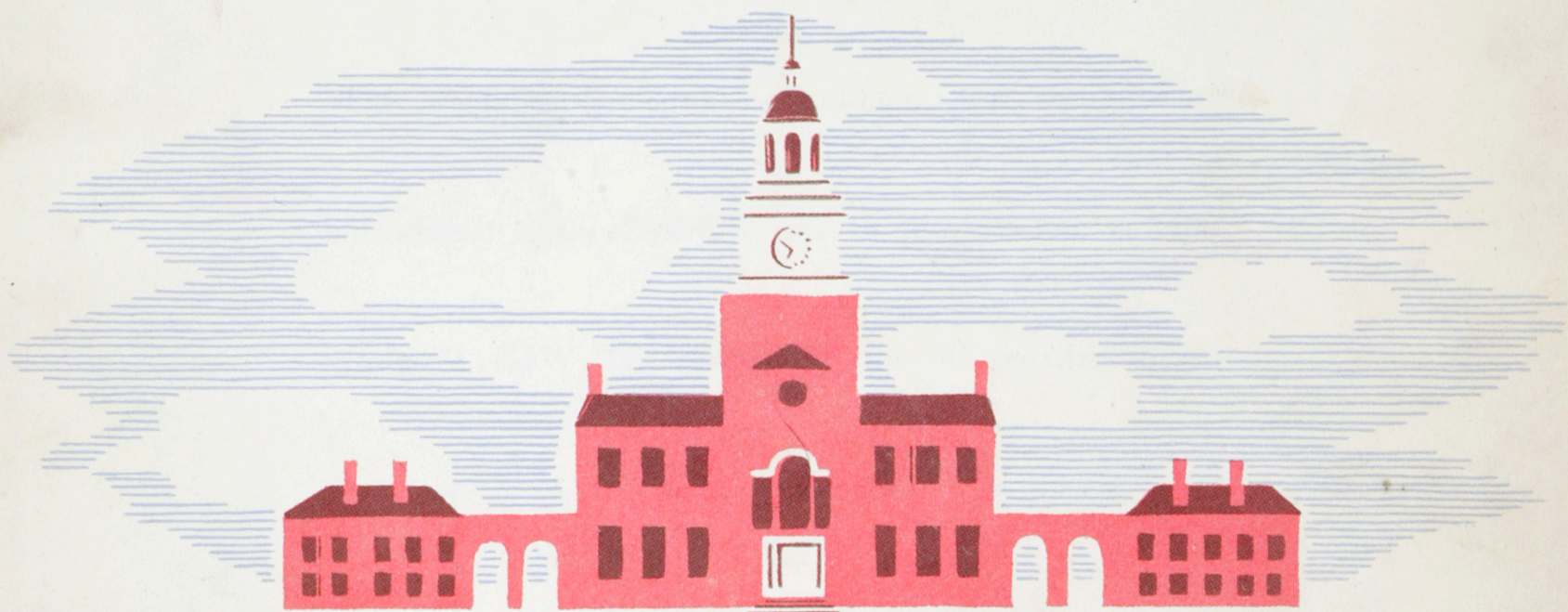

We have 14 pupils in our school. They are Helen Lee Rowan, David Proctor, Marwin Liberton, Reba Proctor, Donnie Baker, Billy Carmichael, Mary Jo Letter, Waunnette Baker, Mary Catherine Bellinghausen, Nadine Baker, Anna Black, Max Black, James Bellinghausen and Gerald Mitchell.

On Sept. 1, 1942 we had

\$97.20 in War Stamps and Bonds.

On Feb. 6, 1943 we had

\$188.05 in War Stamps and Bonds.

We have purchased \$90.15 in War Stamps and Bonds since Sept. 1, 1942.

Fourteen pupils helped with the scrap drive. We delivered letters, made posters and had 15,500 pounds of scrap to our credit.

We helped the neighborhood Chairmen see how many pounds of fat had been sold in our

district. The last report was 20 pounds.

