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MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA BOARD OF REGENTS SEPTEMBER 11, 1986

A regular meeting of the Board of Regents of The University of Oklahoma was held in the Board Room of the Foundation Building on the Norman Campus beginning at 9:10 a.m. on Thursday, September 11, 1986.

Notice of the time, date, and place of this meeting was submitted to the Secretary of State and the agenda was posted in the office of the Board of Regents on or before 1:30 p.m. on September 9, 1986, both as required by Enrolled House Bill 1416 (1977 Oklahoma Legislature).

The following Regents were present: Regent Tom McCurdy, Chairman, presiding; Regents John M. Imel, Thomas Elwood Kemp, Charles F. Sarratt, Ronald H. White, M.D., Sarah C. Hogan, and Sylvia A. Lewis.

The following also were present for all or part of the meeting: Dr. Frank E. Horton, President of the University, Provosts Joan Wadlow and Clayton Rich, Vice Presidents Anona L. Adair, David A. Burr, and Arthur J. Elbert, and Barbara H. Tuttle, Executive Secretary of the Board of Regents. Other executive officers present were: Mr. Gary L. Smith, Mr. Stanley M. Ward, and Mr. Robert P. White.

Regent Hogan moved approval of the minutes of the regular meeting held on July 24, 1986 as printed and distributed prior to the meeting. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

President Horton reminded the Regents that "Research Today for a Better Tomorrow", a report on sponsored programs at The University of Oklahoma for the fiscal year 1985, was forwarded to them with their agenda for this meeting. He said he will ask Provosts Wadlow and Rich to discuss this report and the research activities that are taking place on both campuses of the University.

First, however, he pointed out some outstanding grant and contract activities that are taking place this month. He said it is significant that some of these awards have been made and it reflects the quality and level of the scholarly activity at The University of Oklahoma. He reminded the Regents of the announcement last Saturday morning at a press conference of \$3.3 million in grants to the Health Sciences Center (\$2.7 million to the College of Medicine) from the Presbyterian Health Foundation. He said these will help immensely the research programs in medicine and the University is extremely grateful for the grants. A second area is a three-year grant from the National Science Foundation for Midnet, a regional universities computer network which will allow Norman Campus faculty to access the national computing centers established by the NSF. OU is a member of the eight-institution consortium which submitted the

proposal to NSF. Initially operations will be coordinated by the University of Nebraska. A third area is an agreement with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration which provides for the establishment of a Cooperative Institute for Applied Remote Sensing at the University. He said this Institute is reported in more detail in the item included in the agenda for action of the Board later in the meeting. A fourth item, he said, is another award from the National Science Foundation, the Epscor grant. Oklahoma will be one of eight states to receive this award for an experimental program to stimulate competitive research. The NSF makes these awards to states which have previously not had strong science and technology bases generally but show a willingness to make a commitment towards strengthening these bases. Funds from this award will be used to support the research of several faculty members in a variety of departments. The last area he commented on is a \$986,000 proposal for a grant from the Oklahoma Higher Education System Foundation which will provide for the establishment of a doctoral program and research center in professional continuing education. He said \$500,000 of the funds will be fellowships to support graduate students studying in that area. He said Dean Fred Wood of our College of Education will have primary responsibility for this program.

Dr. Horton extended congratulations to Dean Kenneth Hoving who played a leadership roll in the acquisition of many of these grants.

President Horton then introduced Provosts Wadlow and Rich who each commented on the various activities included in the report on each campus and the impact of these grants and contracts on the economy of the State of Oklahoma.

In closing, Dr. Horton called attention to the bottom line of the report which indicates that for fiscal year 1985 approximately \$47.5 million in grants and contracts was received by the faculty and staff of the University.

STADIUM SUITES AND OTHER IMPROVEMENTS TO OKLAHOMA MEMORIAL STADIUM

Pursuant to a public invitation to bid, the University received one bid from SportSuites Inc. to lease space in the Oklahoma Memorial Stadium for a term of 15 years to construct sky suites, loge seating, and to make other improvements to the stadium.

The bid of SportSuites Inc. is to develop 99 luxury sky suites and a climatized loge area with seating for 850 persons. These improvements would be made to the east side of Oklahoma Memorial Stadium. In addition, SportSuites Inc. would construct badly needed restroom facilities, concession stands, novelty stands, new ramps, and concrete the floor of the concourse area of the east side of the stadium. The total cost of the sky suites and loge seats is estimated by the bidder to be \$9,024,000 and the University estimates that these other improvements to the stadium will cost approximately \$3,000,000 exclusive of financing charges.

During the first five-year period of the leasehold agreement, the University will receive a 25% interest in the gross revenues. During the second five-year period the University will receive a 30% interest in the gross

revenues. During the final five-year period the University will receive a 35% interest in the gross revenues. The University's interest in the revenues generated by the improvements will be subordinated to the debt service on the construction bonds and operating expenses. In addition, the University will receive a distribution of 60% of the revenues beyond debt service and operating expenses on an annual basis until the gross percentage is attained.

In order to construct the improvements, Physical Plant and Architectural and Engineering Services have determined that it will be necessary to improve the electrical and mechanical services at an estimated cost to the University of \$570,000. The electrical services serve academic as well as athletic facilities and the present electrical service is inadequate to meet the needs of these facilities. SportSuites Inc. is willing to improve the electrical and mechanical services as part of this project as hereinafter provided.

Architectural and Engineering Services and the University's consulting engineer have also determined that extensive repairs are needed to correct the water permeation problem in the stadium. It is estimated that the cost to repair the east side of the stadium is \$974,000 and that it will cost \$2,339,000 to repair the balance of the stadium to prevent further damage from water permeation. While these repairs are not emergent in nature, they need to be addressed within the next few years in order to prevent further deterioration to the structure of the stadium. Renovation of the east side of the stadium by SportSuites Inc. will include the estimated \$1,000,000 cost to repair the east side of the stadium and correct the water permeation problem.

If the bid is awarded to SportSuites Inc., it will have the sole and exclusive responsibility for financing the construction of these improvements to the stadium and managing the suites during a 15-year lease term. At the end of the 15-year lease term, the University will own all of the improvements free and clear of any leasehold interest or other encumbrances incurred by SportSuites Inc. to construct the facilities. SportSuites Inc. has indicated that its cost to construct these suite improvements is \$9,024,000 and that the project cost with financing amortized over a 15-year term is \$11,965,000.

The University does not have financial risk for the construction of the sky suites and loge seating. It does, however, have exposure for the other improvements to the stadium projected to cost \$3.8 million with interest amortized over 15 years. On an annual basis the cost to pay for these improvements is approximately \$450,000.

According to the representative of SportSuites Inc., 42 sky suites and 850 loge seats must be sold to meet the break-even point on the \$11,965,000 sky suite and loge financing commitment. If SportSuites Inc. fails to sell that many suites and loge seats, it bears solely and exclusively this risk of loss. On the other hand, in order to debt service the sky boxes, loges and additional improvements that will cost an estimated \$3.8 million, 55 sky suites and 850 loge seats must be sold. That number of sales will pay the debt service on \$3.8 million and provide approximately \$200,000 cash to the operating budget of the Athletic Department for each year of the 15-year term.

SportSuites Inc. will not bear the risk of loss on the additional improvements costing approximately \$3.8 million should the sales be deficient to cover the annual payment of approximately \$450,000. The Department of Athletics is in the process of establishing a capital expense budget to pay for the needed improvements to Oklahoma Memorial Stadium. Funds to pay for possible shortfalls in revenue in the event sales are short of the debt service levels would have to be identified within the general operating budget of the Athletic Department. Also, consideration is being given to the elimination of the waterproofing of the east side of the stadium to reduce approximately \$1,000,000 of costs inasmuch as that portion of the renovation could be deferred for several years although it would be highly desirable to make the repairs at this time. As indicated above, \$570,000 of the renovation aspect of the project is required to address electrical and mechanical repair issues. Stadium suites and loge seating cannot be undertaken without making these repairs and it should be noted that the present electrical and mechanical systems service academic as well as athletic facilities. Likewise, it is estimated that the cost of the concourse paving, restroom reconstruction renovation, exterior improvements, concession stand construction, and novelty stand construction is \$1,031,000.

The development plan of SportSuites includes the assumption that the University will:

- 1. Assist in the marketing
- 2. Provide a number of tickets to the Texas game and bowl game equal in number and desirability of location for the suite and loge leaseholders.
- 3. Provide sufficient and well located parking.

SportSuites Inc. will comply with the provisions of the Oklahoma Public Competitive Bidding Act in the construction of the improvements to the stadium and all construction will be consistent with applicable University procedures related to the construction of University facilities.

President Horton recommended that the bid of SportSuites Inc. for the construction of 99 Stadium sky suites and 850 loge seats together with the renovation of the east side of Oklahoma Memorial Stadium be accepted by the Board of Regents and that the Office of Legal Counsel be directed to prepare the formal agreement with SportSuites Inc.

