The Boston Women's Health Book Collective published this report August, 1984.

A NEW DISEASE: In 1980, the public learned about Toxic Shock Syndrome (TSS). It is a rare but serious disease which mainly strikes menstruating women under 30 who are using tampons. Although only a small number of menstruating women have gotten TSS, a few of them have died.

SYMPTOMS: This disease is a syndrome or group of syndromes. At present, only those people who have all the symptoms listed are officially counted as having TSS. However, there are reports of people with a few of the symptoms who have a milder form of the same disease. The symptoms are: a high fever, usually over 102, vomiting, diarrhea, a sudden drop in blood pressure which may lead to shock, a sunburn-like rash.

CAUSE: Little is actually known about TSS and information is changing rapidly. It is probably caused by a new strain of the bacterium Staphlococcus aureus (S. aureus). The bacterium infects some part of the body, often the vagina, and produces toxins (poisons) which go into the bloodstream. Researchers do not know why TSS occurs with the use of tampons. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has found a higher risk of TSS with higher absorbency tampons. No one knows if this is because of the absorbency itself, the materials which make the tampon more absorbent, or some other factor. Although, tampons have been for sale since the 1930s, they have changed in the last 10-15 years with the introduction of super-absorbent fibers like modified cotton or rayon polyacrylate. Ingredients are now listed on the box.

TREATMENT & FOLLOW-UP: If you get any of the symptoms listed during your period and you are using a tampon, remove it immediately. Do not use tampons or any other internal method for catching menstrual blood until you get a culture showing that you do not have any S. aureus in your vagina. It's a good idea to get in touch right away with a medical person who can keep track of what is happening to you. For a mild case, the most important thing is to drink lots of fluids and rest if possible. TSS involving severe dehydration or very low blood pressure may require hospitalization with medical treatment. Although antibiotics do not seem to affect symptoms once the disease has started, they can still significantly reduce the chance of recurrence. Since this type of S. aureus is pencillin and ampicillin

resistant, beta-lactamace anti-staphlococcal antibiotics must be used.

PREVENTING TSS: You can reduce your risk of getting TSS the most by not using any internal menstrual product. Use the least absorbent tampon you can to collect your flow. If it is dry or difficult to pull out when you remove it, then you need a less absorbent one at that point in your flow. You may also reduce the risk with tampons by using them on and off during menstruation. Although some groups recommend changing tampons frequently, there is no evidence that this reduces the chance of getting TSS. Some women have chosen to use natural sea sponges or diaphragms to collect menstrual fluid. No one knows if the risk of TSS with these alternative methods is any different from that with tampons. There have been at least two cases of TSS associated with sponges. There are mixed reports on whether sponges are contaminated by pollutants while growing in the ocean and how serious a problem this is. Currently, women's clinics have diverse opinions on whether to recommend sponges. The FDA has stopped distribution of sponges for menstruation, usually done by one-woman businesses, while moving slowly in requiring stricter standards for tampons.

WHAT NEEDS TO BE DONE: Believe it or not, tampons have never been subjected to government or independent studies for safety and efficacy. More research needs to be done. One piece of information the consumer can and should know is how absorbent each type of tampon is. Finally, in response to consumer pressure, the FDA is moving to require labeling on the box. Give BOOKS This Holiday.....

The Thin Woman, by Dorothy Cannell. St. Martin's Press, 1984. 242 pp. \$13.95 cloth

Dorothy Cannell's first novel, The Thin Woman is an occasionally feminist, sometimes silly, always entertaining combination of mystery, treasure hunt, family saga, love story, and British drawing-room comedy. The best thing about this book is its delightful heroine, Ellie Simons, who is smart, articulate, forthright, and witty - altogether worthy of joining P.D. James's Cordelia Gray and Amanda Cross's KateFansler in a feminist gallery of sleuths.

Taking It Like a Woman: A Personal History, by Ann Oakley. Random House, 1984. 212 pp. \$14.95 cloth

Sociologist Ann Oakley says she began this book, which is an autobiography, a social history, and a collection of fictional scenes, as an attempt to answer a series of important questions that she felt uneasy about: What makes a feminist? How can a feminist find a congenial place within a patriarchal society? What is the nature of love between men and women? How do we face our own mortality? This book is so searchingly honest that it is sometimes painful to read, but the reward is worth the effort.

Jewish and Female: Choices and Changes in Our Lives Today, by Susan Weidman Schneider Simon and Schuster, 1984. 640 pp. \$19.95

This is an immensely valuable resource for women who are committed feminists and committed Jews. It lucidly summarizes the activities of Jewish women over the past fifteen years in both religious and secular environments.

Children of the Wolf, by Jane Yolen. The Viking Press. 136 pp. \$11.50 cloth

Jane Yolen, a prolific, award-winning writer, has done it again. Children of the Wolf is an engrossing "young adult" read. Yolen writes, she says, with great joy. She crafts carefully because children read with their whole heart.

A brilliant tour de force by one of the modern masters of science fiction. Short stories.

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
