MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION December 12, 1917.

Members present: Messrs. Wilson, Ralls, Brewer, Sandlin, Hill and Shapler and Dr. Rite.

Recommendations from President J. W. Graves of the Central State Mormal were presented as follows:

- That the resignation of Beulah Rickard, Assistant Instructor in Science, be accepted.
 Approved on motion by Dr. Brewer, seconded by Mr. Ralls.
- 2. That Mrs. J. C. Davis be elected Assistant Instructor in Science at \$720 per year with \$1100 per year if her full time be needed in the summer term.

 Action deferred.
- 3. That the Instructor in Piano at the Central State Normal be allowed to increase the fees charged for Piano lessons.

 Action deferred.
- 4. That \$10,000 be transferred from the salary fund of the Central State Normal to the fund for support and maintenance other than salaries.

 Action deferred.

President Stratton D. Brooks of the University of Oklahoma appeared before the Board and presented the following recommendations:

- 1 (497) That indefinite leave of absence, without pay, be granted to the following persons for military service:
 - R. M. Howard, Associate Professor of Surgery;
 F. B. Sorgatz, Associate Professor of Clinical Pathology and Microscopy;
 - F. J. Bolend, Assistant Professor of Medicine; Rex Bolend, Assistant Professor of G. U. Diseases and Syphilology;
 - G. D. McLean, Instructor in Surgery; George Hunter, Instructor in Obstetrics;
 - F. M. Sanger, Instructor in Gynecology;
 - M. M. Roland, Instructor in Dermatology, Electro Therapy, and Radiography;
 - Clarence V. Nichols, Instructor in Pharmacy, to date from January 1, 1918.

Approved.

2 - (498) The appointment of Dr. A. B. Chase to the position of Instructor in Therapeutics, to date from September 1, 1917, at the salary fixed by the schedule for his rank.

Approved.

3 - (499) I desire to report that the following high schools have complied with all the conditions necessary to become fully accredited schools with the University of Oklahoma, and are therefore entitled to operate as independent districts:

> Drummond High School, and halfer a Oksene High School, Tonkawa High School, To the transfer to Hitchcock High School. Approved.

4 - (500) I desire to report that Adolph Linscheid, appointed to the position of Assistant Professor of English and Debating Coach, declined to accept the appointment.

Ordered filed.

5 - (501) I desire to report that on November 26, 1917, I accepted the resignation of W. E. Dresser, janitor in the library and parkrow buildings. Mr. Dresser died two weeks later.

ADDIOVed.

- 6 (502) Subject to your approval I have appointed Alec Cowan as jamitor in the library and park-row buildings, to date from : November 24, 1917, to July 1, 1918, at the rate of \$780 per amum. Approved.
- 7 (503) I recommend that Helen Phipps, Instructor in Spanish, be granted leave of absence from January 20, 1918, to September 1, Approved. - 1918, without pay.
- 8 (504) I recommend that the regulation prohibiting the employment of two members of the same family be suspended to permit the appointment of Miss Ruth Mansfield as student stenographer in the law school. This recommendation is made because Mr. Kneeland, who now holds the position, has left to enter military service and no other qualified stenographer is available.

Approved.

9 - (505) In accordance with your request I desire to make the following report with reference to extension work among the miners: I am of the opinion that if this work is undertaken under the general supervision of the University, it should be placed in general charge of someone who will supervise and direct various centers. Each of these centers, in turn, will consist of as many classes as can be established. These classes should be located as near as possible to the residences of the men attending the classes. Since a considerable portion of the work is of elementary grade, local teachers can be secured. It is doubtful that a sufficient number of applicants in a single place can be secured to render profitable the conducting of advanced courses. Such courses may, however, be readily provided by means of correspondence Ordered filed. courses.

10- (506) I desire to report that Lawrence Nelson Morgan, who was granted indefinite leave of absence for military service, returned to his position as Assistant Professor of English, on December 1, 1917.

Ordered filed.

- 11 (507) The Advisory Council of the University of Oklahoma recommends that beginning with the second semester (Feb. 1, 1918) military drill with a minimum of three hours per week be made compulsory for all first and second year male students, subject to such exemptions, regulations and provisions as the Council may from time to time establish.

 Approved on motion by Mr. Sandlin, seconded by Dr. Fite.
- 12 (508) I desire to report that a considerable number of students find that their services to the Government in various positions would be materially improved if they had some knowledge of shorthand and typewriting. I recommend, therefore, that there be established, beginning January 1, 1918, special courses in stenography and typewriting, and allied clerical subjects, under such conditions as the Advisory Council may approve.

