ILENTIESS OE THE ANNUAL MEETING
BOARD OF REGEHTS OF THE URIYERSITY OT OKLAFOMA FRENCH ROOM，MAYO HCTEL，IULSA，ORIAHOMA THURSDAY，MARCA 10， 1966

The annual meating of the Board of Regents of the Univeraity of Oklahoma was held in the French Room of the Hayo Hotel in Tulsa，Cklahoma， beginning at 1：50 p．m．，following the annual Tulaa Chamber of Comerce－ OU Alumi Club＂OU Day in Tuisa＂luncheon at which time Mr．James A． Mackenmie was the principal speaker．

The following were present：Regent Juisan J．Rothbaum，Preaident， preaiding；Regents Johnson，Davidson，Houchin，and Calvert．

ABSENT：Regents Little and Sparks．

The following were lso present：Vice Presidents Pete Kyle McCarter and Horace B．Brown；Mr．DavidA。Burr，Assistant to the Presi－ dent for Univeraity Relations；Mr。James R．Swain，Director of Univeraity Relations；Mr．David Swanic，Assistant Professor of Law；Mrs。Bariara $k$. James，Assiztant Secretary of the Regenta；and Dr．James Lo Dennis，Director of the Medical Center．

The minates of the meeting held on February 10 ，1966，were approved．

Regent Rothbaum stated the first order of business was the elec－ tion of officers of the Board for 1966－67．Regent Houchin nominated Dr． Mark R．Johnson for the office of President．The nomination was seconded and approved unanimously．

On motion by Regent Eouchin，Mr．James G。Davidson wes elected Vice President of the Board．

On motion by Regent Davidaon， Mr ．Rmil R．Kraettif was re－elected Secretary of the Board of Regents．

On motion by Regent Davidson，Mrs．Baxbara H．James was re－elected Assistant Secretary of the Board of Regents．

Members of the Board joined President Cross in expressing appre－ ciation to Mr．Rothbaum and to Mx．Davidson for the hospitaifty extended at this meeting．Mr．Rothbaum stated they were happy to have the Regents in Tulsa and that ha felt this occasion helped to bring the University closer to the eascern gection of the state．

Mr. Davidson suggested, and it was agreed unsnimously to extend appreciation to Xt . Rothbeum for his services during his tenure on the Board and eapecially during the past year while serving as President of the Board. It was unanimcusily agreed that an appropriate Resolution be prepared acknowledging ourstanding aervice by Regent Rothbaum.

Regent Davidson stated he had received several requests from the Oniverzity pertaining to the appointment of architects and engineers and that he intends to have a meeting of the committee immediately following the Regents' mecting. One item, however, the ramodeling of the third floor of Jefferson House and air condftioning of both athletic dormitories, is somewhat of an emergency because the work should be completed as quickly as posaible in order to have the eir condicioning completed by the opening in the fali. Regent Davidison requented authority for the committee to appoint the engineera for thia project with a report of action taken being presented at the next mesting of the Board. The necessary archinactural work on these projects is being prepared by the Uaiversity Architectural Committee.

Regent Johnson moved that the Comittiee on the Selection of Architects be authorized to appoint the engineers necessary in the preparation of the plans for remodeling the thizd floor of jefferson touse and the air conditioning or Jefferson and Washington Houses so that work may proceed as quickiy as possible. Approved.

Regent Calvert reported the committee appointed to atudy further the matter of refunding the 1957 and 1963 Housing System Bonds had met but was not yet prepared to make a recommendation to the Board. He requeated that this be deferred to the next metting. Since bonds for the new highrise housing facilities cannot be issued until a decision is made on refunding the present housing system bonds, Kr. Rothbaum sugsested that if the committee is unanimons in ita decision that a mail vote might be considered.

Vice President Brown reported that a recomendation had been received from J. \& W. Seligman $\& C 0$. that the funds available in the Will Rogers Memorial Scholarship Fund and in the Murray Case Sella Building Fund as a resuit of the merurity on March 15, 1966, of $\$ 25,000$ Federal Home Loan Bonds, plus $\$ 5,000$ in cash in the Sells Bailding Fund, be invested in $\$ 30,000$ Jederal Home Loan Bank 5. $15 \%$ Hotea due October 25, 1966. Dr. Brown recommended that a $4-3 / 4 \%$ six-month Cartificate of Deposit in the First National Bank of Tulsa be parchased with the $\$ 1,434$ cash remaning in the Sells 子uilding Fund and the $\$ 14,000$ cash in the blenray Case Sells Foundation.

