The State Board of Education met at 9:00 o'clock. The members present vere Messrs. Duff, Fite, Potterf and Hester.

On motion by Mr. Hester seconded by Dr. Fite, Mr. Duff was elected Chairman in the absence of President Wilson.

The Secretary presented the sealed proposals of the book companies offering text books, maps, charts, globes and other apparatus for adoption by the State Board of Education in the common schools of Oklahoma and a list of the isposits of the several companies with the State Treasurer.

Ruby Canton, Librarian, leave of absence to September 1st, to do library work in the University of Wisconsin. Salary to be paid during the months of July and August.
