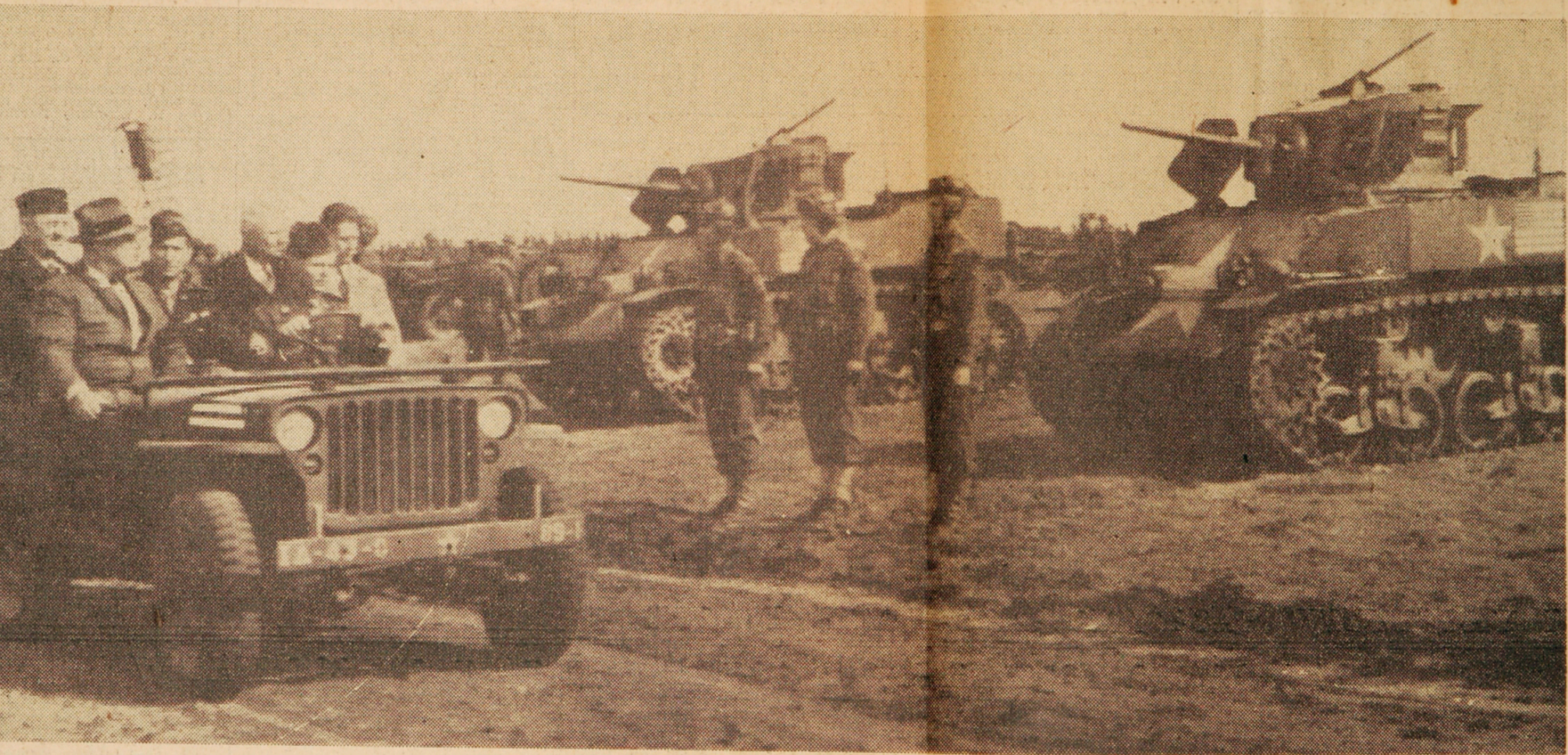