A lengthy and complete review of the SportSuites proposal was presented at the Committee meeting on Wednesday by the following individuals representing the SportSuites proposal and most particularly Mr. Marc Ganis:

Following the SportSuites presentation at the Committee meeting, Mr. Sam Meason, representing Diamond Circle Associates, Dallas, Texas, had presented the following letter addressed to the Board of Regents and dated September 10, 1986:

"Ladies and Gentlemen:

"On July 28, 1986, the University of Oklahoma issued to prospective Bidders an Invitation to Bid for Leasehold of East Side Stadium Area for Construction of Suites and Concourse Renovation for the University of Oklahoma. Prospective Bidders were therein advised of the minimum Bid requirements established by the University's competitive bidding process, all in accordance with the Oklahoma Public Competitive Bidding Act.

"As provided for in the Invitation, a Pre-Bid conference was held on August 11, 1986, in the Santee Lounge. In response to questions from prospective Bidders, Chief Legal Counsel for the University advised all present that the Stadium Suites Bid Specifications were minimum Bid requirements which must be satisfied by all Bidders. Chief Legal Counsel further advised those present that additional information beyond that required could be submitted without having a Bid disqualified as being non-responsive, but that all minimum requirements must be satisfied.

"Paragraph 2.5, <u>Marketing Plan</u>, of the Bid Specifications states: 'The University <u>requires</u> each bidder to submit in detail their plan for marketing stadium suites and the distribution of revenues thus generated.'

"On or before the Bid close date, Sports Suites, Inc., filed a Bid with the University, and on page 15 of its Bid states, 'The Marketing Plan is not ready for implementation. Considerable development work is in progress concurrent with this submission.'

"Sports Suites, Inc., failed to file its marketing plan in detail as required by the minimum Stadium Suites Bid Specifications.

"Diamond Circle Associates accordingly files a formal objection with the Board of Regents regarding the Bid of Sports Suites, Inc. The Bid must be disqualified for failing to meet one of the most important elements of the Bid Specifications—an element <u>required</u> by the University of all Bidders.

"In the event the Board of Regents elects to waive the minimum Bid requirements for a marketing plan, Diamond Circle Associates formally requests that all prospective Bidders be advised of the granting of such waiver and that

such Bidders be permitted all of the privileges provided by the Oklahoma Public Competitive bidding Act related to authorized changes in Bid Specifications prior to any Contract award related to the project contemplated by the Invitation.

"Diamond Circle Associates is confident that the Board of Regents will not compromise the integrity of the competitive bidding process for the University of Oklahoma.

At the Committee meeting Mr. Meason presented details of the Diamond Circle proposal and asked the Regents to reject the SportSuites proposal because it doesn't meet the bid specifications and to extend the date for receiving bids by 30 days. He does not believe that a 30-day extension will jeopardize the project for 1987.

Chairman McCurdy announced that Mr. Marc Ganis had asked to have the opportunity to make some remarks as a response to Mr. Meason's presentation at the meeting on Wednesday.

Mr. Ganis said that he will make remarks only about his own proposal. He believes this should be a positive project and not one to create conflict. He believes the SportSuites proposal was responsive to the bid specifications. The proposal included a complete marketing approach and the information was included throughout the proposal. He said at no time since the bid opening has there been any suggestion that the proposal was defective. He mentioned various items such as the anticipated lease term and fee for the suites and the sky lounges and a discussion of what the amenities will be that were included in the proposal and are a portion of the marketing plan. He said the statement included in the proposal that the marketing plan is not ready for implementation was inserted as a result of the bid specifications; they cannot implement a marketing approach without approval by the University.

Mr. Ganis said questions were raised at the Wednesday meeting on the financing aspects and the certainty of the financing. He said major financial institutions can make only certain guarantees at certain points of the process. He said Goldman Sachs gave yesterday the maximum legal limit of a commitment to guarantee that they can at this time. Without a leasehold agreement in hand they cannot legally go any further. He emphasized the size and reputation of Goldman Sachs and indicated that financing will not be a problem. With regard to concessions, Mr. Ganis said the proposal provides that on the average the University will receive 30% of the gross revenues from concessions. With regard to the electrical problems discussed at the Committee meeting, Mr. Ganis said

that he is committing right now that SportSuites will include within the contract any electrical improvement costs that are directly affiliated with the construction of the new part of the stadium - probably about \$250,000. In further discussions of this matter later in the meeting, Mr. Ganis indicated that the additional items of electrical and mechanical work identified in the discussions yesterday up to \$570,000 would be considered in the negotiations for the final agreement with the Regents on this project.

Mr. Ganis said that if the Regents want this improvement for the 1987 season, it cannot be delayed. He talked about the tight time-frame and said he believes if there is any further delay the project cannot be completed until 1988. Mr. Ganis included in his comments that they plan to use Oklahoma workers and contractors on this project.

Mr. Ganis said that Bill Mack, Managing Partner of The Mack Company and the President of SportSuites, is not doing this project for the dollars involved but only because of a business relationship (as a favor to Mr. Ganis). Mr. Ganis said he did not want the Regents to think that he is offering an ultimatum because he is not but he said Mr. Mack told him that if the University, almost at the end of the stream, would change the bid process he had questions about how secure a bidder can be when he makes a bid to the University. "He said it impugns the entire process and tells us we are not dealing with good, reasonable, solid, reputable businessmen who are going to go forward with their commitments in the future. If that's the case, we'll just go on to the next one."

Regent Imel objected strongly to these comments. He said the Regents have to consider what is in the best interest of The University of Oklahoma first.

Regent Sarratt supported Mr. Ganis' statements and said "if you let me see someone elses bid, I'll give you a better one tomorrow". He said he believes the credibility of the University with regard to the bid process will be questioned if the University does not proceed with the SportSuites proposal.

President Horton called attention to the recently received information on the unanticipated improvements that are required in the Stadium as discussed at the Committee meeting on Wednesday.

Regent Kemp said he feels as strongly about this as Regent Sarratt. He moved approval of President Horton's recommendation.

During the discussion that followed, Mr. Ganis made it very clear that all of the items included in the proposal were still subject to negotiation with the University and that anything negotiated could still come back to the Regents for approval. He said he'd like to have two months to negotiate the final agreement but feels that under the time-frame circumstances that an agreement could be negotiated in a couple of weeks. Mr. Ganis also indicated that he would be willing to do the repair work necessary in the Stadium at cost.

Regent White emphasized that he does not believe the Board is dealing with the credibility of SportSuites. "I have no reason to question that their bid isn't good and have no reason to think we would reject their bid." He believes the only question is whether the bid process was misleading or perhaps illegal according to the bidding act.

In response to questions, Chief Legal Counsel Ward reiterated that he feels the proposal of SportSuites does conform with the bid specifications. He called attention to the fact that this was basically a pilot project and it was necessary to set forth the specific criteria but also to give the prospective bidders enough flexibility so that each bidder could come forward with a creative proposal. He commented on the pre-bid conference that was held on August 11 at which time the bid specifications and requirements were discussed in detail and questions answered.

Regent Imel asked questions about the request for Texas and bowl game tickets for the leaseholders and asked if they would be willing to waive that requirement. Mr. Ganis stated at this moment they would be willing to negotiate that request.

The Regents talked about the desirability of having information early if the final agreement is to be brought to the Board for approval. It was suggested that each Regent who wishes should participate in the negotiating process and that a summary of each negotiating session be mailed to each Regent.

Regent McCurdy asked Mr. Meason if he had any comments. Mr. Meason said he would file with the Board of Regents a letter from Huber, Hunt, Nichols, signed by its Executive Vice President which cites their commitment. He also asked, if University Counsel has deemed that the SportSuites proposal was filed in conformance with paragraph 2.5, that it be issued in writing. Also, if the proposal is being expanded to include other improvements, he requested the Board issue new specifications as Diamond Circle Associates would want the right to bid on them.

On the vote on Regent Kemp's motion to approve President Horton's recommendation the following voted yes with the understanding the proposed agreement would be submitted to the Regents a week before the agreement is to be acted on: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

FINANCIAL ANALYSES

The financial analyses for the University for the period ending June 30, 1986 (the final report for the 1985-86 fiscal year) and the first report for 1986-87 for the period ending July 31, 1986 were reviewed by President Horton at the Committee meeting on Wednesday. The reports are attached hereto as Exhibit A.

REGENTS' ENDOWMENT REPORT

The Regents' Endowment Report for the year ended June 30, 1986 was distributed to the Regents with the agenda for this meeting. The report was reviewed at the Committee of the Whole meeting by Mr. Ron Burton, University Trust Officer.

The report was presented for information. No action was required.

INVESTMENTS

J. & W. Seligman & Co., investment advisers, recently submitted the following recommendations for changes in the Regents' endowment investments:

The Celanese and the Noxell were recommended for sale in order to realize profits and to provide a source of funding for the purchases. J. & W. Seligman believes that both issues have reached their potential. The Highland Superstores and the Lubys were recommended for sale in order to limit exposure since neither has performed as expected.

Great Northern Nekoosa is a manufacturer of paper and paper products. Union Electric is a quality utility in the Missouri, Illinois, and Iowa areas. Bank of Boston is the national holding company for the First National Bank of Boston.

A \$100,000 Certificate of Deposit in the Liberty National Bank in Norman matured on August 4, 1986. The funds will be invested in a 90 to 120-day U.S. Treasury note.

These investment transactions were approved by the President and University Trust Officer and the transactions completed.

