

MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING
BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA
TUESDAY, MAY 10, 1960 - 10:00 A.M.

The regular May meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Oklahoma was held in the offices of Regent Leonard Savage, Tri-State Building, 619 South Main, Tulsa, at 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday, May 10, 1960.

The following were present: Regent Benedum, President, presiding; Regents Savage, Morgan, Northcutt, Rothbaum, Grisso.

The minutes of the meeting held on Wednesday, April 6, were approved.

The actions taken at a special meeting held on Wednesday, April 27, were confirmed, and the minutes approved.

President Cross asked that Regent Grisso report on the matter of his request that the Regents discuss the question of joining in a lease for oil and gas on the tract known as the Oliver Wildlife Refuge. Regent Grisso stated in deeding the 60 acre tract to the University Mr. Fred Oliver had retained the mineral rights and a life estate in the surface. A letter to the Secretary of the Board by A. H. Huggins, Attorney, under date of April 25, stating he is representing Mr. Oliver, requests the Regents to offer for sale at public auction a five-year oil and gas lease covering a portion of the Fred Oliver tract which is owned by the Regents without restriction.

Regent Grisso stated, upon investigation, he had found there is some confusion on the matter of leases agreed to, or actually granted, and there is some question as to the exact status of the matter.

Regent Grisso moved, and it was voted no action be taken until we know who the proposed lessee is.

It was agreed that the Regents cooperate with Mr. Oliver in the matter, but for the present no action be taken.

President Cross stated he had just returned from the annual meeting of the National Association of State Universities, of which he was the retiring President, and was absent from the campus for about ten days. Several matters had come up during his absence and do not appear on the agenda. He asked that the items be admitted to the agenda and that action thereon be taken at this meeting.

There being no objection the President was asked to proceed.

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He called attention to the press release reporting the University of Oklahoma had entered into an agreement with the University of Hawaii in a home-and-home football series, the first game to be played at Honolulu on December 9, 1961 and the second game to be played in Norman as the season opener in September, 1964. He stated the press release was premature and that he had intended to discuss the matter with the Regents in advance.

He recommended the Regents approve the home-and-home series as reported in the press release. Approved.

President Cross reported that reserving several of the apartments and rooms in the Oklahoma Memorial Union as guest facilities is not proving satisfactory in that the use is on an irregular basis, and no regular room service is provided. It would be more economical to use the Lockett Hotel for University guests and rent the rooms in the Union Building to regular tenants, for which there is always a demand.

It was voted to approve the President's suggestion in the matter.

SPEECH AND HEARING CLINIC ADDITION. The final plans and specifications for the addition to the Speech and Hearing Clinic on which the preliminary plans were approved at the October meeting have just been received.

President Cross recommended that the Regents approve the final plans and specifications, and authorize calling for bids for the construction of the project. Approved on motion by Regent Savage.

NIEMANN APARTMENTS. The present kitchen units in Niemann Apartments are now fourteen years old and entirely unsatisfactory. President Cross recommended that one-third of the kitchen units be replaced during each of the next three years so that all ninety-six apartments will have new units at the end of the third year. Also, that the rental rate in apartments with new units be increased by \$5.00 per month.

Moved by Regent Northcutt, and voted to approve the recommendation.

MURRAY CASE SELLS WILL. Julian B. Fite, attorney for Bacone College, one of the beneficiaries under the Murray Case Sells Will, wrote to Dean Sneed suggesting a change in the provisions of the will which would permit that part of the income allocated to loan funds to be used for grants and scholarships. The letter was referred to Mr. Stockwell, Legal Advisor to the President's Office.

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President Cross stated it has been our position not to join in any request to change the conditions of the will, and unless he is directed otherwise by the Regents, he would inform Mr. Fite we would not want to request such changes.

The Regents expressed agreement in the President's position.

WNAD RADIO TOWER. Following is a report and recommendation concerning the Radio Tower (WNAD):

During the storm on April 28, the tower for the University Radio Station WNAD was damaged beyond repair. Estimated costs of replacing the tower have been obtained by telephone. The costs are:

Because of WNAD Conelrad frequency, Federal Government will probably share half the cost of a new tower under funds allocated for the Civil Defense Act. The Federal Government will not participate in the cost of replacing the FM Antenna.

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RECOMMENDATION:

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1. That the Regents authorize the replacement of the tower at a cost of approximately \$11,087.43 and that the Regents authorize an application to the Federal Government to participate in the cost of the replacement.

2. That the Regents authorize an application to request funds equal to the University cost from the Governor's Contingency Fund.

