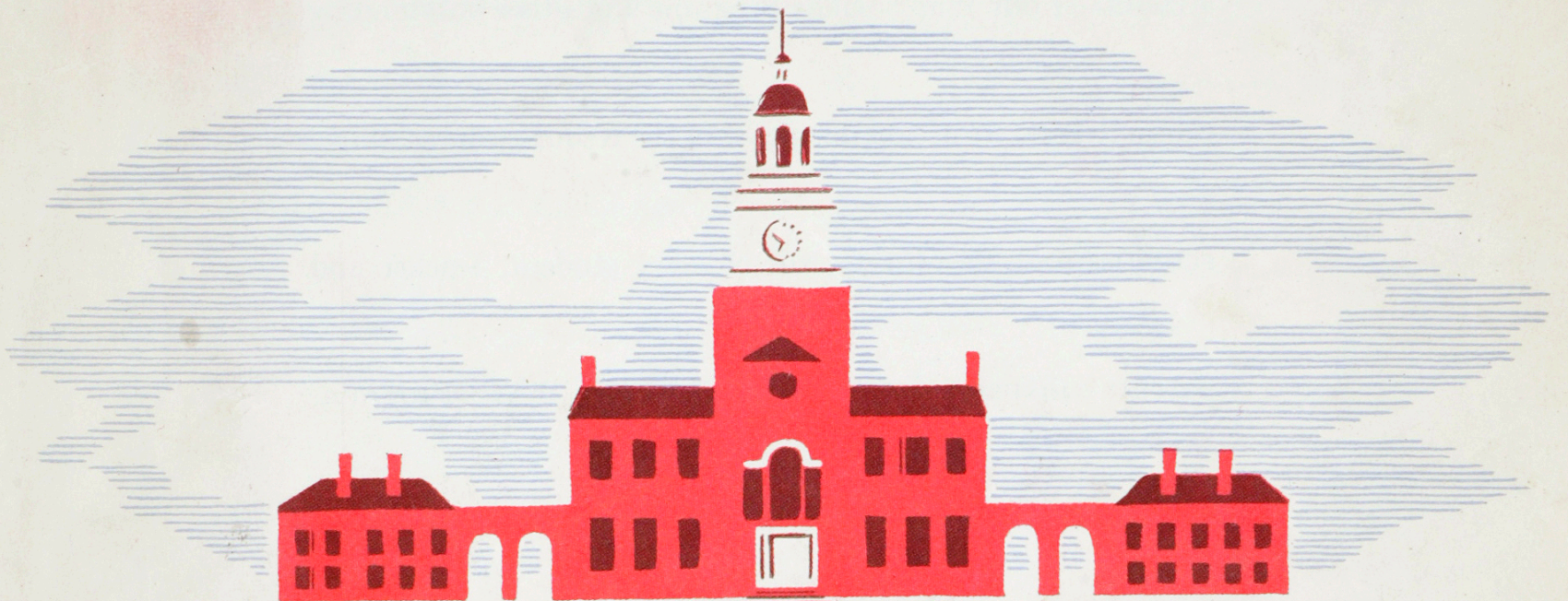

"Victory!"