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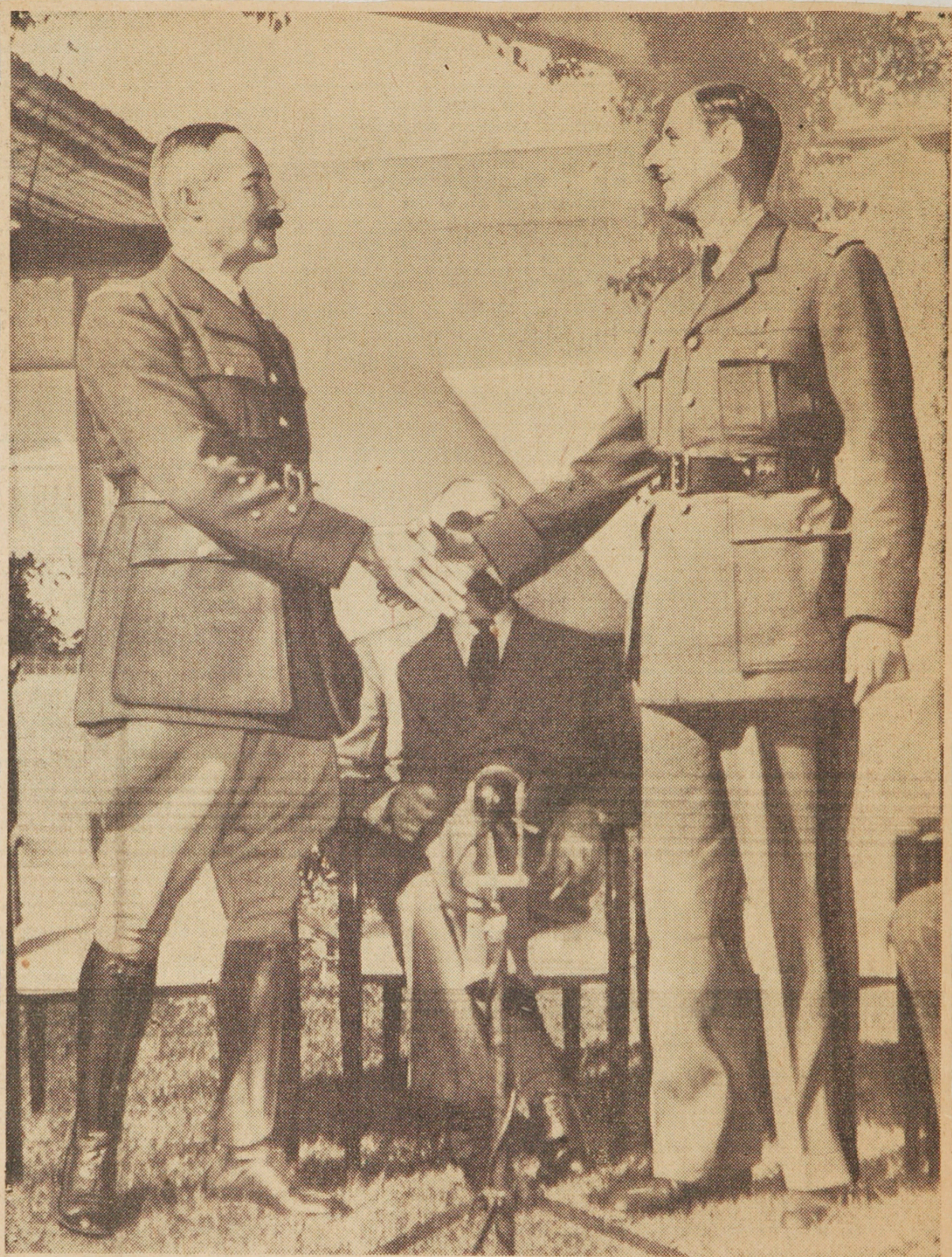

