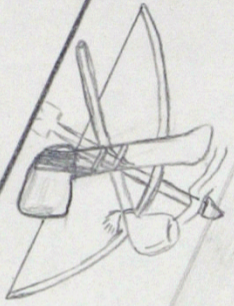

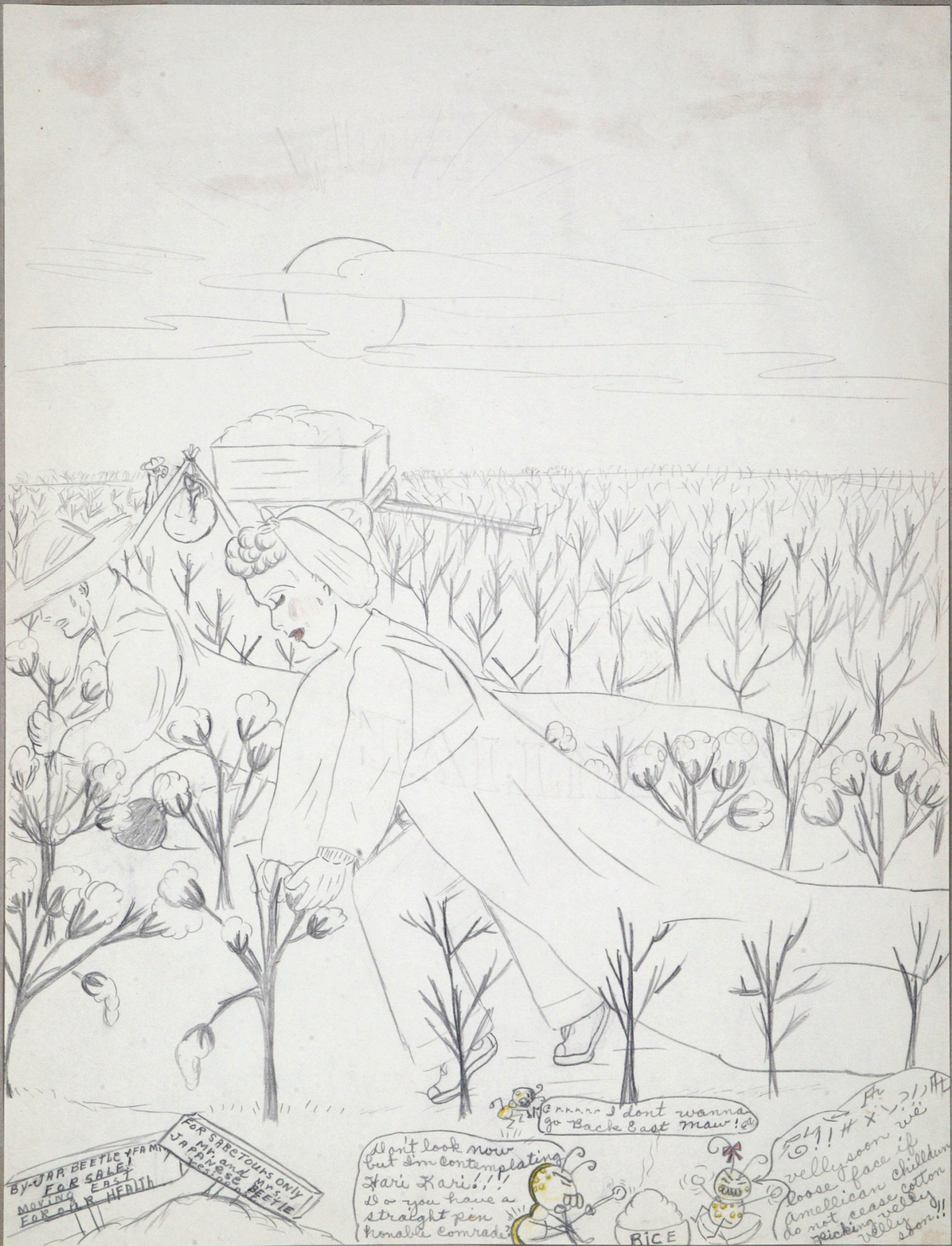


CHAPTER 1

WHO GATHERED THE COTTON CROP

For four weeks school was dismissed for a cotton picking vocation. During that time more than fifty per cent of the school faculty were engaged in farm work during all or part of the time.