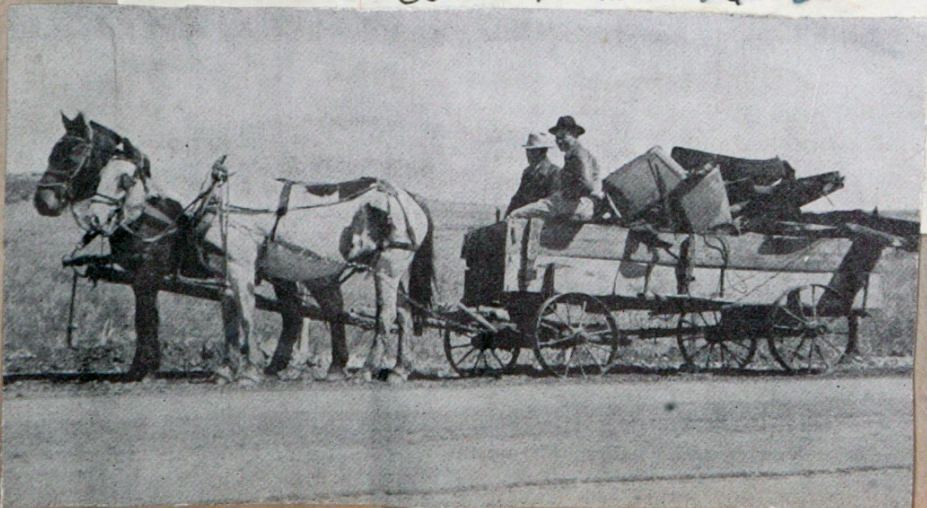
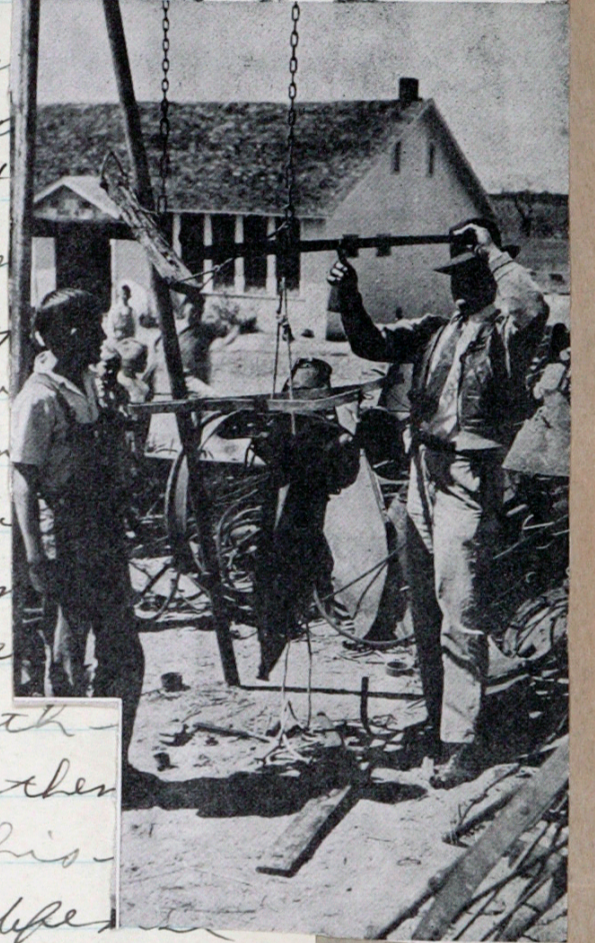

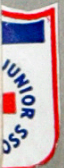

we can raise cattle for beef, butter and milk to drink. we can make seed boxes to plant tomatoes, sweet potatoes and cabbage seeds.

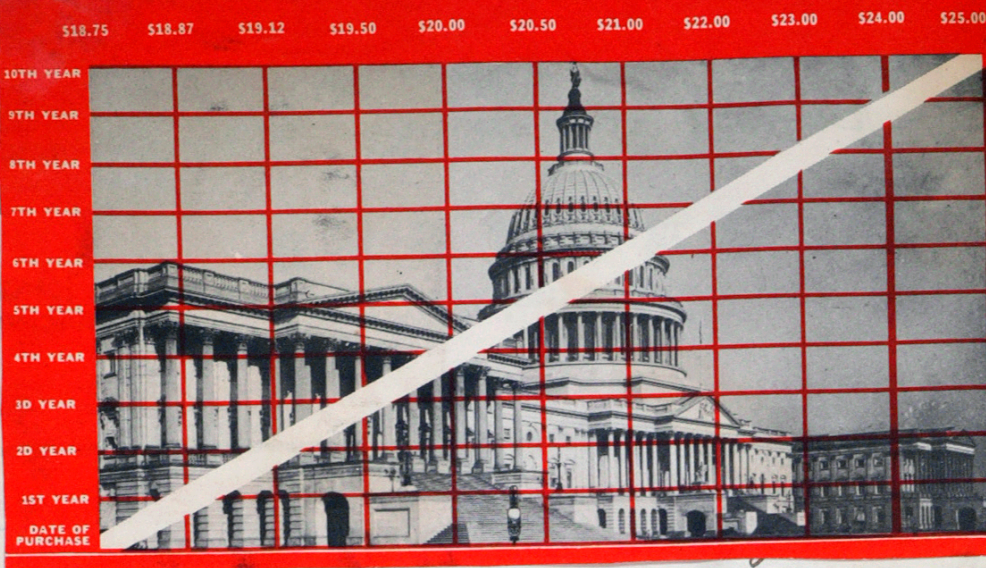
The more food we can raise the better our Soldiers can fight, and our country will be stronger when war comes to us.

When the war is over you will still have your stamps and bonds to spend. If you keep your bonds for 10 years, every \$3 invested will give birth to a fourth dollar. You will then have \$4 to spend for every \$3 you now save.

Investment in War Savings Bonds is considered the safest investment you can make. There is none safer.

War Saving Bonds are also the most profitable of all Government Bonds. The present yield of all other Government Bonds averages less than 2 percent a year. The E Bonds in the War Savings Program yielded nearly 3 percent a year if held until maturity.
