Under the Schools At War Program, the Olustee School, having a total enrollment of 200, plans to carry out a definite program of activities for the duration of the war.

Immediately after the attack of Pearl Harbor, the entire school became interested in the Red Cross, and put forth every effort in making a definite contribution for the Red Cross.

The War Savings Program started out of a desire to be useful in the community and by cooperating with others in every way.

Even before the attack on Pearl Harbor, the Olustee School was helping out by making sweaters for the British Refugee Children and also for the Red Cross.

The High School is helping out by taking part in the sale of stamps and bonds regularly each week.

Under activities, a Defense Ball Game was played, in which the admission was a Defense Stamp.

Most of the people in the community cooperated in the activity.

The Olustee School and the community, as a whole, want to do their share and be of help in any way that they can.

As an incentive for buying more War Stamps, the Olustee High School has made an attractive War Stamp Booth, highly decorated in the patriotic colors of red, white, and blue. The classes are having a contest to see which can buy the most stamps.

This has seemed to encourage the buying of War Stamps a lot.



The Olustee School started its War Savings Program by giving thermometer posters to each class in school and the students and teachers, through the purchase of War Stamps and Bonds, raised it to 100% in each class. The rise of the thermometers indicated the purchases up to 100% and they were checked once a week.

Surplus funds in the school paper are used for the buying of War Stamps and Bonds.

Posters are kept on the bulletin boards in the school rooms to urge the students to buy War Stamps and Bonds and to cooperate and do what they can.

#### Defense Program

Thermometers have been placed in each room to show the progress of defense bonds and stamps purchased. We want to make Olustee School 100% in the buying of defense stamps and bonds.

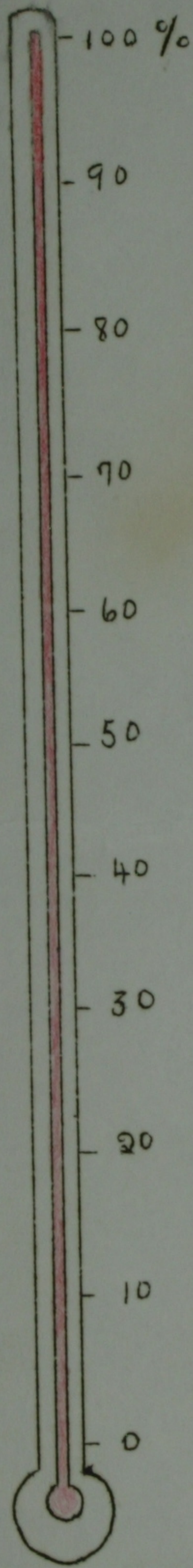

## DEFENSE STAMP & BOND THERMOMETER



OLUSTEE STUDENTS BUY and SELL  
MANY BONDS and STAMPS

The drive for National Defense has resulted in the sale of many defense stamps and bonds. Students are encouraged to sacrifice now and then in order to buy stamps. Defense bonds that the students have bought or have been instrumental in buying amount to \$1850.00 and defense stamps amount to \$61.65 making a total of \$1911.65.

The different classes in high-school are buying bonds and stamps either as a class or as individuals.

The Senior class has bought a \$25.00 bond and members of the class have bought stamps amounting to \$12.50.

The Junior class has bought a \$25.00 bond and some of the members intend to buy stamps.

These are the only classes to buy bonds, but the other classes in highschool and the grade school are buying stamps.

The Athletic Association has purchased a \$50.00 bond.

KNITTING

The high school girls, under the supervision of Mrs. Watson, have organized a knitting club for the purpose of knitting sweaters for the Red Cross. There are 25 girls who have started the knitting and five have started on their sweaters. One sweater has been completed by Sue Dickey.

Mrs. Watson has called a meeting of the girls at her home next Thursday evening at 6:30. She has asked that all the girls be present to learn new stitches and to start sweaters.

AMERICAN JUNIOR RED CROSS

Junior Red Cross Chapters have recently been organized throughout the Olustee school. 59 students have joined in the highschool and in the grades there are 94 students who joined.

The members subscribed to the following pledge before signing the Roll: We believe in service for others, in Health of mind and body to fit us for better service, and in world wide friendship. For this reason we have joined the American Junior Red Cross. We will help to make its work successful in our school and community and will work together with members everywhere in our own and other lands.

A \$150.00 Defense Bond and \$3.00 worth of stamps have been purchased with funds made in the 1941 Carnival. This represents the net profit after deducting expenses, plus \$21.00 for the Boxing show, which amount went into the O Club fund. This money will eventually be used to purchase a moving picture projector for the school.

The Olustee Eagle has purchased a \$50. Bond. The money used for this was a surplus that has been accumulated by the paper during the last two years.