INTERNAL AUDIT REPORTS

President Horton called attention to the following audit reports which were completed recently:

- 1. Payroll Services Norman Campus
- 2. Motor Pool Norman Campus
- 3. Professional Practice Plan of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, Tulsa
- 4. Bursar, The University of Oklahoma Tulsa Medical College
- 5. Goddard Health Center

A copy of each report had been distributed to each Regent with the agenda for this meeting. President Horton said the first four audit reports are routine. An executive summary of the Goddard Health Center audit was presented as follows:

The Charles B. Goddard Health Center provides health care services to students and as of April 1985, to faculty, staff and dependents.

The audit indicated that due to a breakdown of supervisory reviews of daily financial activities of the Center, various functions were not performed properly. As a result, there was a three month delay in filing insurance claims which amounted to approximately \$26,000. Certain charges had been outstanding for 10 months without appropriate follow-up action being initiated. In addition, it is possible that not all non-student patient charges were fully accounted for since some of the departments did not account for the charge documents.

Management has taken immediate steps to remedy the problems discussed in the audit report.

Mr. John Eckert, Director of Internal Auditing, was at the Committee meeting on Wednesday and the audit reports, particularly the Goddard Health Center report, were discussed in some detail with him and with Vice President Adair.

The reports were presented for information. No action was required.

ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT AUDIT

The NCAA now requires that the intercollegiate athletic programs of all member institutions be audited annually. Coopers and Lybrand has been engaged to perform an audit of the University as a whole for 1985-86. A separate examination of the statement of revenues and expenditures of the intercollegiate athletics program would not be required if the audit is performed by Coopers and Lybrand. Instead "minimum agreed upon procedures", those required by the NCAA, would be developed to expand the University-wide audit procedures to provide additional coverage of Department of Athletics accounts and the revenues and expenditures of outside organizations that are not under the auditing control of the University. Such procedures would include the reconciliation of expenditures by outside organizations for or in behalf of the University's intercollegiate athletics programs or employees to the Athletic Department's accounting records and examination of support for any individual contribution received by the intercollegiate athletics programs that constitutes more than 10% of all such contributions.

In addition, supplemental procedures as suggested by the NCAA for outside organizations would be developed to provide detailed examination of cash receipts and cash disbursement records and evaluation of internal accounting controls. These supplemental procedures are at the option of the University.

Coopers and Lybrand's examination would be in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and in accordance with the June, 1986 NCAA Financial Audit Guidelines.

The primary purpose of such an examination would be to ensure that the University is made aware of all recorded expenditures, both internal and external, for athletic purposes and is intended to assist the University in exercising control over expenditures made for and in behalf of the intercollegiate athletic programs. The University's Internal Auditing Department would assist Coopers and Lybrand with the audit.

President Horton recommended that Coopers and Lybrand be engaged to conduct the audit for 1985-86 of the Department of Athletics as required by the NCAA at a fee of \$14,000.

This proposal to appoint Coopers and Lybrand for the Athletic Department audits required by the NCAA was discussed at length at the Committee meeting on Wednesday.

Regent Sarratt moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis (Regent Kemp was out of the room). The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

AGREEMENT WITH OU FOUNDATION

The following Agreement for Mutual Cooperation was discussed at some length at the Committee meeting on Wednesday:

This Agreement is entered into by and between the Board of Regents of The University of Oklahoma ("Regents") and the Board of Trustees of the University of Oklahoma Foundation, Inc. ("Trustees"), as a special agreement for the purpose of providing financial information and conducting mutually advantageous accounting procedures.

Each party, for the purpose of this Agreement, gives recognition to the independent status of the other, recognizing that the Board of Regents of The University of Oklahoma is a constitutional entity whose primary function is the governance of The University of Oklahoma in its educational mission, and that the University of Oklahoma Foundation, Inc. is a non-profit corporation chartered under the laws of Oklahoma and whose primary purpose as set forth in its Articles of Incorporation is to provide assistance to The University of Oklahoma as the primary beneficiary of the Foundation's trust mission.

The Regents and the Trustees recognize that by virtue of University fund-raising activities, certain of the funds are donated or raised for the benefit of The University of Oklahoma and are placed on deposit with the University of Oklahoma Foundation, Inc. to be expended by authority of an account sponsor who is a University employee and that therefore it becomes necessary for the Regents in the governance of their employees to ascertain that these funds are appropriately expended for University purposes. Regardless, the Trustees have discretion to invest the funds and make them available for appropriate University purposes.

The Regents and the Trustees, in a spirit of cooperation, have agreed that the Regents or their authorized designee may be given access to Foundation records or materials for audit purposes as to any of these specific accounts sponsored by University employees and upon reasonable notice and request.

Furthermore, because of their separate functions and operations, the Regents and the Trustees are desirous of conducting periodic meetings through one or more Regents and a committee of Trustees for the purpose of implementing policies and procedures in reference to maintaining a free flow of information in the spirit of ascertaining that monies donated to The University of Oklahoma and deposited with the University of Oklahoma Foundation, Inc. are being appropriately expended by University of Oklahoma employees for educational and donor purposes.

President Horton recommended the Chairman of the Board of Regents be authorized to execute the Agreement for Mutual Cooperation between the Board of Regents and the Board of Trustees of the OU Foundation as shown above.

Regent Imel moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, White, Hogan, and Lewis. Regent Sarratt voted no. The Chair declared the motion approved. Regent Sarratt indicated he voted no because he does not understand the agreement and because he does not want an individual right to be lessened in any way.

Regent White retired from the meeting for a few minutes.

MODIFICATION OF REGENTS' AWARDS POLICY

The policy on the Regents' Awards for Superior Teaching, Superior Research and Creative Activity, and Superior Professional and University Service includes a cash award of \$1,000. This amount was established in 1978. It is desirable at this time to increase the cash award because of inflation and because most other faculty awards include substantially greater monetary rewards.

The cash awards are provided by private funds.

President Horton recommended that the cash award provided the recipients of the Regents' Awards for Superior Teaching, Superior Research and Creative Activity, and Superior Professional and University Service be increased to \$2,000 effective with the awards given in the spring of 1987.

Regent Lewis moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

PRESIDENT'S HOME IMPROVEMENTS

Regent McCurdy said since the early 1900's The University of Oklahoma has owned and maintained a home for the President of the University. The current building is located at 1200 South Pickard. It is expected that the President and his family will live in the house and that it also will be used by the President for official University functions and entertaining as he desires. President Horton plans to use the home for official University functions significantly more than has been the case in the past. For this reason, and because general maintenance improvements have not been made for some time, certain repair, refurbishing and renovation is necessary.

Chairman McCurdy recommended that pursuant to a study made for improvements to the President's Home that the Board authorize the expenditure of a reasonable amount not to exceed \$160,000 to be paid for from private funds donated for this specific purpose.

Regent Imel moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Hogan, and Lewis. Regent Sarratt voted no. The Chair declared the motion approved. Regent Sarratt stated he voted no because the material was not presented in a timely manner.

MAJOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS AND REVENUE BONDS

Progress reports on major capital improvement projects under construction and in various stages of planning on both campuses of the University were distributed to the Regents with the agenda for this meeting as shown on Exhibit B attached. A report on the University's outstanding revenue bonds as of June 30, 1986 was included.

These reports were presented for information only. No action was required.

GAYLORD CHAIR OF OPHTHALMOLOGY

At the April meeting the Board approved the establishment of the Gaylord Chair in Ophthalmology (page 18957). A committee was appointed according to Regents' policy and has proposed that the Chair be filled by Dr. Thomas E. Acers. This recommendation has been endorsed by the Dean, the Provost, and President Horton.

President Horton recommended approval of the appointment of Dr. Thomas E. Acers, Chair and Professor of Ophthalmology, to the Gaylord Chair of Ophthalmology effective immediately.

Regent Hogan moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

COLLEGE OF MEDICINE ADMISSIONS BOARD

President Horton said the nominations for the individuals to be appointed to the 1986-87 College of Medicine Admissions Board have been generated in the appropriate way. Regents' action is required to appoint the Admissions Board.

Regent Imel moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

FACULTY DISCRIMINATION POLICY

President Horton reminded the Regents that the University has had a Faculty Discrimination Policy on the Health Sciences Center campus for several years. A copy of the current policy was distributed to the Regents with the agenda for this meeting.

President Horton said the proposed policy represents a more simplistic process to review and hopefully adjudicate on an informal basis discrimination allegations. The new process permits the Affirmative Action Officer the opportunity to work out a reconciliation of a grievance before it is sent to a formal hearing. Additional administrative due process is provided by appeals to the Provost, President, and ultimately to the Regents.

The new policy will provide that any person impacted by discrimination on the Health Sciences Center Campus will be afforded the opportunity to be heard, confront, and cross-examine witnesses, and be represented by a person of his or her choice. All of these safeguards insure the due process rights of the faculty member. This process has application not only for the alleged victim of discrimination but also for those individuals who are charged with discriminatory acts.

President Horton recommended adoption of the following Faculty Discrimination Policy for the Health Sciences Center Campus to be effective immediately:

The University has a policy of internal adjudication in matters relating to alleged discrimination. The process involves informal investigation and conciliation attempt by the Affirmative Action Officer which may be followed by a formal hearing by the Committee on Discrimination. The Committee on Discrimination shall consist of nine members, three of whom shall serve staggered three-year terms. The Faculty Senate shall nominate twice as many nominees as there are vacant faculty positions. Members shall be appointed by the President from these nominees. The Senate in nominating members should be sensitive to the purpose of the Committee and the need for representation on the Committee of both sexes, of ethnic minority groups, and various academic ranks. The Committee shall elect its own Chair annually from among those members whose terms are nearest expiration.

