during this semester he has ten recitations per seek, and that in addition to these ten recitations he spends seventeen hours in the laboratory each week. The work which this professor is doing this semester, we suggest, amounts only to the minimum amount of work which ought to be required of him. We are of the opinion that during last semester he did loss than onewhalf the work which he ought to have done. We rocommend that unless, during the ensuing year, his work can be kept up to the minimum, or not less than the work which he is doing this semester, that his salary be diminiched accordingly.

## POLITICAL SCTENCE.

Your committee personally interviewed trof. Samtell of this department, ard find he is teaching thirteen hours per weel, and draw a aalary of $\$ 1500.00$ per year. We are of the opinion that the work which the professor is doing is less then the amount which ought to be required of him. We are pleased with the character of the mork whinh he is doing and the popularity of his department.

Prof. Sawtell called our attention to the fact that he ca e here at the same time that the Professor of Psychology came; that he believes his dopartment to $c$ of as high standing as the depert ment of poychology, and that he was receiving a calary of only 1400.00 a year, hile the profocsor of psychölogy receives a aalary of ${ }^{2} 1800.00$ a your. he thinks he is entitlod to an increase in salary.

Your comittee would be willing to recommend an increase in salary from 1500.00 to $\$ 1800.00$ pe year, if he were required to do more work, but, being of the opinion, as above stated, that he is doing not more than two-thirds of the worl he ought to do, we believe his salary should not be increased.

## PSYOHOLOGY DEPART TIT.

We find the work of this department to be very light, the number of students to be few. and we make further reference to this under the head of the Department of Pedagogy.

DEPARTEIN OF PHYOICS. I

Prof. Haseman had especially heavy work during the last semester, as he taught nineteen hours per week. and did his lahoratory work besides. The total enrollment of his departraent appears to have boen 119. His work is very popular and he appears to be a very strong nan. iuring the present semester, however, he has but 6 recitations per week, although his laboratory work has increased until he spends 16 hours per moek in the laboratory.

Prof. Iase an has suggested to us that he would be glad to have a student assistant. While we believe that his work during the first semester was up to the maximun, we are of the opinion that his work during this semester is dom to what ought to ke the tinimum required. Prof. ilaseman informed us that he would so arrange his work during the next year so the seme would be better equalized between the two sercsters.

We are of the opinion that Prof. Haseman's salary should be increased from \$1500.00 to $\$ 1600.00$ per year, but that no assistant bo employed.

We call the Loard's attention to the fact how ver, that this departnent needs a considerable lot of new apparatus, which ought to be supplied.

YOUr committee interviemed Pro . Ohern of this departmont, and are thoroughly satisfied with the work being done by Prof. Ohern and Prof. Maylor, and we recomend that the salary of Prof. Ohern be retained at $\$ 1750.00$, and that the salary of Prof. Taylor be also rotained at $\$ 1250.00$ per year.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIOLOGY.
Your comaittce has inquired, especially, into the work being done by Prof. Dowd of this deartment. He has made the most remarkable showing. During the last scmester, he had a total onoll went of 144 in his classes. He taught seven classes, giving to the work 18 hours per meek.

We regard the work of this department to be such as requires more roading and personal research than most of the other departments. We find that Prof. Dowd, in addition to doingall this work in the most skillful and competent manner, has found the time to do a great deal of outside worl, and has made for himself a national reputa${ }^{2}$ ion in his department. Prof. Dowd is now receiving a salary of 2000.00 per year. Except for the reason that the finances of the institution are very limited, we would be glad to recomend an increase in the salary of Prof. Dowd, as a roward for the especially high class work which he is doing.

PHYSICAL CULTURE.
Prof. Darling of this Department gets a salary of $\$ 1500.00$, and wants a leave of absence of a year, as he desires to complete his course in medicine and then return to the University. We believe that his leave of absence should be given, without salary; that a substitute be employed for the ensuing year at a salary of $\$ 1250.00$ per year.

DEAN OF WOMEN.
Wiss Dora occupies the position of Dean of Women. ": hav interviewod ifiss Dora; she has been teaching sench, in addition to performing the duties of hor position. She draws a salary of $\$ 1600.00$ per year. We believe the salary is more than sufficient for the dutios which she is performing. However we areof the opinion that arrangements more beneficial and nore economical to the University could be made in this Department, and which the members of your committee will explain at the meeting of the Poard.