## FOR DEFENSE

Thursday, December 18th, the school began a campaign for the sale of defense bonds and stamps. This is to be a part of the national drive for defense. This program urges people to invest in the U.S.A. because it is wise and patriotic to be thrifty; because the U.S.A. needs money to be used for re-arming our nation and for financing our entry into the war.

Class meetings were held and members of a general committee for defense were elected. The classes are going to encourage the people to invest their money in defense bonds and stamps. They have started this drive by purchasing or promising to purchase bonds and stamps as a class.

The Junior Class and Senior Class have each bought a \$25.00 bond and members in these classes plan to buy stamps individually.

The Sophomore Class plans for each person to sell \$1.00 worth of defense stamps.

The 8th grade and the Freshman Class plan for each individual to buy a defense stamp book and fill it out.

The Defense Committee is made up of two representatives from each class from the 8th grade and high school. These representatives are: Sue Dickey, Nila Drake, Nell Cleveland, Betty Jo Bates, Bill Krapff, Theodore Carpenter, Dorothy Jim McKenzie, Ollie Ada Hensley, Lora Lee Atchison and Geraldine Weber. The committee elected Nell Cleveland as its chairman.

The meeting of the Defense Committee resulted in the following resolutions: 1. To sell Defense Bonds and stamps. 2. To encourage the children of the school to be thrifty. 3. To encourage the students to bring buttons in answer to a request made by the Red Cross. 4. To make it possible for every girl in high school to knit as a means of helping the Red Cross. 5. To have a ballgame at which the admission will be at least one defense stamp.

## Olustee Students Buy Defense Bonds

OLUSTEE—A total of \$1,421.50 in defense bonds and stamps has been purchased by students and faculty members of the Olustee school system, the sales including 100 percent purchases by all pupils from the third grade through the senior class, Elmo Smith, superintendent, said.

Sales include \$221.50 in stamps and \$1,200 in bonds. In addition to the sales among the classes and faculty members, this includes also stamps and bonds purchased by the athletic association, the carnival fund, 4H club and Eagle fund of the school system.

## COOKIE SALE

In order to help raise Olustee's quota in the Red Cross Emergency Drive, the members of the Junior Red Cross are sponsoring a cookie-making project. When the Olustee group entered the Junior Red Cross, it was understood that each individual would do something to justify his membership. Some of the girls have done knitting, but some could not, so this project will give all an opportunity to do their bit.

Various students furnish the staple ingredients, which may be brought from home. Other ingredients, such as nuts, chocolate, etc., are purchased with Junior Red Cross funds.

The cookies are made after school in the Home Economics room under the supervision of Mrs. Watson and Miss Woodard.

To date three groups have made and sold 46 dozen cookies. Anyone interested in buying cookies, may order them at 15¢ a dozen.

## DEFENSE BALL GAME

Defense bonds and stamps are being sold at basket ball games all over the county. The Olustee defense ball game was held Saturday night, January 3rd when Olustee met Southside here.

At intervals during the game, officials would announce the amount of bonds and stamps that had been sold up to that time. Defense bond sales at the game totaled \$175.00 while the sale of stamps amounted to \$76.00 making a total of \$251.20.

The Southside girls fell under the Olustee girls 46-20. The Southside boys won 32-20.

Another defense game will be at Harmony Saturday night, January 10.



The Junior Red Cross was organized for the first time last year. Membership became 100% in a short time. During the year the students carried on different things. Some of the girls knit sweaters and a total of eight sweaters were turned in to the Red Cross. Others made and sold cookies in the community, and a total of \$12 from the sale was turned in to the Red Cross.

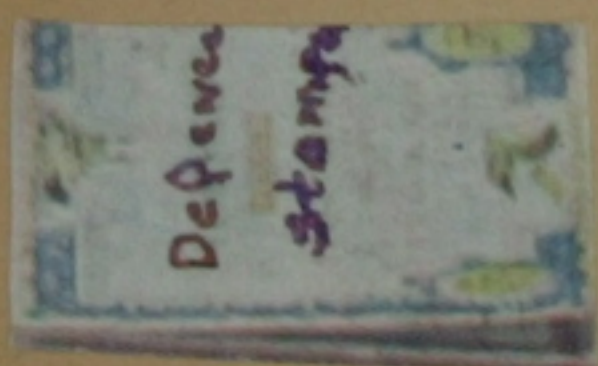

We sometimes wonder where all the money goes and why we should buy bonds and stamps when there are 130,000,000 other citizens in the United States to buy them.

In this edition of our paper on Page 6 we have listed some of the things your bonds & stamps will buy, separately. Besides all of those things listed there are many others that no one stamp or bond will buy. To show the great cost of this war, here are a few of the implements of war and their cost:

Table listing military equipment and costs: Sound Locator \$5,000, Anti-tank Gun 6,500, Barrage Balloon 10,000, Anti-aircraft Gun, 37mm. 20,000, 155mm. Howitzer 50,000, PT Boat 75,000, Medium Tank 75,000, Pursuit Plane 137,000, Flying Fortress 350,000, Submarine 3,000,000, Destroyer 3,000,000, Aircraft Carrier 150,000,000.