On motion by Regent Johnson, the above recommendations on investments were unanimously approved.

Dr. James L. Dennis, Director of the Medical Center, reported on the establishment oi The Oklahoms Health Sciences Foundation, Inc. The Trustees of this non-profit corporation will be the coordinating governing body for the proposed Oklshom gealih Canter, in which the University of Oklahoma Medical Center will be a core institution, but will be only one of many separacely governed public and private institutions and, therefore, meaningful to all segments of the state.

Dean Denmia briefly dascribed the goals of the Foundation as follows: to attract, encourage and asaist boch private and public ingtitutions and agencies related to che public heslith, health acience education, bicmedical research and exemplary patient care to locate in a functional relationship to the Univergity of Oislahoms Medical Centex, according to a master plan, and in so doing to encourage a "unity of diversity" in meeting the health needs and the healeh sciance manpower needs of the people of 0islahoma.

Dean Dennis also reported on Project Reoponsibility, a project deaigned to establish program of rural health cara at a high level of excellence. The clinics established would also serve as medical experimental stations in the area of research. He said no state funds are ree quired.

The following letter from the Medical Center was preaented:
"Tebruary 25, 1966
"Dear President Cross:
"The administrative officisls of Univeraity Hospitals have for some time been quite concexned with our inadequate food service facilities. Our present student and enployees' cafeteria was designed and built at a time when the Medical Center population was appromimately half of what it is now. As a rebult, these facilities are quite crowded during the day.
"The number of students and employess on duty for the evening and night ahifts is much smaller than the daytime population and the maintenance of an adequate food service for this segment of our staff results in a financial loss.
"Tood sezvice to our our-patients and hospital visitors is also grossly inadequate. Eatients come to our out-patient clinics from all over the state and visitors come from all over the state to visit the inpatienta. Commercial food service in our imadiata area is not adequate or suitable.
'Much thought has been given to possible solutions to our problems, and it is now our belief that automaic vending equipmenc offers the most feasible solution to these problems. Preliminary discussions wich a number of companies have indicated graat interest on their part in assiating us. The Hospital Administrators Superintendent of Physical Plant, and our Department of Dietetics have all agreed that there ia a suitable and feasible area where auch a facility could be built at moderace expense. Seversl companies have indicated that they would be interested in building such facility at their expense, the cost to be amortized by the comissions.
"We, therefore, respectfully request that we be authorized to call for proposals from reputable and bonded vending companies for the construction and operation of an automatic vending facility. Said proposals should include for our approval:

1. Proposed building plans
2. A list of equipment to be ingtalled
3. A list of the produces to be vended and the proposed prises to be charged
4. The commisoions to be paid to the Medical Center
"These proposals would, of course, be reviewed and submitted to your office for the Regents' conaideration.

Approved on motion by Regent Davidson.

Presidenc Cross reported the names of the nominees for the Regents' Award for Superior Teacinirg have been submitted. The regulations agreed upon for the selection of the faculty members to be honored by Regents' Awards are se follows:

1. Fiom the nominations that reach the President each year not fewer than three or more than five sill be choaen to receive the award according to the state of the budget and the quality of the nominations received. It will be conbidered desirable that at leasi one shall have been a reacher for not more than ten years.
2. The final selection of the resipienta will be mace by a comaittee of three Regents, appointad by the President of the Regentc.

Announcements of the reciplents will be wade by the presicent of the Regents at the regalar April meeting of the General Zaculcy.

President Crosz rocomended that the President of the Zegents appoint a comittae of three Regents to make the finai selection of faculty members to receive the Award for Superior Feaching so that the mames of the recipients may be announced at tie April meeting of the General Faculty.

Regent Rothbam appointed the following to serve as the commitee to make the final selection of faculty members to recaive the award: Regent Johnaon, Chaiman, and Regenta Eouchin and Davidison.

President Cross reported the Graduate Colleges of the University of Oklahome and Okiahoms State University have developed a plan for offering together a special Master's degaee in Engineering, with the mork to be done by the two institations at approved Graduate Cencerz.

The two Universities, upon the approval of their respective Boarde, propose to make the following joint recommendation to the Oklahoms State Regents for Higher Esucation:

Approval is requested for the offering of the Master's degree in Eaginaering by allowing all the course requirements to be met at apm proved Gradaate Centers of the Enfveraity of Okiahoma and Okiahoma State University.