Moved by Regent Savage, and voted the President be authorized to proceed as recommended.

President Cross reported joint committees from the University and Oklahoma State University have been working on a plan for selective admissions and the matter has also been discussed with President Willham. The details of the plan are to be worked out later. When the plan is completed there is to be a joint announcement. The plan would require action by the State Regents for Higher Education.

President Cross reported Dean White has prepared a brochure for an application for a grant to The Fund for Adult Education for a ten-year project to develop a comprehensive program for Liberal Adult Education. The application is for the amount of \$500,000.00 to be matched from the University over a ten-year period. A further report will be made as the project develops.

The matter of annexation of a strip of land on the south and east boundaries of the North Campus by the City of Norman was presented at the request of the Norman City Council. President Cross reported the Council on Planning and Development had considered the matter at a meeting held on March 24 and had reported adversely, as shown by the following copy of a part of the minutes of that meeting:

"3. Reconsideration of annexing a narrow strip along the south edge of North Campus and a narrow strip along the east edge of the North Campus to the City of Norman. At the meeting held February 11, 1960, the Council considered a letter from Mayor Benson requesting early consideration of the annexation of a narrow strip of land along the south edge of the North Campus extending west from the strip previously annexed to the west edge of the University property, and also a strip along the east edge of the North Campus extending from Robinson Street north to the north boundary line of the University property.

"The Council discussed this request and was of the opinion that this is a worthwhile long range planning program and in principle is a good idea, but before taking definite action the Council recommended that an opinion be obtained from the President's Legal Advisor.

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"Mr. Ben Stockwell appeared before the Council March 3, 1960, and presented his opinion on the annexation of this property with specific information on the point outlined in the minutes of the meeting held February 11, 1960.

"The following was the conclusion submitted to the Council by Mr. Stockwell on March 3, 1960:

"There is no particular objection to approving the annexation of the strips desired by the City of Norman, but the approval of the University should not be granted until after the present proposed oil and gas leases are finally executed and recorded and further the instrument granting approval to the annexation should spell out the restrictions placed upon this property by the conveyance from the United States Government and any other limitations we deem justified to incorporate therein.

"In addition, I would recommend approval of the National Guard on this instrument simply to remove any possibility of difficulty from that area.'

"The Council recommended that the request for annexation of the two strips of land on the North Campus be approved.

"Before action was taken on the Council's recommendation by the President, Mr. Stockwell requested that he be allowed to meet with the Council again to re-evaluate his opinion on the annexation of this land.

"Mr. Stockwell met with the Council March 24, 1960, and stated that due to long range planning, of which he had no knowledge at the time his first opinion was rendered, he felt that action on this request should be abandoned for the time being.

"The Council recommended that the recommendation made at the meeting held March 3, 1960, and submitted to the President for approval, be withdrawn and that action on the matter be delayed until a study of all the factors involved is completed. The Council is in sympathy with the intent of the proposed annexation, but feels that there are factors involved which make it inappropriate to approve annexation at this time."

No action on the matter was taken by the Regents pending further report by the Council on Planning and Development.

President Cross reported further on the matter of the application for facilities and land on the South Base as discussed at the Special Meeting on April 27. President Cross stated the Department of Health, Education and Welfare is favorable to making the allocation to the University if approved

by General Services Administration. He stated it has been agreed the University should reimburse the City of Norman for services rendered, such as fire, police, and sewer service.

Regent Morgan moved, and it was voted, that President Cross negotiate with the City of Norman on the amount to be paid for services.

The following are reports and recommendations appearing on the Agenda:

President Cross reported an inspection of the Numerical Analysis Laboratory Building was conducted by Parr and Aderhold, Architects, on Friday, April 15, 1960, in the presence of representatives of the Physical Plant Department of the University and the University Architect.

President Cross recommended that the Regents accept the building with exceptions as listed by the Architects, and that \$1,500.00 be retained until correction of exceptions, and final approval by the Architect.

Approved on motion by Regent Morgan.

President Cross stated plans are being made for dedication ceremonies, and appropriate recognition of Mr. Ward Merrick who provided funds for the construction of the building and toward purchase of equipment. No date has been set for the ceremonies.

President Cross reported that the Trustees of the Lew Wentz Foundation of the University of Oklahoma have authorized setting aside \$50,000 for service scholarships for the 1960-61 school year, this being approximately one-half of the annual income from investments.

This action by the Trustees provides that the Scholarship Committee report to the Trustees on the rules and regulations for granting of service scholarships, and that a report at the end of each year be made to the Trustees on the scholarships awarded.