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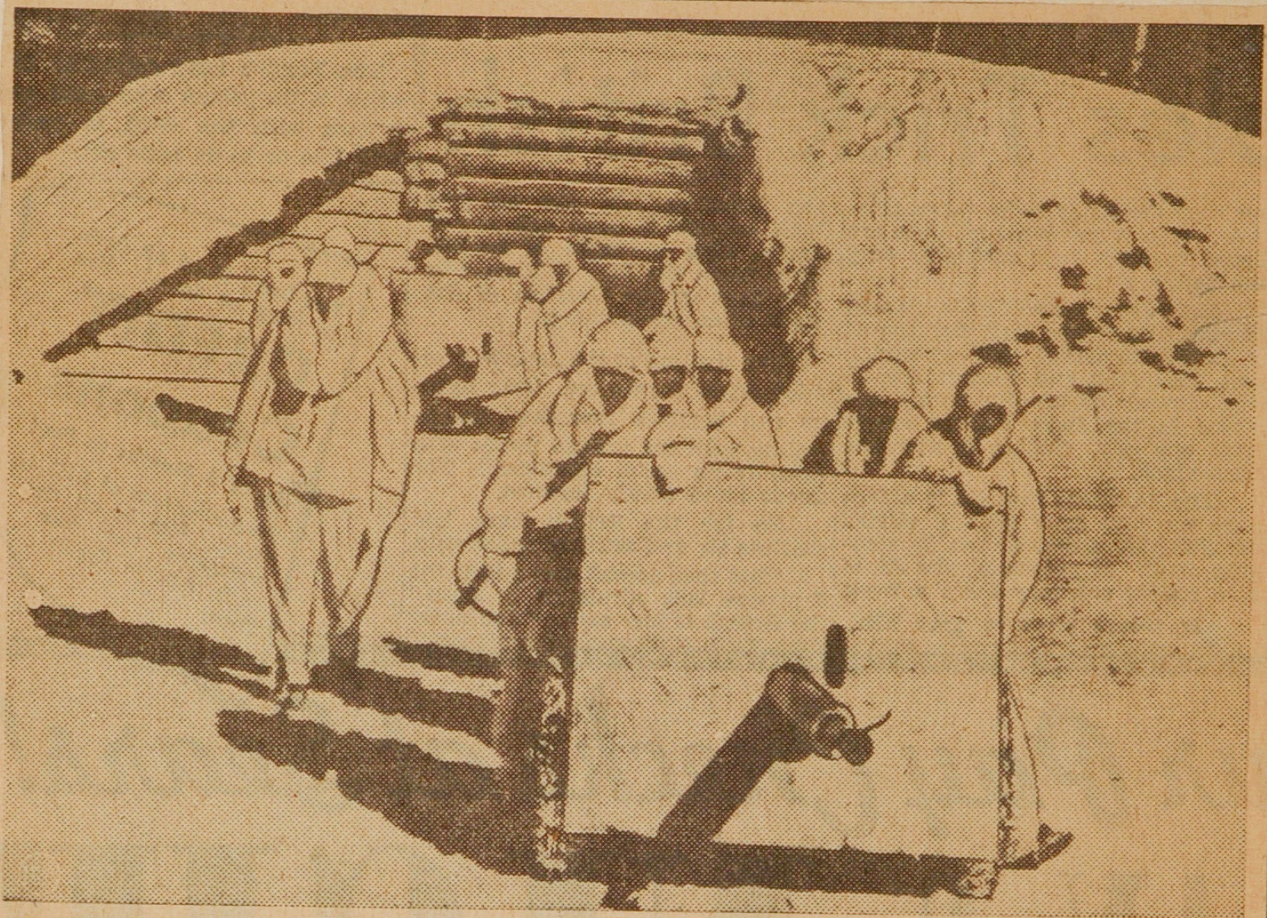

