The school has collected five hundred eleven pounds of iron and some rubber. We have also bought six dollars and fifty-five cents worth of War Saving Stamps.

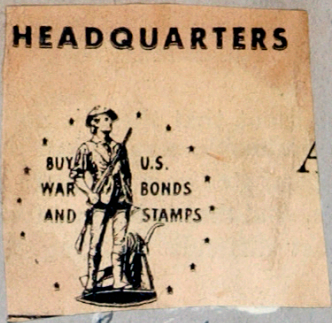

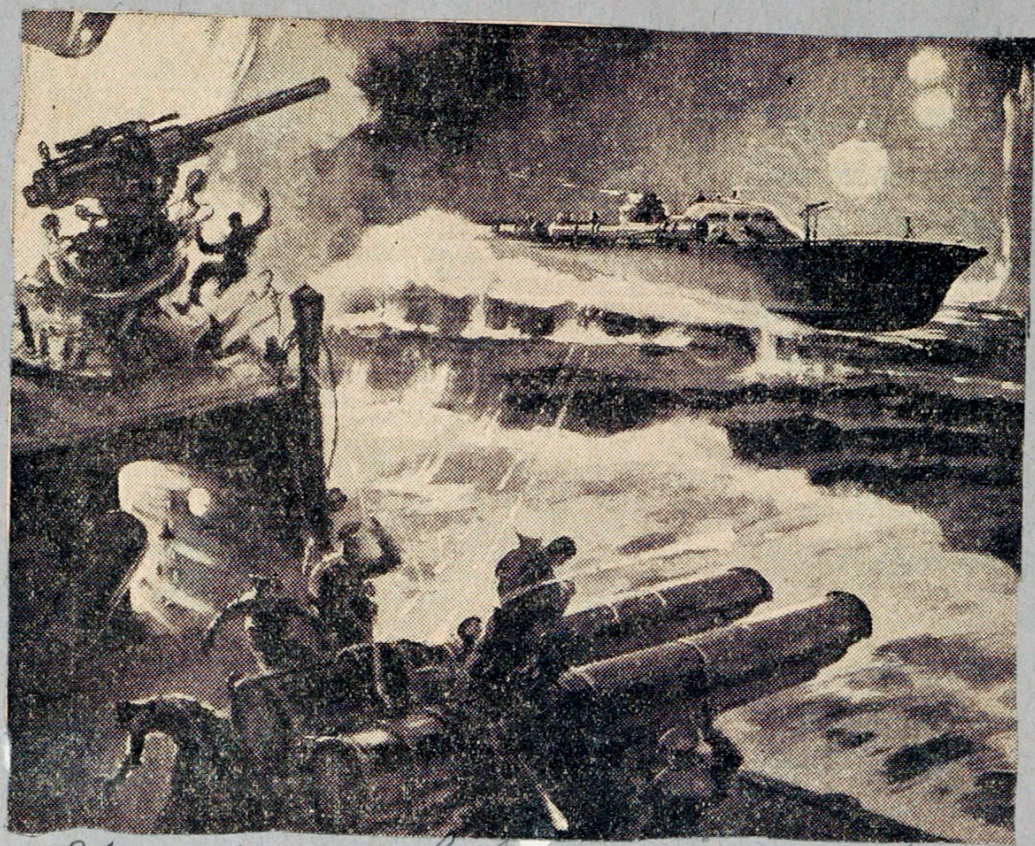

this war. Because we are on God's side

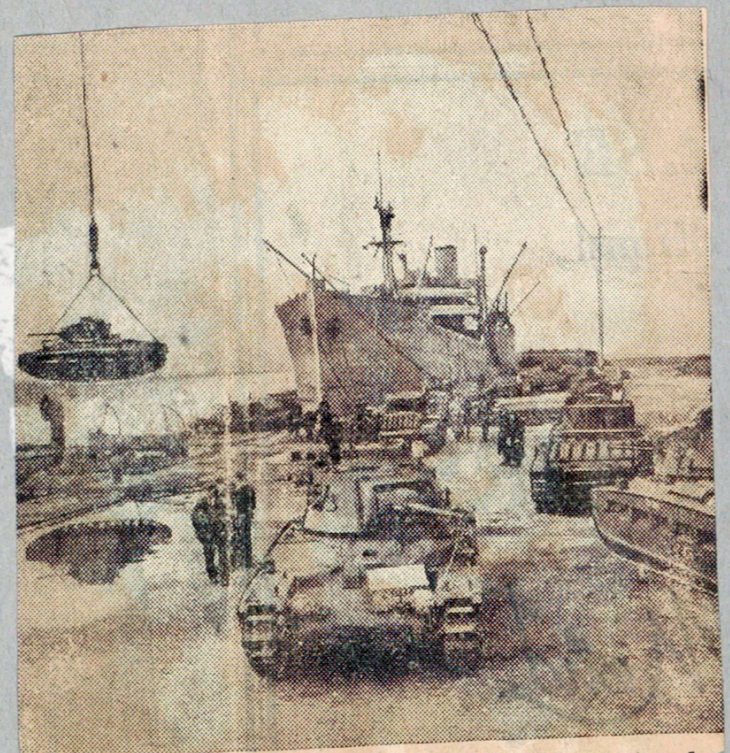

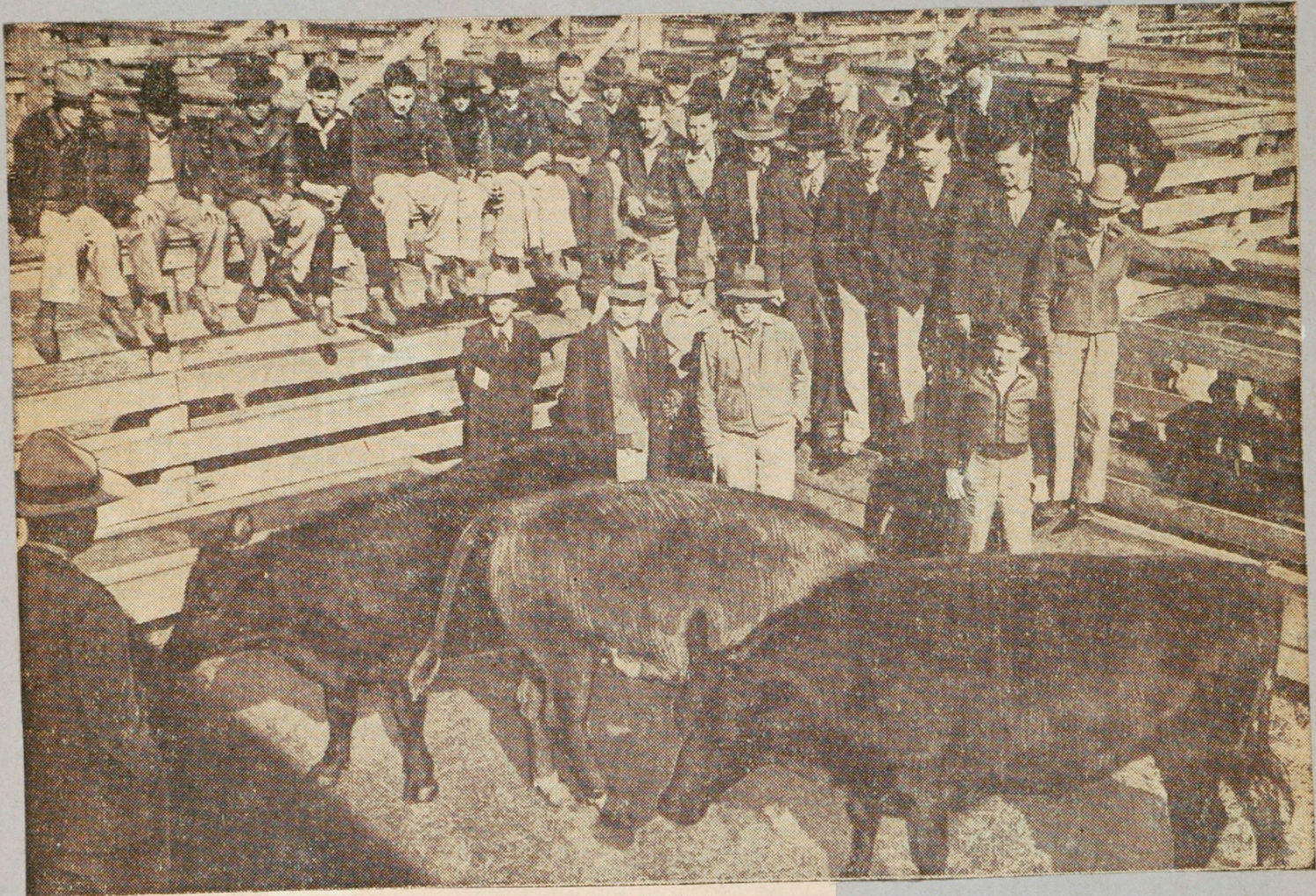


Our scrap helps make them

THIS IS GOING TO HURT

President Roosevelt has asked Congress to add 16 billion dollars to the federal government's annual income through taxes and compulsory savings. The object is double barreled: to finance about half of our war expenditures and at the same time to siphon off income which otherwise would contribute toward inflation.

This, as Americans have said and the British concur, is a total war budget and a total war financing program. Its twin objectives are so vital that the people will accept the soundness of the President's request and expect Congress to act accordingly.