At least one-half of the course hours needed mat consist of course houra taught by the Graduate Faculty of whicherer of the two Universities confers the degree. The remainder of the credit hours my be made up of transfer credits from the other of the two Universities earned on campus or at its Graduate Centers and a maximum of eight hours of transfer credits from other inatitations with approved graduate programs.

All other requirementa ox the regular Mseter's degree, as atated in the Bullaein of the Graduate College of the Jniversity confering the degree, mast be met.

The special Master's degree will have the same designations already approved for each Univeraity as if it were earned on the main caupus, except that the diploms and transcript will show the following words: "Graduate Center Program."

President Czoss recommended that the University be authorized to join with Oklahoma State University in making this joint recomendation to the State Regents.

Approved on motion by Regent Davidson.

Presijent Czoss reported that many teachers in elementary and aecondary schools are fincing that a general master's degree in the Social Sciences would be more desirable to them for their professional purposes than a specialized degree in one of the specific Social Science disciplines (Anthropology, Economics, Geography, Government, History, Philosophy, Sociology) or than a degree in Education. They need some depth in a apecific field but they need breadth in cloaely related fields. The need for such a degree has been further poinced up by the government-supported inaritutea, which are designed to increase the subject-matter information of the Social Science teacher, and from which the studensa expect degree credit. To meet this need, representatives of the departments concerned have devised and recommended a no-thesis, 32 -hour program leading to the degree Master of Social Science. The program has been accepted and recommended by the Graduate Coilege and in turn by the Council on Instruction.

This degree is ansiogous to the degree Master of Natural Science, which was designed to meet the similar needs of teachers of science and mathematics in the public schools and which has been offered with great success by the Oniversity for a number of years.

The proposed requirements for the degree are as follows:

1. Admi3sion. --To be admitted to the program the student mast have a standard teacher's certificste and be a graduate of an accradited college or university or hava special permiasion of the Casirman of the department in which the major concentration of stady will be done. The candidate will neither necessarily have coupleted, nor have to complete, an undergraduate major in any one Social Science department, nor will he necesaarily meet minimum entrance prerequisites for graduate study set by any one of the different Social science dapartments.
2. Reguirements:--All atudenta admitred to the Msater of Social Science program will be required to complete 32 sementer hours of course work numbersd " 200 " or above with at least 16 hours in courses numbered "300" or above. Correspondence work for graduste credit will not be accspted and at least 24 semester hours mast consist of courses taught by the faculty of the University of Oklahoma. A final comprehenaive examination will be given over the graduate course sork presented for the degree. This examination may be written or oral or both.
3. Rafor and bitior Aress.--Every student will be required to have a major concentzation in one aocial science-Anthropology, Economics, Geography, Goverment, Ristory, Philosophy, Bociology-of at least 15 graduate hours and at least 5 hours of graduate credit in each of two other social science fielda. The student may counc $\sigma$ hours of graduate Education toward the degree.
4. Comaittee.--The stadent's edvisor will be the Ctaisman of the department gelected for major concentration ox a facuity member debignatad by the Chairman. The advisor plus representatives of the two social science departaents in each of shich at lesot 5 hours are saken will form the student's graduate comittiee, said comytitee to be appointed by the Dean of the Graduate Coliege.

President Cican zecommandad approval of the degrse Master of Soctal Science (M.S.S.) with the requirements as shown, with the understanding that, upon the approval of the University Regents, the recomendation will be submitced to the Oklahome State Regents for ajgher Education, and with the further understanding that approval will becone effective as of the date of final approval by that body.

Regent Davidson moved that the recomendation be approved but that the requirements be changed from 32 hours and no thesis to 30 hours of course work pius a thesis. A discussion followed and president cross and Vice Freaident Mcharter explained in detail the reasoning betind offering the degree as a no-thesis program.

On the vote on the Davidson motion the following voted AYE: Regent Davidson. The following voted so: Regents Rothbaum, Johnson, Rouchin, and Calvert. The Davidson motion was declared lost.

On motion by Regent Johnson, the recomendation on the Master of Socisl Science degree vas approved as presented. Regent Davidson requested that he be recorded as voting 1 .

