

The organized War Savings program of our school began with the arrival of the first "Schools At War" booklet. This booklet and the accompanying literature brought to the faculty and students a full realization of the active part our children should play in sharing the burden of their country's needs. The teachers imbued the children with the spirit of sacrifice and loyal service, and the following pages of student work outline the plan of campaign.


Parents also cooperated by urging the children to invest their small savings in stamps, and by presenting them with bonds of various amounts instead of the usual Christmas novelties.

The students themselves organized into groups to further the cause of war savings; the older ones taking charge of the weekly stamp sales in the school, others soliciting sales from door to door, and still others engaging in competitions of various kinds, directing the proceeds into war savings channels.

Every child in the school has been enlisted in this activity, and each has pledged his loyal support to the very end. Although Sacred Heart School has the small enrollment of one hundred pupils (transients), the following creditable account is submitted for War Savings durings the months of October, November and December:







Children of the first and second grades line up to purchase war stamps with "long-treasured" dimes.


Junior Red Cross Notes
