## SCHOOL BOYS "TAKE OVER" for WORKMEN

To get workmen for the repair jobs necessary the school plant has proved an impossibility. However, the repairs have been satisfactorily made.

Boys signed up for the various kinds of work needed around the school. Jobs were assigned and done with a happy-to-be-helpful spirit.

Radiator attachments were made; gas stoves set up, pipes soldered and fitted where needed.

Another group has done the carpentry work; repairs, screening, setting up shelving, installing venetion blinds, tightening up and mending school furniture.

Painting jobs were also satisfactorily carried out by the boys. Some jobs requiring electrical skill too, were completed by the boys and judged "professional."

Younger boys have worked right al ong with the older group so that there may always be those on hand to keep the school plant "in shape." We have found that there is hardly any job which cannot be done by one of our boys.


Thursdays have been set aside as Stamp Day here at school, though stamps can be bought on any day.

Two high school students each week wear the "Victory Cap" which designates them as sales managers for the week.

From an enrollment of 125 pupils, there is always a ninety-five per cent and more often a hundred per cent, sales count.

Stamp sales so far have totaled \$1050.75 since September.