Ten pupils are very saving with everything they have.

Eleven pupils are to have a Victory Garden.

Nine pupils spend 10% of their earnings for war stamps.

Several pupils will have posters or stories in this Scrap book.

When asked to list other things they had done to win the war, the list was as follows:

Raising live stock and poultry.

Encouraging others to do the same.

Joined the W. A. F. C.

Eat plenty to keep healthy.

Help mother a lot.

We have two groups; one of boys and one of girls - who write to a man in the service at least once a month.

We have fourteen members of the Good Food Patrol.

How We Can help Win This War

We can help win this war by buying war savings stamps and bonds, saving scrap metal and oil, fats, and old tin cans.

When you flatten your tin cans cut out both ends and then put them on the inside of the round part then flatten them out.

Take your old lard that you do not want to use anymore. put it in a tin container until get enough to sell then take it to your nearest grocer and sell it to him. They pay a penny a pound.

You can help save your clothes by not getting down on the ground and rolling.

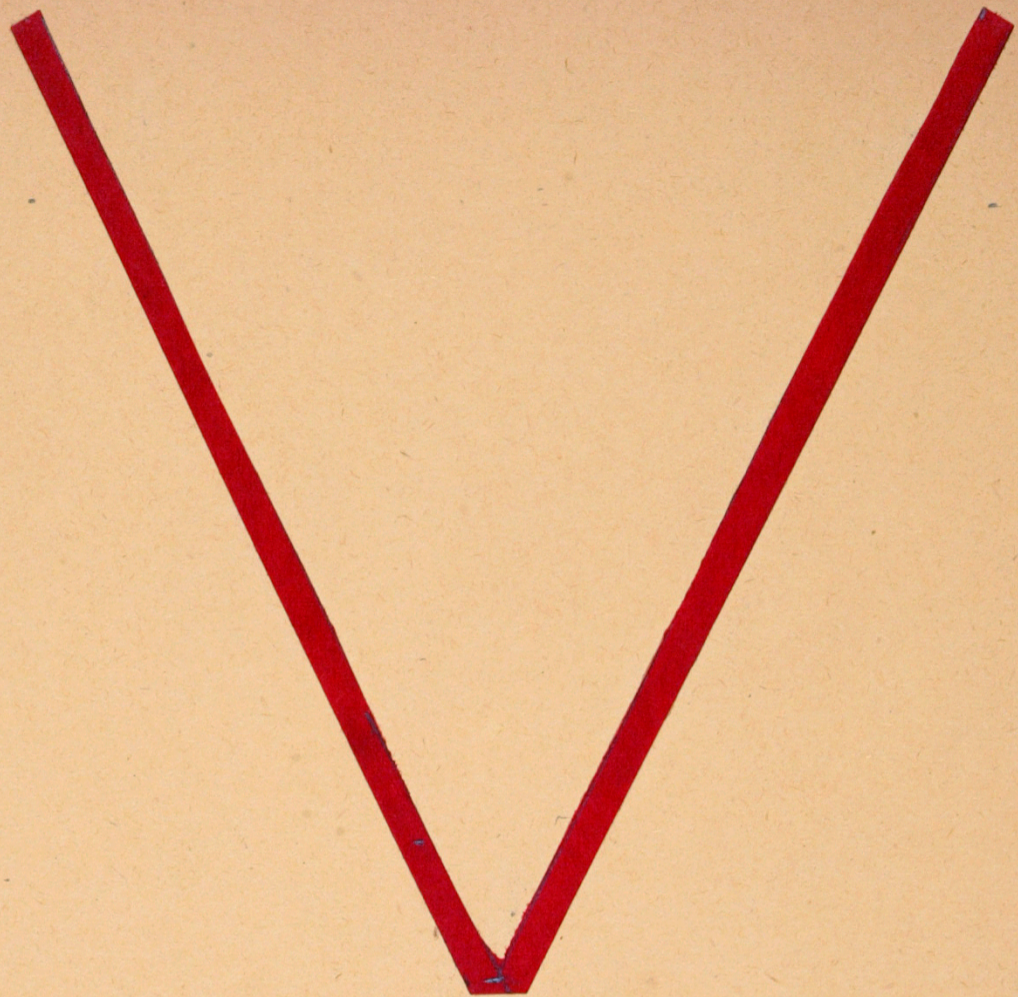
We can help our parents more than we used to do. We can help milk, feed chickens, or do some housework like sweeping or washing and wiping dishes.

