# MINUTES OF THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA Wednesday, July 13, 1949 10:00 a.m.

The Regents met in regular session on Wednesday, July 13, 1949, at 10:00 a.m. in the office of the President of the University, Norman.

There were present the following: Regent Emery, president, presiding; McBride, Shepler, Benedum, Morgan, White. Regent Kent Shartel, appointed on June 24, 1949, to March 29, 1955, arrived for the afternoon session.

The minutes of the special meeting held on Wednesday, June 29 were approved.

President Cross requested permission to present several matters which were not included in the agenda mailed to the Regents, and it was the sense of the Regents that he proceed with these items.

### ITEM I.

President Cross presented the blue prints and specifications for the additions to the Oklahoma Memorial Union Building. He stated the Board of Governors had approved the plans as presented by Tom Sorey, Architect, at a meeting held on Tuesday evening, July 12, and that these plans were being presented to the Regents for consideration and action. If approved by the Regents then bids are to be called for to be opened on Thursday, August 18. Regent Emery, ex-officio a member of the Board of Governors attended the meeting on Tuesday.

Regent Emery stated that he has complete confidence in Mr. Sorey and as a member of the Board of Governors voted to approve the plans, and that he would likewise move, as a member of the Board of Regents, that the plans be approved.

It was unanimously voted to approve the plans for the additions to the Oklahoma Memorial Union Building.

ITEM II.

The Speech and Hearing Clinic on the Oklahoma City campus is in need of additional space as reported by Dr. John W. Keys, Director. Mr. Kraft and Mr. O'Neil have made an estimate of the cost of erecting a temporary building at \$3,394.25. Dr. Keys requests that the University furnish \$1,394.25, the balance - \$2,000 to be furnished by the Oklahoma Commission for Crippled Children as per a letter from Mr. Joe Hamilton, Secretary, under date of July 2. The plan has the approval of Dean Everett.

President Cross recommended that the University supply \$1,400 toward the above project which is to be located on the triangular space east of Kelly Street, as recommended by Dean Everett.

On motion by Regent Benedum the recommendation was approved.

## ITEM III.

Coach Wilkinson has made inquiry about the possibility of our allowing two professional football teams to play a game in our stadium early in September, 1950, probably on Saturday night prior to Labor Day. The usual fee for the use of stadiums runs between ten and fifteen per cent of the gross after federal and state taxes have been deducted. The University would have no financial responsibility in such a project and there is a possibility to make some money. Mr. Curt Gowdy, formerly sports announcer for KOMA called Coach Wilkinson about the matter and had requested an early decision.

President Cross recommended approval of scheduling such a game. It was the sense of the Regents that President Cross make a further investigation of the matter and report his findings in writing and that the minutes reflect such findings. The Regents expressed no objection to the plan of scheduling the game.

ITEM IV.

President Cross called attention to the Summer School graduation exercises including Baccalaureate on Sunday evening, August 7 and graduation on Monday evening, August 8. He extended an invitation to the Regents to attend.

#### ITEM V.

Approximately \$34,000 remains in the bond issue funds for improvements in Woodrow Wilson Center. Mr. Kraft reports that because of the pressure of work faced by the Physical Plant Department between now and the beginning of the Fall semester he advises that such improvements should be done under contract. Mr. Kuhlman, University Architect, has prepared preliminary drawings but it is believed advisable to employ an outside architect in order to have completely detailed plans and specifications necessary to call for competitive bids on the work.

President Cross recommended that Paul Harris, Chickasha architect be employed for this work.

Moved by Regent McBride and unanimously voted to approve the recommendation.

ITEM VI.

President Cross discussed the proposal to construct a golf course on the south campus. He stated Mr. Perry Maxwell had made a survey and prepared a drawing showing the layout of the course. The officers club would serve as a club house for the golf course. Mr. Maxwell offered to construct the course, to be completed by the fall of 1950 at a maximum total cost of \$95,000, with the understanding that he would pay the University for the use of heavy equipment, and that he would also use some of the regular University employees. President Cross stated there is available \$50,000 in athletic funds not committed to bond retirement, and the balance might be paid from athletic funds not needed for the payment of bond commitments. He recommended that a contract be entered into with Mr. Maxwell at the lowest figure Mr. Maxwell will accept.