 Approved on motion by Mr. Sendlin, seconded by Dr. Brewer.

President J. M. Gordon of the East Central State Normal appeared before the Board and spoke concerning an appropriation for purchasing additional land adjoining the campus at Ada.

On motion by Mr. Hill, seconded by Dr. Brewer, a committee of three was appointed to take up the matter of purchasing such additional land at Ada with the State Board of Public Affairs. Mr. Wilson appointed Mr. Hill, Dr. Fite and Mr. Sandlin.

Mr. Ralls, appointed as a special committee to visit Ada and investigate the necessity of repairing the gymmasium of the East Central State Normal, made an oral report and recommended that an appropriation of \$850 be made for such purpose.

On motion the requisition was approved.

President Gordon recommended that he be authorized to employ an additional critic teacher at a salary of \$1000 per year if such employment seems necessary after the winter term is fully organized.

The recommendation was approved on motion by Mr. Sandlin, seconded by Dr. Brewer.

On motion by Mr. Sandlin, seconded by Mr. Ralls, President Gordon's recommendation that the head janitor's salary be raised from \$75 a month to \$1000 a year, beginning December 1, was approved.

Supt. 0. W. Stewart of the School for the Blind appeared before the Board and presented the following matters:

1. He spoke concerning the rules for admission of pupils to the School for the Blind and explained the action of some of the counties sending children to the institution. He stated that his purpose was to follow strictly the law providing for admission of pupils, requiring all counties to meet such requirements.

Approved.

2. Informing the Board of the resignation of J. K. Miller, Instructor in the seventh and eighth grades who resigned to enter military service.

On motion by Dr. Brewer, seconded by Mr. Ralls, Mrs. O. W. Stewart was elected substitute for Mr. Miller until such time as a competent instructor may be secured. All voted aye.

A. C. Elliott of Jenks, Oklahoma, appeared before the Board. The charges against Elliott were presented, together with a communication from the attorneys of the Jenks Board of Education withdrawing the charges.

On motion by Mr. Ralls, seconded by Mr. Hill, the appointment of a committee of one was authorized to hear the charges in the Elliott matter at Jenks, the committee to have the power to summon witnesses, employ a stenographer and take testimony, a report of the findings to be made to the Board at its next meeting.

President J. B. Eskridge of the Southwestern State Normal appeared before the Board and presented the following recommendations:

- 1. That salaries of \$25 a month be allowed to the violin and expression teachers for additional work in the Normal, the feas received by said instructors not being sufficient remuneration for services rendered. The recommendation was disallowed on motion by Mr. Sandlin, seconded by Mr. Hill.
- 2. That the Board-authorize the purchase of a machine belonging to F. H. McCrea now being used in the manual training department of the Southwestern State Normal.

 No action was taken.
- 3. That the employment of a fireman to keep the fires burning at night during the cold weather be authorized.

 Approved on motion by Mr. Sandlin, seconded by Mr. Ralls, Mr. Wilson voting no.

A communication was presented from Mrs. John Littlefield of Ft. Smith, Arkansas, concerning her desire to secure Delia Wilson, inmate of the State Home.

On motion by Mr. Balls, seconded by Mr. Sandlin, the Secretary

was instructed to notify Mr. Gardner that the Board waived the matter of residence in this case and would approve Mrs. Littlefield's application if there are no other reasons for refusing her request.

The Board recessed until two o'clock.

Afternoon Session.

All members present.

Senator John Golobie appeared before the Board presenting the application of the Catholic College of Oklahoma for Young Women for authority to grant degrees under the provisions of Chapter 147, Session Laws of 1917, also the application of this institution for the approval of its course of study in order that its graduates may receive state certificates as provided in Chapter 66 of the Session Laws of 1915.

Mr. Sandlin presented the following resolution:

"BE IT RESOLVED by the State Board of Education of Oklahoma that the Catholic College of Oklahoma for Young Women, located at Guthrie, Oklahoma, be approved and granted authority to grant academic and professional degrees to graduates of said institution such as are usually granted to graduates of institutions of collegiate rank, and said institution is given the same rank as colleges named in Section 1, Chapter 147, Session Laws of 1917."

Adopted on motion by Mr. Sendlin, seconded by Mr. Hill.

Action on the application of the Catholic College of Oklahoma for Young Women for approval of its course of study, under Chapter 66 of the Session Laws of 1915, was deferred.

A communication from S. O. Henshaw, County Superintendent of Creek County, Oklahoma, asking for the transfer of Creek County to the Northeastern State Normal School District, was presented.

