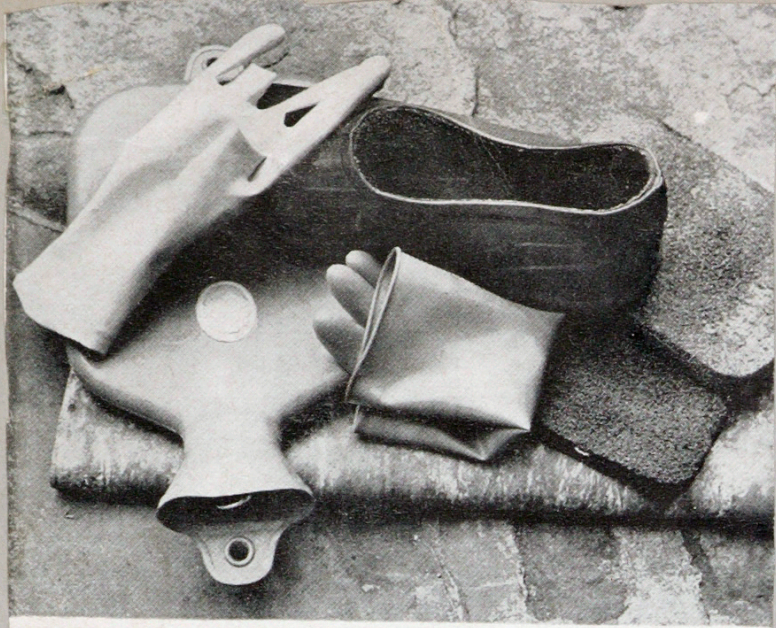

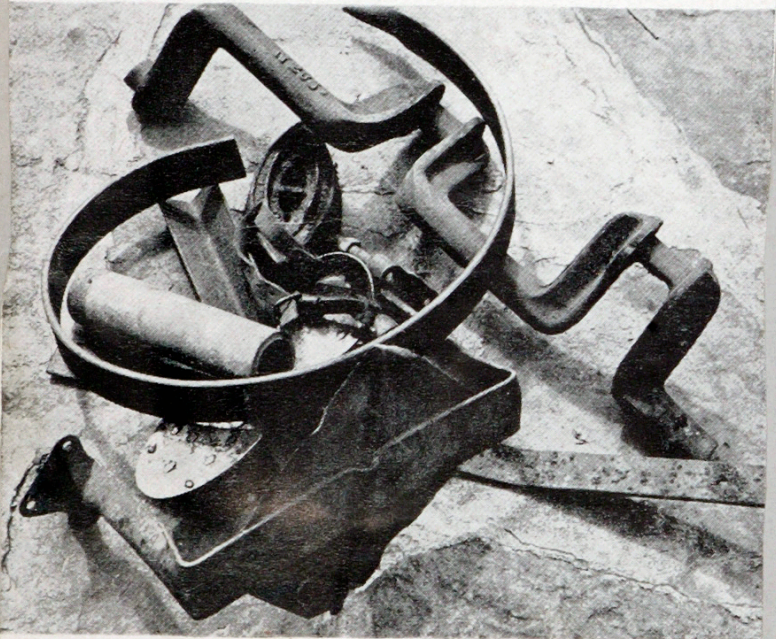

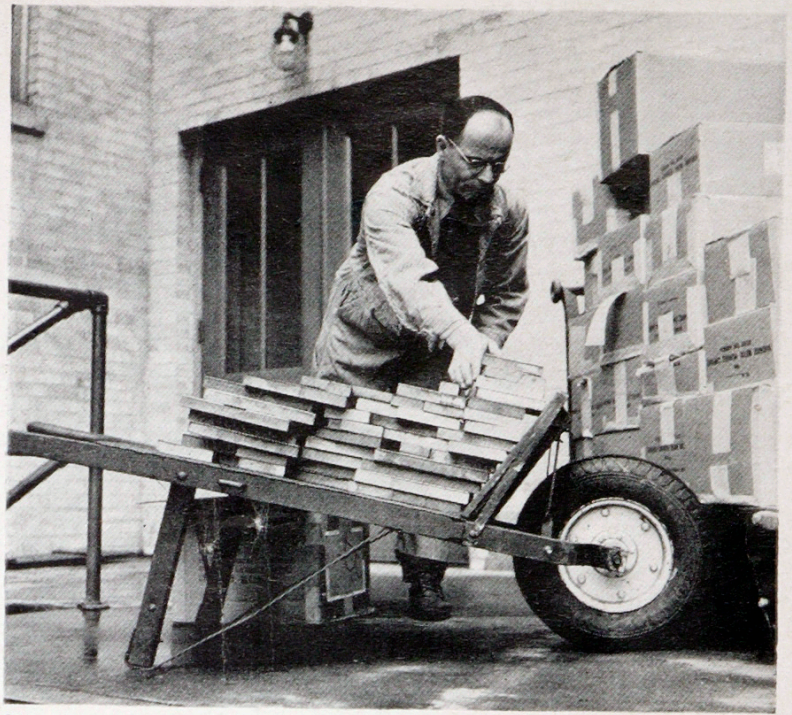