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Regent Benedum moved approval on the assumption the contract is carefully drawn, and that complete plans and specifications be prepared, the contract to be approved by the President and the Board of Regents. After discussion to the effect that such golf courses had been constructed elsewhere at a cost of approximately \$3,000 a hole, it was voted to adopt the Benedum motion.

The following matters were listed on the agenda:

President Cross brought up the proposal to have preliminary plans made for future buildings on the campus, this matter having been discussed at the May 25 meeting. He stated if the \$36,000,000 bond issue is approved at the September 27 election the University would probably be allocated four or five million dollars for buildings and that it is imperative some advance planning be done. President Cross expressed himself as favorable to a plan of employing University architects for the advance planning and thus insure some uniformity in exterior architecture. If one per cent of architectural fees would be used to employ draftsmen, engineers, etc., and the commercial architect paid five per cent the total cost would be no greater than without the advance planning. He stated this is the plan used at the A. & M. College.

President Cross recommended that one per cent of construction money be set aside by the Regents for planning purposes.

Regent Shepler moved, and it was voted, to approve the recommendation.

Regent Emery asked Regent McBride to assume the Chair, whereupon he presented the following resolution and moved its adoption and that a certified copy be sent to Mr. Noble.

## RESOLUTION

"WHEREAS, Lloyd Noble has recently retired as a Regent of the University after fifteen years of continuous service;

WHEREAS, during his tenure, he has been twice elected to the presidency of the Board of Regents;

WHEREAS, he, as a Regent, as an alumnus, and as a citizen of Oklahoma, has contributed to the welfare of the University in a variety of ways never excelled in its history;

WHEREAS, his insight into the problems of higher educational administration and his clear and courageous exposition of his views upon administrative policy have prompted the establishment of sound and enduring methods of University administration.

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved that the Board of Regents of the University expresses its great regret over the retirement of Lloyd Noble, its sincere appreciation for the excellent quality of his service and for his constant loyalty and devotion to the University, and its hope that his wisdom and experience may continue to be available to agencies of the State of Oklahoma dealing with higher educational administration."

President Cross called attention to the invitation from Dial Currin to hold a Regents meeting in the new bank building at Shawnee, and be his guest at luncheon, at a time mutually agreeable. At the suggestion of Regent McBride it was agreed that President Cross thank Mr. Currin for the courtesy of the invitation, and that should the opportunity arise when his hospitality may be accepted he will be notified by the Secretary after action by the Regents. Since there is some doubt that a meeting of the Regents will be held in August it is not possible to make a decision at this time.

President Cross reported that Dr. Verne H. Schnee, whose appointment as Director of the Research Institute was authorized at the June 8 meeting is considering the matter. The Regents will be informed of further developments.

12:30: Recess for luncheon in the Oklahoma Memorial Union with Dean John Rackley, College of Education and Earl Sneed, Acting Dean of the School of Law, as guests.

1:30: Reconvened in the President's office.

Mr. Kent W. Shartel, appointed as a member of the Board of Regents by Governor Turner on June 24, 1949, his term to expire March 29, 1955, was introduced. The Chair inquired if Mr. Shartel had taken the oath of office and he stated he had done so in the office of the Secretary of State. A copy of the Executive Order of Appointment and the Oath are being sent to the Secretary of the Regents.

Regent McBride moved, and it was unanimously voted that Mr. Shartel's credentials be accepted as evidencing his lawful appointment as a Regent of the University of Oklahoma, and that he be recognized by the Regents as such.

The Chair welcomed Mr. Shartel as a new Regent.

President Cross presented the proposed budget for Intercollegiate Athletics for the year 1949-50 showing estimated receipts and proposed expenditures. President Cross stated the income had been figured conservatively and the expenditures liberally, and that he felt there would be more balance at the end of the year than is shown in the budget. He recommended approval of the budget as submitted by Mr. Wilkinson.

On motion by Regent Benedum the budget was approved.

President Cross discussed the salary for Dean Carson, which was fixed at \$7,400 in the University budget approved in May. He stated some of the problems with reference to the faculty in the College of Engineering had been worked out, and recommended that Dean Carson be given a \$500 increase effective July 1, 1949; this will place his annual salary for 1949-50 at \$7,900.

