BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA

A meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Oklahoma was held on Tuesday, June 7, 1932, at 2 p. me, in the office of the President of the University, Norman, Oklahoma.

Regent Bowman, president of the board, presided; ethers present: Regents Hatchett, Tolbert, Milburn, Rosser, Looney.

The minutes of the meeting held on Wednesday, March 50, 1932, approved as read.

President Bizzell presented the annual report for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1931 and ending June 30, 1932, and discussed the various phases of the report. The report was accepted and approved.

President Bizzell made the following recommendations, the action in each case being as indicated:

That the previous action fixing the salary of B. A. Dillard, Auditor in the University Hospital, at \$150.00 per month, to date from April 1, 1932, be rescinded and that his salary be fixed at that rate beginning May 1, 1932, and until otherwise ordered by the Board.

That the rank and title of Dr. John Evans Heatley now Associate
Professor of Radiology be changed to that of Professor of Diagnostic Radiology
without change in salary, effective September 1, 1932:

That the title of Dr. Everett Samuel Lain now Professor of Dermatology, Electrotherapy, and Radiology be changed to that of Professor of Dermatology and Radio-Therapy without change in salary, effective September 1, 1932.

Approved.

That the non-resident fee for the summer school in the School of Medicine at Oklahoma City be fixed at the rate of \$50.00, effective at the beginning of the summer school on June 8, 1932 and until otherwise ordered by the Board, this fee to be in addition to the regular course and laboratory fees previously approved.

That beginning with the fail semester of 1932 the deposit of ten dollars (\$10.00) for Military Science be made to cover also the cost of shoes, which has formerly been fixed at four dollars (\$4.00), this being in addition to the regular ten-dollar deposit.

Approved.

Also, that the following fees be changed:

That Dr. F. A. Balyeat, Associate Professor of Secondary Education be permitted to continue in the cooperative arrangement with the city schools at Oklahoma City on one-fourth time basis, and that one-fourth of his salary in the University, \$700.00, be deducted, fixing his total salary on a three-fourths time basis in the University, at the rate of \$2,150.00.

That F. C. Dickinson be appointed Janitor in the University Library, effective April 1, 1932, at a salary of \$100.00 per month.

Approved.

That leaves of absence without pay be granted the following:

President Bizzell submitted a list of employees in the University, including fiscal office, the book exchange, athletic department, the Medical School and Hospitals at Oklahoma City, showing the amount of surety bonds in effect.

President Bizzell was instructed to make some investigation regarding the reliability of bonding companies, and it was suggested that the larger bonds be split up and distributed among several companies with a maximum of \$5,000 each.

President Bizmell presented rules and regulations of the University Housing Committee governing the approval of rooming houses for students enrolled in the University. It was the sense of the Board that matters of this kind should be left to the discretion of university officials.

President Bizzell discussed the University's cooperation with the Oklahoma Municipal League. He explained that for the past two years the University had employed Roy Eaton as instructor in government on a part time basis but that practically all of his time had been given to League work; that he was expecting to devote allof his time in the future to field work for the League since with the reductions in all departments his time would not be required in the department of government, President Bizzell reported also that there had been some friction between the officers of the League, Professor Alley, head of the department of government, and Mr. Eaton.

It was the sense of the board that since the University would be operating on a very close margin due to reductions in the budget, and since Mr. Eaton's services would not be required for teaching, his services with the League, so far as the university funds were concerned, be discontinued at the end of his present contract - June 1, 1932. President Bizzell concurred, and recommended that Mr. Eaton be not employed for the next school year. The recommendation was approved.

President Bizzell presented the appointments in the University Hospital and the Crippled Children's Hospital, Oklahoma City, action on these appointments having been deferred at the meeting on March 30. After some discussion the appointments were approved, with the understanding that there be no increases in salaries for any employees unless there were special cases involving additional duties, and that in all such cases President Bizzell make an investigation to determine the facts.

President Bizzell presented the budget of the department of physical education, and the coaching staff in athletics, action on this part of the budget having been deferred at the meeting on March 30. He submitted also the report of special committee consisting of Regents Milburn, Molbert, and Rosser, appointed at the meeting on March 30, to investigate certain official acts of Mr. Ben Ge. Owen, atathexamutingxamxMarchx30;xtaxiaxamti Director of Athletics. The report was as follows:

*We, your committed appointed to investigate certain official acts of Ben G. Owen, Director of Athletics of the University of Oklahoma, beg leave to report, as follows:

We took, with the assistance of an official reporter, the testimony of various and sundry persons at Oklahoma City and Norman, Oklahoma, on March 30, 1932 and March 51, 1932.

We find no evidence of intentional wrongdoing. Certain miner irregularities were brought out which have been satisfactorily explained.

We recommend that the President of the University be requested to discuss with the Athletic Council the submission to this board of the Council's recommendations as to any measures that may be necessary to bring about a more systematic and business like administration of the

of the affairs of said department.

The salary of Mr. Owen was reported as \$3,230 from state funds and \$2,875 from the athletic association, making a total of \$6,105.00. It was moved, and duly seconded, that Mr. Owen's salary be fixed at \$4,200.00, that \$1,375 be paid from state funds. A vote was taken on the motion but failing to secure a majority vote of the board, the chair rules the motion lost. A motion was then made to fix Mr. Owen's total salary at \$5,000, \$2125 from state funds and \$2,875 from athletic funds. The motion was duly seconded and on a vote carried. The other appointments in the department of physical education, and athletics, were also approved at the amounts specified.

President Bizzell submitted summaries as follows:

Regent Rosser suggested a possible reduction in the number of employees in the power plant. President Bizzell stated he felt the plant was being economically operated but that he would be glad to make further investigation, and if possible, reduce the number of employees. The president was authorized to take such action as conditions might warrant.

Regent Bowman, President of the Board, asked that the question with reference to Mr. Craven's activities as reported to several members of the board on numerous occasions. After some discussion it was voted to discontinue the services of Mr. Craven at the end of the current fiscal year - June 30, 1932. Following this action President Bizzell recommended that Howard G. Jensen, landscape gardener at the University Hospital, be appointed in Mr. Craven's position. He stated that he thought Mr. Jensen would be willing to come to Norman at considerably less than Mr. Craven is now receiving, but that he had not had an opportunity to consult with him concerning the matter. President Bizzell was authorized to employ Mr. Jensen, and to fix the salary at not to exceed \$2,100 per annum.

Regent Hatchett made inquiry concerning the extension work in Dental Education, for which an appropriation had been made in the Thirteenth Legislature. He expressed disapproval of the program if it fellowed the plan asoutlined in some printed circulars that had come to his attention. President Bizzell was instructed to make an investigation of the matter, and that unless the work undertaken was in line with the proposals to the Legislature, the work be discontinued.

President Bizzell was authorized to notify all appointees, and to send contracts, but with the understanding that should contingencies arise during the fiscal year which might make it necessary to reduce salaries further, this might be done without a violation of a contract at a specific salary.

President Bizzell presented a petition from Alpha Omicron Pi - social sorority - to maintain its identity as a chapter during the next school year while living in the University Residence Halls. It was the sense of the Board it is not desirable to have a separate group in the Residence Halls and President Bizzell was instructed to notify those concerned accordingly.

On motion adjourned.
