Story of our School at War.

Our war work had its beginning about a year ago when our local 4HC won the Pawhuska Kiwanis Health achievement award and was presented with a five dollar prize. The 4H club purchased a ten-cent War Stamp for each child in our school. This was the start in each child's Stamp Book.

When Valentine Day came the children made their valentines and gave War Stamp in them.

In March one of the local tire stores offered War Stamp for old tires and tubes. The pupils soon collected two hundred and twenty-five.

When school started the past fall our community must raise money to pay a cook's salary in order to have a school lunch program. About the same time the scrap iron drive started. The children collected and sold 12445 lbs. Rags, paper, rubber, and glass were collected to add to the fund. Through these efforts the children enjoy a plate lunch at school every day. For food 1454 quarts of fruits, vegetables and meat were canned.

by the mothers with help from the children in the school kitchen last summer. Each child brought a chicken to be canned. The vegetables were all donated from extra rows planted in each garden for that purpose.

Every child in school is planting a victory garden this year. The children are preparing seed flats to raise tomato plants at school for early planting.

Every child in school has joined the Junior Red Cross. Three Agghans have been completed. The members are also making wall hangings, hospital slippers, greeting cards, lap robes, library checking cards, and cushion covers.

Through the 4H club every member is participating in the health program. They are learning to eat many simple foods. The program teaches what balanced meals mean and how they make for strong health bodies.

To raise funds for the Jr. Red Cross the art students designed and sold Christmas Cards which contained a War Stamp Book.