Any faculty member, including those on temporary or part-time appointment, who believes that he or she has been discriminated against because of race, ethnic or national origin, sex, creed, color, or age or who believes that he or she has been a victim of sexual harassment should give the University's Affirmative Action Officer a written account of the alleged act of discrimination no later than (forty-five) 45 calendar days after becoming aware of its occurrence. The Affirmative Action Officer shall (a) request a written response from the respondent, (b) investigate the alleged discriminatory act, and (c) attempt to effect an informal settlement between the parties involved within three (3) months period. In the absence of such a settlement, the Affirmative Action Officer shall determine whether issues exist for a formal hearing and shall then notify the complainant, respondent, and the President that settlement is not possible.

If issues are found to exist for a formal hearing, the complainant may, within ten (10) days of receiving notification, request a hearing by notifying the Affirmative Action Officer. Within three (3) weeks of receiving the request, the Affirmative Action Officer shall notify the respondent, convene the Committee on Discrimination, and give the committee a copy of the complaint and response. No other material shall be forwarded.

The following procedures shall apply to a formal hearing:

- a. Hearings shall be closed unless the complainant requests that they be open.
- b. The Committee shall invite the parties to the grievance to present their arguments. Members of the Committee, and the parties directly involved may call witnesses, present statements, and ask questions of one another and of the witnesses. The principle of confrontation shall apply.
- c. At the Committee hearing, each party may be accompanied by an adviser.
- d. The Committee shall consider as evidence only those relevant documents and materials presented by the parties at the hearing and which all parties to the dispute have been afforded access.
- e. At any point in the proceedings, the complainant may withdraw the charge. The grounds for the alleged grievance, however, may not be changed after the informal conference involving the Affirmative Action Officer and the parties to the complaint.
- f. The Committee shall complete its hearings and submit its findings of fact and recommendations to the President through the Provost, with copies to the parties directly involved and to the Affirmative Action Officer, within sixty (60) days of receipt of the grievance.

Within thirty (30) days after completion of the hearing, the Provost shall forward them to the President. If the Provost makes additional recommendations to the President, the Chair of the Committee, both parties and the Affirmative Action Officer shall receive a copy of such recommendations.

Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the findings and recommendations, the President shall communicate his or her own written decision to the parties involved, the Chair of the Committee, and the Affirmative Action Officer. If the President decides not to accept the recommendations of the Committee, he or she shall include a statement of the reasons for the action. If the President finds that an act of discrimination has in fact occurred, he shall direct appropriate steps to be taken to remedy the situation.

In the event of dissatisfaction with the action taken by the President, the complainant or the respondent may appeal to the Board of Regents for a review of the case. The decision of the Regents ends the internal processes for settlement of the grievance.

Regent Lewis moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

CONTRACT WITH EASTERN STATE HOSPITAL

The University of Oklahoma Tulsa Medical College and Eastern State Hospital desire to enter into an agreement which will result in improved educational opportunities for medical students and residents, will provide better care for patients needing mental health services, and will provide increased opportunities for clinical investigation and research.

Eastern State Hospital is a 360-bed facility for the mentally ill operated by the Department of Mental Health in Vinita, Oklahoma. Access to patients housed in the facilities of the hospital will provide invaluable educational and training experiences for medical students and residents. Patients in

this hospital often represent the most severe forms of mental illness which may not be encountered in the usual setting of a clinic, general hospital, or even a private psychiatric hospital. Numerous professionals on the staff of the hospital will be able to participate in the educational process offering the different perspectives of clinical psychologists, psychiatric social workers, and psychiatric nurses.

The Hospital and the Tulsa Medical College have agreed that the services of Thomas A. Goodman, M.D., J.D., will be provided to develop and direct the forensic psychiatry program under the auspices of The University of Oklahoma Tulsa Medical College and with the cooperation of Eastern State Hospital and the Department of Mental Health.

Under terms of the contract, Eastern State Hospital will pay the Tulsa Medical College a maximum sum of \$105,790 during the term of the contract which is September 1, 1986 through June 30, 1987. Payments for services will be made in monthly installments not to exceed \$10,579.

President Horton recommended the administration be authorized to enter into a contract with Eastern State Hospital as explained above.

Regent Imel moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

AFFILIATION AGREEMENT AMENDMENT

In June, 1985 (page 18426), the Board of Regents entered into an affiliation agreement with St. Francis Hospital of Tulsa Medical Research Institute. The purpose of the affiliation was to develop a cooperation in the furtherance of both the research aims of the Institute and the research and educational purposes of The University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center.

It is now the desire of St. Francis Hospital of Tulsa Medical Research Institute to amend the affiliation agreement to provide for a change in the period of the contract. The Institute proposes to change the period from a fiscal year basis, October 1 through September 30, to a calendar year basis, January 1 through December 31.

The administration of the Health Sciences Center has recommended the proposed contract period change.

President Horton recommended the affiliation agreement with St. Francis Hospital of Tulsa Medical Research Institute be amended to change the contract period from a fiscal year October 1 through September 30 basis to a calendar year January 1 through December 31 basis.

Regent Imel moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

CHANGE IN NAME OF SURGERY DIVISION

In the College of Dentistry, Oral Surgery is a department. In the College of Medicine, Oral Surgery is a division within the Department of Surgery. In 1983 the name of the department in the College of Dentistry was changed to Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery. It is appropriate that the division in the Department of Surgery and the department in the College of Dentistry have the same name.

President Horton recommended approval of changing the name of the Division of Oral Surgery within the Department of Surgery, College of Medicine, to Division of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery, effective immediately.

Regent Lewis moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

PURCHASE OF CARPET

A recent carpet survey of all Health Sciences Center buildings was conducted by the Site Support Department. Upon inspection, the carpet was identified as being in good, fair, poor or bad condition. Of the 42,000 square yards surveyed, approximately 12,000 square yards were classified as being in poor or bad condition.

Representatives of the Site Support and Purchasing Departments visited the Hollytex Carpet Mill in Anadarko, Oklahoma. The quality of the carpet and the manufacturing process were examined and specifications were written around this Oklahoma made product or its equal.

The bid specifications did not guarantee any quantities to be ordered nor obligate the University, except to the extent that each purchase against the resulting contract will be on an as-needed basis only. In order to obtain the lowest and best price over an extended period of time, to set a standard for quality, and to eliminate unnecessary paper work, bids were sent to 15 vendors in Oklahoma requesting quotations on the following three types of carpet with coordinating colors: (1) 30 oz. per yard tufted cut pile, (2) 38 oz. per yard tufted cut pile, (3) 26 oz. per yard textured level loop.

American Millwork Company, Inc., of Oklahoma City submitted the low bid on all items specified, including an alternate.

The prices quoted are good for 12 months with the option to renew the contract for an additional four years on an annual basis. Any subsequent price increase would not exceed the producers price index, table 5, industry code 2272 and product code 2272-30301.

The Site Support and Purchasing Departments propose the low bid be accepted in its entirety so that carpet may be purchased on an as-needed basis as funds are identified.

President Horton recommended the Health Sciences Center be authorized to award a contract to American Millwork Company, Inc. for the purchase of carpet on an as-needed basis at the low bid prices specified above as funds are identified. The bid prices will be good for a twelve-month period from the date of contract issuance.

Regent Imel moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

PURCHASE OF COMPUTER DISK DRIVES AND CONTROLLERS

Current computer disk drives utilized by the Health Sciences Center mainframe Burroughs computer are approaching maximum capacity. Systems under development, as well as existing storage needs, require an additional 964 million bytes of disk capacity.

To address this problem, an invitation to bid for the purchase of one sequential mode disk drive and controller and one interlaced mode disk drive and controller was sent to 27 vendors. Eleven no bids were received. Three responses were received as follows:

The low bid of DSI, Incorporated for the purchase of the disk drives and controllers is satisfactory to the personnel in the Computing Services Department.

Funds have been budgeted in account 3806-9 for the purchase of the disk drives and controllers.

President Horton recommended the award of a purchase order to DSI, Incorporated for the purchase of computer disk drives and controllers in the amount of \$55,196.

Regent Sarratt moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

PROPOSALS, CONTRACTS, AND GRANTS

A summary of proposals for contracts and grants for the Health Sciences Center, including The University of Oklahoma Tulsa Medical College branch, for July and August, 1986 was included in the agenda for this meeting. A list of all contracts executed during this same period of time on proposals previously reported was also included.

President Horton recommended that the President of the University or the President's designees be authorized to execute contracts on the pending proposals as negotiations are completed. The contract budgets may differ from the proposed amounts depending on these negotiations.

Regent White moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

CONTRACTS WITH ZOOLOGICAL SOCIETY AND THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES

The contract recently finalized with the Oklahoma Zoological Society for lease of approximately 35 acres of land belonging to the University was for a period of 75 years, ending December 31, 2061. The University's agreement with the Department of Human Services for land upon which an Animal Holding Facility is to be built calls for the term of the lease to coincide with that of the Zoological Society contract.