Moved by Regent McBride and unanimously voted to approve the recommendation.

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## SEGREGATION - ATHLETIC EVENTS

President Cross recommended approval of the following policies with reference to segregation:

Since each student will be entitled to purchase a wife's ticket, and the number of such students is at this time X number, it is recommended that the colored students be seated by their respective class rank in the following manner:

- a. A row or rows beginning at the top of the stadium in section 30, the student 50 yard line section (since they are now all graduate students), be designated as required by statute.
- b. That these designated rows be separated from the rest of the students by one of two plans:
  - (1) Blocking off a row of seats in front of this section as shown by attached rough sketch Plan 1
  - (2) Erecting a temporary solid "wall" behind the first top row of white students; such wall to be as high as a person's head when seated on the row in front of the "wall", see rough sketch Plan 2.
- c. Designate separate rest room facilities in the stadium.
- d. Privately instruct the colored students that they should plan to arrive early and in this manner try to avoid the surging crowds.
- e. Provide for markers with adhesive backs that may be put up the morning of the game and taken down soon after the game and in this manner avoid as much as possible publicity and photographs which will result.
- f. The tickets themselves should be so designated and this will be handled in this office by using a simple rubber stamp overprint.

It is suggested that a space must be preserved or a wall erected in preference to a rail because of the fact that people are in much closer proximity to each other in the stadium than in classrooms.

It is felt that under the ideas outlined above, the colored students can be accommodated at football games with the least possible adverse publicity to the University.

Regent Benedum moved that the recommendation be approved, with the understanding that No. 2 under "b" be accepted as the plan.

All members voted "AYE" on the Benedum motion and it was declared carried.

The following copy of a communication concerning Distinguished Service Citation awards was presented for consideration:

June 21, 1949

President Cross Faculty Exchange

Dear President Cross:

The following recommendations have been submitted by the Selection Committee and the Planning Committee in regard to the Distinguished Service Citation System. The action of the Executive Board of the Alumni Association in regard thereto is shown beneath each proposal.

1. That January 15th of each year be, and hereby is, set as the deadline by which the names of the honorees must be submitted by the Selection Committee to the President of the University.

(Approved by Executive Board of Alumni Association)

2. That the Selection Committee be authorized and is hereby directed to prepare and submit the form of the citation to be given each honoree.

(Approved by Executive Board of Alumni Association)

3. That consideration be given to the propriety of awarding the DSC to active members of the Faculty, Board of Regents, University Staff, and Alumni Board.

(The Executive Board of the Alumni Association voted to leave this matter entirely in the hands of the Selection Committee, believing that the discretion of said committee should be as unlimited as possible.)

4. That the recipient of this award be present and that the award not be presented to a substitute designated by the honoree.

(The Executive Board of the Alumni Association rejected this proposal, saying that the honoree should be unged to be present if at all possible, but that the present system be followed and the award presented to a substitute if necessary.)

5. That the Planning Committee consider the possibility of placing pictures of the honorees or a suitable plaque containing their names in some designated building on the campus.

(Approved by the Executive Board of the Alumni Association)

I am submitting these proposals to you for your study and action by the Board of Regents. Particular attention is called to Proposal No. 3, which concerns a policy on which the Selection Committee has asked instruction; Proposal No. 4, which concerns a policy regarding the recipients; and Proposal No. 5, which involves the expenditure of funds. I heartily approve the action taken by the Alumni Association, and I hope the Board of Regents will concur. 1

On motion by Regent McBride it was voted to approve the recommendations as submitted.

President Cross recommended that the following preliminary steps be taken to clear the way for construction work on the Union Building:

(1) Authorize demolition of the Liberal Arts Annex, which must be removed in order to permit the south extension of the Union Building.

(2) Authorize the use of salvaged material from the Liberal Arts Annex, along with such new material as may be needed, to construct a temporary book store to be used while construction work on the Union is in process, the temporary store to be located between the Union Building and Monnet Hall in such a manner so as not to interfere with the proposed library addition to Monnet Hall in the event that funds for this purpose are obtained before removal of the temporary building.

