TO ALL PRINCIPALS

SUBJECT: SCRAP DRIVE

1. You must finish your publicity by Friday.
2. Monday at 11:30, all home rooms should have a meeting to put the finishing touches on the program. School will be dismissed at noon Monday to celebrate the beginning of this drive and to give the boys and girls a half-day in which they can begin to accumulate their materials.
3. Scrap should not be brought to the pens until Tuesday morning.
4. Arrange a small box for the small pieces of metal.
5. Divide your scrap metal into two classes: Namely, A. Scrap metal that has more iron than tin, B. Scrap that has more tin than iron. These two metals should be in separate piles.
6. There are no individual prizes offered for bringing in scrap. It is the patriotic duty of every boy and girl as a citizen to do his best.
7. Busses will run at one o'clock Monday afternoon.
8. The bus drivers will be notified that they should haul small pieces of scrap for students. Of course they can not overload their busses or haul pieces that are so large that they interfere with the transportation of the students.
9. Be sure and arrange some way for your students to make reports on heavy scrap, giving you the location, person donating it, and approximate weight. These written statements should be kept by the principal until further notice.
10. Let's make this drive big in every way.

The Victory Night which was scheduled for Thursday has been postponed due to booking difficulties of the picture to be shown. An announcement will be made later giving the new date.

As the government has asked conservation of all goods, it will be necessary to make clothing last as long as possible. As many items are discarded due to style and similar factors, it was felt that these garments should be re-done. The clinic will be held in the home economics department on Saturdays from 9 to 11 a. m., beginning February 20, under the di-

rection of Miss Lola Bellmyer and Miss Marie Moreland.

A new course in Dairy production has been instituted by the Vocational Agriculture Department. This course is designed to aid the farmers with their direct problems. Any one interested should see M. A. Shields or Euland Collins.

All home rooms at the high school are participating in Junior Red Cross work. Each home room is engaged in making at least one article on the approved list of projects issued by headquarters of the National Red Cross. The items being made include such things as Afghans, bed jackets, card table covers, bed occupation tables, book marks, canes, lap boards, memorandum pads, and amusement games.

Huge Scrap Drive Launched In County

MONDAY IS "ALL-OUT FOR ALL SCRAP" DAY IN CITY OF IDABEL

Schools To Turn Out In Afternoon

Monday afternoon is to be Idabel's "All-Out For All Scrap" Day, Acting Mayor Pete Williams said this morning.

He urges that each business establishment delegate at least one employee at that time to make a thorough inspection of the business premises for scrap and that each housewife take out two or three hours to make a thorough search of her home and grounds for scrap iron and rubber overlooked in previous drives.

All city schools will let out at noon and all students will be asked to bring all available scrap to the grounds of their respective schools.

NOTICE

Anyone who can supply a truck or trucks to assist the school students in collecting scrap should leave his name at the Gray high school office or report it by phone at 772.

R. H. Burton, superintendent, said this morning.

Persons may either throw their scrap into the city ring in the square, sell it to a junk dealer themselves or give it to some student to add to the school quota. In any event, Williams said, the big idea is to clean out all of the scrap in the town Monday afternoon.

Luther Davis, firechief, suggested that since October 4 to 10 is Fire Prevention Week, persons might make inspections of their homes for fire hazards Monday and do a double job at one time.

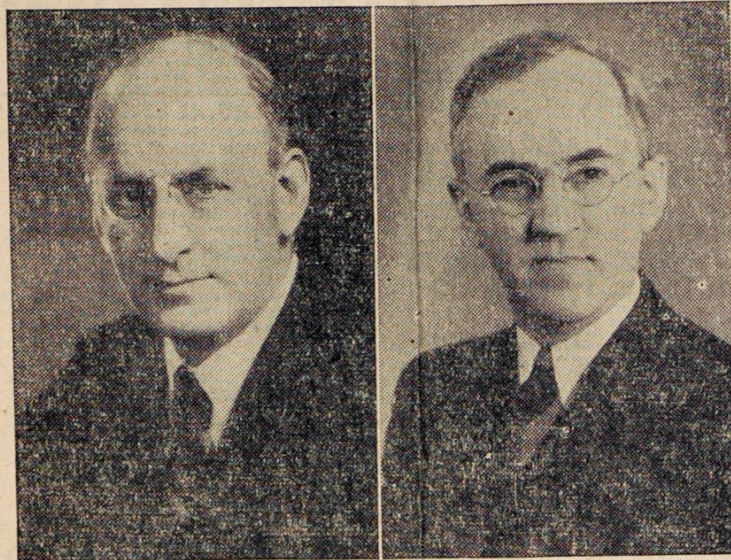
"MARCH OF DIMES" GETS UNDERWAY

COLLECTION OF EVERY PIECE OF SCRAP SET AS GOAL OF DRIVE

SCHOOLS TO BE USED AS CENTRAL COLLECTING POINTS FOR MATERIAL

The schools of McCurtain county both city and rural, were requested this week to act as the principal gathering agencies in the most intensive scrap drive yet attempted in the county.

The drive, which is now officially underway, is the climax of the scrap-gathering program and has as its goal the collection of every piece of metal, rubber and other war-vital material which has been overlooked in previous drives.