The lease between the Zoological Society and Oklahoma Racing Associates for land, including the University's 35 acres, upon which a horse racing track will be constructed does not commence until the track opens for business, which is projected to be in the autumn of 1988. The Zoological Society has requested the University's contract be amended so their lease with the University will run concurrently with their lease with Oklahoma Racing Associates.

The Department of Human Services has agreed to extend their lease agreement with the University for the Animal Holding Facility land for an additional three years so that all three lease agreements will run concurrently.

The Zoological Society has agreed that in exchange for the University extending the current land lease agreement for an additional three years, the Society will reimburse the University \$50,000.

Oklahoma Racing Associates has further requested the right to enter upon the real property and make site improvements before the ground lease between the Regents and the Zoological Society is finalized. Accordingly, it has agreed to indemnify the Regents from liability for damages as a result of the early entry in order to meet its construction schedule.

President Horton recommended the University's contract term with the Zoological Society for lease of land be extended from 75 years to 78 years in accordance with terms outlined above, with the end of the contract period December 31, 2064, and that the University permit the early entry for the purpose of site improvements provided that Oklahoma Racing Associates indemnifies the Regents for liability for damages caused by such entry.

President Horton also recommended the University's contract term with the Department of Human Services for land upon which an Animal Holding Facility will be constructed be extended to correspond with the new ending date.

COOPERATIVE INSTITUTE FOR APPLIED REMOTE SENSING

The University of Oklahoma and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) are working together to establish a Cooperative Institute for Applied Remote Sensing (CIARS) at the University. The Institute will be a cooperative endeavor between the University and NOAA to develop techniques for making better use of geological data collected by satellite observation of the earth. Benefits the University will realize from this Institute will be increased research support from NOAA and other organizations, greater interaction with representatives from petroleum and geologically related fields, and enhanced educational and research opportunities for students and faculty working with remotely sensed applied information.

The proposal for the funding of CIARS is under final review by NOAA. The Institute will begin as soon as the final review and approval is completed. As is customary in support of sponsored research activities, the University will provide space and office facilities for the Institute. Indirect costs recovered from NOAA will more than balance the expenses associated with this contribution. Initially the director of CIARS will be an employee of the University who will devote one-half time to the operation of the Institute. The permanent director will be hired on a full-time basis with the salary paid by NOAA.

With the establishment of this Institute, the University will become the only institution in the country with more than one NOAA sponsored cooperative institute. CIARS, together with our other cooperative institute, the Cooperative Institute for Mesoscale Meteorological Studies, will eventually be housed in the Energy Center. They will provide centerpieces of excellence to strengthen the Center's programs. It is expected that CIARS will attract additional private and federal research funding.

Regent Lewis moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

MODIFICATION OF NAME

In 1972 (page 11364) when the offices of Student Government were moved from Walker Tower to Ellison Hall, the Board of Regents approved naming the Student Government activity within Ellison Hall the Hollomon Student Government Center. J. Herbert Hollomon was President of the University from July 1, 1968 to September 1, 1970. Dr. Hollomon passed away recently and the students believe now is the appropriate time to change the name to the Hollomon Memorial

Student Center. On August 26, 1986, Student Congress adopted a resolution that this change of name be made. The Student Congress action has been approved by the UOSA Student President and the Vice President for Student Affairs.

President Horton recommended that the name of the student areas in Ellison Hall be changed to the Hollomon Memorial Student Center.

Regent Hogan moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

RESOLUTION - WALTER O. MASON, JR.

President Horton recommended adoption of the following Resolution:

WHEREAS, Mr. Walter O. Mason, Jr., was a man of high ideals and uncompromising integrity who quietly and without fanfare touched the lives of those around him through his courage, his intelligence, and his sense of humor; and

WHEREAS, his belief in justice and freedom were a lodestar to all who knew him, and his dedication to that which is right served as an inspiration to many; and

WHEREAS, in his work and in his personal relationships, he always respected the dignity and the convictions of all men and women, offering advice rather than dogma, counsel rather than coercion, and logic rather than emotional declarations; and

WHEREAS, he served The University of Oklahoma through times of both trouble and joy, persevering in sometimes difficult circumstances to advance the institution through his dedication, his hours of effort, and his adherence to the principles upon which this nation was founded;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that The University of Oklahoma acknowledges the meaningful contributions of the late Walter O. Mason, Jr., expresses gratitude for his influence upon the course of University life, and extends profound sympathy to his wife and family.

Regent Lewis said it was with a great amount of pride that she moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

Regent Lewis also moved that \$35,000 of the amount to be realized as a result of the extension of the contract with the Zoological Society (see page 19236) be established in the Regents' Endowment accounts as a scholarship fund for minority students at the Health Sciences Center in memory of Walter O. Mason, Jr. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

OU/TEXAS TELECAST

Last year, shortly before the OU/Texas football game, it became apparent that it would be possible for the University to make arrangements to televise the game on October 12 and that it would qualify for the Big Eight Conference single telecast exception rule. Bids were solicited for a single, live, over-the-air public telecast and a single pay-for-view telecast of the game. Only the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metroplex markets were serviced, one by public TV and the other by pay-for-view.

It is possible a similar situation could occur this year and the next regular meeting of the Board of Regents is not scheduled until after the OU/ Texas football game. Thus, it is desirable that the Regents authorize the administration to proceed in the event the game is not going to be televised through the CFA package. President Horton said we do not anticipate that televising the Texas game would exceed the five-game policy.

President Horton recommended that if the game becomes available for an exception telecast, the administration be authorized to award a contract for the highest and best package for televising the OU/Texas game.

Regent Sarratt moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

BIDS FOR ATHLETIC RADIO BROADCASTING RIGHTS

Sealed bids for athletic radio broadcasting rights for a four-year period beginning July 1, 1987 were received on August 29. The following bids were received:

The dollar value listed above for each year with the Oklahoma News Network bid is the ONN estimated value of a promotional program which was included in their bid, a summary of which follows:

The Oklahoma News Network, in each of its active broadcast weeks, will broadcast a minumum of ten 30-second announcements (clearance of which will be required by its regular affiliates, subject to standard industry trade restrictions). These announcements may be used by the University to achieve any or all of the following objectives:

- 1. Increase enrollment.
- 2. Identify and support the University's programs on and off campus which benefit not only students but citizens of the State as well (i.e., Health Sciences Center, etc.).
 - 3. Increase fund-raising through endowments and donations.

In addition, in each of its active broadcast weeks, the ONN will broadcast an additional 60 30-second public service announcements per week on behalf of the University and its ongoing programs for students and citizens. Although clearance of these PSA's is not required of affiliates under their network contracts, experience indicates that an average of 20% will be ultimately aired.

Finally, the ONN will provide to the University, access to facilities to feed ONN affiliates a 30-minute public service program centering on the services, programs and facilities of the University of Oklahoma. This program, which will be produced by the University community, will assist network broadcast licensees in meeting their public affairs, commitments to the FCC, thereby resulting in a significant clearance percentage.

KTOK Radio (AM) in Oklahoma City is the flagship station of the Sooner football network, and will provide a two-fold plan for supporting the "promotional partnership".

First, KTOK will quarterly air a series of five daily ten-minute programs which focus on University services and accomplishments (i.e., Health Sciences Center in first quarter, Energy Center in second quarter, etc.).

Second, KTOK will also offer a bank of 520 30-second promotional announcements which will air in the same manner as the Oklahoma News Network.

Experience indicates the following to be reasonable estimates of the value of these services consistent with the pricing of the facilities involved; this will be a first year value:

With the University's favorable decision, the ONN and KTOK will immediately implement the promotional partnership. The University then will receive benefits for the 1986 season.

ADDITIONAL VALUE

NATIONAL COVERAGE

Although the University of Oklahoma has lifted requirements of providing national exposure, the ONN feels out-of-state coverage is important to Sooner recruiting and alumni.

The ONN has an outstanding record in disseminating the broadcast in areas of highly concentrated alumni areas, and will continue to make the broadcast available to all stations wishing to become a part of the Sooner football network, either on a full game or per game basis.

In addition, the Oklahoma News Network has contracted with Cable Radio Network, a cable audio system which provides music, information and sports programming to cable systems across the country. Each cable system will air the Sooner games via the audio portion of their TV Guide listed channel. The Cable Radio Network will distribute the OU signal in the 1986 football broadcasts to one and a half million homes in Southern California, plus Reno, Nevada, and in approximately one month, to Tampa Bay, Florida. In addition, Sooner Clubs nationwide will be able to receive the game via home satellite dishes or through arrangements with their local cable systems.

The Cable Radio Network expects to be in approximately half of the cable systems nationwide within one year, providing maximum national exposure for The University of Oklahoma.

We place the value of such national coverage at:

\$8,000 per game \$88,000 per year

Based on projections by the Cable Radio Network, we project the following increases in value per year:

1988 - \$100,000 1989 - \$110,000 1990 - \$120,000

Oklahoma News Network also included in their bid the statement that for each football game televised live in any form over five per season ONN would deduct \$50,000 per game. Any football game televised live on a pay-for-view basis over five per season would be deducted at the rate of \$5,500 per game.

President Horton recommended the Board of Regents award a contract to Oklahoma News Network/Clear Channel Communications for the radio broadcasting rights for The University of Oklahoma football, basketball, and delayed broadcasts of football and basketball for the four-year period beginning July 1, 1987 in accordance with the bid submitted, a summary of which is shown above.