President Cross stated the foliowing policies on admission to first-year standing in the College of Law have been developed and recommended by the Faculty of the College of Law, and that he now recommended they be approved by the Univeraity Regencs, subject to the approval of the Oklahoma Stace Regenta for Figher Education, to become effective for the first-year class to be admitted to the College of law for the semester beginning September, 1966:

Residents of Oklahoma.--Any resident of 0klahoma who (a) holds a bacheloris degree from an accredited inatitution of higher learning and (b) has taken the Law School Admiosion Test and (c) meets at least one of the following requirementa is eligible for admission to first-year
standing in the Jniverbity of Oklahoma College of Law:

1. Maintained a cumalative grade-point average of 2.5 (comutad on a 4.0 scale) ox better on all previously attemped colleginta wozk, az evaluated by the Office of Acmissions and Records.
2. Scored 500 or better on the Law School Admis3ions Test.

The requirement set forth in (a) above may be waived provided that the applicant was enrelled in college on October 1, 1964, and had declared his objective to be the study of law. A student applying under this provistion shall meet the stancards for admission to first-year standing which were in effect on Octaber 1, 1964.

An individual not eligible ander (c) above may, by action of the Admissions Comitice of the College of Lasw, be admitted proviaionnlly if success in the study of law can reasonably be predicted because of significant or progressive improvement in grade average on previousiy attempted collegiate work. If his work completed in the first semester is satiafactory, he will be allowed to contime his atudy of law as a regularly admitted studeat.

Non-Residents of Oklakoma.--A non-resident of Oklahoma, in order to be eligible for admission to firat-year standing in the Juiversicy of Oklahoms College of Law, must (a) hoid a bachelor's degree from an accradited institution of higher learning, (b) have taken the Law School Admission Teat, and (c) have met at leasc one of the foliowing requirementa:

1. Kaincained a grade-point average of 3.0 (computed on a 4.0 scale) or better on ali previoasly attempted collegiate work.
2. Scored 500 or better on the Laz School Admission Test.

The requirement aet Eorth in (a) above may be waived provided that the applicant was enrolied in college on October 1, 1964, and had declared hia objective to be the study of law. A atudent applying under this proviaion siail meet the standards for admiasion to first-year atanding which were in exfect on October 1, 1964.

Policy on Application Pee for Admisaion to College of Law.--Each application for admission to the College of Law mant be accompanied by a deposit of $\$ 25.00$. If the applicant is not accepted for admission, the fall amount of the deposit will be reziunded. If tine appilcant is accepted for admissica, the deposit will not be refunded. However, if he subsequently enrolls, the emount of his deposit will be applied toward his general enrollment fees for the flzat semester of his ensollment.

The above recoumendations, in the form shown, have been worked out in conanitation with the Chancellor and, if approved by the University Regents, will be subinitted to the Ok lahoma State Regents for Higner Educstion as two separate recommendationa, one having to do with standards of admiasion, the other with the appilcacion fee.

President Cress ald that in acting upon them the Jniversity Regents ahould be aware that the primary aims of the recomendations are two: (1) to improve and make more apecific the atandards of admisaion to the College of Law, and (2) to provide a method of aelective admiasions which will permit an annual adjustment of the size of the first-year class in law to the capacity of the physical plant and the size of the faculty.

In order to accomplish the latter purpose the following administrative procedures are proposed by the Paculty and the Dean of the College of Lav, and President Cross recommended spproval, effective for the semester beginaiag in September 1, 1966:

1. Application Dates.--Any person who desires to apply for admission to first-year atanding in the College of Law mast apply not later than the first day of July of the year in which admisaion is sought. Applicants for admisaion to advanced standing mast apply at least sixiy days before the beginning of the sementer for uhich admission is sought. Permission for any applicant to apply after the prescribed date may be granted in exceptional cases by the Dean of the College of Law.
2. Maximum Number of Applicanta Admitted.
a. Admizaions Comaittee of the College of Law.-- The Admissions Committee of the College of Law shall consiat of three members of the faculty of the College of Law. The members of such committee akall be appointed each year by the President of the Universit:y upon the recommendation of the Dean of the College of Late.
b. Determination of Maximum Number of Applicanta to be Admitted.--

Bach year, a recomendation as to the maximam number of applicants to be admitted to the College of Law shall be made by the Admisaiona Comittea of the College of Law to the Dean of the College. The Dean of the College ahall forward such recomendarion, with his own recomendation, to the President of the University. Substantiating materials and explanation as to the method used in determining the recommended marimum number of students to be admitted must accompany such recommendations. The President will determine and announce the maxiaum number of applicants to be admitted to the College of Law. Every effort should be made to make such recomandations, determination, and announcement as zoon as it is possible to do so and not later than the firat day of July of each year.
c. Selective Admisgion.--If the number of qualified applicants exceeds the maximem number of applicanss to be admitted, all applications uill be reviessed by the Admisaions Committee of the College of Law.