School pupils, both grade and high school, gathered approximately 93,000 pounds of cotton. This is the equivalent of 186 five hundred pound bales. Here as in many other places in the cotton regions, the cotton crop would not have been gathered had it not been for the help of the school children. After farmers had taken their scrap to town,

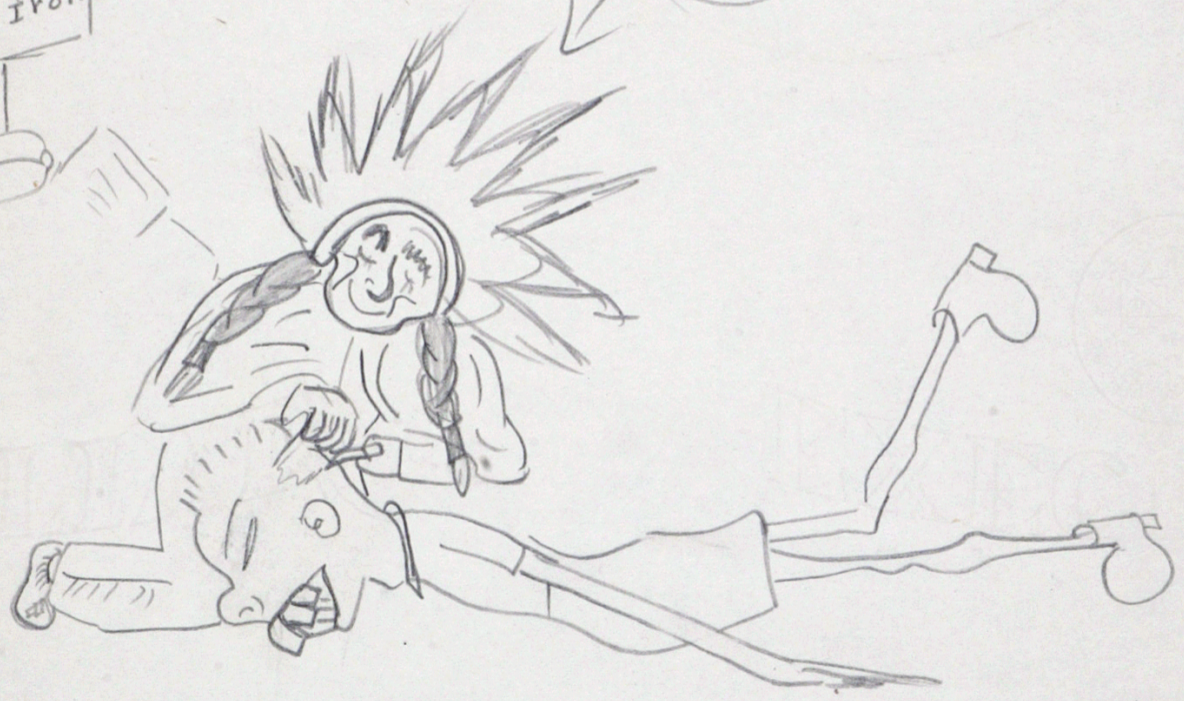
After people said they had no scrap,

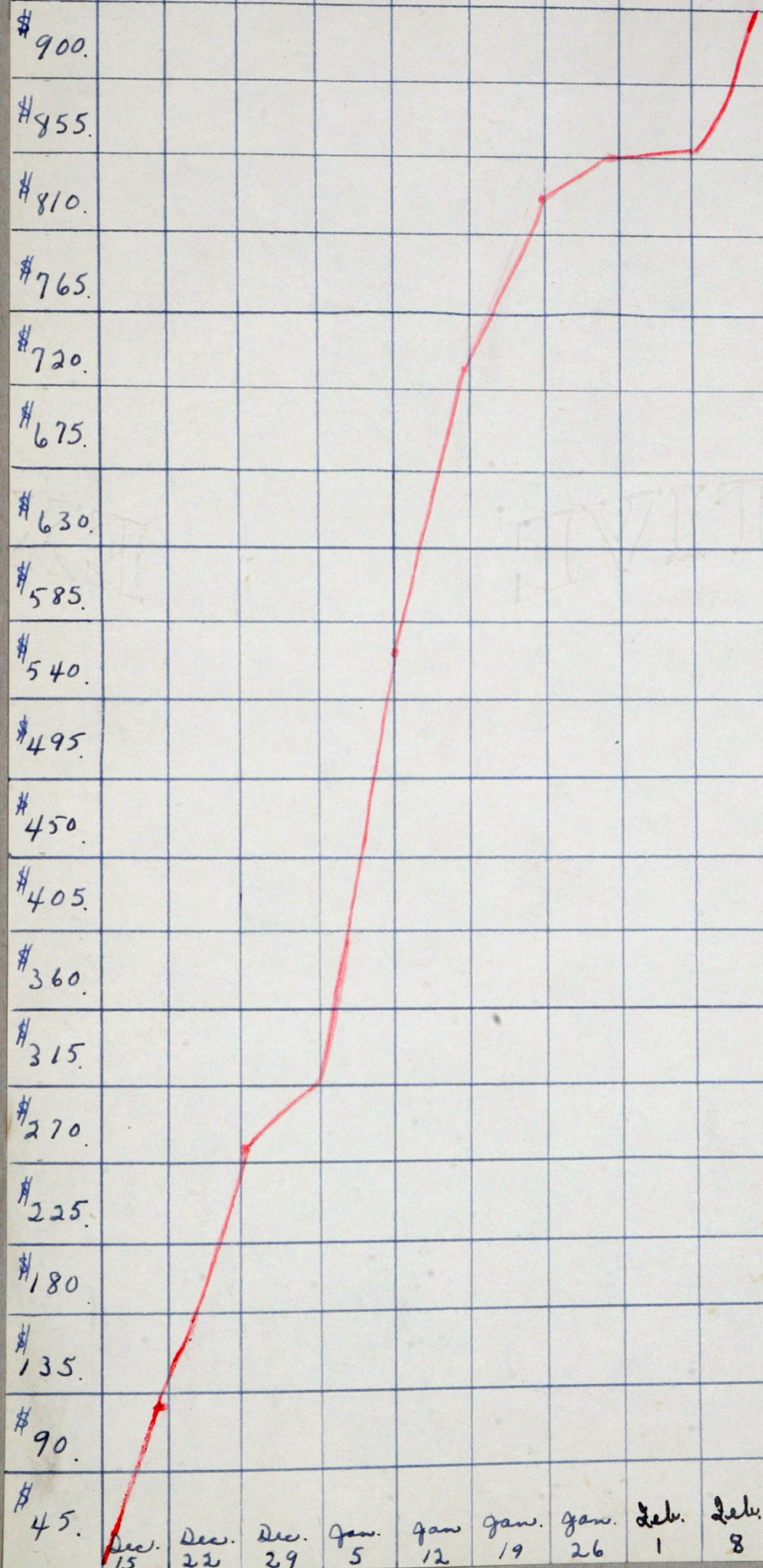
CHAPTER IV

December 15, 1942, we began to sell war stamps at the school. We set as our first objective \$900.00 enough to purchase a jeep. The graph on the following page is an indication of how well we have succeeded.

Although the total sold is not large compared to some communities, we feel it is a good deal. Only a little over a year ago a big per cent of this community was receiving some form of government relief due to a series of droughts. Today due to increased rainfall crops are better. Unemployment has disappeared since the war began.

Now that "Uncle Sam", needs money, pupils are able and willing to do all they can by buying war bonds and stamps.
