Work for Victory

Water works for Uncle Sam. Factories need water. The factories are making things Uncle Sam needs. Help Uncle Sam to save water. Do not waste water. Be sure to turn off the faucet when you are through using water. Do not put quite so much water into the tub when you take a bath. If the faucet leaks, tell Mother. Ask her to have it fixed right away. If every child saved a few drops of water, how much water could the school children in the United States save for Uncle Sam every day?

Work for Victory

Help Uncle Sam to win the war by "toting" packages. You will be helping to save rubber. You will be saving time for an older boy who can be doing some other kind of work for Uncle Sam. Carry packages home from the store for your mother. Help your neighbors by carrying packages for them. Soldiers have to "tote" packs. Be a soldier and "tote" packages.

Work for Victory

Uncle Sam needs trains to carry soldiers, goods, guns, and tanks. He needs busses to help carry soldiers. Help Uncle Sam by not taking a trip or going away from your home town. Write a letter to your grandmother and to your friend. Uncle Sam has room for a letter when he does not have room for you. Save a seat for a soldier by staying at home.

Work for Victory

Help Uncle Sam by taking good care of your clothes. They will last longer if you give them good care. If you wear your clothes longer, there will be more cloth for Uncle Sam's soldiers.

Keep your clothes clean. Brush them often. Hang up your clothes when you take them off.

Save rubber.
Walk to school.

Uncle Sam needs leather for soldiers' shoes, harness, saddles, and many other things.

Save leather for Uncle Sam. Take care of your shoes. Keep them clean. Keep them dry. Shine them often. Have new soles put on your old shoes.

Work for Victory

Helping Mother to keep your room neat and clean is helping Uncle Sam. Hang up your clothes when you take them off. Put your shoes away. Do not drop things on the floor and leave them there.

By helping Mother in this way, she has more time for other work. She has more time to knit, sew, and work for the Red Cross. If she works in a factory, she has more time to do her other work at home.

Uncle Sam needs much sugar. You can help to save sugar for Uncle Sam. Eat fruit in place of candy. Use other sweet things in place of sugar on your food. Use honey and sirup. Use less sugar on your foods.

Work for Victory

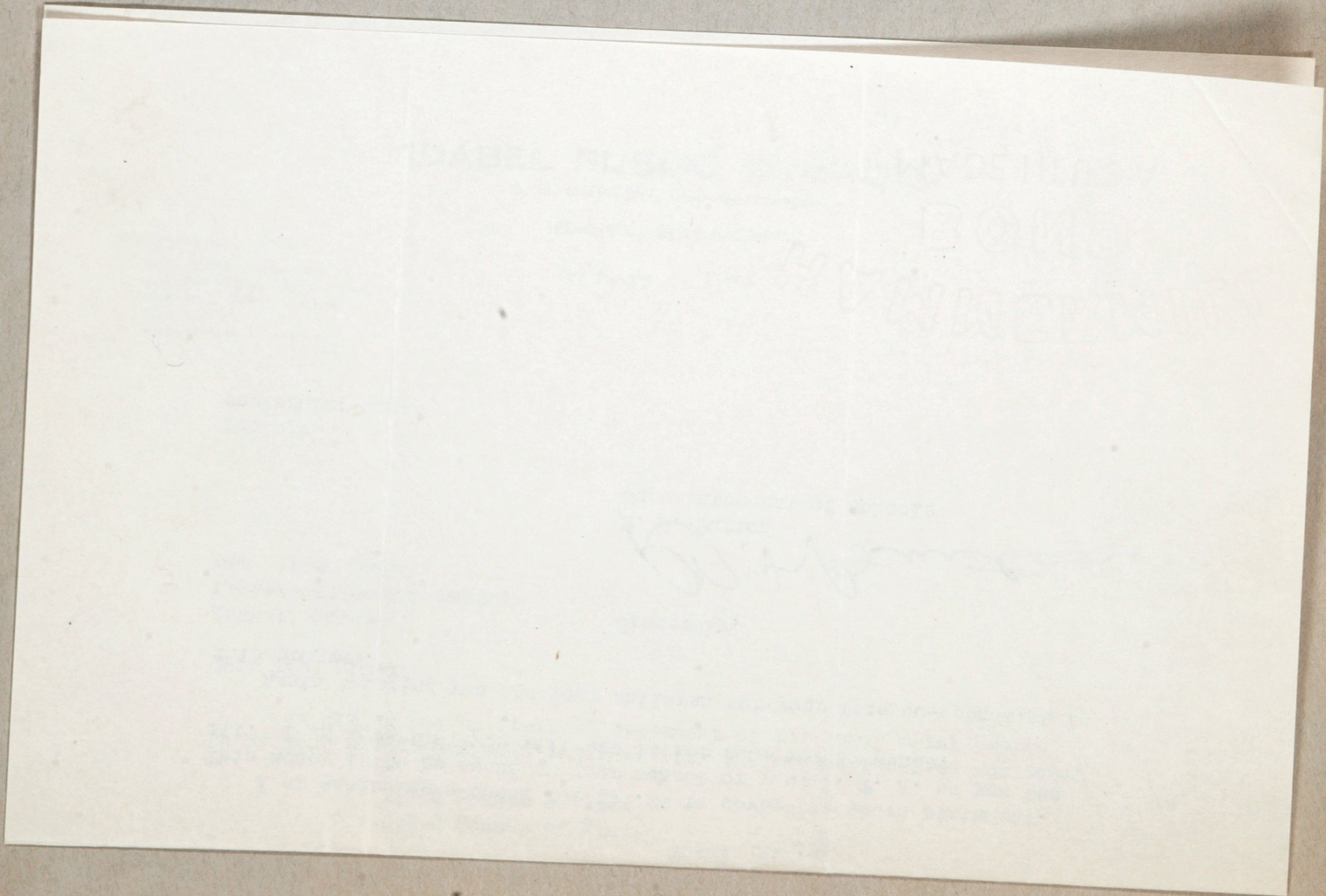

I am giving you an itemized statement of the scrap metal turned in by your school and sold together with the amount received for same:


1,610 Pounds of Iron	\$ 6.44