(3) Authorize use of a sufficient amount from the operating surplus of the University Book Exchange to cover the cost of constructing and equipping the temporary book store. Plans have been prepared and the preliminary rough estimate indicates that it might cost about \$13,864.

Moved by Regent Benedum and unanimously voted to approve the recommendation.

President Cross recommended that D. B. R. Johnson, who is retiring as Dean of the School of Pharmacy on September 1, be given the title of Dean Emeritus, with the rank of Professor of Pharmacy, and that his salary effective September 1 be fixed at the rate of \$5,000 on a 9-months basis.

Approved on motion by Regent McBride.

President Cross reported that the deed conveying title to the Lake Texoma property being given to the University by Norman W. Brillhart for use as a biological experiment station will be in the hands of the University within the next few days, Mr. Brillhart reports. It is important that remodeling of the existing partially complete building be started as soon as possible since there is a possibility that trespassers might start a fire so long as the property is unoccupied.

He recommended that the Board of Regents authorize execution of a contract with an architect for preparation of plans and specifications for the completion of construction of the building and the installation of necessary appurtenances such as a water system.

He recommended further that Harold Flood, of Ardmore, be employed as architect for this project.

Approved on motion by Regent Benedum.

The agreement between the Regents of the University and the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company in which the Regents would authorize the company to install, maintain and operate a telephone plant and equipment on the North Campus was presented by President Cross. Formerly the telephone company maintained the system under an agreement with the State Board of Public Affairs which no longer has custody of the base. The draft was prepared by Dr. Cheadle.

President Cross recommended execution of this agreement.

On motion by Regent Shepler it was voted to authorize the President of the Regents to sign the agreement on behalf of the Regents.

President Cross recommended approval of a contract with the Capitol Outdoor Advertising Service, 701 Commerce Exchange Building, Oklahoma City, for outdoor advertising for the football season of 1949 at a cost of \$332.80 for the month of July and August, 1949, including seven special 24-sheet posters.

Approved on motion by Regent White.

Recommended approval of the contracts with the University of Texas and the State Fair of Texas for our football games in the Cotton Bowl from 1952 through 1955. A copy of this contract is on file in the Secretary's office.

Approved on motion by Regent White.

Recommended approval to purchase electrical engineering laboratory equipment from the General Electric Company on their bid of \$28,327.56 less a donation of \$10,000 which the company agreed to make. Bids on this equipment were called for from other companies but no bids were received.

Approved on motion by Regent White.

At the June 8 meeting President Cross submitted a report by the Budget Council concerning appointments to David Ross Boyd Professorships but at his request action on the nominations was postponed. He resubmitted the following for such appointments and recommended approval.

The minimum salary for David Ross Boyd Professorships on the 1949-50 budget is \$6,500 on a 9-months basis. Recommended that the above receive the salary indicated.

President Cross reported that the University School of Medicine and Hospitals now have available the sum of \$15000 provided by the Legislature for drilling of a water well and establishing necessary connections to replace the existing well on property acquired by the Veterans Administration.

Four drilling companies have been requested to submit bids on drilling the well. Two bids were received. Harry C. Rouner of Oklahoma City bid \$6,500; the C. H. Staats Drilling Company of Oklahoma City bid \$6,231.

The work in general consists of the furnishing of all materials, labor, tools, equipment, etc., necessary to drill, seal, and develop a water well, but does not include the well casing, which is to be furnished by the owner.

Persident Cross recommended that the Business Office of the School of Medicine and University Hospitals be authorized to execute a purchase order contract with the Staats Drilling Company in accordance with the low bid received; with the provision that the contractor be required to provide statutory and performance bonds and the amount of the contract be increased sufficiently to cover the cost of such bonds since the bond requirement was not included in the specifications.

Regent Benedum moved, and it was unanimously voted to approve the recommendation.

President Cross reported a committee consisting of Walter Kraft, Herbert O'Neil, Dr. Vernon Cushing, Kenneth Wallace and Dean Everett considered the question of employment of architects for the building program on the Oklahoma City campus. The State Regents allocated \$650,000 for an addition to the Medical School Building, and \$500,000 for the Out-Patient additions or buildings, and for an addition to the nurses' building.