LAN DEPARTMENT.
We have interviewed Dr. Monnet, Dean of the Law Department, and we believe that the second
year of this Department should beestablished by the Board of Regents; that a professor should be employed, in addition to the Dean ard the instructor which we now have, at a salary of 2000.00 . We find that the dean of this department ought to have a stenographer to attend to his correspondence worl. It will require but a small part of the time of a stenographer. "e are catisfied that student in the law school could be omployed at a very s:all salary to do this work, and we recommend that the Dean of this Depertment be authorized and empowered to employ a stenographer to perform this service, at such a small and reasonable salary as can be arranged.

We find that the Department has quite a law library already established, to which will soon be added other books; that it is necessary to have some one to stay in the law library and look after the same. Ve believe that Dean Monett should be authorized and empowered to employ a student in this department to look after the library, or that he employ two students, if he so desires; that the salaries of the student: thus employed for said purpose shall not exceed $\$ 20.00$ per month.

Dean Nonett has advised us that the hssociation of the Anerican Law Schools meets at Chattanooga, and that he believes that the Lav Department should become affigiated with this Association; that the cost is nominal, bein only 10.00 per year. We recomnend that Dean Konett be sent as a delegate to this Associ tion from this University, at the expence of the University, and that he be authorized to have the Lsw Department of this University offiliated with that issociation.

## MEDICAL DEPARTMENT

$F_{0}$. the reason that a special committee of this Board has been appointed to arrange for the changes in the medical department, we have only to recomend, as we presume that committee will recomend, that the salery of the Dean be raised from 600.00 to a reasonable conpensation, commensurate with the duties which will be necessury for the Dean of that Department to perform. Your comittee is not fully advised as to what this salary ought to be, but suggests, wi thout reconmending, that it be fixed at $\$ 1500.00$ per year.

We are advised that the changes thus about to be put in the medical department will pat a great deal of extra work upon Dr. Capshaw, and we believe it would be proper to raise his salary from $\$ 1500.00$ to 1600.00 per year.

CURATOR OF IUSEUNL.
Prof. Stephens of the Alva Normal has appliod for the posit ion of Curator of the Museum and Professor of Vertebrate Zoology. It seem that Prof. Stephers, a few years ago,
made a trip to Alaska and he has a very valuable collection of specimens which he desires to sell to the University. It appears further that he is one of the best qualified men as professor of Vertebrate Zoology.

If the finances of the Institution are surficiert to justify the creation of this departmont, we believe it would add considerably to the advancement of the University and its popularity among those who visit the Institution.

PHYSICAL CULTURE FOR WOMEN.
Mrs. Guerrant is head of this Deportment, and has been drawing salary of 1000.00 per year. She has had an entirely too small amount or work to do to jut tify the continuance of this position as a separate position. lis. Guerrant has offered her resignation, and we recommend that, while the work which irs. Cuerrant did should be continued, that it should be either combined with the Department of Elocution, or that this work be given to the Lean of Women, or in some other manner included with the duties of some other professor or instructor, so as to make it less expensive to the University.

> ELOCUTION DEPARTMENT.

Miss Smith has resigned, and it wold be un vise to fix the salary for hersuccessor until her successor is first obtained and the duties of her position defined. Should it be found wise to give her the work heretofore done by hrs. Guerrant in physical culture, the salarr should be arranged accordingly.

## DEPARTMENt' OF EDUCATION.

At the last meeting of the Board of Regents, it was voted to create the department of education. This department $w 11$ embrace the work heretofore done by Prof. Erwin and Prof. Gard$n \in$, and will also inclu e instruction in the theory of teaching, and this department will be expected to give in traction ir Ab entia, and to look especial $y$ after the correspondence with the bligh Schools and prospective students, and the affiliation are closely of the High Schools to the University.

We are of the opinion that another posstion should be created to handle the extra work which should be given this department, and that the work be arranged, subdivided and the department $g$ governed as the board of Regents may elect to do.

Your committee does not desire to be understood by this recommendation as passing judgment, in any manner, upon the duties of the Pro ensor of Psychology, or his relation to the head of the Department of Education, or as to who should fill that position.

## DEPARTMENT OF BACTERIOLOGY.

Prof. Turley is head of this department, and receives a biliary of $\$ 1500.00$ per year, and his as istant, Artie Alden, receives a salary of \$900. 00. Prof. Turleyand his assistant appear to be doing very heavy work. Their work in the health department is very valuable and beneficial to the State at large. Prof. Hurley desires an increase of salary for himself and for dr. Alden. We dosire that the board seriously consider this request for raise in salary, although, at this time, your comittee is not in possession of sufficient informationto satisfy it in making the recommendation.