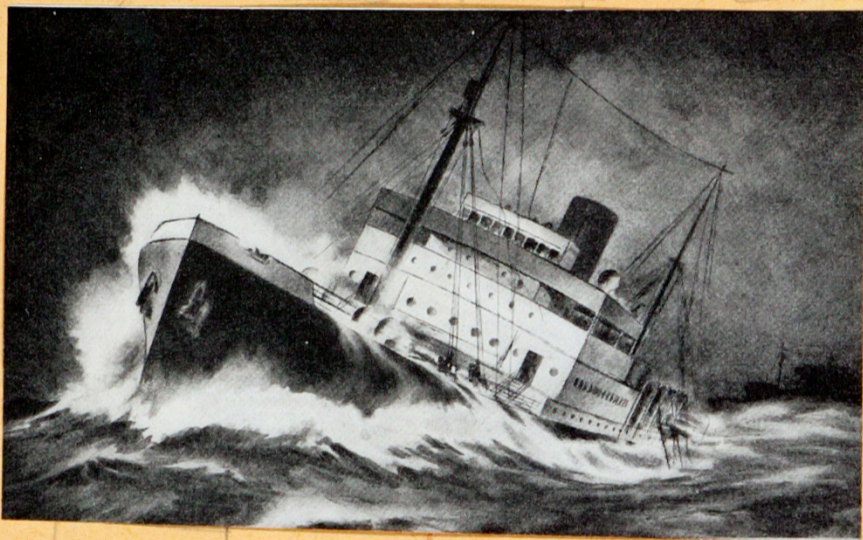