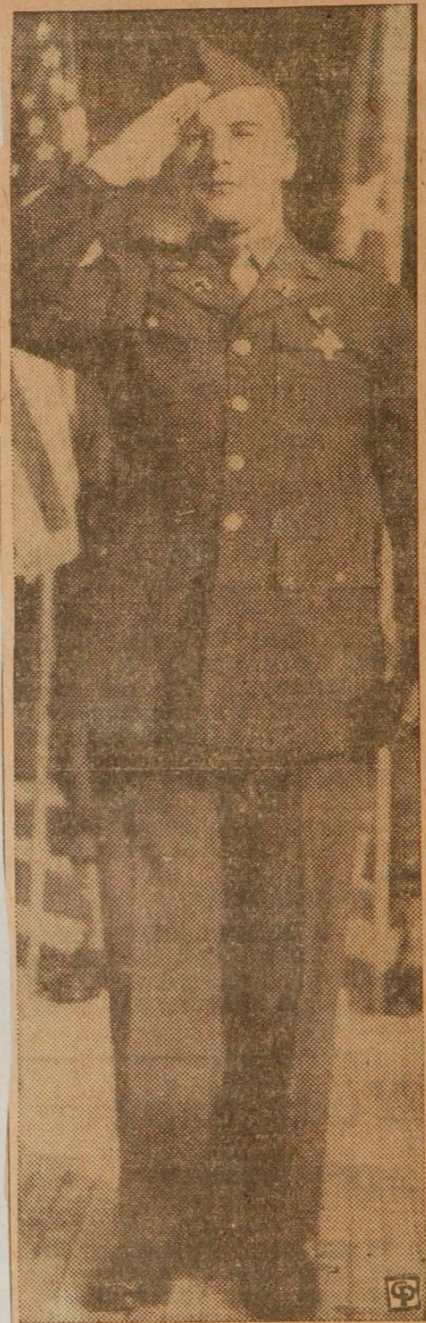

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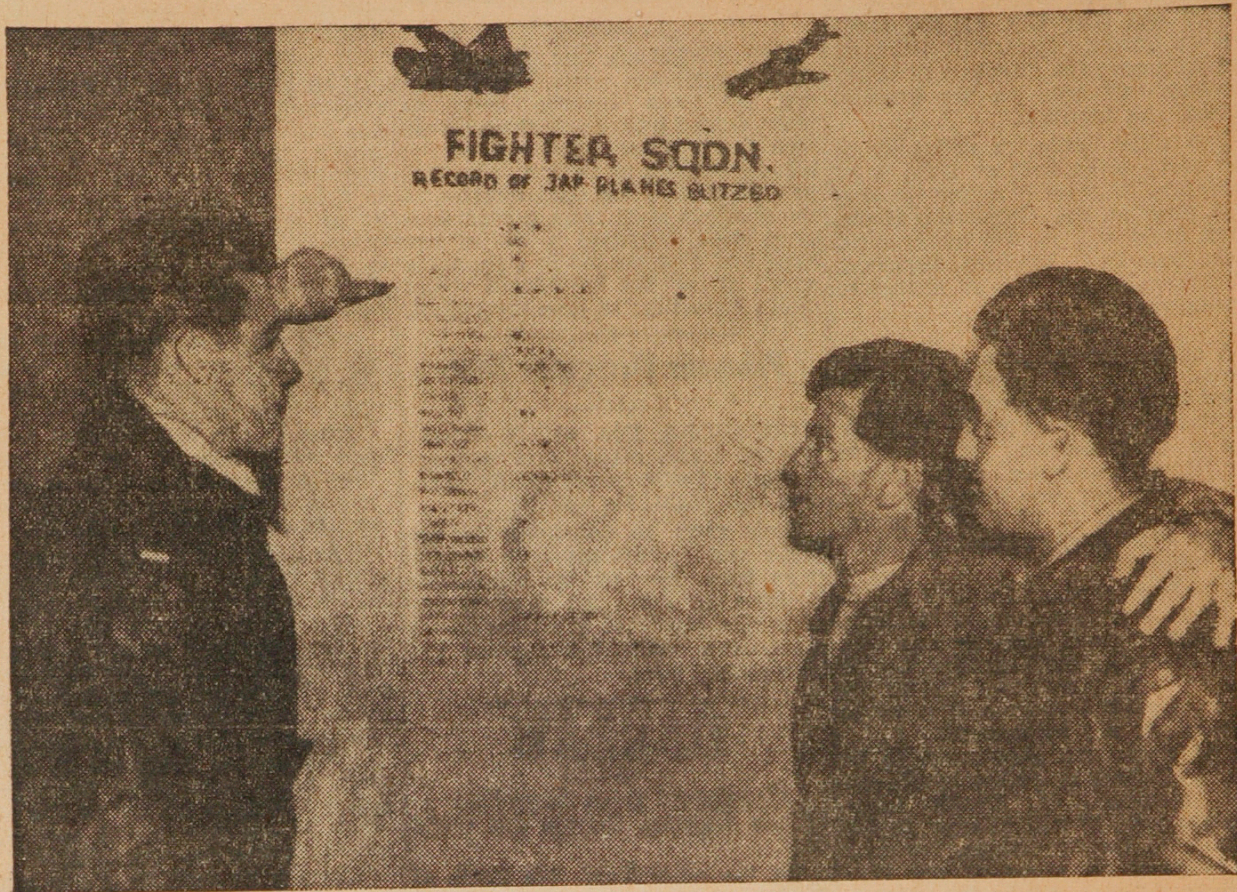

