

Art Activities Over County to Be Tied In With Red Cross Work

At a recent meeting of the city art teachers, Miss Lourice Core, county chairman of Junior Red Cross, told teachers of plans whereby students could render a service as called for by the national American Red Cross through art activities, serving the men in khaki and blue directly and realistically as well as veterans in hospitals of the last World War.

Plans have been worked out so that rural schools can participate in this course with Mrs. Raymond Rains, rural chairman, supervising the rural activities. About 800 separate articles will be furnished by the city and rural schools of this county.

Special emphasis was also made on "Health Education" and "War on Waste" in our schools.



Have Purchased Over \$10,000 Worth and Most Of Them Buying Regularly

Ada Junior righ school student body is entering with patriotic fervor into purchase of war bonds and stamps.

In social studies classes the teachers are selling stamps and keep records of all sold—these records show that the Eighth grade, sponsored by Oscar Cantwell, has bought \$3,976.95 in bonds and stamps; the Ninth grade, sponsored by Miss Allen, has purchased \$3,155.20, and the Seventh grade, sponsored by Renfro Herndon, has bought \$2,893.25.

This all adds up to \$10,025.40 for the school.

There are 566 pupils enrolled in Junior high and of these, 475 are regularly purchasing stamps and bonds. Some classes are 100 per cent in regular buying.

These figures do not change the totals for the county of more than three and a half million pounds.

Considerable scrap is yet to be hauled in, but the trucks of the scrap dealers are running. It will take two or three weeks to clean it all up.

While the nation now has piles of scrap available, the War Production Board emphasizes that industrial scrap will be asked for continuously as long as the war lasts. It also wants all the scrap available delivered as fast as it becomes scrap and can be delivered to dealers.

Scrap, the board points out, will be needed as long as the nation is making implements of war.