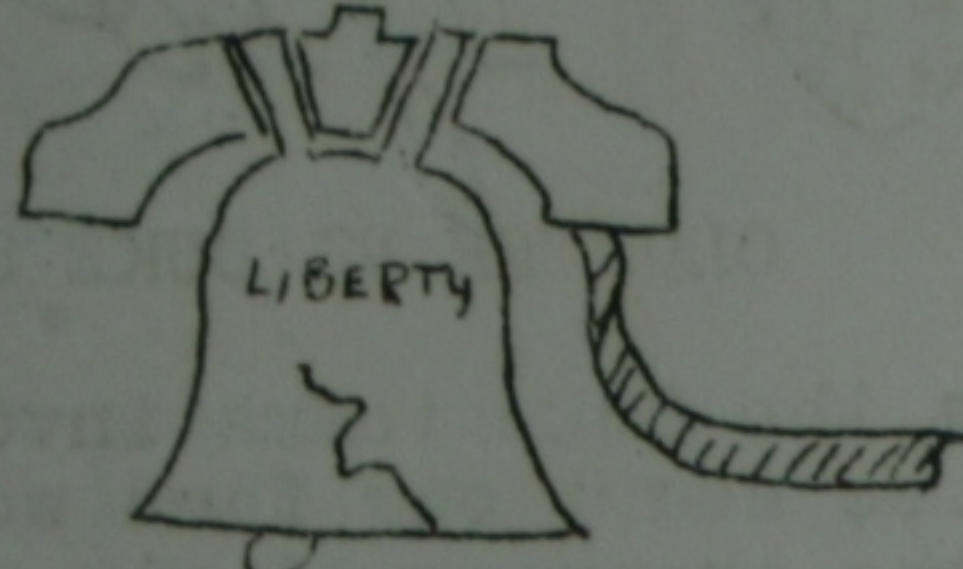
### COLD WEATHER PREVENTS GAME