On motion the Secretary was instructed to write Superintendent Henshaw giving him information concerning the requirements of attendance at the Normal Schools in the different districts.

A communication was presented from President G. W. Gable withdrawing his recommendation that the resignation of J. H. Combs be accepted by the Board and recommending that Mr. Combs be summarily dismissed for acts unbecoming a member of the faculty of the Northeastern State Normal.

On motion by Mr. Sandlin, seconded by Mr. Ralls, the resignation of J. H. Combs was rejected and he was summarily dismissed as instructor in the Northeastern State Normal, as of November 14, 1917.

A communication from Governor R. L. Williams concerning the loyalty of James Rothenberger, Instructor in the Central State Normal, was presented trogether with a copy of a letter from Pres. J. W. Graves to the Governor.

On motion by Mr. Hill, seconded by Mr. Ralls, Mr. Sandlin was appointed to visit Edmond and investigate the charges against Professor Rothenberger.

Mr. J. M. Aydelotte and Mr. A. N. Leecraft of the Board of Public Affairs appeared and discussed the purchasing of additional land at the East Central State Normal.

On motion by Mr. Sandlin, seconded by Dr. Fite, Mr. Hill was appointed as a member of the committee to act in conjunction with Mr. Ayaslotte and President Gordon in conferring with the Governor concerning the purchase of additional land at Ada.

The Segretary was instructed to send letters to the heads of all institutions under the control of the Board, authorizing them to employ additional help, if necessary, to keep the buildings heated at night where there is danger of pipes freezing.

Mr. Wilson announced the appointment of Mr. Ralls as a committee of one to hold an investigation of the charges against A. C. Elliott of Jenks.

President J. W. Graves appeared before the Board and spoke concerning his recommendation to transfer \$10,000 from the salary fund to the fund for support and maintenance other than salaries.

On motion by Mr. Sandlin, seconded by Mr. Hill, the Board ordered the transfer of such amount and authorized the President and Secretary to sign a proper resolution in conjunction with the State Board of Public Affairs.

A communication was read from Superintendent W. W. Pierce of the West Oklahoma Home concerning the condition of Gladys Nelson, paralytic, left at his institution by the sheriff of Jackson County on November 10th.

On motion by Mr. Ralls, seconded by Dr. Fite, Superintendent Pierce was instructed to return Gladys Nelson to Jackson County, as she is not entitled to admission to the Home under the laws of Oklahoma.

On motion by Mr. Ralls, seconded by Mr. Shepler, Mrs. J. C. Davis was elected Laboratory Assistant in the Central State Normal at a salary of \$720 per year, with \$1100 per year if full time is required during the summer term.

On motion by Mr. Ralls, seconded by Mr. Brewer, the requisition of President J. W. Graves for an Edison dictating machine with equipment, in amount \$305, was approved.

Frank Buck of the Macmillan Company appeared before the Board and presented copies of "Everyday Classic Readers" for the third, fourth, fifth and sixth grades, and asked that the Board approve such readers in order that they might be used in the training schools of the State Normals.

On motion by Mr. Ralls, seconded by Mr. Shepler, "Everyday Classic Readers" for the third, fourth, fifth and sixth grades were approved...

A communication was read from the Governor concerning the placing in the State Depository all moneys received by Presidents and Financial Secretaries of the State Institutions.

The following resolution was introduced by Mr. Sandlin:

*WHEREAS, Section 2, Chapter 238, Session Laws of 1915, provides that it shall be the duty of each and every state officer, state board, state commission and all members and employees of either thereof, to deposit in the official depository designated by Section 1, said Chapter 238, all moneys, checks, drafts, orders, vouchers, funds, rentals, panalties, costs, proceeds of sale of property, fees, fines, forfeitures and public charges of every kind received or collected by virtue or under color of office.

"AND WHEREAS, Section 9 of said Chapter 238 provides as follows: *Any official or employee thereof or any member or employee of any state board or state commission who shall fail, neglect or refuse to comply with the requirements of Section two (2) hereof, or any other provision of this act, shall forfeit and pay to the use of the State of Oklahoma the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) per day for each and every day that he shall so fail, neglect or refuse to comply with requirements of said act, and shall forfeit and be removed from office; and any such official who shall issue, sign. . attest or utter any false or illegal voucher against any moneys deposited, as in this act provided, shall be liable to the state or his official bond for a sum double in amount of any such illegal or fraudulent voucher, and shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in the sum of not less than one hundred (\$100) dollars nor more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) and by imprisonment in the State Penitentiary for a term of not less than one nore more than five years."

