A NEW COUNSELING SERVICE AT HERLAND

"Sometimes people feel like seeing a counselor means you're crazy," Cassia Mealor, M.S., private practice, said. "It does mean you need assistance to take control over your life."

A new counseling service for women became available in conjunction with Herland Sister Resources in July. Cassia Mealor has set up a private practice at the Bookstore and is available for individual and group counseling or facilitating support groups around specific issues for interested women.

Mealor has worked in community mental health centers in Ada and Oklahoma City for four and a half years. She helped to found the Ada Services for Battered Women and actively volunteers for the YWCA Crisis Intervention Services in Oklahoma City. She is a member of the Oklahoma County Task Force on Domestic Violence and the Oklahoma Coalition on Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault.

Services for Lesbian counseling for individuals and couples, counseling for women or men experiencing life adjustments, battered women, rape survivors, women with severe emotional challenges and intervention with Lesbian battering will be provided.

Mealor sees her role as a counselor as someone who "helps people find and use their power." "People seek counseling often in an emergency situation," Mealor said. "My goal is to help to make them stronger in order to handle the presenting problems, even before they occur - to use counseling as a learning tool as well as for crisis intervention."

"I do a combination of cognitive behavior and feminist counseling. Cognitive behavior helps people restructure the way they think about things and how they make decisions. I define feminist counseling as our right to control our lives."

"In an unusual break from tradition, women in the Moslem nation of Kuwait have been ordered not to wear traditional Moslem headgear while at the wheel of a car. The reason for this order? It seems that male fugitives may have cloaked themselves in women's garb to gad about the countryside. Last December, Kuwait was peppered with bomb attacks. A number of alleged pro-Iranian terrorists were convicted of perpetrating the barrage. Four got away, however, and the Kuwait's interior ministry has ordered the veils-off policy as a 'security measure.'"

A city ordinance recently passed the Minneapolis City Council that defined pornography
as discrimination against women, giving women
the right to file civil rights complaints
against the distributors of offensive materials.
The ordinance was vetoed by the mayor a week
later, yet it set a precedent in its approach
to pornography. It defined pornography not in
terms of sexual explicitness but rather as it
degrades and discriminates against women. The
ordinance was co-authored by writer Andrea
Dworkin and University of Minnesota law professor Catherine MacKinnon.

A California state law requiring that a woman returning from maternity leave be reinstated in her 'same or similar' job was ruled discriminatory because it does not require equal medical leave benefits for men. US District Court Judge Manuel Real rules that the state law, passed in 1978 allowing pregnant women up to four months disability leave from their jobs and reinstatement on their return, was in conflict with Title VII of the federal Civil Rights Act of 1964. Under the federal statute, women are assured of being reinstated to their former positions only if men, who are disabled and on medical leave, are given the same benefit.

The workshop runs from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. Saturday and 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Sunday. Registration is \$50. prior to September 1; \$40. for students and senior citizens; late registration add \$10. Scholarships are available for those unable to pay. Fees are non-refundable.

Jean Houston is an extraordinary teacher whose work awakens, enlarges and focuses our capacities for full and effective living. The integration of her scientific, historical and spiritual knowledge is a rich blend of storytelling, humor, intellect and rare depths of understanding and compassion. In the workshop, Dr. Houston will guide you through physical and mental exercises to develop new skills and techniques with which you may discover a fuller, richer self.

Formsix years, mind researcher Jean Houston studied the thought processes of Margaret Mead, trying to figure our why she was more creative than other people. The anthropologist never lost her capacity for cross-sensory experiences. She was always having "sensuous bouts with ideas...she was thinking in images all the time. We would go in a room and she would sniff the conversation. She was operating out of an almost aboriginal sense of sensory knowing and her senses were so rich she was seeing sound, hearing color." Jean Houston's most recent book <u>The Possible</u> Human outlines the process by which the individual can increase and integrate the dormant potential of the mind, body, and emotions. Other books include <u>Life Force: The Psychohistorical Recovery of the Self, Listening to the Body, and Mind Games.</u>

The Lesbian Task Force of the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence is requesting papers to be published in an anthology for distribution to lesbian and gay groups, anti-rape and domestic violence programs.

The first priority is for the stories of battered lesbians about their personal experiences. The second priority is for discussion papers on topics such as: the dynamics of violence in lesbian relationships, services for battered lesbians, self-defense, power dynamics in interracial relationships, confrontation and accountability of batterers. confidentiality of the individual vs. community involvement, police and courts, political analysis, community response.

Entre Nous (Between Us), a film by Diane Kurys, is having a brief showing at the Screening Room, 4316 N. Western in Oklahoma City. Its run ends Thursday, August 2nd, but the community should clamour for an extended run! This is a piece of art well worth seeing, and more than once. There is a central reason for this. That is, Entre Nous is resonant with female experience. The title itself gives us our first clue to the nature of this mode and the instruments of the wisdom and melodies: Between (mode) Us (instruments). And the film is precisely this: a brilliant revelation of the social, emotional, historical contexts surrounding its characters, and the thousands of myriads of sparkling moments and ways in which all these things and people are connected. And most incredibly, shows the infinite complexity surrounding any decision to action.

To be more specific, the storyline is this: Two Women are the principle characters, Lena and Madeleine. They are shown growing up as young Women in WWII Europe, each one experiencing an aspect of that terrible conflict in their personal lives. By means of carefully revealed incidents and details we come to understand the social and emotional climate within which these two young Women's early lives were shaped. By means of this same technique; carefully revealed incidents and details, their lives after the their marriages, their children, their life-choices and reasonings are laid before us like an intricate and subtle tapestry. Then, they are brought together by an accident of fortune (Fate, that most subtle and inexplicable of Goddesses). Instantly a bond is forged between them born of their commonality as victim, survivor, woman. From there on the film explores the deepening of that bond. Mind you, this film is set in the early 1950's in Europe, the time-frame of the "Feminine Mystique". Even so, these two women end up leaving their husbands and children and living together.

The emotional needs and atmospheres, and the circumstances which precipitate this incredible action are brilliantly portrayed and reveal the hearts and minds of women more beautifully, more clearly, more truly, than any other film I have ever seen. We need more filmmakers like Diane Kurys to explore with such clarity, sensitivity and finesse all the myriad aspects and phases of women as

they have lived, historically and today. We need such filmmakers to transform and confirm our images of ourselves and the world. Go see it. And if you miss it, petition the Screening Room to Bring it Back!

TOMOE GOZEN, THE GOLDEN NAGINATA, THOUSAND SHRINE WARRIOR, by Jessica Amanda Salmonsen Ace Books - a review

A woman balanced precariously between spirituality and violence. A woman, strong, graceful and passionate. A woman who questions the nature of authority and freedom for her life. A woman who is restless at the edges of her untameable self. These phrases describe Jessica Amanda Salmonsen's epichera, Tomoe Gozen.

In the three books of this landmark trilogy, we watch the woman, Tomoe, grow from fiery, hot-headed youth, through a flamingly brilliant career, to a restless and searching later life. This trilogy, in fantasy form, offers a life-process model for women, a process modeled on personal power founded in bodily and spiritual harmony between self, community and nature.


The books may be problematic for many Feminists in that they contain a great deal of violence. But be patient. These portrayals are used throughout the trilogy to question the value, place and nature of Violence (for instance, who and how does it really serve?) The reader's patience is also rewarded by the fact that Salmonsen is a writer of deep power with a brilliant feminist philosophical bent to her imagination. Let her spirit enter, strengthen and illuminate yours.