Oklahoma Military academy at Claremore will be remembered by Tulsa boxing fans as the popular winner of the northeast Oklahoma Golden Gloves heavy-weight championship in 1940 and the runner up to skinny Ellsworth Clark in 1941.



BOOTH

Lieutenant Booth, who was 25 years old, had his marine aviation training at Corpus Christi and was graduated last July. He was sent to the southwest Pacific area in October and went into action almost immediately. His parents who live in Texas county, Oklahoma, only recently got official notification of his death which occurred on December 21.

Booth played high school football at Guymon and then was employed by a California detective agency for three years before entering O. M. A. in 1939. Lee Gilstrap (now an army major) put him on the academy boxing team at once and he won the northeast championship in his first year of competition. He didn't have a great deal of skill but was a dogged fighter who pressed his opponent at all times and was willing to take two or three punches to land one himself. He was a friendly, good natured youngster liked by everyone who knew him.

John C. Hamilton, president of O. M. A., wrote Roy's parents: "In spite of his strength and size Roy was one of the gentlest men I have ever known, and one of the most unselfish."

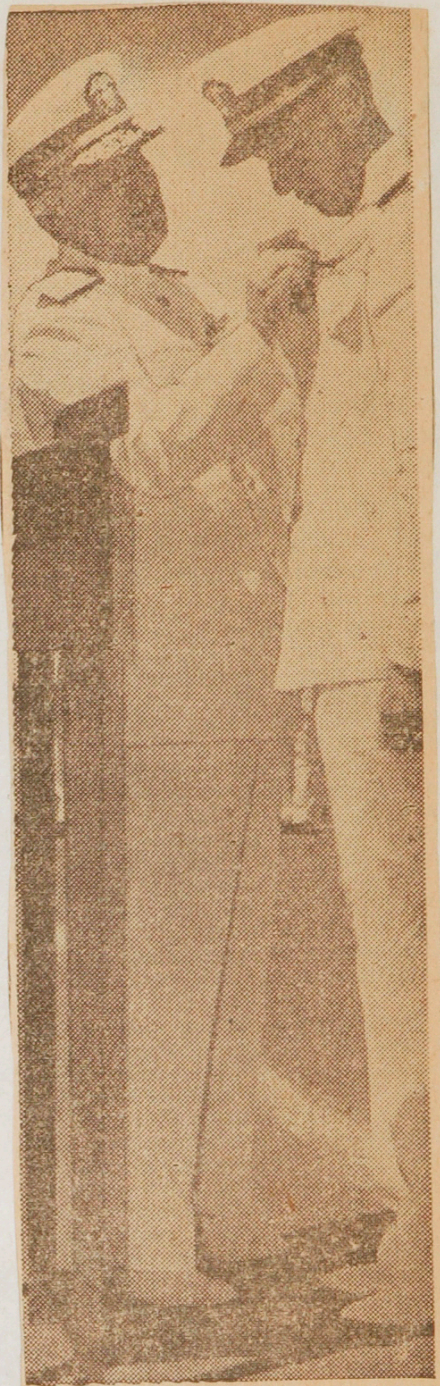

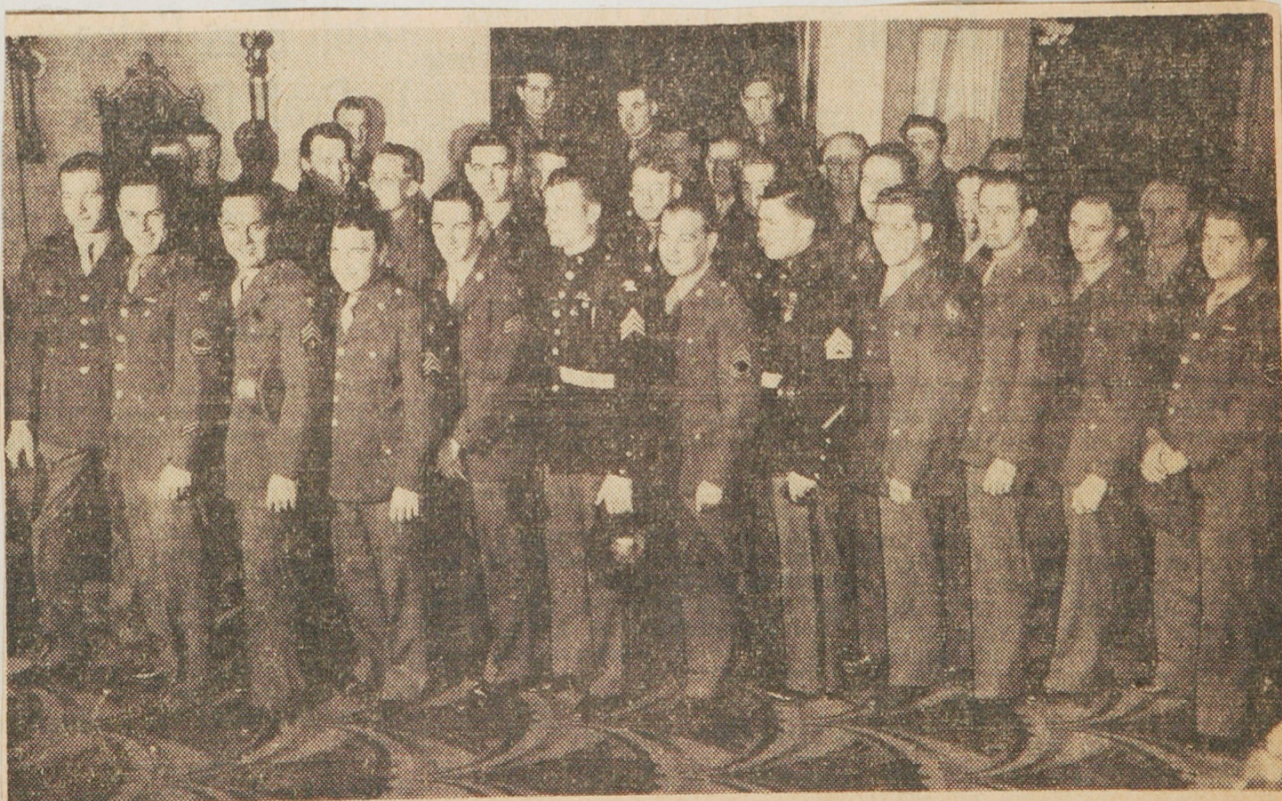