"THEREFORE, be it resolved by the State Board of Education of Oklahoma that the President or Superintendent of each and every Institution under the jurisdiction of said Board and each and every chief clerk, secretary, or financial clerk of said Institutions be required to deposit in the State Depository all funds, moneys, checks, drafts, orders, vouchers, fimds, rentals, penalties, costs,

proceeds of sale of property, fees, fines, forfeitures and public charges of every kind received or collected by any such president, superintendent, secretary, chief clerk, or financial agent, by virtue or color of his office, position or trust, that such funds be deposited only in depository banks under the direction of the State Treasurer and to the credit of the State Treasurer, and in no case in any private bank.

*BE IT MURTHER RESOLVED by the State Board of Education of Oklahoms that a copy of the foregoing resolution be sent to the president or superintendent, secretary, chief clerk, or financial agent of all such institutions to the end that all such employees of the State Board of Education may take notice of the requirements of the said depository law, the pains and penalties thereof, and govern themselves accordingly."

On motion by Mr. Balls, seconded by Dr. Fite, the resolution was adopted.

A communication from Superintendent Neil B. Gardner of the State Home, concerning Henry McPherson and Wilson Orr, incorrigibles, was presented.

The following resolution was introduced:

"BE IT RESOLVED, that whereas Henry McPherson, committed to the Oklahoma State Home from Bryan County, Oklahoma, on April 5, 1915, and Wilson Orr, committed to the Oklahoma State Home from Sequoyah County, Oklahoma, on December 9, 1915, are, by reason of vicious havits and incorrigibility unfit to be placed or retained in family homes, the State Board of Education, under the provisions of Section 702, Article 1, Chapter 68, Revised Laws of Oklahoma, 1910, order that said Henry McPherson and Wilson Orr be returned to their respective counties and that the guardianship of said Board shall cease upon the aforesaid persons becoming charges of the counties from which they were sent."

The resolution was adopted on motion by Mr. Hill, seconded by Mr. Ralls.

A communication from R.E. Braden concerning his salary for the next year as Engineer at the State Training School was, on motion, referred to Superintendent Gossam.

The Board recessed until 9:00 o'clock, Thursday, December 13, 1917

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION December 13, 1917.

Morning Session.

All members present.

The minutes of the meeting of the State Board of Education on November 6th were approved.

A communication was read from Superintendent Blattmer asking permission to expend the balance of the \$600 allowed for a janitor and assistant engineer, his purpose being to employ a man to assist the engineer and janitor, at \$60 per month.

On motion by Mr. Hill, seconded by Mr. Ralls, permission was granted to expend the balance of the \$600 allowed for: the purpose of hiring an assistant engineer and janitor.

A communication was read from Superintendent E. S. Monroe of Muskogee concerning the use of the adopted system of Penmanship in the Muskogee schools, stating that the city of Muskogee was complying with the uniform text book law in using these books.

The communication was ordered filed.

A communication was read from Honorable P. P. Claxton, Commissioner of Education, concerning the time of the adoption of text books and the thickness of the paper used.

The communication was ordered filed.

Communications and recommendations of President J. M. Marquess were presented as follows:

- 1. The report of the work being done at the C. A. & N. University in the way of repairs, construction, etc., was presented and ordered filed.
- 2. A requisition for the employment of labor on the farm, esc., in amount \$425, was presented and, on motion by Mr. Ralls, seconded by Dr. Fite, the Secretary was instructed to return the requisition to President Marquess and ask that an itemized statement of the items of labor, which this requisition is intended to cover, be included with the requisition.
- 3. A requisition for electrical supplies was presented. On motion by Mr. Ralls, seconded by Dr. Fite, it was ordered returned to Pres. Marquess with the request that he explain the necessity for such equipment and to indicate to the Board whether or not there are fixtures in the institution that can be used for the same purpose as the material indicated in the requisition.

- 4. On motion by Mr. Ralls, seconded by Dr. Fite, requisition for material for laundry tubs, \$22.37, and repairing damages to the president's residence, not to exceed \$50, was approved.
- 5. That the appointment of Marea L. Overstreet as Instructor of Vocal Music, at a salary of \$60 per month, be approved.

 Approved on motion by Mr. Balls, seconded by Dr. Fite.
- 5. That R. Benton Bingam be elected Superintendent of Industries at \$1200 per year. Approved on notion by Mr. Balls, seconded by Mr. Hill.
- 7. That President Marquess be permitted to devote some time to the promotion of an entertainment for the purpose of raising a recreation fund for the drafted Negro boys at Camp Sherman.