He recommended also that the Board of Regents award a contract to Oklahoma Sports Broadcasting, Inc. for the radio broadcasting rights for other sports (other than football and basketball) for a four-year period beginning July 1, 1987 in accordance with their alternate bid of \$1,000 per year.

The bids received were discussed at length at the Committee meeting on Wednesday.

Regent Kemp moved approval of the recommendations. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

USE OF ENERGY CENTER INTEREST FUNDS

President Horton reminded the Regents that at the July meeting (page 19138) there was a discussion of the use of Energy Center interest funds. The Board requested that an opinion be prepared by Chief Legal Counsel Ward regarding the use of these funds. The opinion is as follows:

"SUBJECT: Expenditure of Interest Income from Energy

Center Donations to the University of Oklahoma

Foundation, Inc.

"Regent Kemp at the July, 1986 meeting of the Board of Regents requested an opinion from the Office of Legal Counsel as to the legality of the expenditure of interest income generated from Energy Center donations for Energy Center fund raising purposes without the express consent of the donors. Accordingly, this office researched the issue after reviewing the applicable documentation which supports the creation of the Energy Center Donors Program.

"The specific question to be answered is: 'May interest income earned from the unexpended principal received from Energy Center donations be expended for related purposes without the express consent of the donors?'

"In order to address this question, it is necessary to understand the legal status of the University of Oklahoma Foundation, Inc. In a prior memorandum to Interim President Martin Jischke dated March 21, 1985, that subject matter was discussed in some length. A copy of that memorandum is attached hereto for your reference and review as Exhibit 'A' to this memorandum. However, suffice it to say that the University of Oklahoma Foundation originally was a charitable trust and was incorporated as a non-profit charitable corporation in the State of Oklahoma in 1955. Ever since its date of incorporation, it has operated as a non-profit corporation.

"The University of Oklahoma Foundation, Inc. (Foundation) is a charitable corporation created, administered, and operated exclusively for the benefit of The University of Oklahoma as per Article V of the Articles of Incorporation. In general monetary donations to a charitable corporation constitute an absolute gift of full ownership of the property vesting in the corporation, subject to the duties imposed upon it by its charter or articles of incorporation and by the terms of any agreement the corporation makes by contract or in its acceptance of an qualified gift. Bogert, Trusts and Trustees, 2d Ed. Rev. Section 324.

"The particular Articles of Incorporation of the Foundation support this general proposition of an absolute gift vesting in the corporation. Article VIII provides that in no instance and under no circumstances shall any part of the corporate estate (donations) whether principal, income, or accumulations be distributed to, revert to, or inure to the benefit of any donor or his heirs or personal representatives. Under Article V of the Articles of Incorporation, the distribution of corporate assets shall be made at such time and in such manner and amounts as the Trustees in their absolute discretion shall deem

to be proper. The duties imposed by the By-Laws of the Foundation (Article VIII) in the acceptance of a restricted donation require that no disbursements shall be made from such funds contrary to the conditions of the restricted fund from which the payment is made.

"The powers of the Board of Trustees of a charitable corporation are similar to that of a trustee of a charitable trust. The Board of Trustees of a charitable corporation are limited only by the terms of its charter, articles of incorporation and by-laws. Trustees of a charitable trust may be further limited by the trust instrument and the duties imposed by law on trusts and trustees. In a practical sense, the results of contributions to either a trust or corporation are the same with a higher, personal, fiduciary duty imposed on trustees of a charitable trust. See Bogert, Trusts and Trustees, 2d Ed. Section 324, page 548; The Restatement of Trusts, Second, Section 379b.

"Trustees or directors of a charitable corporation have the power and the duty to incur certain expenses in the administering of a charitable corporation or trust. Included in these powers and duties are the duty to take reasonable steps to take and keep control of the trust property, to use reasonable care and skill to preserve the trust corpus, and to use reasonable care and skill to make the trust property productive. See, Restatement of Trust, Second Section 188, Section 379, Section 380. The trustee of a charitable corporation can properly incur expenses which are necessary or appropriate to carry out the purposes of the trust and the restricted donation which are not forbidden by the specific terms of the trust. Restatement of Trusts, Second Section 380. In the furtherance of this power and duty in the administration of a charitable corporation, the trustee can properly incur expenses of employing attorneys, brokers, or other agents and employees so far as such employment is reasonably necessary in the administration of the trust or appropriate to carry out the purposes of the trust. Restatement of Trusts, Second Section 188C.

"The costs of operating the trust and managing the trust including expenses in connection with the preservation of the trust and expenses appropriate to carry out the purposes of the trust should be paid from trust income. See Bogert, <u>Trusts and Trustees</u>, 2d Ed., Section 803. <u>Restatement of Trusts</u>, <u>Second</u>, Section 233E. Items included as ordinary costs of operation and management of a trust include such items as office rent, secretarial help, salaries of assistants, tax consultants to prepare tax returns, services of investment counselors, travel expenses of trustees if necessarily incurred. See Bogert, <u>Trusts</u> and Trustees, 2d Ed., Section 803.

"Where discretion is confirmed upon the trustee or director of a charitable corporation with respect to the exercise of a power, its exercise is not subject to control by the courts except to prevent an abuse of discretion by the trustee or director. Restatement of Torts Second, Ed., Section 187. The factors in determining whether there is abuse of discretion include the following:

- "1. The extent of the discretion conferred upon the trustee by the terms of the trust or articles of incorporation.
- "2. The purposes of the trust or corporation.

- "3. The nature of the power exercised by the trustee or director.
- "4. The existence or non-existence, the definiteness or indefiniteness, of an external standard by which the reasonableness of the trustee or director's conduct can be judged.
- "5. The motives of the trustee or director in exercising the power.
- "6. The existence or non-existence of an interest in the trustee or director conflicting with that of the beneficiary.

"Applying the general principles set out above to the income from donations to the Foundation restricted to the Energy Center, it would appear that the Board of Trustees of the Foundation can properly incur and authorize expenses which are necessary or appropriate to carry out the purposes of the donation, i.e. establishment and operation of the Energy Center. Included in the trust purposes created by the donation are the actual construction of the facility, the endowment of the program and the operation of the facility. (See, Energy Center Founders Prospectus, The Funding). Included in this intent would be the duty to raise funds for the completion of the project. The prospectus which seeks donations indicates that funds must be generated to match other donations. The donations are made to the Foundation restricted to Foundation disbursement for the Energy Center. There are no further limitations. Implicit in this project to which donations are made is the need to obtain additional funds to complete and operate the facility.

"CONCLUSION

"In order to make the trust property productive and to maintain and operate the trust property, it is necessary to generate funds to carry out the purposes of the trust, i.e. establishment and operation of the Energy Center. In the furtherance of this duty it is necessary, appropriate, and proper as part of the administration and management of the trust to employ agents to acquire such funding. Additionally, other expenses in the maintenance, improvement, operation, and administration of the trust property, i.e. the Energy Center, are properly incurred expenses and may be paid out of income derived from donations to the Foundation restricted for the Energy Center. There are no terms of the Articles of Incorporation of the Foundation which would forbid the proper incurrence of these expenses.

"Accordingly, I am of the opinion that based on the specific facts underlying the creation of the Energy Center Donors Program interest income earned from the unexpended principal received from the Energy Center donations may be expended for related purposes such as legitimate fund raising activities without the express consent of the donors. However, in the future when similar donor programs are established, it would be preferable to define at the outset how both principal and interest are to be expended by the University of Oklahoma Foundation, Inc. so that no ambiguity or doubt will exist. This is essentially what occurred with reference to the Associate Funds when the Regents established the policy relating to a limitation on expenditures from those donated proceeds and eliminates most problems of construction that could otherwise exist."

President Horton said it is essential that some funds be available to pursue the fund-raising activities associated with the Energy Center.

President Horton recommended that an amount not in excess of \$100,000 per year be expended from Energy Center interest funds for directly related Energy Center fund-raising activities and that all other accrued and unexpended interest be utilized for construction and endowment purposes.

Regent Kemp moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

OKLAHOMA GEOLOGICAL SURVEY AGREEMENT

A renewal of the agreement between the Oklahoma Geological Survey and the United States Geological Survey for the fiscal year 1986-87 for an investigation of water resources in the State of Oklahoma has been proposed. The agreement for this fiscal year provides that each party will contribute \$160,200 to continue this study. This is a reduction of this program by \$22,500 for this fiscal year. The amounts contributed will cover all of the costs of necessary field work and office work directly related to this program but exclude any general administrative or accounting work in the office of either party.

All other terms of this agreement are identical with the agreements of previous years.

President Horton recommended approval of entering into an agreement with the United States Geological Survey as explained above.

Regent White moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

SECURITY SYSTEMS FOR FRED JONES, JR. MEMORIAL ART CENTER

The existing security systems for the Fred Jones, Jr. Memorial Art Center are inadequate and need to be extended and improved. The Board of Regents has previously authorized the use of Section 13 and New College Funds for this project.

Plans and specifications for a revised security system have been prepared by Architectural and Engineering Services in consultation with the Director of the Art Museum. Included in the plans and specifications for the new security systems are: (1) a closed circuit television system, (2) a motion detection system, (3) a glass breakage detection system, (4) fifteen additional television camera mounts, and (5) a door intrusion system.

