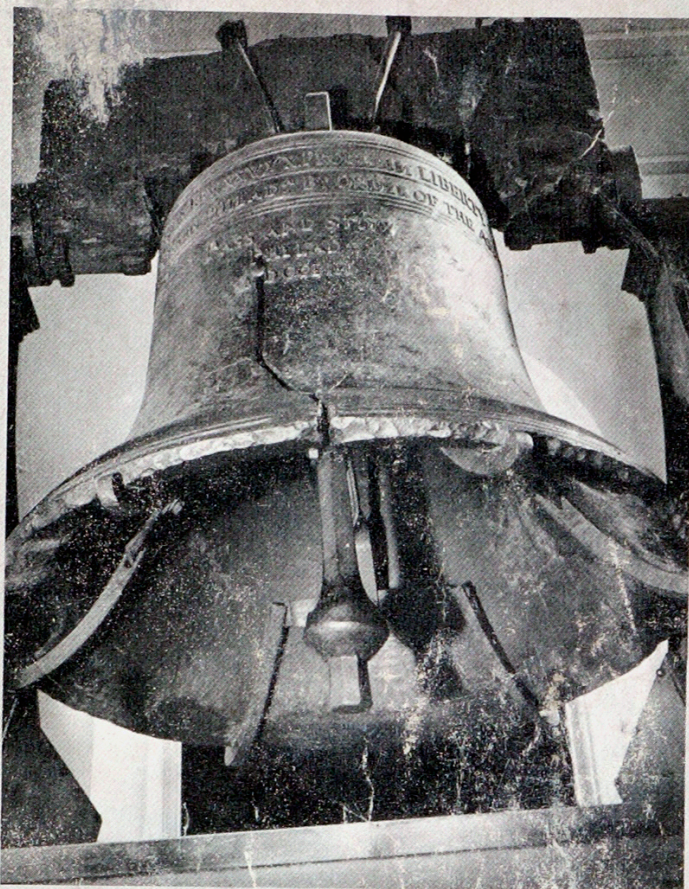

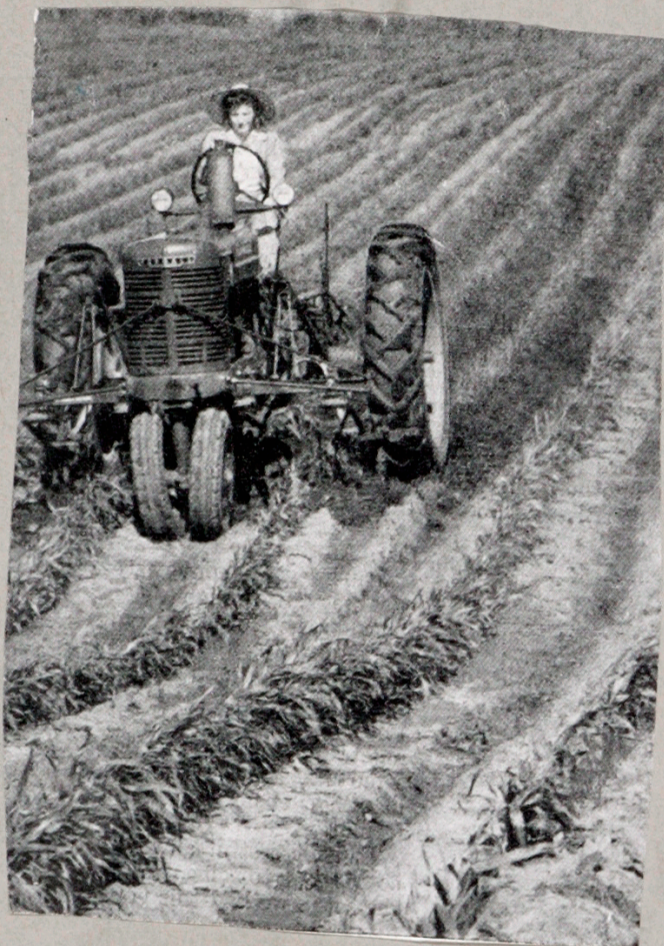
## VOICE OF LIBERTY . . .

It was cast three times, and at the third casting the prophetic words, "Proclaim liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof" (Lev. XXV, 10) were again inscribed upon it. Then it hung in Independence Hall, Philadelphia, for nearly 24 years, awaiting the Day—July 4, 1776—when it was to ring out the first tidings that the Declaration of Independence had been adopted by the American Colonies.