President Cross reported as follows on applicants for admission to the freshman class of the School of Medicine, September 1960:

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The President was asked to report at the next meeting on the number of acceptances.

President Cross reported that the State Regents for Higher Education approved the request for approval for two degree programs as follows:

Doctor of Philosophy in Business Administration
Doctor of Business Administration

Action by the State Regents on March 28, 1960. (Minutes p. 6484)

He reported, also, that the State Regents for Higher Education, at their meeting on March 28, 1960, approved the request to discontinue the present curriculum in Architectural Engineering after students now enrolled in the program have been graduated. The State Regents also concurred in the request to change the name of the School of Architecture and Architectural Engineering to the School of Architecture.

The request to initiate a five-year Structural Option curriculum in Architecture was postponed for future consideration. (Minutes p. 6512)

President Cross reported a petition signed by all members of the graduating class of the College of Law had been presented. The petition requests separate graduation exercises, and that representatives of the class had requested a hearing before the Regents. He asked that the three students be given a hearing at this time, and the following were introduced:

Fred Wright, John O. Dean, and John M. Burzio.

Mr. Burzio acted as spokesman for the group and he distributed copies of the petition. A copy of the petition follows:

"We, the undersigned members of the 1960 graduating class of the College of Law, University of Oklahoma, do hereby unanimously petition the Board of Regents, University of Oklahoma, for a separate graduation ceremony in lieu of participation in the regularly scheduled exercises for the following reasons:

"The relatively small graduating class of the College of Law becomes literally lost in the mass University graduation. It would appear that a separate, more personal graduation for law graduates would be more commensurate with the prestige and professional status of the practice of law upon which the graduates are about to embark.

"The Bachelor of Laws degree will be a second degree for the vast majority, if not all of the senior law class. Graduation from the College

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of Law will represent an additional three years of separate, distinct and specialized study and it would seem appropriate to observe this occasion in a different ceremony from that in which the students participated when receiving their first degree.

"Separate graduation for the College of Law will afford an opportunity to solicit attendance and participation by members of the practicing bar and judiciary. Under the present system, the attendance by these persons is slight owing to lack of incentive, a means of proper recognition and absence of a personal and professional ceremony. Separate graduation exercises could afford an excellent opportunity to bring together these persons and effect not only an enduring benefit to the graduating law class and the College of Law, but also enhance the prestige of the University of Oklahoma.

"Separate graduation ceremonies for the College of Law will be scheduled at 2:00 P.M. on the afternoon of June 5, 1960 in order that guests, visitors and participants will also be able to attend the University graduation ceremonies that evening.

"We respectfully submit this petition for consideration by the Board of Regents, University of Oklahoma.

Mr. Burzio stated the petition represented not only the attitude of the senior class, but also the first and second year classes, and that the Student Bar Association was unanimous in support of the request. He explained in detail the purposes and objectives of such a separate ceremony.

Following the presentation the students expressed appreciation for the opportunity to appear before the Regents and they retired from the meeting.

President Cross recommended that the commencement exercises this year be held as usual, especially because the Distinguished Service Citations are to be awarded at this time, and it is hoped to make the ceremony an impressive one.

— Following a discussion Regent Grisso moved that the petition be granted.

On the vote on the motion Regents Grisso and Savage voted AYE; all others voted NO, and the motion was declared lost.

Regent Rothbaum suggested a complete study be made of the situation with the idea of making the ceremony so attractive that all colleges, including Law and Medicine, would want to participate. Also, that a study be made on the advisability of having separate ceremonies for the various colleges of the University.

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It was agreed that the Commencement Committee should make the study, and that the Committee should be requested to report in ample time during the next school term to put whatever plan may be adopted, into effect next year.

The Executive Committee and the Faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences, recommend the establishment of a Summer Residence Center at Fort Sill, following conferences with representatives from Fort Sill. Facilities for library and classroom purposes are available at the Post. It is anticipated that the financing will come from military funds and student tuition payments.

Approved on motion by Regent Savage.

President Cross reported the Graduate College recommends that the University offer the degree of Master of Nuclear Engineering.

The curriculum for this degree program has been in existence for several years as an optional program in Engineering Physics, designated as Master of Engineering Physics (Nuclear Option). Now that the University has nuclear reactor and radioisotope laboratories, equipped and operating to give the nuclear engineering program the recognition it deserves, it seems entirely appropriate that students completing the program should receive the Master of Nuclear Engineering Degree, rather than the Master of Engineering Physics (Nuclear Option).