The steel mills of the country are urgently needing metal in order to keep up war production, the chairmen of the drive, W. H. Chandler and Guy R. Old, pointed out, and it is up to us to see that they get it—NOW, not in the future.

In a meeting this week with Lero McClendon, county superintendent, plans were made for utilizing every school and every teacher and student in the county in this drive as well as every parent and other individual in the various school districts.

McClendon said that he would request that every school yard be used as a collecting point and that he would name a principal or teacher to head the drive for each school.

And each school will be given orders to shut down one day in order that the teachers and students may make a thorough canvass of the vicinity and gather scrap material. Each school may select the day on which it is to close.

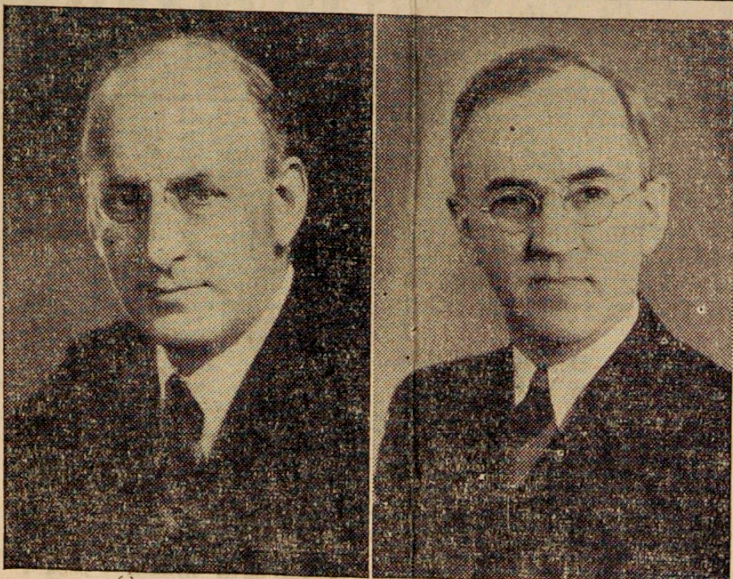

Every other individual in the
 county should consider himself as
 chairman of his premises and con-
 sider it his duty to see that not one
 scrap of material is left on them.

The McCurtain county rationing
 board has requested that every per-
 son using rationed rubber consider
 himself a hauling agent. There is
 no way to enforce this ruling at
 present, they admitted, but the co-
 operation it receives will figure in
 future requests for rationed rubber.

Each school must master its own
 transportation problem. It is sug-
 gested that when enough scrap has
 accumulated, some trucker be hired
 to haul it to the nearest junk dealer
 for sale and his fee paid from the
 proceeds.

Private individuals may do their
 own hauling or may hire it done in
 the same manner used by the schools.

Each school and each individual
 may use the proceeds of this drive
 in any way it sees fit. They may
 give it to some charitable organiza-
 tion, or they may use it for some
 school project.

Bennie Jo Weatherspoon was appointed to make the curtain for the Student Council room door.


The Student Council would like to thank Miss Farmer's homeroom for contributing \$15 to the moving picture projector, we now like \$20 having the payment.

To Teachers:

1. The gasoline rationing is set for Thurs., Fri., and Sat. of this week. We can have students to take care of it during the week but it will be necessary to have teachers on duty Saturday. If you can work Saturday, please leave your name with me.
2. This is National Education Week and we may have visitors. Please show them every courtesy and consideration possible.

To Students:

1. This is National Education Week and we have a special theme for each day. We will have assemblies Tuesday and Friday at 2 o'clock. Wednesday at 10:50 we will have a special Armistice Day Program. Tuesday Activity A and Thursday Activity B will float. Wednesday the first two hour classes will meet. School will be dismissed at 11:30. Busses will run at 12 o'clock.
2. Let us see how many war stamps and bonds we can buy Wednesday noon and show our appreciation of Armistice Day by contribution to a future Armistice Day.
3. The football game between Hugo and Idabel will be played at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. There will be a special Army demonstration at the football field at 1:30 and a parade down-town at Hugo at 10:30.
4. The Pep Club and Band will not attend the Hugo game. Members are requested not to wear uniforms if you go.
5. The Football squad will be excused all day Wednesday. All other students must be in school.
6. In regard to the gasoline rationing: Please pass this information on to your parents, car owners or other who will be affected. The rationing will take place at the office in the IA building on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. The office will open at seven and close at six. This will be the only place in Idabel that gas-rationing books will be issued to car owners.

To obtain a gas-rationing book, each car owner must secure an application from the filling stations and have it filled out. The car owner must not have more than five tires per motor vehicle if he expects to secure a gasoline rationing car. Only passenger cars, motorcycles and motor bikes can secure gas-rationing books at the High School. We have no information regarding trucks, pick-ups, and similar vehicles, but they will not apply to the school for gas-rationing cards. The persons using gasoline for non-highway uses, such as tractors, washing-machines, ironers and etc. will get their gasoline permit from the local rationing board. Persons who will need more than the basic allotment may secure applications for B cards at the High School. These must be filled out and taken to the local rationing board.

Please stress the fact that the application must be filled out prior to coming to the school.