SCRAP METAL IS PRECIOUS. CALL JUNKMAN ONLY AFTER ASSEMBLING BIG PILE

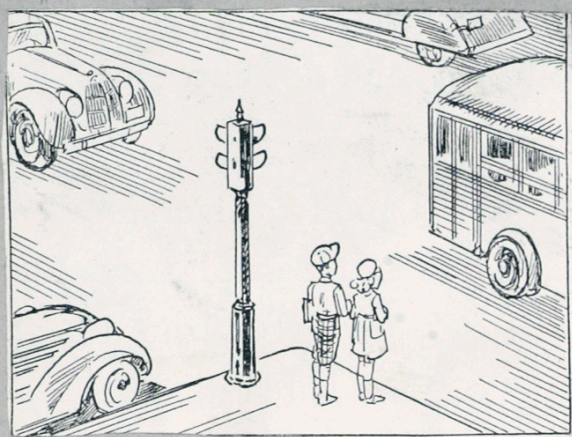

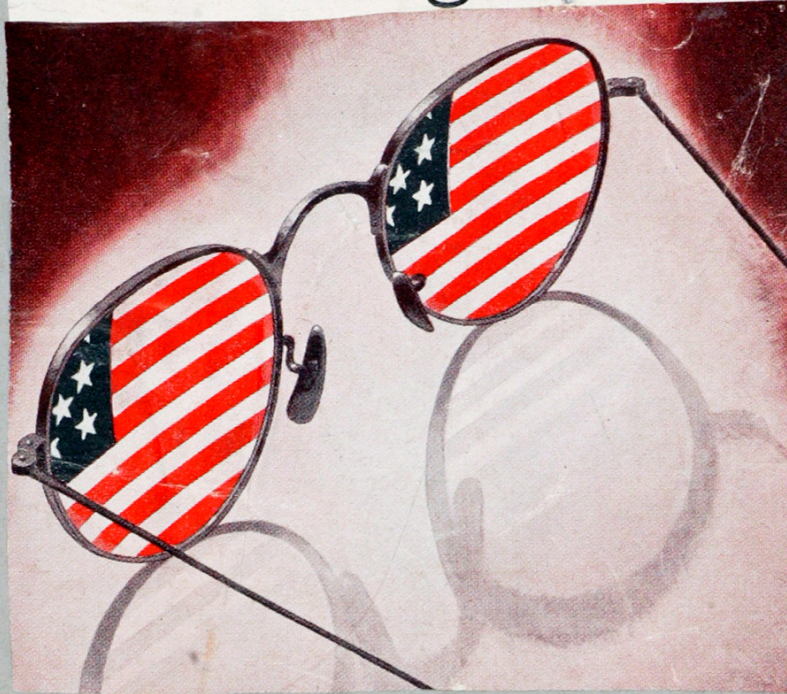