It is not drawing any invidious comparison to mention that the hardest part of the job now falls on Congress.

Because of the causes, the people will be willing to turn over 51 billion dollars a year to Uncle Sam. But it is inevitable that whatever formula may be adopted by Congress for raising the 51 billion dollars, millions of voters are going to believe that some other method would have been less burdensome.

IT WAS PENCIL WORK

The way this figure of 33 person per year got into circulation is excusable though confusing. So a pencil and paper and divided up all the canned goods that could be consumed by all the people that would consume the answer came out 33 pounds.

It was an easy figure and that could be compared with the amount available on what consumption had been in years previous.

But here again some additional information is necessary. Per capita consumption of canned goods varies with income as well as with the size of the family. A 1941 Department of Agriculture report shows that families with incomes of \$10,000 a year consumed on the average about 112 pounds of canned goods per capita per year, in which the income was over \$10,000, while those who consumed an average of about 112 pounds of canned goods per capita per year.

UNFAIR, IN A WAY

To rule arbitrarily that consumption have to be reduced to an average of 33 pounds per year would therefore mean that the lower income families would get about 75 per cent of the goods, while the upper income families would get only about 35 per cent of the consumption.

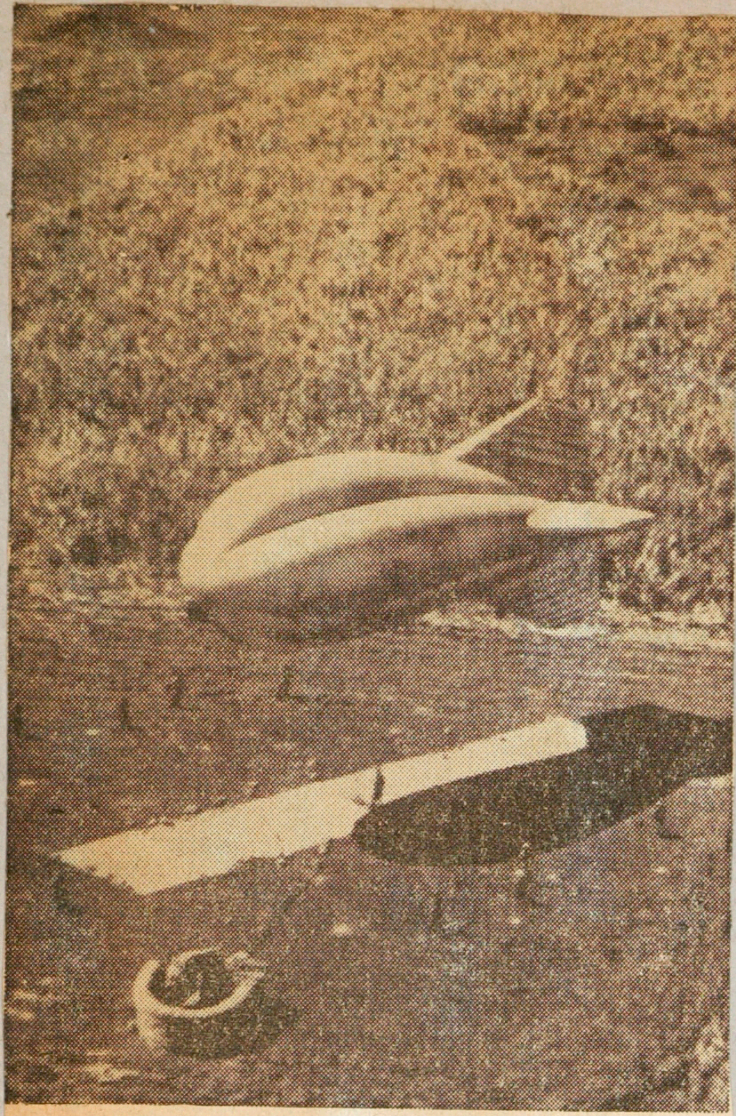

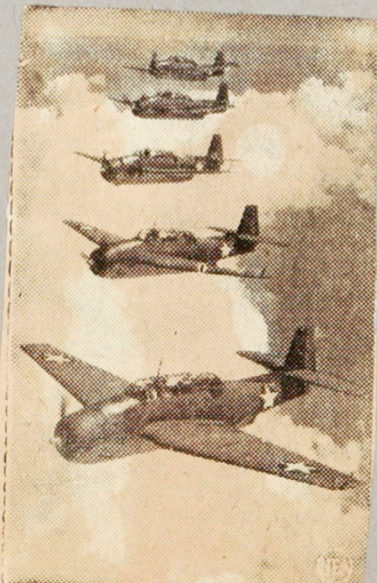
