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
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With The Editor ...

CONVENTION TO DRAW 850 DOCTORS

Arrangements Complete for 62nd Annual Meeting of the Oklahoma State Medical Association in Tulsa, May 8-11. Outstanding Program of Social Events Scheduled.

As this issue of The Bulletin went to press final arrangements for the 62nd Annual Meeting of the Oklahoma State Medical Association in Tulsa, May 8-11, 1955, were virtually complete. Dr. James W. Kelley, General Chairman, predicted that 850 Oklahoma doctors would attend the four-day program of scientific and social events.

Highlights of the 1955 convention will

include:

1. An outstanding scientific program featuring 27 papers in all fields of medicine presented by nine visiting distinguished guest speakers and by members of the Oklahoma State Medical Association.

2. Forty-eight commercial exhibits by leading manufacturers of pharmaceuticals, surgical supplies, recording devices, x-ray equipment and supplies, and other products and services of interest to the practicing physician.

3. The President's Inaugural Dinner Dance on Tuesday, May 10, featuring Russ Morgan and His Orchestra, nationally known dance band and record-

ing artists.

- 4. A complimentary buffet dinner program at the Blue Cross-Blue Shield Building on Monday, May 9, with the principal address of the evening to be delivered by Dr. Charles S. Houston of Exeter, New Hampshire, distinguished American physician and mountain climber.
- 5. Twelve scientific exhibits prepared by physicians and organizations allied

with the medical profession.

6. Roundtable luncheons on Monday and Tuesday, May 9-10, at The Mayo, where visiting guest speakers will answer

questions from the floor.

7. The Pfizer Golf Tournament, sponsored by the Oklahoma State Medical Association, at Tulsa Country Club on Wednesday, May 11, with convention visitors as guests of the Pfizer Laboratories for complimentary golfing, social hour, and buffet dinner.

8. Related meetings of ten specialty groups immediately preceding the opening of the regular convention program.

9. The annual business meeting and election of officers at the House of Delegates of the Oklahoma State Medical Association on Sunday, May 8.

10. A program of business and social events prepared for visiting wives and daughters by the Woman's Auxiliary to the Oklahoma State Medical Association,

May 8-10, at The Mayo.

"We believe the scientific program for the 1955 Annual Meeting is one of the best in the Association's history," said Dr. Walter E. Brown, Program Chairman, last month. "Our guest speakers comprise a virtual Who's Who In Medicine, and their wide selection of subjects offers invaluable clinical information to the practicing physicians."



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ANNUAL MEETING PERSONALITIES

-George Crile, Jr., M.D., Cleveland, Ohio-

For George Crile, Jr., one of eleven visiting distinguished guest speakers at the 62nd Annual Meeting of the Oklahoma State Medical Association in Tulsa, May 9-11, the practice of medicine is a fascinating career inherited from a famous father. Most of the year this busy Cleveland Clinic surgeon is content to follow in his father's footsteps—and a brilliant job he does of it, too—but with the coming of warm weather his thoughts turn to an unusual hobby which has won him wide recognition of another kind.

Summer vacation is sure to find Dr. Crile, his lovely wife Jane, and four strapping children (three girls and a boy) in the Florida keys or off the California coasts busily exploring the ocean bottom, searching out the treasure of ships sunk a hundred years ago.

Most of the time the Criles have no equipment other than a face mask and frog-man flippers, but occasionally they use an aqua-lung or a home-made diving bell for the greater depths. Colder waters will find them clad (for protection

against sea life as well) in a pair of black long johns across whose stern has been painted the weird face of an amiable but shark-toothed demon. With this frightening insignia, the Criles are ready for the water.

Oklahoma doctors in attendance at the 1955 Annual Meeting will find Dr. Crile in a more serious vein. His two papers, both to be presented on Monday, May 9th, concern surgical subjects of topical importance. In his discussion on "The Use and Abuse of Ultra Radical Surgery For Cancer" Dr. Crile will elaborate upon theories which were recently reported in Time Magazine. A second paper will be "Changing Trends In Abdominal Surgery."

A graduate of Harvard University School of Medicine, Class of 1933, D1. Crile took his internship and a surgical residency at Barnes Hospital of St. Louis. Shortly thereafter he embarked upon his career at the Cleveland Clinic Foundation and Hospital. His remarkable surgical technique and keen interest in surgical

research quickly established him as one of the nation's leading medical personalities. During World War II he served with Navy medical units in the South Pacific, where his studies in burn repairs (conducted in association with his old friend, Tulsa's .Dr. Hays R. Yandell) won him new recognition.

Although the Criles had experimented with a home-made diving bell in the chilly waters of Lake Erie, their first real skin diving experiences came late during World War II when Dr. Crile was stationed at the San Diego navy base. In their temporary home near La Jolla, Barney (as he is popularly known) and Jane Crile found a fascinating new world

J. E. WALLACE, M.D. 1879 - 1955

Dr. Jesse Emmons Wallace, 75, pioneer Tulsa County gynecologist, died March 19, 1955, following a stroke. He had been in poor health for several months and had recently been a patient at the United States Veterans Administration Hospital at

Muskogee, Oklahoma.

Born in Maryville, Tennessee, Dr. Wallace interrupted his college training to serve in Cuba with the 4th Tennessee Volunteers during the Spanish-American War. He graduated from the University of Tennessee School of Medicine in 1906 and interned at the Evebros Hospital of Nashville. Dr. Wallace entered practice in Tulsa in 1907 in offices at Second and Main streets. Later postgraduate training in surgery was taken at Columbia University Polyclinic Hospital of New York, the Mayo Clinic of Rochester, Minnesota, and the Battle Creek Sanitarium of Battle Creek, Michigan.

