## SPECIAL METTING OF THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA

JANUARY 24, 1911.

The special meeting of the Regents of the University of Oklahoma was called to order at the office of Governor Gruce in Oklahoma City at 11:40 a. m. by the Governor.

Present, Governor Cruce, Mesars. Rowsey, Hatchett, Betty, Perry, Gordon, Linebaugh, and Nelson. J. F. Warren of Oglahoma City, the newly appointed regent, took the oath of office and assumed his position on the Board.

The reorganization of the Board was first taken up. On notion by Linebaugh seconded by Rowsey, Mr. Cruce was elected temporary chairman. Mr. Hatchett was nominated for the position of President of the Board by Mr. Linebaugh. Mr. Rowsey was nominated by Mr. Helson. Mr. Linebaugh then withdrew his nomination of Mr. Hatchett with the latter's consent. On motion by Perry seconded by Betty the nominations closed and Mr. Rowsey was declared elected President of the Board by acclemation.

Hominstions for Secretary of the Board were next celled for. Mr. Betty nominated Mr. Hatchett and the Howed by Betty, seconded by Linebaugh that the temporary meeting come to a close and the Regards adjourn to meet at once. Carried, and the meeting was called to order by Chairman Rowsey. Present, same as before except Governor Cruce who was excused.

President Fyans reported that the special business which was to be attended to aside from the reorganization of the Board was the matter of appropriations needed for the next blennium. Estimates of the expenses of the University for the next two gears were presented by President Twans as follows:

After some discussion of these recommendations the Board adjourned to met at the Tee Huckins Hotel. Session called to order at Tee Huckins Dotel, 12:45 p. m., same members present as at morning session.

The relignation of T. J. Brockway, Instructor in "sychology, was presented. Noved by Matchett, seconded by "erry, that the resignation be accepted. Carried.

A motion was made by Retchett, seconded by Warron, that President Tyens be instructed to provide for the work of Mr. Brockway, distributing it among professors now at the University, without extra pay. An amondment to this motion was offered by Linebaugh, seconded by Nelson, that the matter be left to President Evans to get the work done for the rest of the scholastic year at a cost not to exceed \$50.00 per month. On vote, the amondment was lost and the motion as originally stated carried.

Attorneys Ben Williams of Dorman and W. Fulton of Oklahova City appeared before the Board to report on the case brought by the Begents which had been pending in the Supreme Court of the State. Hr. Williams stated that he had been employed by J. D. Lydick of the Board of Begents and that he had been so employed to represent the Poard of Begents in the matter of its suit in the Supreme Court involving the validity and construction of the 1909 biennial appropriation bill, and that he had engaged Nr. Fulton to

assist him in the case. Each of these men stated that

they were to receive no fee unless they were successful in sustaining the University's contention in said suit; that the Board of Regents did not owe them anything as the case had gone against the University; and that the Regents were under no obligation to pay them anything; that they thought, however, that their services were a benefit to the University and other state institutions so that they desired a recommendation from the Regents to the tegislature so that they might obtain an appropriation from the Legislature covering their fees for services rendered.

After some discussion a resolution was presented by Hetchett, seconded by Helson, as follows:

WHEREAS, in the summer of 1910 an errangement was made with Dr. Ben Williams of Norman, Oklahoma, by a member of this Board of Regents, J. D. Lydick, Esq., to represent the Regents of the University in certain litigation before the Supreme Court of Oklahorn involving the construction and wilidity of the appropriation bill passed by the Legis lature of the State of Oklahoma in 1909; and.

WHEREAS, it is stated by Hr. Williams that he employed Judge H. Fulton of Oklahoms City to essist him in said cause and that it was the understand that if the Board of Regents failed in their suit before the Suprem Court that then the Board Was under no moral or legal obligation to pay them any fee or remuneration in any matter whotever, and,

WHENEMAS, said litigation has resulted adversely to the Board and the Board Seels that while it owns these gentlemen nothing, that their services in conducting said litigation and in drawing cortain appropriation bills have been worth something to the University.

THURSPORE, BE IT REPOLVED, that the proper officers of this Board tender to these gentlemen the sum of \$500 in payment of their services for any work or labor performed by them in said suit and in said litigation and in drawing said appropriation bills, and that this offer is made to these gentlemen with the distinct understanding that the Board is under no legal or moral obligations to pay them anything,

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Board of Regents that we decline to make any recommendation to the Legislature for the payment by the Legislature to these gentlemen of any sume whatsoever,

AND BE TE FURETER TOSOLVED, that this \$300 shall be paid out of any available funds which the University now has or may hereafter receive out of which the same may be legally paid.

The resolution as made was duly carried.

Nowed by Linebaugh, seconded by Betty, that the matter of the appropriations be referred back to the

Consittee on Appropriations. Carried.

Noved by Warren, seconded by Relson, that the Board recommend that Dr. Gordon attend the meeting of the Association of American Medical Colleges in Chicago February 27th and 28th with President Evans and that expenses of both be paid by the University. Carried.

Moved by Linebaugh, seconded by Helson, that the special consister on appropriations from the Board be instructed to ask the Ingislature to appropriate insteed of \$25,000 for the School of Medicine in Orlahoma City, 375,000 to be used by the Board of Regents in securing a site and putting up buildings. as far as this amount will go; that the appropriation of \$150,000 for a law building bd divided and \$75,000 be used for law and \$75,000 for medical work, and that the Board of Regents request that the last two years instruction in medical work be located in Oxlahave city, and that this committee on Appropriations be instructed to say to the Cosmittee on Appropriations of the Legislature that it is the belief of the Board of Regents that \$75,000 is sufficient for the law building of the University. Carried.

Moved by Betty, seconded by Gordon, that the mileage and per diem and expenses of those atlending this session of the Begents be allowed and paid. Carried.



Notion was made by Linebaugh duly seconded by Hatchett that the President of the Board appoint "such committees as me required by law. Carried. President Rowsey as ad until the next regular meeting of the Regents to announce new committees, which request was greated.

On motion the meeting adjourned.