The committee recommends employment of architects for the above as follows:

Hudgins, Thompson & Ball for the additions to the School of Medicine

Coston & Frankfurt for the Out-Patient additions or buildings

For the addition to the nurses' building the committee submitted Noftsger & Lawrence or Parr & Aderhold. Regent White suggested Parrand Aderhold and President Cross stated that would be his recommendation also.

President Cross recommended selection of architects as indicated, and on motion by Regent White the recommendation was approved.

President Cross suggested that each firm be requested to indicate in writing the time required to prepare completed plans and specifications and that this be taken into consideration\_before contracts are let. The Regents concurred in this suggestion.

A copy of the agreement between the Oklahoma State Department of Health and the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine and University Hospitals for the establishment of a combined training and service project for premature infants at the University Hospitals was included in the agenda. President Cross recommended approval of the contract which is as follows:

#### ACREEMENT

This agreement is entered into this first day of July, 1949, by and between the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine and the University Hospitals and the Oklahoma State Department of Health.

The purpose of the agreement will be to establish and conduct an eighteen unit premature care program and an associated education program at the University Crippled Children's Hospital, Oklahoma City, for graduate and basic student nurses, physicians, residents, interns, and medical students in the care of premature infants; also to assist other hospitals in other areas of the state desiring to establish premature care centers by providing medical and nursing consultation.

It is agreed that the Oklahoma University School of Medicine and the University Hospitals will provide adequate and proper space for such an eighteen unit premature nursery and training center and make the necessary structural alterations so that the nursery will conform with the standards and recommendations for hospital care of newborn infants.

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The University of Oklahoma School of Medicine and the University Hospitals agree to provide medical direction and care including services of attending and resident staffs, nursing and auxiliary services, clerical service, medical social service, laboratory service, and any or all other services recommended as principles or goals as outlined in the publication, "Standards and Recommendations for Hospital Care of Newborn Infants," published by the American Academy of Pediatrics.

The University of Oklahoma School of Medicine and the University Hospitals agree to help expand proper premature care to other areas or hospitals in the state by providing medical consultation from the Department of Pediatrics to other areas or hospitals desiring or requesting such assistance. All travel expense for consultation to outlying areas shall be paid by the Oklahoma State Department of Health.

The Oklahoma State Department of Health agrees to buy additional or new equipment for the premature and suspect nurseries, demonstration room, formula room, and an air-conditioning unit (not including ducts and vents) for the nurseries and formula room. The total cost of all equipment is not to exceed \$10,000.

The Oklahoma State Department of Health agrees to assist in providing adequate and proper personnel for the premature care and training by paying the salaries of the following:

- 1. 1 full-time Pediatrician
- 2. 1 Supervisor
- 3. 2 Head Nurses

This agreement will be effective indefinitely unless cancelled in writing by one or the other parties after notification of one year or less, whichever is necessary to permit the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine and the University Hospitals to cover previous budgetary committments undertaken because of the plan. It may be amended by mutual agreement at any time by either of said parties.

Promotions for the faculty of the School of Medicine as recommended by Dean Everett were included in the agenda. Following a discussion it was decided to postpone action on the promotions until the next meeting.

At the June 9 meeting an appointment for Dr. John D. Ingle, as Clinical Assistant (part-time, Visiting Staff) in the department of Surgery; clinical rates, effective June 1, 1949, was presented on the recommendation of Dean Everett. The nomination of Dr. Ingle was withdrawn by President Cross pending further inquiry by Regent White. Following a discussion the Regents requested that President Cross defer a recommendation of Dr. Ingle's appointment until further inquiry had been made. President Cross was agreeable to this suggestion.

President Cross reported as follows concerning the names for the Women's Dormitory units which are nearing completion:

The new Women's Dormitories contain sixteen separate units accommodating 52 girls each. Names for these units should be selected and I appointed a committee to consider the matter and submit a recommendation. After studying the committee's suggestions, I make the following recommendation:

(1) That the four individual dormitory buildings, in accordance with previous Board action designating them as the "Women's Quadrangle" be designated as Northeast, Northwest, Southeast and Southwest Units, Women's Quadrangle. This will make an individual building easy to find.