 Approved on motion by Mr. Hill, seconded by Dr. Brewer.
- 8. That President Marquess be permitted to attend the Farmers' and Industrial Conference at Tuskegee Institute in January.

 Approved on motion by Mr. Hill, seconded by Dr. Brower.
- 9. That President Marquess be anthorized to expend not to exceed \$125 for each of the months of December, January and February for farm labor, with the understanding that he furnish an itemized monthly statement showing the amounts expended for such purpose.

 Approved on motion by Mr. Hill, seconded by Mr. Ralls.

On motion by Mr. Hill, seconded by Mr. Balls, the proposal of the Union School Furnishing Company of Chicago was approved.

Mr. Hill presented the following resolution:

"WHEREAS it has been the custom of the State Board of Education, acting as the State Text Book Commission, to make adoptions of text books for the use of the common schools of the State of Oklahoma some time during the calendar year in which existing contracts expire,

"THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that adoptions of books for use in the common schools of this state, the contracts for which expire during the year 1919, be made not earlier than January 1, 1919."

On motion by Mr. Hill, seconded by Mr. Ralls, the resolution was adopted. Voting aye: Mr. Hill, Mr. Ralls, Mr. Shepler, Dr. Fite and Dr. Brewer. Voting no: Mr. Sandlin and Mr. Wilson.

On motion by Mr. Ralls, seconded by Dr. Fite, the Normal Schools of Oklahoma were authorized to put in courses in stenography, typewriting and bookkeeping, provided that they have sufficient funds for such purpose; the salaries of the instructors to be fixed at not to exceed \$100 per month for women and \$116.67 for men, the President of the Board being authorized to approve nominations of teachers and requisitions for necessary equipment.

The motion carried. Voting aye: Mr. Ralls, Mr. Hill, Dr. Fite, Mr. Shepler and Mr. Brewer. Voting no: Mr. Sandlin and Mr. Wilson.

It was moved by Mr. Ralls, seconded by Mr. Hill, that upon the receipt of a nomination from any superintendent or president of a state institution, which nomination is required by the rule of the Board to be accompanied by endorsements and recommendations from persons having knowledge of the work of the one nominated, where such president or superintendent fails to file such testimonials or endorsements with the nomination, the Secretary of the Board shall immediately return such nomination to the president or superintendent, notifying him that no consideration will be given the nomination until it is accompanied by the aforesaid endorsements and testimonials; provided, also, that nominations shall not be made by a president or superintendent in person unless written nominations shall be properly filed by such president or superintendent with all requirements met as aforesaid.

The motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Sandlin, seconded by Mr. Balls, that all presidents of institutions under the direction of the State Board of Education be instructed to send forthwith to the Secretary of the State Board of Education recommendations of all teachers and instructors employed in such institutions if the same are not now on file in the office of the State Board of Education.

The motion carried.

The claim of J. B. Eskridge, Junior, for salary as substitute secretary-registrar of the Southwestern State Normal, was disapproved on motion by Mr. Ralls, seconded by Mr. Sandlin.

On motion by Mr. Hill, seconded by Mr. Ralls, Secretary S. M. Barrett of the State Board of Vocational Education was elected Director, without salary, of the Extension work in the School of Mines in the coal, and zinc and lead fields, Mr. Barrett being directed to organize such work and to make all appointments of instructors necessary in carrying on this work, subject to the approval of the State Board of Education, the expenditures for carrying on such extension work to be divided equally between the State Board of Education and the State Vocational Education Board.

The motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Balls, seconded by Mr. Hill, that all claims now on file for services rendered or expenses incurred in conducting the extension courses in the lead, and zinc and coal fields be disallowed on account of the passing of the resolution of the State Board of Education on June 28, 1917, declaring all places in the School of Mines at Wilburton vacant.

The motion carried, Mr. Wilson voting no.

On motion by Mr. Balls, seconded by Mr. Hill, the Secretary was instructed to return all claims and requisitions that do not meet the requirements of the State Board of Education as to explanation, itemizing, and attaching of receipts, immediately upon receiving such claims or requisitions.

The motion carried.

On motion by Mr. Ralls, seconded by Mr. Hill, the Secretary was instructed to write President J. M. Gordon that the instructor in Penmanship in the East Central State Normal was not using the adopted system of Penmanship and to request him to see immediately that the resolution of the State Board of Education requiring the use of the adopted texts is carried into effect.

The Board adjourned to meet at the call of the President.