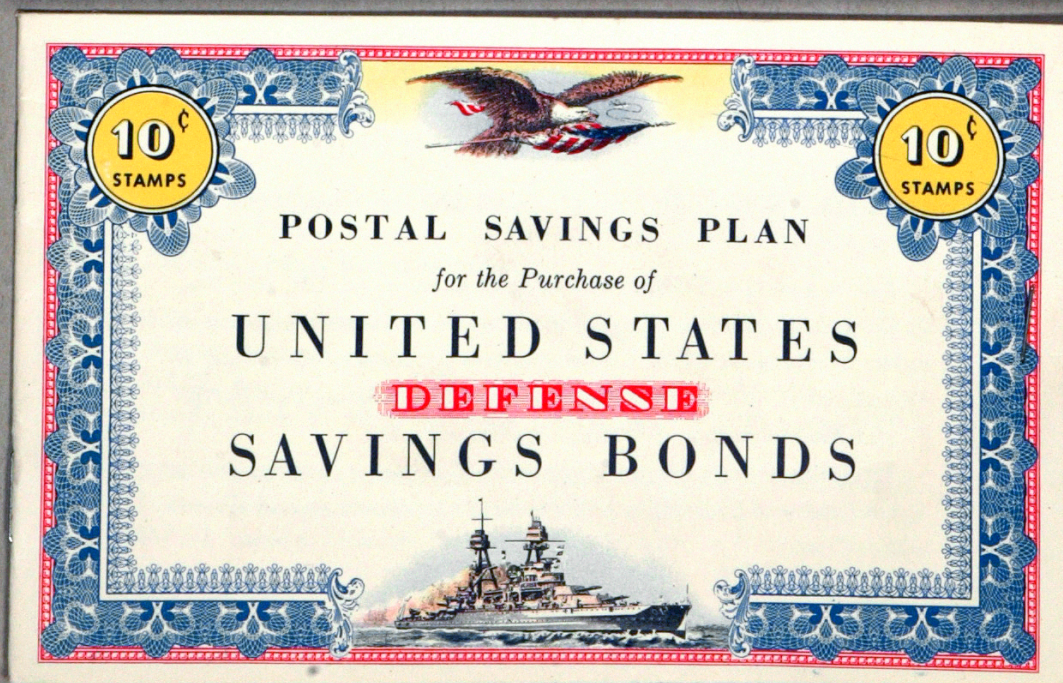

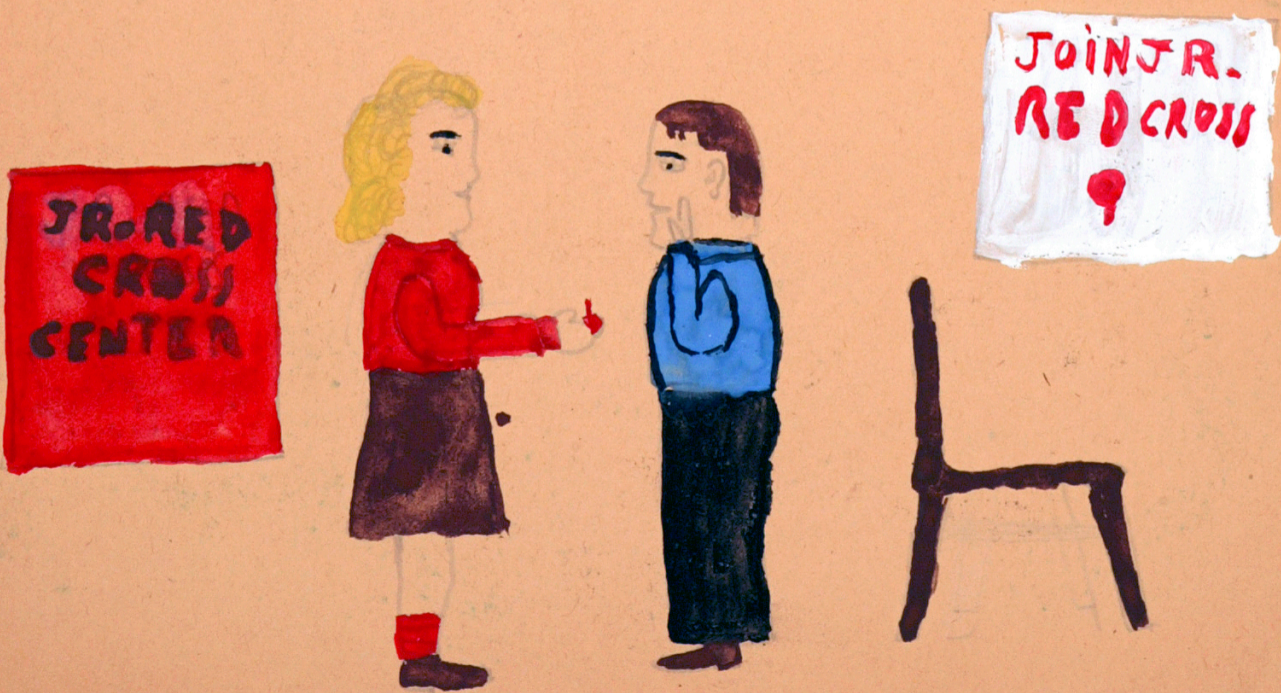

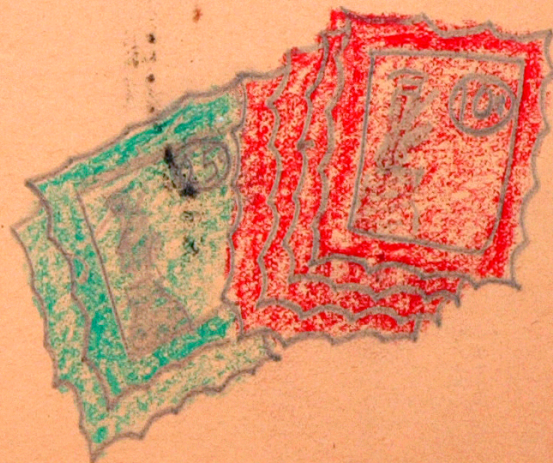

Anderson 4-H Club Program Is Pointed At Health For Members

The program conducted by the Anderson 4-H club in the southeast part of Osage county since last January is one which may be a model for the rest of the clubs of the county.

With 21 members, the club records show that all 21 enrolled in health projects and the entire enrollment completed health score cards during the past 11 months.

Another phase of the report showed that 21 gardens were grown during the past spring and summer by club members, and achievement in various phases of the 4-H club program brought awards to members, including winners of health demonstrations and displays at competitions.

The Anderson club was the winner of the Pawhuska Kiwanis club health achievement award for 1942, and to back up their claims for the award, 11 of the homes of members were tested for water supplies, from

which samples were sent to state laboratories for purity tests.

The club, its members acting as waiters and waitresses at the Anderson school, served 5,850 lunches in connection with the WPA school lunch program before it was discontinued, and club members have been assisting with the program under its new sponsorship since that time.

They have given eight health demonstrations before groups at their school and elsewhere during the period, and 18 of the 21 members are now enrolled in a Red Cross first aid unit, after studying first aid under certificated instructors, according to the report.

The Anderson club report was the first to be received at the office of Harold Shearhart, assistant county agent, who said that Anderson is frequently first in reporting as well as achievement in various phases of the 4-H program.

Home Demonstration Club Takes Over to Run School Lunch

Members of the Anderson home demonstration club in the Sand Springs area of this county have preserved more than 1,200 quarts of assorted vegetables for the Anderson school lunch program and will pay the salary of a cook to handle preparation of school lunches for children of the school, it was disclosed here Tuesday.

The club, taking over the school lunch program after the WPA school lunch plan was abandoned recently, has prepared and canned foods which will be available for quick meals for the school children, it was said, and as jars were emptied, more vegetables were immediately placed in them, said Miss Eveyln Funk, assistant county home demonstration agent, who met with the club Monday and heard their report of activities.

Miss Funk said that some other clubs in the county have also started work on the same type of project and that reports are expected from other clubs in the near future.