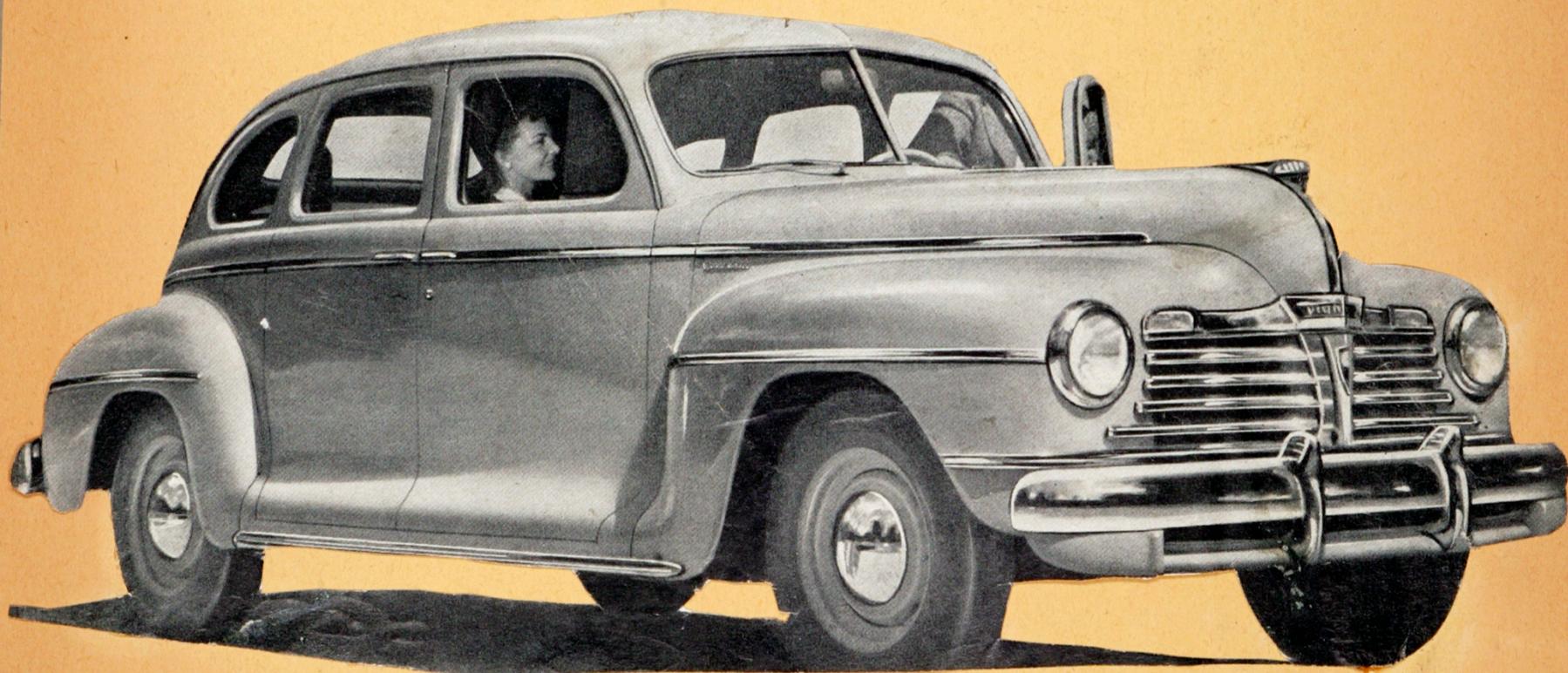

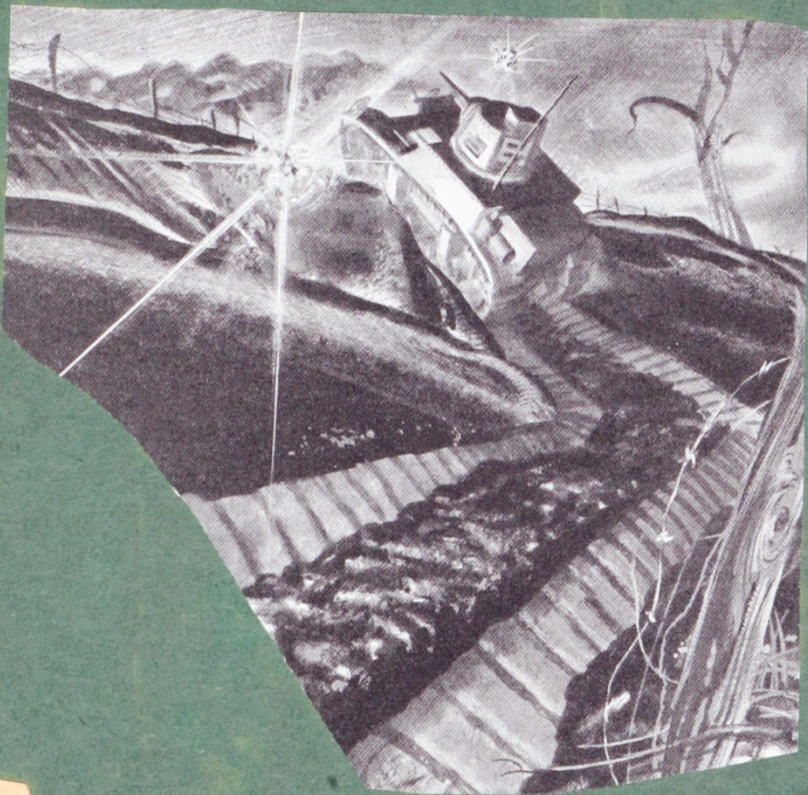
