# **BOYS AND GIRLS CLUB WORK**

Under the direction of the United States Department of Agriculture, in cooperation with the Extension Division of the Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical College and the Oklahoma State Fair and Exposition. For all information relating to Boys' and Girls' Demonstration Clubs, address Boys' and Girls' Clubs, Stillwater, Oklahoma.

# General Rules

- 1. These contests are open to any boy or girl in Oklahoma who was from 10 to 18 years of age, inclusive, on January 1, 1915, and who is a member of the Boys' and Girls' Demonstration Clubs. All contestants in scholarship contest at State Fair School must be 12 to 18 years of age.
- In awarding prizes consideration will be given promptness, accuracy and completeness of reports and the amount of assistance received from others.
- 3. Each contestant must comply with the general rules and requirements of the Boys' and Girls Demonstration Club work.
- 4. Each club member should send an exhibit to his local county contest, where the required exhibits will be selected to compete as a county team in the State contest. Each of these exhibits will also compete for individual prizes at the State contest. Single entries will be accepted from any county to compete for individual prizes.
- 5. Local, county and district contests may be held at such times and places as the local authorities may determine. It is recommended that such contests be held before the Oklahoma State Fair and Exposition at Oklahoma City, September 25 to October 2, 1915. The prize in each county and district contest should be sufficient money to send the first prize winner of each club to the State Fair together with his exhibit, in order that he may attend the State Fair School to which he is entitled by the winning of the first premium, and which begins September 27 and closes October 1.

- 8. Exhibits shall be made at the Oklahoma State Fair and Exposition, Oklahoma City, September 25 to October 2, 1915.
- 9. Club members may compete for prizes offered by the State Fair Association in other departments, but must send extra exhibits for this purpose.
- 10. Final reports shall be mailed to "Boys' and Girls' Clubs", Stillwater, Oklahoma, on or before November 15, 1915. Awards in the State contest will not be made until final reports are received and graded, which will not be later than December 15, 1915.

- 11. In calculating expense of production, a uniform scale of prices for rent, labor, loss of fertility, etc., will be followed. These prices will be furnished club members later.
- 12. Spelling, penmanship, punctuation and composition will not be considered in grading histories or other written work. Histories should be illustrated either by original drawings or by pictures of implements, crops, etc., neatly cut from implement and seed catalogs and pasted on. In making a charge for fertilizer against your crop, you will enter it as a charge for plant food removed from the soil as follows:

- 3. The trio of birds shall consist of one cockerel and two pullets. Exhibition coops will be furnished by the Oklahoma State Fair, and no other coops will be allowed for exhibition purposes. Each chicken must be legbanded. No entry fee or charge for feed or cooping of birds will be made to club members.
- 4. Poultry should be shipped to Boys' and Girls' Clubs, Poultry Department, State Fair Grounds, Oklahoma City, and arrive not later than Tuesday, September 22, 1915. The name and address of sender should be on each shipping tag. Transportation must be prepaid.

- 7. County contests should be held at county fairs or at some central railroad station in the county. No county contest shall be later than Saturday, September 22, 1915.

- 9. Pigs should be shipped, prepaid, to Superintendent Pig Club Contest, State Fair Grounds, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Pigs must reach the State Fair grounds not later than Saturday, September 25, 1915.
- 10. The Oklahoma State Fair will make no charge for pens or for care of pigs. Feed will be furnished by the State Fair and cost of same deducted from the proceeds of sale of pigs. Exhibitors in this contest must make their own arrangements regarding return of crates.
- 11. Boys should reach the State Fair grounds and report to the Principal of State Fair School Sunday, September 26. Admission to State Fair grounds will be granted to first prize winners of county contests.
- 12. Boys will be in charge of a competent superintendent and will be given instructions each day in stock judging, especially judging market classes of hogs. A program of entertainment will be provided, including visits to the packing houses, the horse show, the theater and the department stores. Boys will return home Saturday, October 2.
- 13. Pigs will be judged and sold at public auction at the Swine Pavilion, State Fair grounds, at 11 o'clock a. m. Tuesday, September 28. Bids may be sent by mail.
- 14. Morris & Company and Sulzberger & Sons' Company will slaughter the pigs, in the presence of exhibitors and the public, at a date to be advertised.
- 15. Each competitor will receive price paid for his pig at auction, less actual cost of feed consumed by pig at State Fair. The Oklahoma National Stockyards guarantees that pigs will bring market value.

# Scholarship Contest

Members of the Boys' and Girls' Clubs who are 12 to 18 years of age can compete for the trips to the State Fair and to the Farmers' Winter Short Course, and for scholarships offered in the A. and M. College.

#### State Fair School

In the county contests first prize winners, among the contestants 12 to 18 years of age, in each of the seven clubs-Corn, Kafir, Cotton, Pig, Poultry, Canning and Better Bread-will have their expenses paid for one week at the State Fair School, conducted in connection with the Oklahoma State Fair and Exposition at Oklahoma City by the A. and M. College, September 27 to October 2, 1915. This does not include traveling expenses to and from Oklahoma City. The Fair Association erected a fine building on the Fair grounds exclusively for the use of the A. and M. College for this school.

The prize winners sleep in this building and take meals on the Fair grounds. The school lasts one week. The daily program for the week will include lectures and demonstrations on subjects relating to Agriculture, Home Economics and Rural Affairs, seeing the Fair and seeing Oklahoma City and its industrial and pleasure sights. This work in all its details will be under the direct supervision of members of the faculty of the A. and M. College.

Strict discipline will be maintained at all times, all serious breaches of discipline will result in sending the offenders home. In case of sickness or serious misconduct, parents will be notified by wire and letter. No triflers will be permitted to remain in the school.

Ninety-seven boys and girls attended this school last year. Of this number twenty-four won scholarships in the short course held in connection with the Winter Short Course for Farmers at Stillwater, and were eligible to compete for the year's scholarships in the A. and M. College and the District Agricultural Schools.

# Scholarships

The boy and the girl who make highest grades at the State Fair School will each be given \$100.00 to apply on expenses while taking work at the A. and M. College.

# The Farmers' Short Course

In the county contests second prize winners among the contestants 12 to 18 years of age, in each of the seven clubs named, will have their expenses paid for one week during the Farmers' Winter Short Course in January, 1916, at the A. and M. College. This does not include traveling expenses to and from Stillwater.

The boys and girls will be given lectures and demonstrations during the short course by College instructors. The Boys' and Girls' Club Department will see to the welfare of the prize winners while in Stillwater, and

they will have careful supervision throughout the week.

# Scholarships

The boy and the girl making highest grades at this short course will be given \$100.00 to apply on expenses while taking College work in the A. and M. College.

# Rules

Any club member 12 to 18 years of age who is eligible to compete for cash prizes may compete for the above trips and scholarships, subject to the rules governing competition for cash prizes. No club member is eligible to receive more than one scholarship in the A. and M. College.