As scon as is reasonsbly possible after the firse day of July of any year in which the number of qualified applicants exreeds the maxinum number of applicants to be aduitted, the Admissions Comitcee of the College of Law shall submit to the Dean of the Collega a list of the names of atudents who are recommend by the Comittee for admission to the College of Law, provided that the Dean of the Coilege, upon recommendation of the Committee, may admit exceptionally well qualified applicante prior to the first day of July of each gear. The Conmittee ghall also aubmit to the Dean of the College a list of the names of students who are secomanded by the com mittee as alternste choices, arranged by priorfty. Upon approving such reconmendation, the Dean of the College will fumediately notify each qualified applicant of the action takan on his application. If the applicant was not admitted, he must be advised of his approximate atanding as an alternate. In making such recommendation and in approving such recomendation, the Comittee and the Dean of the College shall not only consider factora which bear upon the prediction of saccess in the otudy of law, but they mast give great weight to all factors which bear upon the liksithood that the applicant will eatablish or ratain his residence in oklahoms and therein faithfully discharge his profesaional and civic responsibilitiea.

After a lengthy discusaion of the various procedures proposed, the recomendations were approved on motion by Regent Davidson. Regent Johnson abatained from voting. Regent Rothbatm suggested that the incoming President of the Board, Dr. Johnson, appoint a comairtee of the Regenta to work with the administration in studying the admission policies appioved with the hope of strengthening and improving the admiasion atandards if necessary.

At the February 10 mesting the Regents approved a resolution authorizing an application of funds from the Eigher Education Pacilities Act of 1963 for the construction of a Physicsi Science Center.
President Cross said that the needs of the Departments of Mathematics, Chemistry, and Physics are so diverse that it would be extremely difficult, if not inpossible, to conarruct a facility to meet the needs of the three departments and atay within the amount of funds that will probably be available for the project.
The Oniversity's Council on Planning anci Development has now recommended that the first unit of the Physical Science center be deleted from the project list and that a Mathemseics Building and an addition to the Chemistry Building, with a complete renovation of the present DeBarr Hall be substituted for the first unit of the Center. If the recommendation is approved, it will be necessary to approve aeperate resolutions for each of the two facilities to be constructed to take the place of the previous resolution on construction of the Physical Science Center.
President Cross recomended that the Regenta approve the following resolutions authorizing an application for matching funds for the construction of a new Mathematics Juilding and an addition to DeBarr Hall which will include the renoration of the building:

At the December meeting the Regents approved the plans and specifications for the addition to the Journalism Building and authorized calling for bids on the project. Bids were raceived on February 17 and the low base bid, $\$ 114,878$, was sucmitted by the I. J. Cook Construction Company, Oiclahoma City. Since it is very important that the addition be constructed as quickly as possible, a letter was sent to all Regents requesting that the contract be let by mail ballot. All memiers of the Board approved awsrding the contract to the low bidder.

President Cross recomanded that the Regents confirm the mail vote taken to award the contract for the addition to Copeland Hall to the J. J. Cook Construction Company on the baois of theit low base bid of \$114,878.

Preaident Cross reported the Wynn Construction Company has completed the construction of the additional space for the Univeraity Arcintectuzal Comaittee which was constructed adjacent to the space occupled by the School of Architectura. The Architectural Comaittee has recommended that the project be accapted as complete and that final payment to the contractor be suthorized.

President Gross recomended that the Regents accept as complete the project for the constauction of space for the University Architectural Committee and that they authorize the final payment to the contractor.

"The Leita hei 5 Ketallograph requested for quotation and which was up for bid, incorporstes a projection sysiem and acreen which measures 340 mm . in diameter. This syatem cannot be added to any of the Reichert metallographo bid. The large projection screen permits group viewing of the magnifiad imsge. This particular feature was deacribed in the proposal accepted by the sational Science Foundation which is providing the maching monies for this purchase. The absence of this feature from the Reichert line of metallographs makes them unacceptable in terms of fulfilling the requirements of the N.S.Z. grant."

Since the Hacker Co. bid is not acesptable, the School of Chemical Engineering and Materials Science racommends that the awsrd be made to Adolph I. Buehier Inc., because of the earlier delivery time.

President Czoss recommended that the bid be awarded to Adolph J. Buehlex, Inc., at a coat of \$8,151.00.