In general
Your comilittee has personally interviewed the heads of all the departments and a great number of the professors and instructors, in its effort to become personally acquainted with the members of the faculty and the work being done by then, the needs of their departments and the salaries which ought to be paid. We have been especially pleased and most favorably irapressed with the ability and standing of nearly all of those whom we have met. However, your committee is of the opinion that the work of the schools has been oo enlarged in the employmont of professors and instructors and in the arrangement of the departments that a much larger attendance of students could be cared. for as easily as the attendance which the school now has. We believe that in many of the departmints the professors and instructors have not * been allotted the amount of work which they could and ought to do. We believe that the attendance oi the school will so increase during the next year and immediate future that the school will grow into the proportions conmitered, and upon which the present arrangements have been based. We sure of the opinion that if the attendance is to remain no larger than it now is, that we should require a complete rearrangement of the departinents, fewer makers of the faulty and place more work upon those which remain. We believe, however, that if we were to so rearrange the departments and cut down the number of professors and instructors, that we would hardly get accustomed to this change until the increased attendance, for which we hope and in which we have the greatest faith, will require us to change back to the present arrangements. We believe that if the prese t arrangements, as recommended in our report, is maintained that it will not be necessary to employ any additional members of the faculty until the attendance is double what it now is.

In accordance with the foregoing paragraph, your comittee urges that the board take every powible step loo ing towards the properly advertisine of the schocl and a closer affiliation of the University with the righ Schools and other preparatory schools of the State, to the end that the attendance at this University may be cost materially increased. Te believe that the sare expense phaih we now maintain will properly educate and diffuse the learning to double the number who are now receiving it.

UNIVERSITY EXTENCION WORL.
It has been the practice in the past for the University to send its various professors and instruc ors out over the state upon lecture tours. This has been done with but little expense to the
$\therefore$ University. Prof. Keier is chairman of this department. Your comittee is of the opinion that the plan is wrong, and that this expense ought to be saved to the school. We believe that no one should be sent out to lecture for the school and to thus advance the University and attempt to build up it attendance, except those men who are qualified to appear before the people and deliver lectures that are pleasing to the common. poople and who have such i. personal magnetism and such an appearance as will make their addresses pleasing and ponular with the people. We believe that we have in the University faculty many a scholarly and learned man, who is thoroughly qulified to fill the positions which he holds in the University, end yet who would, if he appeared before a mixed audience of people in a rural district, be displeasing to the masses of the people and who mould fail to inspire in that class of people the confidence and admiration for the school which ought to be created, and which would be created by a man of even less learning who is better fifted in the art of public speaking and in advertising an educational institution.

For the above reasonc, we recomend that this work be re-arranged and placed ppon a different pooting and under a different plan.

In the foregoing report, we have referred to a number of professors and instructors, without making recormendations concerning their salaries. In all such instances, we $r$ cormend that the salaries, unless otherwise referred to herein, remain at the salaries which have been paid during this year.

Your committee regrets that it is necessary to report that lur. Hatchett, on account of sickness, has been unable to attenc the sessions of this committee, but, in accordance with Mr. Hatchett's request given us by wire, the remaining nembers of the committee have proceeded with the work and give you the benefit of their best judgment.

## FELLOWSHIPS.

We recommend that in accordance with the President's report, the Eoard authorize the creation of a very limited number of fellowships, which fellowships are to be employed only when in accordance with our previous rocomrendation, the nembers of the faculty beco e so heavily burdened with their labors as to make additional assistance necessary.

UNIVERSITY PRINTER.
We call attertion to the fact that the University printer has informed your committee that this department has op rated at a substantial loss, during the past year, and that it will probably have a sililar experience in the future.

COMTITEE WORK.
We desire to call especial attention to the fact that the variaus members of the faculty have asked your comittce to give them credit for a ereat deal of time devoted to comattoc work. We belleve that in a large majority of cases the cormittee work is so light that it is but a very mall factor. However, a few members of the faculty seem to be doing more than their part of this outside work, and we believe that other Gembers of the faculty might well be notified that they are not doing their full part of these extra duties.
(In addition to the above report the chairman of the committee nade a verbal suggestion that an additional teacher in the preparatory school be employed.)