Dr. Wallace was a life member of the Tulsa County Medical Society and its component organizations. He was active in American Legion and VFW affairs in Tulsa and in Masonic activities. Services were held on March 21st. Survivors include the widow and

one daughter.

beneath the seas.

Post-war jaunts took them to the. Florida keys and to the Bahamas. Later they were to explore the unknown waters of the West Indes and the famous Red Reef of the Andros. At first the Criles were content to study the strange sea life and vegetation, but the discovery of a coral corroded cannon and the remnants of an eighteenth century pirate ship excited new avenues of imagination. In woefully short vacation weeks, they hunted down old wrecks and salvaged forgotten treasures from the seas. Like Ponce De Leon, they never found the riches they sought, but they do have numerous articles and curios to show for their trouble—plus a wealth of remembered good times.

The story of the Criles is told in a new book entitled "Treasure Diving Holidays," published late last year. Told in a fascinating and charming manner, it gives a remarkable insight into the mysteries of the sea. Although jointly authored by Dr. and Mrs. Crile, the story is told by the latter. Much of its interest lies in the participation of the entire family in the diving. The training has been good for the children, too good Dr. Crile asserts, for his growing youngsters now outswim and outdive their more experienced elders.

The Crile's top find was the H.M.S. Looe, sunk off Looe Key southeast of Miami, Florida, when it struck an unmarked sandbar. The relics included some perfectly preserved pewter tableware, rusty cannon, numerous coins, wine bottles, pipes, porcelins, and iron riggings. Many of the finds have been preserved in the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D. C.

Less productive but equally enjoyable was the Criles' treasure diving in the Mediterranean. With the aid of the French Sous-Marin Club, they recovered some ancient antifacts and beautiful pieces of pottery.

During his Tulsa visit Dr. Crile will also participate in a roundtable luncheon meeting at the convention session of Monday, May 10th, at which time he will answer questions from the floor.



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



This attractive new clinic building was opened last month by Dr. Allen C. Kramer at 1547 South Lewis, Tulsa. Built of hadite block construction, it also provides offices for Dr. Charles H. Eads and Dr. Samuel J. Bradfield. The new structure contains 20 rooms, including complete X-ray and laboratory facilities, eight examining rooms, recreation room, and a large waiting room. A parking lot adjoins both sides. An additional wing will be built next year to provide offices for Dr. John Kramer, who will join his father in July, 1956, at the conclusion of a residency.

SIDNEY C. VENABLE, M.D. 1890 - 1955

Dr. Sidney Carrington Venable, 64, veteran Tulsa radiologist, died March 28, 1955, at the United States Veterans Hospital of Topeka, Kansas. Death was attributed to coronary thrombosis.

A native of Texas, Dr. Venable received his medical degree from the University of Texas School of Medicine in 1915. His specialty training in radiology was obtained at the Mayo Clinic and at Southside Hospital of Chicago. Dr. Venable served in World War I as a medical officer. Before coming to Tulsa in 1921, he was in practice at Cleveland, Ohio, as assistant superintendent of the Cleveland General Hospital. For several years he operated his own radiological laboratories in Tulsa. In 1937 he was appointed radiologist for the Tulsa County Medical Clinic. Following a train accident in 1947, which cost him the loss of an arm, Dr. Venable retired from active practice. He was a life member of the Tulsa County Medical Society and its component organizations and was a member of the American Society of Clinical Pathologists.

HOSPITALS NEAR CAPACITY FOR FIRST QUARTER OF 1955


First quarter reports for 1955 indicate Tulsa's major hospitals are operating at virtual capacity, pointing up an increasingly serious need for additional hospital beds.

St. John's Hospital reported its 449 beds were 95 per cent occupied during the first three months of the year, while Hillcrest Hospital's 400 beds were 90 per cent occupied. For the same period Oklahoma Osteopathic Hospital reported 95 per cent occupancy of its 60 beds. St. John's recorded 5,533 dismissals in the ninety-day period, Hillcrest 4,766, and Oklahoma Osteopathic 1,342.

The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals last month announced that St. John's and Hillcrest hospitals had been completely accredited for internand nurses training.

DR. PAUL A. BISCHOFF appeared on the program of the Armed Forces Obstetrical and Gynecological Seminar held March 28-30 at Brooke Army Hospital, San Antonio, Texas. His subject was "The Use of Vaginal and Cervical Smears as an Aid in Diagnosis of Carcinoma in situ."

Dr. Betty Conrad, Medical Director of the Tulsa County Red Cross Blood Center visited the St. Louis Red Cross Blood Center in St. Louis, Missouri, last month, studying operations of the huge Center to gain ideas for the coming expansion of the Tulsa Center. The St. Louis Center is now processing 100,000 donors annually.

Despite a comparatively poor replacement record, the Tulsa County Red Cross Blood Center set a new record during the first three months of 1955 when nearly 3,500 pints were taken. If this rate continues throughout the balance of the year, total donations for 1955 should reach 14,000, an increase of 2,000 over last year. The Tulsa Center, incidentally, took more blood in 1954 than the nation's three smallest Red Cross regional blood centers combined. This is an enviable record considering that the local Center operates without the benefit of national Red Cross financing, as do the regional centers.





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
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
