

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Scrap Drive

To start our scrap drive we nominated our officers, Rose mary Fath was Ist lieutenant, Wilma Williams 2 nd lieutenant Jo ann Buhrman Corporals faul Jong and Joyce morrow. The rest were privates. Each one of us took neighbors close to our homes and the ones close to the school were taken by some of the officers, they told them either to bring their scrap to the school or take it on to town. The scrap drive began In October standended October 17. We were gretty successful in getting scrap. The school had 1,875 lbs of scrap and the other scrap that people took themselves was 8 5-74 lbs, oferon and 8 pounds of aluminum tot-



-aling 10, 4 4 47 prounds of iron and 8 prounds of aluminium.

The school bought juctures, a flag, and hectagraph with their money. This scrap drive was the most successful in this community since the war statted.

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Tuberculosis Stamps

Mrs. Thomas Eo. Young chair-man of the Kay County Tuberaulosis Association Panca City sentus two dollars worth of stamps to sell. We sold 1. 28 worth, and sent the rest back. Because we are buying War & tamps and Bonds, we didn't try to sell as many as usual. Two girls in the fifth grade that are twins sold their stamps in a very funny way. This is the way they did it: They put up a booth inside their home and put age a sign that read, Buy Juberculosis & tamps for It apiece and get two kisles."

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
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