(2) That the central dining hall and recreation building be designated "Women's Quadrangle Center."

(3.) That the 16 living units in the dormitory buildings be named for the following women prominent in Oklahoma history or on the faculty of the University:

'l. Jennie Harris Oliver.

2. Alice Brown Davis - only woman ever elected chief of any of the five civilized tribes - Chief of the Seminoles, Mother-in-law of General Keys.

3. Annette Ross Hume - Missionary in Oklahoma, Pioneer Club woman, Mother of one of the first graduates of Oklahoma University.

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4. Roberta Campbell Lawson - Outstanding club woman - Granddaughter of last chief of the Delawares Journey Cake.

5. Jane McCurtain - Wife of Jackson McCurtain - Chief of the Choctaws -Pioneer in every sense of the word - New country - New civilization - Leader in her own rights after her husband's death - Educator - Superintendent of Jones Academy; A School for Boys.

6. Sally Rogers McSpadden - From old Cherokee family - Daughter of Clem Rogers - Sister of Will Rogers - Leader and educator.

7. Cynthia Ann Parker. (See P.312 - Ohla. - Duide Soon allale 1457-5%

8. Meta Chestnut Sager - Teacher and founder of Elmeta Bond College.

9. Minnie May Forbes - Was born on February 10, 1887, at Childress, Texas. She has the following degrees from the University of Oklahoma: B.A. 1910, M.A. 1911. She was first appointed on the faculty of the University in February, 1923, and served until the time of her death, October 2, 1933. She left her entire estate, which consisted of a house on West Duffy Street, some lots in Norman, an interest in a farm, and personal property, to the Student Loan Aid Association of the University of Oklahoma. The total value of the estate was approximately \$6,000.

10. Helen H. Hamill - Was born September 29, 1890, at Des Moines, Iowa. She received the B.S. and M.S. in Home Economics at the University of Oklahoma in 1924. She did graduate work at Columbia University during the summer of 1927, at the University of Chicago during the summers of 1929 and 1931, and the University of Hungary, Debrecen, in the summer of 1936; the University of California, Berkeley, during the summer of 1938. Appointed Assistant in Home Economics, 1922-23; Instructor in 1929; Assistant Professor, 1931 until her death on March 8, 1945.

11. Grace Emma Herrick - Was born April 5, 1873, at Rockford, Illinois. She received the B.A. degree from Carleton College, Northfield, Minnesota, in 1895 and the B. L. S., degree from the University of Illinois in 1911. Came to the University first as Instructor in Library Science during the summer of 1926 and was appointed Assistant Professor on September 1, 1929. She served in that position until the time of her death on February 4, 1935.

12. Catherine Holman - Was born on November 8, 1903, at Wetumka, Oklahoma. She received the B.A. and M.A. degrees in 1924 and 1925, respectively, at the University of Oklahoma. Attended the University of Chicago during the summer of 1928; Cambridge (England) summer of 1934; University of Wisconsin summer of 1938; Columbia University during the school year 1940-41 and the summer of 1941. First appointed on the teaching staff of the University as Assistant in English, 1925-26; Instructor 1929 to 1939; Assistant Professor from 1940 to the time of her death on January 7, 1947.

13. Elizabeth Jordan - Was born on May 29, 1872, at Camden, Arkansas. She had the following degrees; B.S. Lebanon, 1898; Ph.B., Chicago, 1919; L.I., Springdale College, 1901; M.A. Columbia, 1930. Came to the University of Oklahoma as Assistant Professor of English and Dean of Women in 1918 and resigned as Dean of Women June 30, 1922. She was promoted to Associate Professor of English in 1940; in 1942 was given the title of Professor Emeritus. She died April 4, 1943. 14. Ida Z. Kirk - Was born May 26, 1876, at Davenport, Iowa. She graduated from Fulton and Trueblood School of Dramatic Art, Kansas City, Missouri, in 1898. Attended the Chicago Conservatory of Music and Dramatic Art in 1904; Charles Dickson School of Acting, New York in 1909; in 1921 with S.S. Curry, Boston. She came to the University of Oklahoma as Special Instructor in Dramatic Art in 1920; Assistant in 1921; Instructor in 1923; Assistant Professor in 1929; Professor Emeritus in 1944 until the time of her death on December 10, 1948.