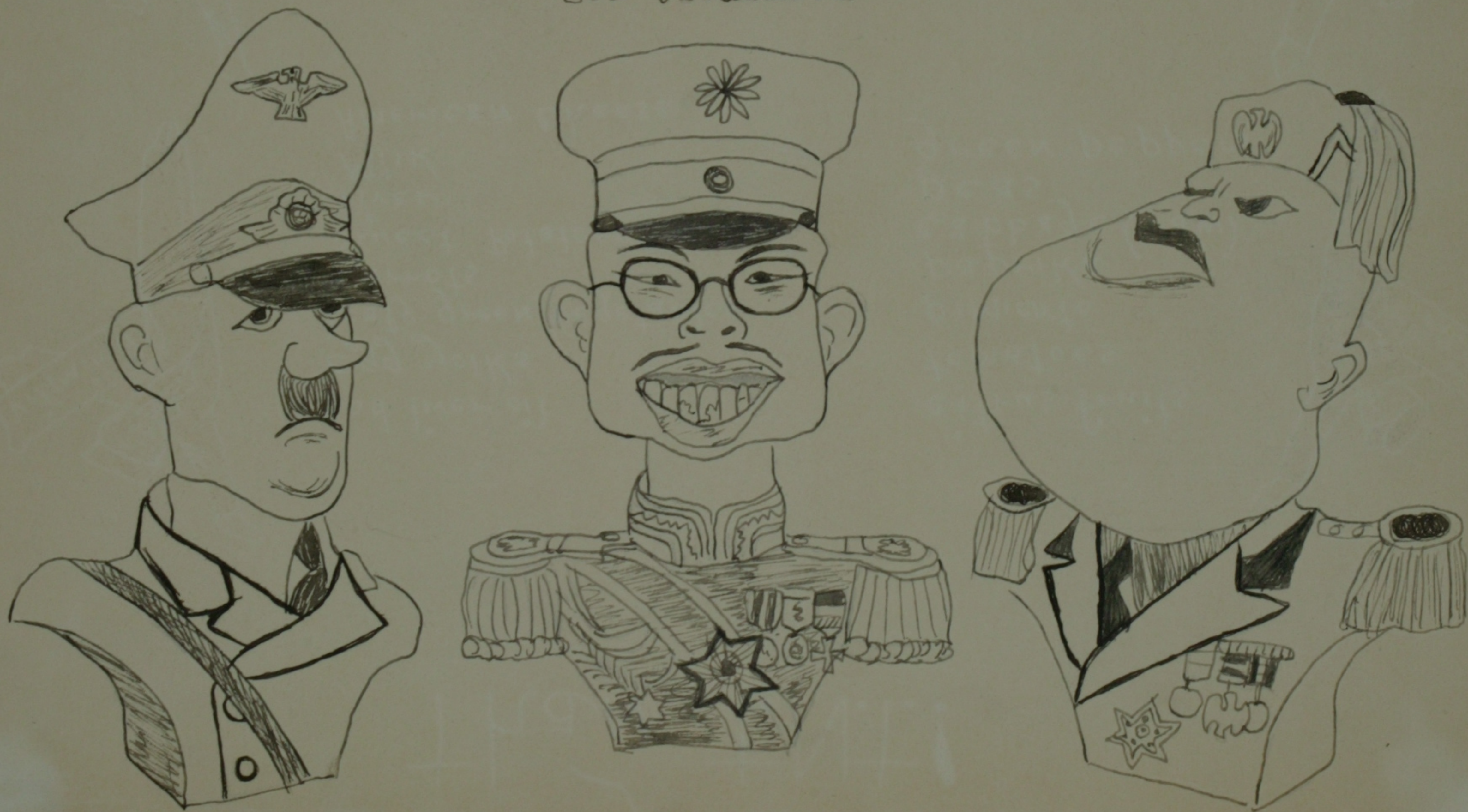

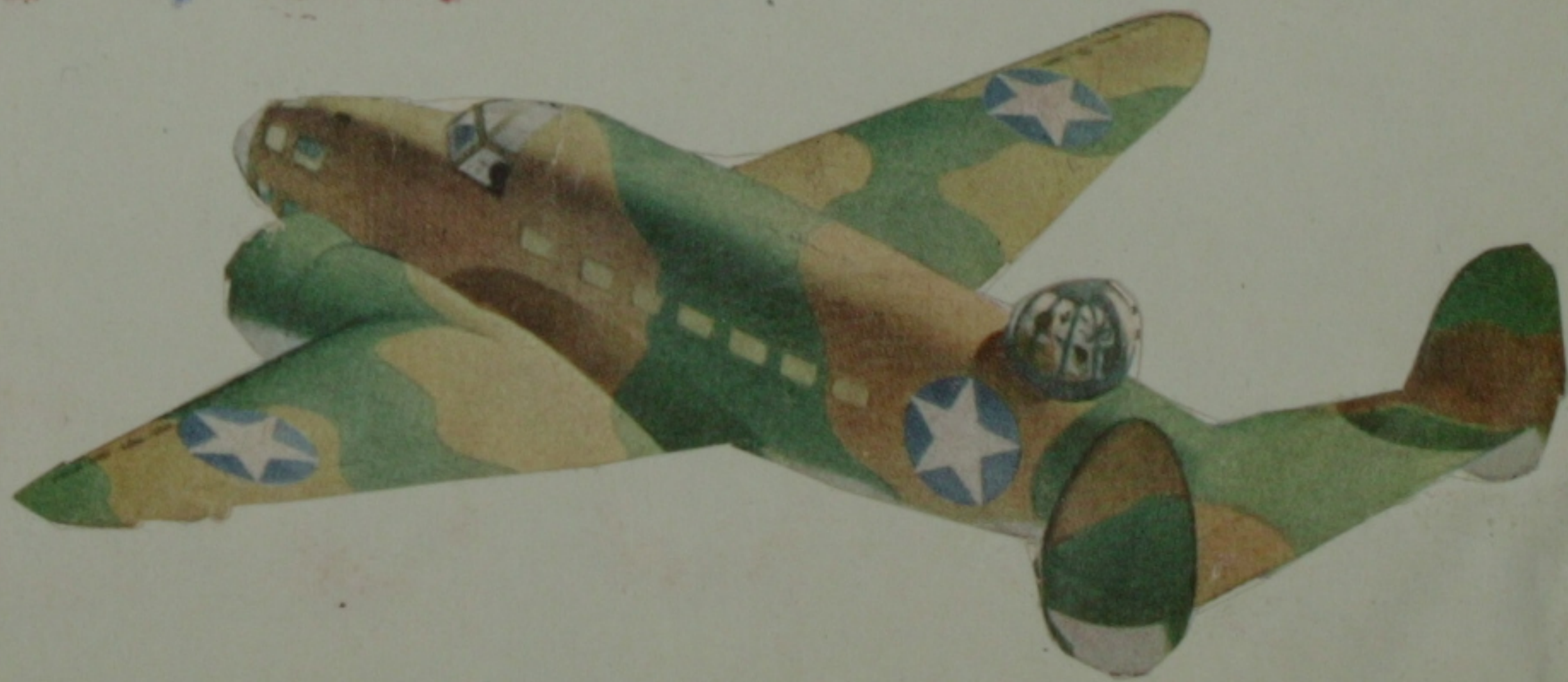