Bids were received from three contractors on August 29 as follows:

The bids were reviewed by University staff. During the review of the bids it was determined that Electronic Systems, Inc. had omitted the receiver-driver units from its Proposal "D" and, therefore, its price of \$9,742 did not represent the full cost of the additional television camera mounts. A letter has been received from a representative of Electronic Systems, Inc. which indicates that the receiver-driver units were not included in the bid. Since the bid is incomplete and not comparable, it is recommended that the bid of Electronic Systems, Inc. be rejected.

It is proposed that the low bid of Johnson Controls, Inc. in the amount of \$70,832.00 be accepted.

The evaluations of the bids by Computing Services and the using departments were as follows:

Items 1 through 6: The Telex bid for Items 1 through 6 did not meet the requirements of the specifications in that the equipment bid by Telex is not equivalent.

The specific requirements of the specifications which were not met by the Telex item bid were as follows:

Items 1 through 4: Subsystem Control Units and Multiplexors.

- 1. The Telex item does not have a second 1.2 MB diskette drive equivalent to IBM feature #1046.
- 2. The Telex item does not have the base control storage size of 1 million bytes (only has 128,000) nor the optional storage expansion to 2 million bytes (can only expand to 256.000 bytes).
- 3. The Telex item does not support micro-code for 3290, 3193 and 3179-G terminals or the 4224 printer.
- 4. The Telex item does not have the optional feature for ASC II protocol conversion and support of 24 additional ASC II terminal ports.
- Item 5 Printer: This printer bid by Telex is a 120 CPS printer and does not meet the 400 CPS requirement.
- Item 6 Printer: This printer bid by Telex does not provide an interchangeable forms tractor feature. It is not as fully compatible as the 4224 printer specified.

Thus, the IBM bid for Items 1 through 6 was the only bid to meet the specifications. The total for these line items is \$143,217.

Item 7: The color display stations were evaluated by the end users for ease of use and functionality. The Bursar's Office preferred the Telex display station because it was smaller and used less space. The Registrar's Office preferred the IBM display station because of the physical placement of the screen and the keyboards. Consequently, the award of this item will be split, with 25 display stations being awarded to Telex at a cost of \$26,200 and 25 display terminals being awarded to IBM at a cost of \$34,475.

PROPOSALS, CONTRACTS, AND GRANTS

A summary of proposals for contracts and grants for the Norman Campus for July and August, 1986 was included in the agenda for this meeting. A list of all contracts executed during this same period of time on proposals previously reported was also included.

President Horton recommended that the President of the University or the President's designees be authorized to execute contracts on the pending proposals as negotiations are completed. The contract budgets may differ from the proposed amounts depending on these negotiations.

Regent Imel moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

NAME FOR CATLETT MUSIC CENTER LIBRARY

Miss Ruby Grant of Norman has provided most generous support for the construction of the Catlett Music Center. For several years, she has provided funds for this project and currently she continues to make donations.

In recognition of her generosity, The University of Oklahoma and the College of Fine Arts wish to name the library in the Catlett Music Center "The Grant Library". In accordance with her wishes, it will honor her late parents, Thomas Sherman Grant and Lizzie Lou Oter Grant.

President Horton recommended approval of naming the library in the Catlett Music Center The Grant Library.

Regent White moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

PARKING LOT FOR STUDENT HOUSING AREA

At the request of student leaders, a plan has been developed to relieve the shortage of parking space in the Cross Center area. The new parking facility would be constructed north of Cross Center on the western edge of the Niemann Field near the Huston Huffman Center. In this position, the new 150-car

parking area will relieve the shortage of parking available to students living in Walker Tower and Cross Center and using Huston Huffman Center. It will also aid in the solution of parking problems associated with the use of Couch Tower by the U.S. Postal Service. Included in the cost of the project is \$26,000 for the resurfacing and repair of sections of Cross Center Drive which will provide access to the new parking area.

The estimated total cost of the project is \$127,000. The project will be funded from two sources: (1) \$77,000 will be provided from the housing budget, and (2) \$50,000 will be provided from Parking and Transportation Systems funds.

President Horton recommended that the Board of Regents approve a plan to use \$127,000 to construct a new 150-car parking area in the Cross Center student housing area and to repave portions of Cross Center Drive.

Regent Imel moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

LLOYD NOBLE CENTER INTERIOR REPAIRS

The interior of the Lloyd Noble Center, which was opened in 1975, is now in need of repairs to return it to like-new condition. This structure was constructed using the proceeds of the University of Oklahoma Student Facilities System Revenue Bonds, Series 1979. Under the terms of the bond system, funds have been placed in a reserve to provide for repairs to the building. As part of a program to keep the building in good condition, it is proposed that \$75,000 be spent to undertake interior repairs in the seating areas.

President Horton recommended that the Board of Regents: (1) approve the proposed plan to make interior repairs to the Lloyd Noble Center at a cost of \$75,000 and (2) authorize the use of University of Oklahoma Student Facilities System Revenue Bonds, Series 1979, Special Reserve Fund.

Regent Imel moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

OKLAHOMA MEMORIAL STADIUM REPAIRS

At its May 1986 meeting, the Board of Regents received a report on the structural deterioration of the east side of Oklahoma Memorial Stadium and authorized President Horton to proceed with necessary repairs to the stadium at a cost not to exceed \$200,000.

Plans and specifications were prepared by Cornforth Associates, the University's on-call consulting structural engineers. The repair project was bid on June 19, 1986. Bids were received from six general contractors. Gilbertson Construction Company of Oklahoma City was determined to be the low

bidder, and a contract was awarded to it in the amount of \$143,800. The firm was authorized on June 23, 1986, to begin the necessary structural repairs. A completion date of August 25, 1986, was stipulated in the contract.

Work on the structural repairs has progressed on schedule. On August 25, 1986, a letter was received from Cornforth Associates stating that, in their opinion, the basic structural repairs had been completed. The remaining cosmetic work associated with the project was complete prior to August 25, 1986.

In conjunction with its studies of structural problems and as a part of its basic services, Cornforth Associates also was requested to provide the University with recommendations regarding any additional repairs that should be made to Oklahoma Memorial Stadium. A preliminary study has been completed. Of greatest concern to Cornforth Associates is the deterioration of the seating deck and the expansion joints, especially in the area of the east stadium. The deterioration of the seating deck and the expansion joints in the east stands probably was the major contributor to the structural deterioration of the east side of the stadium. It is the recommendation of Cornforth Associates that repair of the seating decks and expansion joints, especially in the area of the east stadium, be undertaken as soon as possible. Although detailed plans and estimates have not been developed, the estimated cost of this work, based on preliminary investigations, is approximately \$1,000,000.

President Horton recommended that the Board of Regents accept (1) Oklahoma Memorial Stadium Repairs as complete and authorize final payment to Gilbertson Construction Company and (2) a preliminary report from Cornforth Associates, consulting engineers, indicating that additional work with a cost of approximately \$1,000,000 is needed in the near future to repair the seating decks and expansion joints on the east side of Oklahoma Memorial Stadium.

In response to a question from Regent Sarratt, President Horton indicated the Director of Athletics is responsible for the preventive maintenance and repairs of the Stadium and that generally the Athletic Director will request assistance from the University's Physical Plant. President Horton called attention to the fact that in the major physical planning activity that will begin this fall there will be an Intercollegiate Athletics Committee that will be looking at the physical facilities in detail.

Regent Sarratt moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

ACCEPTANCE OF COMPLETED PROJECTS

The Indoor Athletic Facility polyurethane flooring installation has been completed by Martin Surfacing and Decking, Inc., and an inspection of the project was held by members of Architectural and Engineering Services and the Athletic Department. A punch list of items needing correction was developed and all of the items now have been completed.

Bids were received on May 15, 1986, for the resurfacing and repair of the Lloyd Noble Center Parking Lot and the repair of Imhoff Road. Vantage Paving, Inc. was the successful bidder and a contract was awarded to them by the Board of Regents in the amount of \$414,736.

An inspection of the project was held by University staff and it has been determined that the project is substantially complete. A punch list of items needing correction has been given to the contractor.

Bids were received on May 29, 1986, for the repair of the polyurethane multi-purpose floors in the Lloyd Noble Center and Huston Huffman Center. Pitzer Products, Inc. of Pittsburg, Kansas was the low bidder. A contract was awarded by the Board of Regents to Pitzer Products, Inc. in the amount of \$86,000 for the repair of the floors. Included as a part of the contract is a five-year maintenance agreement. Pitzer Products, Inc. will return annually to conduct an inspection of the floors and to make necessary repairs during a five-year long period.

An inspection of the flooring project was conducted on August 15, 1986, by representatives of Architectural and Engineering Services, the Huston Huffman Center and the Lloyd Noble Center. At this time, the floor repair project was deemed to be substantially complete and ready for acceptance by the Board of Regents.

President Horton recommended that the Board of Regents accept: (1) the polyurethane flooring in the Henry D. and Ida Mosier Indoor Athletic Facility as complete and authorize final payment to Martin Surfacing and Decking, Inc., (2) the resurfacing and repairing of the Lloyd Noble Center Parking Lot and Imhoff Road as substantially complete, and authorize final payment to Vantage Paving, Inc., pending completion of all punch list items and (3) the Lloyd Noble Center and Huston Huffman Center Floor Repair project as complete and authorize final payment to Pitzer Products, Inc.