15. Dr. Alma Jessie Neill - Dr. Neill was born on February 21, 1885, at Chillicothe, Illinois. She had the following degrees: Illinois State Normal University, Diploma, 1911; University of Illinois, A.B., 1913, M.A. 1915, Ph.D., 1920. She attended the University of Chicago during the summer of 1921 and the University of Paris, Faculty d'Medicine, 1926-27 while on leave of absence. She held membership in the following learned societies: Rho Chi; Kappa Delta Pi; Lambda Kappa Sigma; Iota Sigma Pi; Sigma Xi; Royal Society of Arts; Oklahoma Academy of Science (Fellowship); American Association of Advancement of Science; International Physiological Congress. Came to the University of Oklahoma as Assistant Professor of Physiology in 1920; Associate Professor in 1929; Professor in 1938. Died on April 10, 1948.

16. Winnie M. Sanger, M.D. - Dr. Sanger was born on February 2, 1874, in America, Illinois. She attended Scaret College, Neosho, Missouri, and the University of Kansas, where she received the degree of M.D. in 1904. She was president of the State Federation of Women's Clubs in 1923-25; Scribblers League; Gatewood Morning Forum; D.A.R.; 89'er Club; State Chairman A.E.W.; O.E.S., treasurer, Grand Chaplain, 1912; past Worthy Matron. She was Medical Inspector of Oklahoma City Schools, 1919-24; Medical Advisor for University from 1924-27; State Officer of P.T.A. Came to Oklahoma in 1894. She served at the University Health Service from 1923-27.

## CONTRACT

Between:

## UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA HOSPITAL FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN AND . OKLAHOMA COMMISSION FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN

(Senate Bill 144---S.L. 1949)

WHEREAS, The Oklahoma Commission for Crippled Children (hereinafter called the Commission) desirous of purchasing hospital care for the crippled children of the State of Oklahoma, is ready to contract for such hospital care to be provided by the University of Oklahoma Hospital for Crippled Children (hereinafter called the Hospital.)

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NOW THEREFORE, the Commission herein represented by its duly authorized officer and the hospital herein represented by its duly authorized officer do enter into the following contract:

1. The Commission will assume responsibility for payment of all services authorized and rendered in keeping with the provisions of this contract.

2. The Commission hereby agrees to reimburse the Hospital at the ALL-INCLUSIVE rate of <u>\$9.00</u> per diem for in-patient care. Said per diem rate to be paid for the six months period ending December 31, 1949, at which time a negotiated rate, based upon a cost of operations statement covering the last six months operation, shall become effective and an appropriate and equitable adjustment shall be made retroactive to July 1, 1949.

3. Any subsequent rate agreed upon shall not exceed the per diem rate as reflected on a statement of operating expenses covering the immediate <u>six</u> months operating experience.

4. The Hospital agrees to furnish to the Commission an official statement of operating expenses based on the last <u>six</u> months of operation. Approved rate will be in effect for <u>six</u> months following notice of approval. If a new statement is not submitted, the rate shall automatically be reduced to \$5.00 per diem until a new rate is approved.

5. All services must be authorized by the Commission and the initial authorization for hospitalization shall be for a period estimated to be sufficient for the respective illness. Said authorization shall bear the name and address of the patient, file number, authorization number, the per diem rate and the effective date of the authorization.

6. Additional hospitalization may be authorized upon recommendation of the attending physician.

7. Payment will be made to the Hospital upon receipt of properly prepared invoices, submitted in duplicate on forms furnished by the Commission, accompanied by such reports on the patient's progress and care as may be required by the Commission.

8. The Hospital agrees that in accepting payment from the Commission it will not charge nor receive payment from the patient or from any other source, except insurance benefits. Acceptance of payment for authorized care from any source other than the Commission or insurance benefit, will disqualify the Hospital from further authorization.

9. Payment shall be made for the date of admission or the date of discharge, but not both.

10. The Commission reserves the right to make inspection of the Hospital with relation to service and care provided patients of the Commission. The Commission may accept the inspection of the Hospital by another agency.

11. This contract may be terminated by either party by giving the other party thirty days written notice.