The new degree will replace the Master of Engineering Physics (Nuclear Option) Degree, which will be discontinued. The tentative and revised curriculum for the Master of Nuclear Engineering requires no new faculty and as of now only one new course, Radio Chemistry, three hours.

President Cross recommended that the Regents authorize the new degree of Master of Nuclear Engineering and simultaneous dropping of the Master of Engineering Physics (Nuclear Option) Degree.

Approved on motion by Regent Northcutt.

The Graduate College also requests authority to offer the degree of Master of Preventive Medicine and Public Health through the Department of Preventive Medicine and Public Health in the School of Medicine. This works into the complex of the graduate work in the Basic Sciences where the graduate degrees have already been authorized.

President Cross recommended approval by the Regents.

Approved on motion by Regent Northcutt.

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President Cross recommended adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Oklahoma National Guard is relinquishing certain space in and adjacent to Hangar Building No. 301 at Westheimer Field; and

WHEREAS, the U. S. Army Reserve desires to lease approximately 9,320 square feet of inside space and approximately 60,000 square feet of outside ramp and tie-down space; and

WHEREAS, the remainder of the space to be relinquished by the Oklahoma National Guard will be assigned to the Department of Aeronautical and Space Engineering;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the President of the University be authorized to negotiate and sign such release documents with the Oklahoma National Guard, on behalf of the Board of Regents, as may be required.

AND FURTHER, BE IT RESOLVED that the President of the University be authorized to negotiate agreements with the U. S. Army Reserve for use of facilities at Westheimer Field, and to sign such documents, on behalf of the Board of Regents, as may be required.

Approved on motion by Regent Morgan.

President Cross reported the Federal Aviation Agency has requested that the University of Oklahoma lease Buildings 803, 805, and a portion of Building 1005 to FAA on an annual basis for use by FAA Space Technology Research Projects, with annual renewal provisions not to extend beyond June 30, 1963.

Coupled with this request would be the necessity of altering the premises to adapt them for the FAA Research Project. This would cost \$30,123.94. Although FAA can pay a rental rate which will ultimately absorb this cost over a twelve to sixteen month period, FAA cannot pay this amount in advance.

The University does not have sufficient unallocated funds to advance this cost of alteration. Therefore, even though this project is very desirable, and at the end of the lease the building and improvements thereto would revert to the University and provide the University with excellent laboratory facilities, it is not feasible that the University, as such, undertake this project.

However, the Executive Director of the Research Institute is interested in this matter. The Institute has funds available for this purpose and is desirous of working out the following arrangement, if possible:

1. The Research Institute would lease the desired premises from the University of Oklahoma at the standard University maintenance rate, plus custodial costs, plus metered costs of utilities for the duration of the term of the lease desired by FAA. (This would be 52¢ per square foot plus the cost of utilities - total square footage involved, 30,340 square feet.)
2. Have the proposed alteration and construction work done by the University of Oklahoma Physical Plant at cost, said cost to be paid by the Research Institute (whether Research Institute ultimately recoups this full cost from FAA or not).
3. Permit the Research Institute to sublease the premises described to FAA at a rental figure which FAA and Research Institute can agree upon. This figure will be calculated to insure the Research Institute of 6 per cent return on the money advanced for the construction purposes, repayment of the construction costs, costs of the lease by the Research Institute from the University, plus the utility expenses and costs of administration by the Research Institute. The pay out period would extend over the two-three year term of the lease.
4. At termination of the FAA lease, all of the premises would revert to the University of Oklahoma, subject only to the Research Institute having first option on the use of the improved facilities as necessary for further development of Research Institute projects and programs.

This arrangement appears to be in the best interest of the University, its development, the development of the Research Institute, and appears further feasible inasmuch as it requires no capital outlay by the University of Oklahoma and no loss of money to the University.

President Cross recommended that the Regents of the University of Oklahoma authorize the President of the Board of Regents to execute a lease of the buildings requested to the Research Institute with authority to the Research Institute to sublet said buildings to the Federal Aviation Agency for the purposes and in accordance with the provisions above.

Approved on motion by Regent Morgan.

President Cross reported as follows on Estimated Income and Proposed Expenditures of the Athletic Department for the year 1960-61; also Proposed Capital Improvements:

President Cross recommended confirmation of the mail vote, April 18, on the purchase and installation of tile in bathrooms of Sequoyah House and Worcester House, Woodrow Wilson Center Dormitories. Invitations to submit bids were sent to four concerns but only the following bids were received:

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