Regent Imel moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

EASEMENT FOR EXTENSION OF 24TH AVENUE SOUTHEAST

The City of Norman has requested the University to grant a 65 foot easement to allow the construction of 24th Avenue Southeast from Imhoff Road to Highway 9. The requested easement lies east of the proposed centerline of 24th Avenue Southeast and when combined with an additional 65 feet west of the centerline will allow for the construction of a road and sidewalks and the installation of future underground utilities. The road will serve the new Hitachi plant as well as improve vehicle circulation and safety at the Highway 9 and 24th Avenue Southeast intersection.

President Horton recommended that the Board of Regents grant a 65 foot easement to the City of Norman.

Regent Lewis moved approval of the recommendation. The following voted yes on the motion: Regents McCurdy, Imel, Kemp, Sarratt, White, Hogan, and Lewis. The Chair declared the motion unanimously approved.

REVIEW OF INVESTMENT POLICY

A copy of the current Regents' Investment Policy which was adopted on September 1, 1983 and amended in November, 1985 was included with the agenda for this meeting. The policy provides for an annual review of the objectives and the policy.


This matter came up at the Committee meeting on Wednesday and was presented again at this meeting. There were no suggestions for change. In the absence of modification, the policy will continue.


TOTAL BUDGETED REVENUE BY FUNCTION Fiscal Year 1985-86

Fiscal Year 1985-86





Total Budgeted Revenue by Function - \$189,840,381 (190,254,596)


Health Sciences Center TOTAL BUDGETED REVENUE BY FUNCTION FISCAL YEAR 1986-87













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
BUDGETED VS. ACTUAL EXPENDITURES June 30, 1986




Norman Campus BUDGETED VS. ACTUAL REVENUE June 30, 1986




Health Sciences Center BUDGETED VS. ACTUAL REVENUE June 30, 1986

THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA

Definition of Financial Terms

Public universities control their financial resources in a number of different funding categories which are different both in source and purpose.

The University of Oklahoma's Annual Operating Budget includes four main types of funds: Educational and General, Grants and Contracts, Auxiliary Enterprises, and Service Units (internal and external). In addition, the University manages several sources of Capital Funds.

I. Annual Operating Budget

Operating budget funds are available for current operations, which include the support of day-to-day, short-run, consumption-type activities. These funds are divided into three main categories based on the purpose for which they are used:

- A. Educational and General activities are those which directly support the basic function of an educational institution in the creation, preservation, and dissemination of knowledge. Educational and General activities consist of instructional; research; continuing education & public service programs; general administration; and general expense activities such as student services and university relations. Also included in Educational and General activities are operations of the library, physical plant and administrative data processing. Revenue comprises two main sources: State Appropriations and Tuition and Fees (Revolving Funds).
 - 1. <u>State Appropriations</u> are derived from the State Legislature's appropriations from the State General Revenue.
 - 2. Revolving Funds consist of income from student tuition and fees; gifts, grants, and reimbursements; sales and services of educational departments; and all other income available to the institution for Educational and General purposes.
- B. Grants and Contracts are governmental and private grants and contracts.

 These funds must be used for the specified contractual purposes.
- G. Auxiliary Enterprises and Service Unit funds include all revenues and expenditures of enterprises conducted by the institution primarily for the purpose of providing services of a non-educational nature to students, faculty, staff and other university departments. The enterprises are intended to be self-supporting and are similar to business enterprises. Under Oklahoma State Law, auxiliary enterprises and service units should be self-supporting and Educational and General funds of the institution may not be used to subsidize them. While it apparently is not prohibited by law, the auxiliary enterprises and service units should not be called upon to provide support for the Educational and General activities of the institution.

- 1. Auxiliary Enterprises serve individual students, faculty, staff and others in areas such as housing, food service, book store, laundry, and intercollegiate athletics. The University acts as custodian for other funds classified under Auxiliary Enterprises. They include student and staff organizations such as University Sing, Housing Center Association, Administrative Officers, and Campus Chest (and are generally known as Agency Funds).
- 2. Service Units on the Norman Campus primarily serve only internal University departments. On the Health Sciences Center Campus service units have both internal sales and external sales. Service units provide services such as vehicle rental, office machine rental, printing, computing services, telephone services, steam and chilled water and certain other physical plant operations.

II. Capital Budget

Capital funds are to be used or have already been expended for construction and acquisition of physical properties. Capital funds are not included in the Operating Budget.

The revenue for capital funds comes for four major sources: State appropriations, Section 13/New College Funds, revenue bonds, and private donations.

- A. State Appropriated Funds are appropriated annually by the Legislature from the State General Revenue. The appropriations for capital funds and for Educational and General funds are entirely separate and transfers between the two are not permitted. Unlike appropriations for Educational and General, appropriations for construction and acquisition of physical properties may be spent over several years.
- B. Section 13/New College Funds are income, interest, rentals and proceeds from the sale of State Section Thirteen lands which were granted to the State for the use and benefit of institutions of higher education. Under State law, these funds may be used "for the construction and purchase of buildings, for the purchase of equipment, and for other capital additions."
- C. Revenue Bonds provide funds which are borrowed against anticipated revenue. This source is most often used for Auxiliary Enterprises, but may also be used for service unit improvements which will create savings in the Educational and General budget, such as utilities.
- D. <u>Private Donations</u> for construction or acquisition of physical properties are accounted for as capital funds when made directly to the University. Most donations, however, are made to and managed by the University of Oklahoma Foundation.

NORMAN CAMPUS & HSC - EDUCATIONAL & CENERAL

- 1) Tuition overrealization. Main Campus, Law Center and HSC
- 2) Includes \$550,000 of the President's Reserve.
- 3) No reduction was made to the \$5.483 million utility budget.
- 4) Budget Modification of -1230,000 due to unfilled budget positions. Law Center

NORMAN CAMPUS & HSC - AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES

- Additional television, pre-season ticket sales and concession revenues will result in an overrealization of revenue. Budget modifications made for increases in expenditures for team sports and concessions.
- 2) Unanticipated capital improvements, e.g. bridge work at golf course, new busses, renovation of Airport Control Tower, and miscellaneous parking and traffic improvements. Additional unanticipated revenue of \$963,040 from Hitachi sale will result in an overrealization of revenue. Approximately \$260,000 of expenditures have been transferred in from other non-budgeted accounts.
- 3) Increase due to opening of additional Cross Center building in response to increased demand for housing and food service. Parkview Apts. rented with electricity furnished by the University. Extraordinary expenditures in excess of the budget will be approximately \$400,000. These are demolition expenses to Nieman Apartments, various renovation projects to Hester-Robertson Hall. Adams Center, Walter Tower and Cate Dining.
- 4) Pell Grant awards increased by The Department of Education.
- 5) Budget Modification because 79' Student Facility System Repairs, OU Golf Course Development Fund and new Real Estate Development accounts not in orginal budget.
- 6) Increased number of participants in Banking and Pre-Collegiate programs.
- 7) Fine Arts realizing more activity than orginally estimated. Budget increase because Joe Price House Maintenance Fund not in orginal budget.
- 8) Increase due to revised estimate of revenue collections. Primary increases in UOSA accounts.
- 9) Budget Modification due to unexpected increased participation in the University's new Preferred Provider Option (PPO) Health Insurance Plan.
- 10)Unanticipated expenses in Residential Programs, Swimming Pool, Recreation Center Operations and Student Affairs Auxiliary Accounting will result in overrealization of expenditures.
- 11)Prior year cash was utilized in the following areas to increase Y-T-D Revenue: Foundation \$87,552. Housing & Food Service \$346,416, CE & PS \$199,847, Student Publications \$16,000, Other Student Affairs \$149,933, Executive Affairs \$130.

NORMAN CAMPUS - RESEARCH & OTHER SPONSORED PROJECTS

- 1) Original estimates adjusted to reflect actual grants and contracts received. May be subsequently revised, based on proposals submitted and federal awards made.
- 2) Reflect growth in weather-related programs.
- 3) Loss of oil and gas production and reserves contract with the Energy Information Administration of the Department of Energy.
- 4) FAA-ATC Program staffing increases have been delayed until Fall 1986. MTS Program in Lawton was reduced by aproximately 8%.
- 5) Scholarships and fellowships funded with Associates Funds through the University Foundation. The same applies to a Regents Fellowship Award.
- 6) Continued growth pattern for Arts and Sciences.
- 7) Original estimates were higher than actual grant activity.
- 8) Loss of ETA-23 contract offset by increases in the Kanter Archives and weather-related programs.



Aircraft \$10,650.


TOTAL BUDGETED REVENUE BY FUNCTION Fiscal Year 1986-87

TOTAL BUDGETED EXPENDITURES BY CATEGORY Fiscal Year 1986-87





Norman Campus TOTAL BUDGETED REVENUE BY FUNCTION Fiscal Year 1986-87




Total Budgeted Revenue by Function - \$184,643,942






BUDGETED VS. ACTUAL REVENUE July 31, 1986




BUDGETED VS. ACTUAL EXPENDITURES
July 31, 1986




Norman Campus BUDGETED VS. ACTUAL REVENUE July 31, 1986




Health Sciences Center BUDGETED VS. ACTUAL REVENUE
